TOWNS AND CITIES IN LOWER SAXONY IN WORKERS' HANDS

Falkenstehyn, Saxony, March 27.—
(By the Associated Press).—Workers have taken over control in towns and cities of Lower Saxony, but there is an impression their ascendancy will be short-lived, as they are not sufficiently organized in a military way to resist pressure successfully. The principal task of the workers is policing the town.

Amsterdam, March 27.-Telegraphing from Dusseldorf after a visit to neadquarters and the front of the Red army in the Ruhr district, the correspondent of the Amsterdam Handelsblad says: 'At general headquarters of the revolution, which is at Duisburg, nobody seems to know exactly what is happening at the front. Some say there has been no fighting for some time, while others declare the fighting has not stopped. The Red troops go from their homes to the front at their own will and fight for a while, and then return home to sleep and eat a bite. The Reds are a heterogeneous mass, wearing red arm bands, ribbons or neckties. Some of them had red shirts.
"The only thing in common to all is that they carry rifles. While the rest of the world uses such terms as 'government troops,' 'spartacans' and the like, in the fighting area, everyone speaks only of "Noskes," which includes all varieties of the former class, and "Carabinen" wh include all Reds. CHARGES MONEY RING TRYING TO **BUY NOMINATION**

Senator Borah Says Effort To Purchase Presidential

ACCUSES BOTH PARTIES

Convention.

Advocates Congressional Action To Regulate Candidates' Expenditures.

WASHINGTON, March 26.—A direct charge that big financial interests were trying to buy the national convention of the Republican and Democrat parties was made in the Senate today by Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, in a speech advocating congressional action to regulate the pre-convention expenditures of candidates for the presidency.

expenditures of candidates for the presidency.

Concentrating his attack on the backers of Major-Gen. Leonard Wood and Governor Lowden for the Republican nomination, Senator Borah declared the Wood managers were attempting "to control the Republican convention by the use of money," while the Lowden organization apparently was spending even greater sums to gain support for their candidate. Within ten days, he predicted, two Democratic aspirants, whom he did not name, would be found spending quite as much as any Republican in the field.

The speech brought on a heated debate, during which Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, manager of Gen, Wood's Washington headquarters, made a general denial that excessive funds had been used in the Wood candidacy, or that any money had been spent except "legitimately and necessarily."

Calling on all the candidates to tell the country voluntarily how much they were spending and where it was coming from, Senator Borah cited newspaper reports that the Wood promoters had pledged a campaign fund of \$1,000,000, that "testimonials" indorsing Gen. Wood were being bought in Indiana for \$2.50 each, and that every vote cast for the Wood or Lowden candidacies on the recent South Dakota primaries represented an expenditure of \$10. Such a situation, said the senator, forecast a saturnalia of corruption unless Congress intervened.

Premier Charges Labor Program Means Co-operative Commonwealth.

LOP-SIDED EDUCATION

Says Men Who Started Movement Not Among Working Classes.

LONDON, March 26 .- Premier Lloyd George and Herbert H. Asquith, former premier, and member of the House of Commons for Paisley, are conducting an informal debate over the right to claim the leadership of the Liberal party. Incidentally, the question who will be the predominant figure in the National Liberal Club, the party's headquarters. is involved. Mr. Asquith's supporters arranged a luncheon in his honor at the club last Wednesday, and the premier's Liberal followers organized a luncheon honor of Mr. Lloyd George today. In his speech at today's luncheon, Premier Lloyd George defended his at-ack of last week on the Labor party, which he has been condemned by oth the Labor party and the party of

Mr. Asquith.
"The program of the Labor party is to put an end to the capitalistic system and create a co-operative commonwealth," he declared. "I have read carefully everything said by Mr. Clynes (John Robert Clynes), the Laborite, and Mr. Henderson (Arthur Henderson, Laborite), and all the apologies of the Labor party. Not one of them denies that the doctrine of the Labor party is

doctrine of communism.

Doctrine Not Sincere. "It is said by some that the doctrine is not sincere; that common owner-ship is only put into the Labor pro-gram in order to conciliate a section of the party. That is a very danger-ous thing in these days. These are tropical days when seed put into the ground spreads, sprouts and brings forth fruit with startling rapidity. You must not put doctrines of that kind into the forefront of the program of a powerful party, and then say they mean nothing.
"Suppose the Labor party won a gen-

eral election and formed a government. You may say Mr. Clynes and Mr. Henderson are moderate men who would not do these things, but they would have to do them or break faith with the people who put them in power. We cannot take any chances in these revolutionary days. The nation must realize what the Labor program means, then wake its challe with its every

TOWNSHIPS DO NOT WANT GOVERNMENT LOANS FOR ROADS

Not Likely To Take Advantage of Offer, Says County Engineer Talbot.

It is not likely that any of the townships in the County of Middlesex will take advantage of the offer of the Government of a loan of money without interest for a period of five years for the purpose of improving the roads, according to County Engineer C. Talbot. The farmers, he said, in the county had always shown indications that they would rather pay for the construction and upkeep of the roads as they went.

A loan of a considerable sum of money would be of no use to a township unless that township had a considerable building program ahead of i and intended to construct new roads he thought. There was little construc-tion to be done in the county of Mid-dlesex, and the county was rich enough to bear the cost without outside assist-

ance.

Great Aversion.

"The farmers have always shown a great aversion to the assuming of debts, and at the present time the County of Middlesex owes little money," he said. "No debentures except those for schools and ditching have been issued and by adding three or four mills to the tax rate the whole debt of the county could be wiped out.

"The only use which such a loan could be put to would be for the construction of bridges. At the present time there is one big bridge to be built, and that is in the township of Ekfrid. It is very improbable that money would be borrowed by any township for the

be borrowed by any township for the purpose of graveling a road."

Mr. Talbot said that there was a growing agitation in the Government to put the construction and maintent the constr ance of county roads under the supersupervisor, so it was not likely that many of the townships would take ad-vantage of that offer either. The offer of 20 per cent of the ex-penditure on the roads would prove

AMALGAMATE WITH

Single Organization For All

By an unanimous vote, the London post of the Grand Army of Canada decided in favor of amalgamation with the United Veterans' League at a meeting held last night. Such a vote is being taken in every post, both of the G. A. C. and the U. V. L. throughout Canada, and according to J. F. Marsh, the Dominion organizer, the returns so far show that every post is in favor of the amalgamation.

Mr. Marsh dealt chiefly with the gratuity question during his address. He said that the Government could afford to pay the sums asked for in the petition, \$2,000, \$1,500 and \$1,000, respectively. The scheme would cost the Government approximately \$400,000, and this weild mean a cost of \$24,000,000 in interest annually. According to a report made by the Hon. Mr. Crerar, a tax of one per cent placed upon natural resources would raise \$80,000,000 annually, leaving \$56,000,000 each year to pay off the principal. cipal.

He also advocated the levying of a tax on excess capital, which would aftax on excess capital, which would ar-fect the food and munitions profiteer. Bonar Law had referred to the levying of an excess profit tax in England, and Germany had decided to try the same plan in order to pay off her war debt. If the plan had been found practical in England and Germany, there was no reason why it should not meet with no reason why it should not meet with success in this country. He said that some objection had been raised to the gratuity scheme on the
