Chairman Marshall Issues his Mandate in the Matter of the Emma Street Sidewalk - Council Agree to Leave Dispute in his Hands - Other Business.

"I will not be dictated to, and if on deave this matter in our hands the whole affair will be settled in a nanner satisfactory to every resident on Emma street. The Board of Works are competent enough to tend to their own business."

"CIVIC BOARD OF WORKS

These were the words uttered by Alderman (Marshall at last night's neeting of the Oity Council, when Alderman Edmondson brought in the report of the special committee on the Emma street sidewalk question. The report recommended that the side-

walk lowered six inches. Alderman Cowan-Do you ake the matter out of the hands of

he Board of Works. Alderman Edmondson-The committee have investigated the matter and have decided that the walk should be lowered. Blonde Bros. and Mr. Crow are not asking any favors from this Council. They are simply asking for their rights and they ought to be treated fairly. Blonde Bros. are one of our chief manufacturers, and Mr. Crow has always employed a large number of men. When he took over that property on Emma street the city was receiving a very small revmue from it. To-day Mr. Crow's taxes are \$400 each year. These men's rights should be taken into consideraion. If this sidewalk is going to be lowered it will not hurt a single citizen of Chatham. It seems too bad that the matter could not have

eben settled more amicably.

Alderman Marshall, moved amendment that the matter be left in the hands of the Board of Works to be attended to in their own way. Alderman Taylor seconded the motion. In doing so he said: As a member of the special committee I am content to leave the matter in the hands of the Board of Works and I S. side

matter satisfactorily.

Alderman Marshall—I have but few remarks to make and I do not propose to discuss the matter. We do not mean to be dictated to by any Edmondson appointed his committee the floard of Works. Now I say this: If the matter is left with the Board of Works we will satisfy the people. We have decided what we will do regarding the sidewalk and give us credit for doing nothing that will in-Possibly we may lower the sidewalk, but we will not be

dictated Ito. Alderman Edmondson-Last Friday Limet the city engineer on the street and asked him what he was going to do in the matter and he would not lower the sidewalk. The Board of Works have had the matter in their hands all wear and what have done towards settling it amicably? The engineer says that Blonde has no grievance and Blonde told me to-night that if it was not decided at this meeting to have the sidewalk lowered he would issue an injunction to-morrow. The committee were unanimous in their conclu-

sion and I feel sure they will back up the report. When the committee was appointed and investigated the matter, the engineer, before they handed in their report, ordered Mr. Crow to do certain filling and if he did not have it done by Friday night the whole sidewalk would be torn up. I don't think the engineer has that power and if he has it should be taken way from him.

Alderman McCong—We are all tiable to be criticized—even the Board of Works. I will support the report to have the sidewalk lowered but in doing so I do not wish to ignore Alder-man Marshall. I was made aware of the fact that the sidewalk was not to be lowered and if the engineer is running the business instead of Mr. Marshall, it will not be lowered. Blonde Bros. is a good industry and it would harm no one to drop down the sidewalk. No doubt Alderman Marshall could settle it amicably but if the engineer is boss it will not be owered, and how are we going to arrange matters. I can't support the

Alderman Edmondson-If Alderman Marshall will give his word that the sidewalk will be lowered that is all that is necessary.

Alderman Mounteer-I wish to remove one impression. Alderman Edondson inferred that we have been dilly-dallying all summer. I myself want to do what is right with every citizen of Chatham. If the Board of Works are left alone the matter will be settled all right.

Alderman Marshall—I woul dlike to inform Alderman McCoig that the Board of Works are boss of the en-gineer. If we order the sidewalk lowered the walk will go down. I will not agree to saying to-night that the walk will be lowered.

Alderman Cowan—I feel able to sup-

F. Battisby, of Walkerville, Returns Home From the Artic Circle.

a Conversation with Vhe Planet he Tells of his Experiences in the

Herbert Francis Battisby, brother f the rector at the English church, Walkerville, has just returned from pending two years within the Arctic ircle. Mr. Battisby is an athletic roung man of 26, and he has been assisting at the English church missions in the far north at Fort Simpson, Fort Macpherson, and Hay River. Bishop Reeve presides over these mis-

Speaking of his two years sojourn in the land of perpetual day, and per-

petual night, Mr. Battisby said that he had enjoyed it very much.

The staple food at the Missions is fish. Many kinds are caught in Great Slave Lake, including white fish, trout and Jack fish. The waters of Great Slave Lake are always so cold that the strongest man can scarcely stay in swimming longer than five min-utes. As a consequence, the fish caught in this northern lake are always excellent, and the Great Slave Lake white fish are the finest in the world. The flesh, when cooked, is solid and dry, and is delicious, but Mr. Battisby states that having eat-en fish three times a day for two is pronounced "Tachawlgosch." If you years, he is taking particular pains to avoid fish of any kind. The fish diet was sometimes changed, and variety given by a meal of musk-rats. #### A SPARROW HAWK'S SPEED.

The Bird of Prey Does Not Like s Stern Chase.

The sparrow hawk does not more than any other like a long "stern chase," but prefers to attack with the advantage of a surprise when darting from a tree around the corner of a wood or when swooping with splendid speed from a poise several hundred yards above the

We, seeing a finch or a starling taker in a moment, often do not weigh the fact that the victim was Hardly on the wing and probably rising when the bird of prey came like a whirtwind and overwhell it. Even if the hawk discovers its prey when traversing the country at a lower elevation it has still the power of a fair momentum to take full advantage of the chance of a swooping rush at the prey, which is probably on the ground.

Of course, when a rook is watched chasing a sparrow hawk across the sky there is nothing to show that the latter is seriously trying to fly at speed. On the contrary, it generally seems in such a case that the hawk is relying mainly on its soaring powers to avoid the attack.

And it is remarkable, indeed, with how little apparent effort the hawk will soar up and up from the rook, which all the while is obviously exerting itself frantically. On the other hand, it is generally to be seen that when the birds are flying at a level the rook has no difficulty in overtaking the hawk, who after a turn or two begins to go up, as already stated. The kestrel seems more often to evade its enemies by a turn of speed, though it also takes to the soar readily. Last autumn I saw a fine female kestrel harried by two peewits, which swooped at it alternately, very prettily and with surprising persistence. At last the hawk, seemingly tired of "putting out," as a falconer would say, of these active birds, went straight ahead apparently as hard as it could, and then one could see that the peewits were not able to overtake it, though they followed to some distance. The same thing happened with the crow. The latter chased the hawk, but was at fast outflown in a sheer, straight flight.

SOME WHITTLING STUNTS.

From the Ball In Prison to the An chor, Chain and Buoy, "I suppose," said Uncle Hiram, "that every small boy when he gets his first sharp knife does just what our young friend here has been doing. He gets a nice stick of soft white pine and cuts a ball imprisoned within four corner bars I know I did that, and I have made lots

"You take a squared stick of soft white pine of any dimensions, but say an inch square and four inches long, and mark off a block an inch long in the middle of its length. Then you mark off on either side of that another space of an inch and then you proceed to dig out the wood from those spaces through from side to side and from all sides, but carefully leaving the corners of the block untouched, for these will each become a part of the bar of that corner extending from

end to end, when the middle block, of which the ball is to be made, is cut free. "When you have cut out those spaces all clear, leaving the square block in the middle, you cut the block down rounding at the corners, cutting it into the shape of a ball as much as possible before cut ting it away at the corners, because it is so much easier to shape when it is thus held than it will be after it is loose. Only you want to be careful not to slice down through the corner pieces and so spoil the whole thing, and you want, to look out, too, not to do what our young friend here has done, and what I have often done myself, for that matter, and that is to slice down through an end of the block, cutting one of the corner pieces clear there, before you come to the round-

ing of the block at all.
"The rounded block cut free, you smooth it off nicely, and smooth the side pieces and ends, and there you are, a pall that couldn't have been got into this frame from the outside at all, but that in it, all right, and that rolls freely

within it from end to end. "Sometimes a boy would make one of those with two balls in it, and I have oc casionally known a boy to make a ball in à holder like tais out of hard wood, which is a triumph, for to make a good imprisoned ball of any wood is a task requiring the exercise of some skill and of very great patience, but it is really nothing to some of the whittling stunts that occasionally men do aboard ship on long voyages or on long waits in port.

"A man who was fond of whittling might, in such circumstances, take for a blank a stick as long as a broomstick and of suitable dimensions and carve out of one end of this an anchor on a swivel. It is pretty difficult work, and it calls for the greatest patience, too, to cut a swivel out of a solid block.

"Having cut the anchor and the swivel, the whittler proceeds to cut that long stick, step by step, into the links of wooden chain. Court-Other Changes. Dr. Borden, a recognition of the long-standing rule that the Department of Marine and Fisheries should be ad-

ministered by a Maritime Province Hon, James Sutherland has accepted the portfolio of Militia and Defence. Sutherland was urged to accept office when the Liberals were return ed to power, but stood aside at that time, holding that there were other stalwarts of the party better entitled to a portfolio than he. His accept-ance of office at this time, and especially of the portfolio of Militia, will be welcomed by his own political friends, and it is the least objection-

able to Conservatives.

Mr. B. M. Britton, M. P., for Kingston, has been appointed a Judge of the High Court of Ontario, while Mr. For-tin. M. P. for Laval, has been given the position on the Superior Court bench of Montreal, made vacant by

Fighting.

London, Sept. 23.-A Reuters' des patch from Pretoria gives another instance of the manner in which the Boer leaders mislead the rank and file of the burghers. It is afforded by an intercepted despatch from Command ant Liebenberg to Commandant Delarey informing the latter of the departure of the British mobile columns from the neighborhood, which, he adds, supports reports received of defeat of the English with great slaughter on the other side of Pretoria and the capture of the entir British camp, with cannon.

"Boer commandoes," he continue 'are causing great destruction and desolation in Natal, where they are, in fact, playing the English game; the Swazis and Basutos have risen against the English on account of the seizu of their cattle; and England and France have come to blows, and the latter is blockading the Channel. Botha has issued a counter-proclamation, warning the Boers in English camps who have not been guilty o treason to rejoin before the 15th inst on pain of death, and Lord Kitchener has been notified that there will be no protection in future for British pro perty or subjects.

#### G. T. R. ELEVATOR BURNED.

Port Huron, Mich., Sept, 23 .- The Grand Trunk Elevator at Point Edward was destroyed by fire this wftermoon. The new plant of the G. A. Crosby & Co. was threatened. 

RENTS PORT IN CALCUITA.

Apartment Houses U. S. Consul Patterson, in a letter to the State Department from Calcutta, says there is a fine opportun-ity for investments in hotels and apartment houses there. Saya he: The congested condition of the European quarter of Calcutta is such that rents are extravagantly high, and various propositions are being discussed for its relief, among others the building of suburban residences, several miles out, to be reached by electric tramways; but this would ot prove satisfactory, as the people

re prefer to live in the city. If a building company with sufficient capital would come here and erect first-class apartment houses, of six or eight stories, not more, as the ceilings must be high on account of the hot climate, with elevators and all modern improvements, they would be taken by Government officials and merchants at a large

rental The people here are too conservative to start such an enterprise, but those requiring apartments would soon see the advantages over ordin-ary dwellings in cheaper rates and in requiring fewer servants; besides, as nany residents go to the hills during the hot months, the rooms could be left in charge of janitors more

"Where ground is as costly as it is in the European quarter of Calcutta, on account of its limited area, apartment houses properly constructed would bring the desired relief and be paying investments. A dwelling hous paying investments. A dwelling house, such as is regarded first class, of two or three stories, with a goodsized compound (ground), rents for from \$2,000 to \$3,500 per annum.

This consulate general, that occupies a flat on the second floor, seventy by ninety feet, with eighty steps to reach it and no elevators or other modern improvements, rents for \$1, 350 per annum. I mention these instances to show what rents are here, and they will be higher unless some way is provided to relieve the situation, as the city is growing rapidly. "Calcutta is a city of about 800,-000 population, the capital of Brit ish India. The residence of the vice roy, as well as of the officers of the secretariat and the officials connected with the government, with their thousands of employes, but without one first-class hotel. During the cold season the native princes and other wealthy citizens of India visit Calcutta, besides tourists from every part of the world; hotels are so crowded that it is almost impossible to secure rooms at any price, and tents are put on the roofs for the accommodation of guests. I know of no place where first-class hotels are

more needed or would bring better returns on the investments than in Calcutta.



Cricket in England. August finds the cricketing season at Its height in England-the high noon that precedes the waning-and, though the votaries of this splendid game on this side of the water have perforce to depend upon their own enthusiasm rather than their great numbers, the national game of the heart of the empire demands respect, if nothing more. The London Daily Mail not long ago had an interesting article on this noble sport, which, with the quaint illustration that accompanied it, is reproduced in substance as below. of the scene that is being daily enacted now at the famous ground at Lord's, it says:—

"The 'wisp' of the hurtling ball 'dead on' the middle stump, the responsive crack of the bat as it sends the leather careering boundarywards, the exciting race of batsmen snatching yet another run, the lang, sure aim of 'panting fielder, the rattle of balls as the leather beats the batsman by a second, the cries of 'Well played, sir.' and the cheers and the fluttering of dainty hand-kerchiefs in the golden suushine—it is indeed an inspiriting scene even to the least impressionable. And yet not a new scene, for it has been enacted times without number ever since in 1814 top-hatted and pigtailed batsmen first brandished their clublike 'willows' on the now famous ground in St. John's Wood road.

"Thomas Lord was alive in those days. Who was Lord? Well, if Lord had never lived there would not now be a Lord's. A humble sort of person he was, too, to have his name ring through the centuries and endure as. Ig as England plays cricket. He was immor tilzed by a quarrel.

"Thomas Lord was an attendant at the White Cone ait Fields, where in 1779 a number of title I and moneyed gentlemen were wont to play cricket. One day they had a hearty die agreement, a practice the gentlemen of 'nose days were rather prone to.

men of hose days were patter products. There was a split in the camp; one detach-

nent took the high road, the other took the ow. Lord, who seems to have had a merantile mind, espoused the cause of those who offered him the best terms. He was nstructed to look out for a new ground. This he found in Dorset square. Lord began to prosper exceedingly. In time he actuired a more commodious ground, and took he then firmly-established M. C. C. with him. Eventually in 1814 we find him and the club in St. John's Wood road at the new Lord's.



#### A New Mineral Area Letters received by the Bureau of

Mines from Government inspectors now in northern Ontario contain further gratifying reports of mineral wealth discovered. Prof. W. G. Miller, geologist, writing from Lake Temiskaming, on August 9, says he has just been up the Blanche River and several of its branches, to the height of land. He refers to the stretch of good agricultural land, 30 miles wide, passed through just north of the lake. "Then," he says, "rocky ridges begin to crop up, with intervening areas that seem to be with intervening areas that seem to be good land. The rocks show considerable variety, conglomerates, diorites, quartz porphyries, etc. We also found jasper-conglomerate, and some hematite copper and iron pyrites are widely disseminated, and when the country is more carefully prospected I think there is likely to be important discoveries of mineral deposits—Judging both from the variety of the rocks, and from the discoveries which have already been the discoveries which have already been

made. We visited the Lake Temis-kaming silver-lead mine, which is being worked on quite an extensive scale. The character of the ore body is peculiar, appearing to have the character and structure of the rocks similar to that we met with up the Blanche waters." The officials of the Bureau of Mines regard the report of Prof. Miller with much satisfaction, as showing that what is probably another valuable mineral belt has been located in this hith-erto little known region. Prof. Coleman, the well-known geol-

Prof. Coleman, the well-known geologist, writing from Port Arthur, says he has just returned from a trip through the country between there and Fort Frances, and back by way of Rat Portage. "Everybody," he says, "is on the qui vive for iron ore, and the band of magnetite and silica known as the Steep Rock Range has been traced for many miles. The tunnel through the Atk-Okan range discloses mucn more good ore than I excloses much more good ore than I expected to see. There is certainly a large mine of magnetite of excellent quality in the range. The other ranges have not yet been proved to contain important ore bodies, but their great extent makes it probable that more will be found.

be found.

"The recently-discovered from range near Dryden was visited, and found to be several miles in length, and in places very wide. The ore is magnetite. So far no development of any kind has taken place. It is interesting to note," Prof. Coleman concludes, "the number of Americans, some of them geologists of good reputation, who are be found.

geologists of good reputation, who are studying our iron ranges, with a view to taking up properties."

The Government's large diamond drill has been loaned to Mackenzie & Mann, who will use it for some time develop ing some properties in the Atik-Okan iron range. It has been operating recently on the Mattawa range.

The Royal Visitors Enjoy Some Novel Sport at Ottawa.

Log Rolling Contests and War Canoe Cape to her Royal Highness.

Ottawa, Sept. 23 .- Royalty ran the slides to-day. Running the slides is isually a combination of water tooganing, shooting the chutes and a shower bath, but the last named element was eliminated to-day by the use of tarnaulins.

After the slide running the Duke and Duchess were taken in canoes to Rockliffe, where log rolling contests, war canoe racing and other sports were held, and then all went up to the lumber shanty on top of Pine Hill, where an exhibition was given of the operation of felling trees and prepar-

ing them for the mills.

The trip from Rideau Hall to the head of the slides was made in the royal trolley car "Duchess of Cornwall and York," and a special was also provided for the newspaper managed the paragraphs of the parag and others who accompanied the par-ty. Six rafts were at the head of the slides and the car ran to within a few des and the car ran to within a few feet of the rafts. A special track, 1,000 feet long, had been laid for the occasion, and on the rafts had been built seats covered with tarpauling and robes. Four shantymen were on each raft. J. R. Booth, the lumber king, had charge of the arrangements. On the raft with the Duke were the Duchess, Lord and Lady Minto, Mr. Booth, members of the staff, police and several press men. The other rafts were used by invited guests. Police and military lined both sides of the chutes and thousands of people watched the royal raft go down. Shantymen went over the slides in their river boats and several men went over on cedar logs. The slides are about half a mile long and pass under five bridges. All the bridges were crowded with sight-seers and hundreds of camera shots were taken. Before the trip was made the lumber grounds were closely searched for evil-

intending lurkers. The trip was made without any unpleasant incidents. This afternoon the mink cape from the ladies of Ottawa was presented to the Duchess at Rideau Hall. All who contributed to the purchase money of the gift had been invited to attend and Lady Laurier made the presenta-

To-night the Duke and Duches hold a public reception in the Senate Chambers, beginning at 9 o'clock. The alleged precedence given the Anglican and Roman Catholic church-es at the royal reception yesterday

one thousand came to meet the royal party, and everyone was given a handshake. The reception was to begin at nine o'clock, but it was forty-five minutes after that before the Duke and Duchess were in position on the dais. With them were Lord and Lady Minto, Prince Alexander of Teck and the suite. All wore brilliant uniforms The throne was almost covered with electric lights, and on pillars placed at the sides of the dais were crown done in lights. The walls were decor ated with lights, and magnificent bowers of plants were filled with electric light flowers. The Bishop of Otta wa was the first to be presented, and then came Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Lady

Laurier and Sir Louis Davies. A continuous procession of people passed the dais for an hour, and afterwards the royal party visited the Parliamentary library. A great crowd of people came up to Parliament Hill to see the decorations and gave the royal party hearty cheers. Thousands wait ed until the reception was over to se the Duke and Duchess start for Rideau Hall. The buildings were illuminated for the last time and the scene

was very beautiful.

This afternoon Lady Laurier, on behalf of the ladies of Ottawa, presented the Duchess of Cornwall and York with a fur cape. The presentation was made on the lawn at Rideau Hall, and the Duchess put the cape over her shoulders and told the ladies she was delighted with the gift and with the reception she had been given in Ottawa. Afterwards the Duchess greeted most of the ladies.

### CHANDLER VS. GIBSON

he Court of Appeal Finas Judgmen in Favor of Plaintiffs.

Judgment by the Court of Appeal was delivered in this action on Saturday tast. The defendants appealed from the judgment of Judge Meredith, which finds that Moses Chandler, deceased, took under the will of his father, a life estate in certain lands situated in Chatham Township. and comprising fifty acres. William Chandler died in February, 1882, leaving a will, the sixth clause of which is in these words: "To my son Moses I give and bequeath fifty acres out of the north-west part of lot number twenty in the Ninth concession of mid Transphip of Chatham, durof said Township of Chatham, during his lifetime, and then to go to his children, if he has any, but should he have no issue, then to be equally divided among all my grandsons."

After Testator's death, Moses mar-ried and died intestate in 1897, leaving a widow and two infant children, who are the plaintiffs in this action. In 4886 Moses conveyed the farm to the defendant E. W. Scane in consideration of an exchange of land and \$200.00 in cash. In 1898 the defendant Gibson entered into possession of the land under an agreement to purchase the land from Scane, who after ments. The action is brought by the two infant children of Moses for construction of the will, and to recover possession of the land. The defendants claimed that Moses acquired an estate-in-trial under the will of his father and that the conveyance by Moses to defendant Scane operated to bar the entail and confer upon Scane an absolute estate in Fee-Simple. Defendants also counterclaimed for a return of the land and cash in ex-change for the farm, and an allowance for improvements. Defendants also set up the Statute of Limitations. The trial judge held that the words "children" and "issue" did not confer an estate-in-tail on Moses, but merean estate-in-tail on Moses, but merely a life estate, and that neither the rule in Shelley's nor Wyld's case applied, and that the effect of the devise was to give to the children of Moses an absolute estate in Fee-Simple in the lands. The trial judge also held that the defendant Scane also held that the defendant Scane
