# MURRELLS PUT ONE OVER YOU ALL," SAYS INSPECTOR

Inspector W. W. Dunlop's investigation into the escape of Sidney and William Murrell, alleged murderers, from the county jail on Friday, September 2, closed this afternoon, having brought out the facts that the jail officials were ignorant of the rules governing the institution; that the escape was an inside job; that the Murrells had had saws smuggled into them; in short, that the

prisoners completely outwitted the turnkeys.

"The Murrells put it all over you," declared Inspector Dunlop to Chief Turnkey William McLoud, who was recalled to the witness stand this morning. "They outwitted you. They sure did outwit everyone watching them. PLANNING THE CAMPAIGN

Reform Candidate Will Be Entered in Virtually Every Seat in Dominion.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Ottawa, Sept. 13.—The races, the exhibition, and the pending elections have erved to fill the capital with sightseers sportsmen and politicians. To the flock of Government supporters which as thronged the lobbies of the "Cha-au," and the outer office of Premier eighen there has been added today a ingent of Liberals, from all parts the Dominion, who have come to onfer with Hon. W. L. Mackenzle ling on general questions of organiza-ion. They comprise the first lieutenants if the Liberal leader in all the prov inces and all profess to be highly hope-ful of the result of the coming contest. This is particularly so in the case of the delegates from Quebec, the mari-time provinces and British Columbia. In the prairie provinces it is admitted that the Progressives are a formidable foe, nwilling to make any alliance against

the common foe.
The conference will last a couple of days at least. While the danger of three or four-cornered fights is fully realized, it is rumored that the Liberals vill place a candidate in every seat of the Dominion where it is humanly pos-sible to do so. The move to Queen's Park will also mean a drastic change in the program. It will mean cutting out the annual rugby game between London and St. Thomas C. I. and the girls' basketball tilt.

The idea behind the move to Queen's Park is to make the track meet a real test of athletic competition, so that the game will be popularized at the school, and be at the same time a good preparation for the annual meet in the spring of all the secondary schools in this area. Tecumseh Park with its hastily and unofficially measured grass tracks, has not made the track events possible in the real sense of the word. No records could be shot at on the grass, either, which took the one big factor in track events away from the annual field day. At Queen's Park, it is argued, the athletes of the school will have a real opportunity to know what they can do under the usual track meet conditions.

The move for the abolishment of the rugby and basketball games, at least on the field day, is lack of time. Sufficient attention cannot be paid to the track events if rugby and basketball are allowed on the program somewhat, and a few traditions go by the board. The games could be staged on another day, if necessary, but at any rate, if it is a choice between them and the track events for the good of the school and the future of the track game in the school, it would seem the games, which are in the nature of exhibitions, should go.







Governor Carter made a reply to the effect that it was none of his business. Speaking of the rope which stretched from the scaffolding to a tree at an angle, Inspector Dunlop observed: "I've seen a ten-year-old boy go up a rope higher than that!"

Jailer Questioned.
Then Night Watchman Charles Lilley
was the subject for some questioning f the jailer. "What instructions did you give that "I told him to keep away from the

prisoners." Governor Carter did not know whether Lilley read the rules, and he admitted that he had no record in writing of giving Lilley instructions. "You know I feel this keenly," remarked Inspector Dunlop. "I had no word of this work going on in the yard, it was not there when I was here last."

As far as Turnkey William Blake knew no one went into the Murrell ward between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m. each day, he told the inspector and Deputy Attorney-General Edward Bayly, K.C., who was also on the bench. Blake said that he had worked 85 hours each week

War is Curse.

"Sitting in the shadow of the most terrible conflict in human history, with its unparalleled wastage in human life and property, and with its inevitable aftermath of human sorrow and its burden of woe, we declare war an untiligated curse to humanity," the resolution continues,

"On behalf of millions of youths who suffered and died; on behalf of millions of homes broken by bereavement; in the name of the silent multitudes who still suffer, we insist that our statesmen and leaders find a way for the settlement of international differences by other means than arbitrament of arms. We repudiate the doctrine that ms. We repudiate the doctrine that ur is a necessity. Justice, not force, ust be the final arbiter of right. Difes must be settled by reason, no

ferences must be settled by reason, not by human slaughter."

Will Find Way.

The resolution says that if there are those who refuse to listen to reason, "then let a way be found by which such Ishmaelites may feel the collective disapproval of the world."

The conference, the resolution adds, advocates no plan, but it calls upon the Allies "to give themselves without reserve to the Christian task of finding a substitute for war." It condemns armaments and says the conference especially appeals to the meeting that is soon to be held in Washington to discuss limitation of armaments "that no word be left unsaid, no deed undone, that shall help to relieve the world of its burden of armaments and the threat of war."

The conference today discussed missionary work and world peace. A number of the speakers lauded the League of Nations.



Writer in London Times Discusses Best Means of Keeping Them.

ADVISES INSURING GEMS

Prefers Carrying On Person To Intrusting Them To Maid or Purser.

London, Sept. 12.—Commenting upon the recent train robbery in France, in connection with the well-known fact that English women are accustomed to carry much valuable jewelry on their trains a writer in the Times says:

Thousands of women must have asked themselves, after reading the dramatic story of the French train bandits, "What would I have done if I had been in the Paris-Marseilles express on Sunday night?"

It is at any rate obvious that any woman as instinctively brave as was young Lieutenant Carabell would have been, like him, shot dead.
The woman who travels, whether abroad or at home, without having first insured her jewels, and that whether they are few or many, is asking for trouble. This fact is realized by those who can best afford a serious loss. The women whose pearls are worth anything from £1,000 and £20,000 insure them as a matter of course. To omit this precaution is obviously false economy, for the rates charged are by no means high, especially when all the risks are covered. Valuable jewels are in jeopardy

ered. Valuable jewels are in jeopardy not only from thieves but from all kinds of unexpected mishaps, such, for instance, as a worn setting or a defective clasp. Moreover, it is a great advantage in cases of loss to have at one's back and experienced organization whose interest it is to find the missing property. Not very long ago a lady lost her pearl necklace while out walking in London. It was plain that the string had given way, and the owner practically gave up all hope of recovering the pearls which she valued for family reasons beyond their intrinsic worth. She reported the loss to the insurance company, who discovered by means of advertising that most of the pearls had been picked up by a child and taken home. The child's mother thought, until she saw the advertisement, that they were merely pretty beads. Thus, the owner, owing to her being insured, got back her necklace almost intact with a minimum of trouble.

But insurance alone is not enough. Every sensible woman who travels with valuable jewels has her favorite system of safeguarding her possessions. Probably the best is that of putting both

But a collision or a fire at sea would often mean the entire loss of the jewels, and on the whole I should think it would be better to carry the valuables on one's person, even at the cost of some personal inconvenience.

It is impossible to anticipate everything that might happen. The extreme portability of jewels makes them pecularly desirable to the most expert and intelligent class of thief, and in addition they are very much at the mercy of the innumerable odd and incalculable incidents which are directly or inspection.


