# MAY JOIN OPPOSITION

Ex-Minister Blair Confers With Mr. Borden.

Ottawa, Aug. 13.-Hon. Mr. Blair, by his bitter speech yesterday, is regarded as having indicated his intention of associating himself with the opponents of the Government. This belief is confirmed by the fact that Mr. Blair and Mr. Borden were closeted for a long while together in the former's room. Mr. David Russell, of St. John, an in-timate friend of the Ex-Minister of Railways, made an attempt last night to create a demonstration in the latter's honor after the House had risen. For this purpose he hired the Guards Band, in full uniform, to go and play outside Mr. Blair's house. Their as-sembly at the Russell House directed attention to the matter, and the colonel of the regiment ordered the band to disperse, as militia regulations forbid military bands playing in uniform at political demonstrations.



Until a law embodying the duties of the viceroy is issued, the regulations drawn up in 1845 for the administration of the far eastern and Caucasian territory will remain in force. A special committee, presided over the Czar, will see that the actions

of the viceroy are in harmony with the general policy of the Russian ministries. Viceroy Alexieff has been instructed to submit to the Czar for his approval, proposals for the administration of the territory over which he is about to assume the jurisdiction.


