RE-LAYING OF THE CORNER STONE

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Programme.

His Royal Highness The Governor General will arrive at the site of the Building at Twelve O'clock, Noon and after receiving the Royal Salute and inspecting the Guard of Honour, which will be furnished by the 207th Overseas Battalion (Lieut.-Colonel MacLean), will proceed to the Royal Pavilion.

The corner stone of the old building, originally laid by H R.H. Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, September First, 1860, remaining in position at the North-East angle of the inner court of the eastern wing of the former structure, the ceremony will proceed in the following order:—

1. The Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod Commands Silence
2. The Minister of Public Works for the Dominion of Canada, the Honourable Robert Rogers, M.P., briefly addresses His Royal Highness the Governor General, thanks him for having graciously consented to officiate upon this occasion, and calls upon the Prime Minister of Canada to supplement his remarks.
3. Speech by the Prime Minister of Canada, the Right Honourable Sir Robert Borden, G.C.M.G., P.C., K.C., LL.D., M.P., etc., etc.
4. During the playing of a march by the Band, the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, accompanied by the Prime Minister, proceeds to the corner stone, still in its place in the original foundation. Under the direction of the architect, John A. Pearson, Esq., the stone will be raised from its base, placed upon a bogey, and thereon transferred to a position convenient to its new location in the North-East corner of the foundation of the new building.

5. The glass phial, containing documents, etc., which was deposited in the cavity under the corner stone in 1860 will be removed by the Deputy Minister of Public Works, J. B. Hunter, Esq., placed upon the stone, and conveyed with it to the new position.
6. The Deputy Minister of Public Works deposits the glass phial, as removed by him from the cavity in the foundation of the old building, along with a sealed copper receptacle containing a scroll, coins, postage stamps and certain papers of record, in the cavity, provided for the purpose, in the stone upon which the stone is to rest in the new building.
7. The corner stone is raised from the level and elevated above its base, and the mortar bed is prepared by the construction staff.
8. The Band having ceased to play, the Minister of Public Works presents a trowel, mallet and plumb bob triangle to His Royal Highness the Governor General, which being accepted, His Royal Highness advances to the stone and levels the surface of the mortar.
9. The stone is lowered into position on the bed of mortar under the direction of the following:
D. Ewart, Esq., I.S.O., Dominion Consulting Architect;
John A. Pearson, Esq., Architect;
J. O. Marchand, Esq. Associate Architect;
Wm Lyall, Esq., President of P. Lyall & Sons Construction Company, Limited, Contractor.
While the stone is being lowered into position the band plays "O Canada."
10. Speech by His Royal Highness the Governor General.
11. His Royal Highness applies the plumb bob triangle to the stone, gives the stone three strokes with the mallet and declares it well and truly laid.

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12. His Royal Highness calls for three cheers for His Majesty the King.
13. The Right Honourable the Prime Minister calls for three cheers for His Royal Highness the Governor General.
14. The band plays one complete stanza of the National Anthem.
15. Departure of His Royal Highness the Governor General and party.

DEPOSITED IN CORNER STONE.

Contents of the sealed copper receptacle placed within the corner stone at the relaying, September First, 1916:—

(a) A parchment scroll with the following engrossed thereon:—

"This corner-stone was laid on the first of September 1860 by His late Majesty King Edward VII, of glorious memory, then Prince of Wales, during his visit to the British Colonies of North America and to the United States of America.

"The original buildings, excepting the Library, were completed in the year 1866 and were occupied by the Legislature of the Province of Canada on the 8th of June, 1866, for the last session of that body. Thereafter, they were occupied by the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada. The Library building was completed in the year 1876. The buildings were enlarged by additions to the offices in the north-western part, said additions being completed in the year 1909, but otherwise they remained intact until the 3rd of February, 1916, when they were destroyed by a disastrous fire, which is more particularly described in the Report of the Royal Commission appointed to investigate the origin thereof, a copy of which is enclosed herewith. Parliament immediately resumed its session on the 4th of February, 1916, at the Victoria Memorial Museum which was immediately vacated by the Geological Survey and fitted up temporarily for the purpose by the Public Works Department. Steps were forthwith taken for the erection of new buildings. At the same session of Parliament, a Joint Committee was appointed by the Prime Minister, the Right Honourable Sir Robert Borden, P.C., G.C.M.G., K.C., LL.D., President of the King's Privy Council for Canada and the Leader of the Opposition, the Right Honourable Sir Wilfrid Laurier, P.C., G.C.M.G., K.C., D.C.L., LL.D., for securing the reconstruction of the buildings.

"Sufficient advance has been made in the reconstruction to permit of this stone being relaid by His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, Governor General of Canada, on the fifty-sixth Anniversary of the original ceremony, namely the first day of September, 1916, in the sixth Year of the Reign of His Majesty King George V, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.
