He declared that the conflict should remain 'localized' and that any intervention on the part of a third power would result in 'incalculable consequences.' This was tantamount to letting it be understood that Austria should have every liberty to crush Servia and that Germany would have recourse to arms to prevent Russia from succouring Servia.

Allies Tried to Gain Time. "Confronted with this situation, the first thought of the powers forming the triple entente was to gain time to examine the conflict with greater care, and, if possible, to render it less acute. The powers, therefore, asked that Vienna extend the period of delay allowed Servia for her answer. Then Austria became fearful that she would be left without a pretext for



GERMAN GLORIES

One of the Kaiser's Generals not only Scorns to Refute "The most modest headstone raised Acts

T last there is one barbarian who scorns to lie-one who boldly throws off the mask of German "culture" and gives us a clear insight into the Teuonic state of mind. A more comprehensive summary of the German conception as to how war should be waged cannot be found than in General von Disfurth's article in The Tag, of Berlin.



Interesting Action

T WO interesting actions at law were initiated yesterday by Mr. Morine, K.C., for the purpose of getting a definition from the Supreme Court for trade expressions in common use in this country.

Lorenzo Noseworthy, of Spaniard's Bay, sued W. A. Munn, of this city for certain fish sold and delivered in Labrador and for which receipts were obtained in which the price was ex-

pressed to be at ¤t price." Joseph Kenny, of Conception Harbor, sued J. W. Hiscock, of Brigus, for fish sold and delivered in Labrador for "as much as is paid on the coast of Labrador.

Both the claimants allege that as much as \$4.50 per quintal had been paid for Labrador fish, and they claim this highest amount. The Court will be asked to define the exact meaning of the expressions referred to, and it is for this reason really that the actions are being brought.

It is understood that a large number of planters and fishermen connected with the Labrador trade are awaiting the results of these actions

The F.P.U. is, of course, behind the plaintiffs in their proceedings in the interests of the fishermen generally.

The Sealing Commission

▲ PPARENTLY our contention that the Commission of Enquiry into the sealing disaster is but another short cut to exonerate Abram Kean from blame in the matter of the slaughter of 78 of the Newfoundland's crew will be fully realized judging from what is taking place from day to-day before the Commission of Sealing Experts now presiding over the

Kean actually had the impudence to go before the Commission a day or two ago and confess that the chart he laid before the enquiry in April was incorrect and excused himself for making the mistakes he did in reference to the chart. We called public attention to this serious offence at the time and, our opinion having been backed by the public since, Kean is now compelled out of common decency to correct the statement he made before Judge Knight last spring.

Any common sealer knew Kean was wrong. Yet no one in connection with the enquiry knew enough about the matter being investigated to observe the tangle Kean had placed

The present enquiry is not bringing out as much information or covering as many important points as the penny-twopenny-enquiry of

The fishermen who have followed the proceedings so far are simply disgusted, as the whole farce will leave a tremendously bad effect upon simple minded men, for while they expected little from an enquiry before a magistrate they will be furious over Judges of the Supreme Court, sitting as a Sealing Commis sion, being parties to such a miserable piece of business.

The fishermen are indignant over the matter and the outcome will be most serious for the Colony in more ways than one.

The greatest part in the farce is being played by Dr. Lloyd who is supposed to represent the families of the slaughtered men but who never consulted them or anyone else about the matter except the Government. The Government appointed Dr. Lloyd to represent the dead sealers' families. and he accepted their generous offer of looking after the case and became a party to the farce in order to scoop in the fee that the Government intend to pay him for defending the rights of those whom he has not consulted and whom he does not of course repre-

Dr. Lloyd might just as well make up his mind to defend Abram Kean as ais action in this matter amounts, in the eyes of the fishermen, to nothing

Learned German Wants The Swedes Fight For Kaiser

> The celebrated chemist, Professor Ostwald, of the University of Leipzig, is at present visiting Stockholm as a delegate of the new association for the promotion of a German "Kultur" Lea-

In an interview Professor Ostwald frankly stated that the object of his mission to Sweden was to sound the disposition of Swedes towards the establishment after the war of a sort of union of the Baltic States, in which Sweden would have a position similar to that of Prussia in the German Em-

The "Dagens Nyheter' protests strongly against the idea of which the celebrated scholar is the interpreter. "This friendship for us is an honour." says the journal, "but his view of the present war will never be that of Sweden, and, as for the part which he offers us to play in the war drama, we cannot think of it.

Our Royal house has certainly no envy for the throne of Finland, prospects of which is opened up by the German delegate. Nor do we know of any desires of the kind on the part of Finland."

The journal says it would have learned with much more interest from the mouth of Professor Ostwald how the "Kultur" League imagines the reorganisation of Eastern Europe and its plans as regards Schleswig-Holstein, Alsace-Lorraine and Belgium.

Professor Ostwald must not, it says, be surprised if German demands for the right to reorganise the map of the world meet with open opposition rom those who feel menaced by them.


