**THE MASS-MEETING LAST NIGHT.**

We need not here go into the details of last evening's mass meeting in the City Hall, because we print the particulars in another column. The speakers seemed very zealous indeed, and the resolutions no one can object to, because they were a mere acknowledgment to Providence of His benign interest in this matter—some are irreverent enough to call it a "vote of thanks." No one can object to people meeting in this way when they honestly believe in their hearts that what they are doing is for the good of their fellow men; and however much we may be disposed to question the propriety of preventing the drinking of liquor by law, yet we can't but be edified when we see men of pure and exemplary lives throwing themselves heart and soul into this work. We might in this connection mention men like Captain Sypher and others, whom we have in our mind. One can't but be impressed with the exhortations of men whose private characters adorn their own firesides and the social circle, and who, preaching the virtue of temperance, consider it as only one gem in the moral crown, and speak of it most because it is most disregarded. We have not the slightest doubt but Captain Sypher and the other co-workers of his on whom we have our eye and who exhort the people to the virtue of temperance, are just such men as we have tried to picture above.

One of the speakers, Mr. J. McLeod, we believe, charged the City Council with being in league with the assumed-liquor sellers of this city, but while we think a good many of the Council not above the very lowest of dealings, yet we doubt very much if Mr. McLeod is not very much astray. If the statement be true, it is the most shameful act that the Council has yet been guilty of: for having a law upon our books, so long as it is acknowledged to be the law, no matter how tyrannical it may be, or how contrary to the spirit of all British law, we are bound to respect it; and the officers appointed by the people though their representatives, should be held responsible for the observance of that law. We presume the Law aims chiefly at keeping liquor from those who take it to their ruin, and those who drinking it, (gorging themselves), go out in the gutter and lie down like beasts. Yet this same law affords a safe and healthful field for denizens where such depraved persons go: but let the minions of the law keep their eyes open for such places, let them have no mercy but drag the offenders from their hideous resorts into the light of public day.

But while vigilance is necessary, we can't but contemplate with disgust the advice contended by Mr. Charles Luginin to all those who wished to become informers. This is a proposition so low, so devoid of every manly and decent element, that we coax ourselves to

believe, that hard times in the law business, and the prospects of a hum in the prosecution line, were what induced an otherwise worthy and intelligent lawyer, to stoop to such debasing depths.

An informer must *ipso facto* be a low man, his occupation is lower—he is detested and despised all over the world, and he is scarce tolerated by those in whose hands he plays as a piant tool.

But this is not the worst feature in the present case,—it is the dangerous and the un-British principle of a man appearing to a charge and not knowing who is his prosecutor. Mr Luginin says any man may make a charge against a rumseller, and no one need know who the informer is. It is degrading to Mr Luginin's profession, that anyone suffered to wear the gown should be an exponent for such a rascally provision. A rumseller may be a *bet noir*, he may be the most contemptible of men, but he is nevertheless a man, and here a British subject. And being a British subject he is entitled to the protection of British laws. Now, then, if any man can come forward and prefer a charge against him he must appear at court, but appearing he meets a prosecutor. English, British law provides that he who is charged may know who so charges him. And this for the best of reasons. Some malicious person else, might go and make some heinous charge against an innocent man, the very trying of which might ruin his character. Then if the prosecutor be irrog, the injured man has no satisfaction, but were his prosecutor before him, he might in turn sue for defamation. The most notorious robber, and the midnight murderer is entitled to the benefit of British laws,—why shouldn't the rumseller?

Mr McLeod was forcible in denouncing the traffic, and glorying in the law, he said "So help his God" he would defend it to the end. There is no need of this,—a wholesome public sentiment will ask for police, and police the town must have, when the majesty and the dignity, if this be in order, of the temperance Ten gallon law, and of every other law, will be maintained. Among the first asking for this, will be found the STAR.

**DEATH OF SENATOR BROWN.**

At 2 o'clock Sunday morning, the physicians and the dying man's near friends gathered about his couch, Senator Brown passed quietly away. For more than a week his life had been as the flickering candle, now blazing up and showing signs of increasing vitality, now waning till it scarce gave any sign of existence.

The following which is Mr. Brown's own version of the assault, in brief, may not be uninteresting:

The man came and knocked at the door. He was told to come in. He entered, and proceeded to shut the door after him. Mr. Brown stopped him and asked him what he wanted. The man seemed hesitating, but at last presented a paper to him, and asked him to sign it. He said it was a statement that he had been employed in the Globe office for five years. Mr. Brown said he should apply to the head of the department for the certificate, as he was not aware of the length of his services. Bennett replied that the head of the department would not give it to him. Mr. Brown then told him he should apply to Mr. Hennig, the treasurer of the company, who had the books, and tell how long he had been employed. Bennett pressed the paper upon Mr. Brown, and asked him to

Mr. Brown continued to refuse, when Bennett began fumbling apparently at his pistol pocket, whereupon it passed through Mr. Brown's mind, as he himself said, "that the little wretch might be meaning to shoot me." He got the pistol out, and then Mr. Brown grabbed him by the wrist and turned his hand downwards. He had got the weapon cocked before he was seized, and he at once pulled the trigger, but the muzzle being turned downwards,

THE BALL STRUCK MR. BROWN on the outer side of the left thigh, taking a slanting direction, and escaping about four inches below and towards the back of the leg. Mr. Brown thereupon closed with his assailant, and they got outside the door, still struggling. He pushed Bennett against the glass partition of the waiting room, at the same time calling for help. By this time the alarm had been given in the office, and a number of employes rushed down.

THE MAN WAS SEIZED and quickly disarmed: while Messrs. A. Thompson and John A. Ewan held him Mr. Brown wrenched the pistol from his grasp, and then walked into his room, carrying it along with him. During the struggle in the hallway Bennett repeatedly made attempts to fire off his revolver, but he was prevented from cocking it by Mr. Brown, who, notwithstanding the fact that he had already received one shot, held on to his would-be murderer until assistance came and he was over-powered. The services of an officer having been called into requisition, Bennett was handed over to his keeping, handcuffed and conveyed to the police station where he was locked up.

The bullet which must have dropped to the floor after it passed through Mr. Brown's leg, was found lying on the carpet in his room, several feet from where the wound was given.

mind that tortured and subdued it. The anxiety attending his confinement while so many duties pressed upon the journalist and the Senator, first led to prostration, and the more the strong frame yielded, the more did his active impatient mind harass and rack him. Day by day he felt his strength fail him; and only he who has turned about in his couch for a couple of sleepless nights a prey to a thousand images passing at race-horse speed through the brain, defying sleep or tranquility can understand Mr Brown's case. This continued till eventually Mr Brown's strength entirely forsook him, and he had to yield. Truly has it been said "What a piece of work is man!"

In life Mr Brown was respected by all, in death he is mourned by the nation. He had not many warm personal friends, but he had a host of admirers. He might be regarded as an iceberg that you may gaze almost in raptures upon in the distance, but which chills and repels you as you near it. There was but the one side to his nature, those who have met and known him say, the sombre side; but he was by no means lacking in human sympathies. Individuality, such a rare jewel in most people nowadays, for there was little in private or public right that had not either been approved or thought of by himself. He and Mr Mackenzie were about the two most stubborn Scotchmen that ever breathed, and they were as much alike in their character as the Siamese twins. Mr Mackenzie's intellect, however, was not so massive as Mr Brown's, nor was it of so original a character, but what the latter lacked in this respect he made up by practical tact. Mr Brown was patriotic, but his patriotism was nothing if it did not stand on the Brown platform, just as Liberalism with Mackenzie is nothing if not conformable to Mackenzie's idea of it.

Yet Mr Brown was a credit to his country and is now a serious loss to it; because many occasions arose when the Brown-Mackenzie view of things was in accord with the most enlightened national view. The old man is gone, and with all his self-will and hard-headedness, we would if we could reclaim him from the "vasty deep;" but as he is now at that bourne whence no traveller returns, let his virtues shine and form a circle of glittering gems to his memory, and let us who outlive but who never can outshine him, throw the pall over those failings which were his, because he was human. Requiescat in pace.

**CONTRACTOR LAWLOR.**

MR. LAWLOR the Contractor of the Parliament Buildings, has not returned yet, and it is the opinion of a good many, that like the first bird sent out from the Ark, he will not return. It is stated further that Mr. Lawlor could not induce his bondsmen to sign security for him, and this is given as a reason for his delay. It is also reported the Provincial Secretary has telegraphed him that a prompt appearance in Fredericton is desirable. Suppose Mr. Lawlor does not through some disability take the contract, the Government should not give it to the next highest, but call for new tenders, insisting on a forfeit sum to be deposited with each tender.



THE INDIAN DEPARTMENT. There is a falling off in the population of Mr. Fisher's Indians, which gentleman accounts for in this classic fashion: Cause—due to the "migratory character of the Indian." Mr. Fisher has the Education of the "Indian people" at the bottom of his heart.

"During one of my visitations in the spring, I made arrangements by which some of the Indian children have been enabled to attend a school in the district of Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, and I am glad to say that they are doing well, and hope to be able to inform you upon a future occasion that it has been advantageous to them."

The word in italics shows how thoroughly Mr. Fisher appreciates the situation; and it will be a joyous piece of intelligence for Canada that will come to the notice of the "future occasion" arrives. Now and again, the Indians get their "back up" with Mr. Fisher, which fact he describes thus—and the description is so like Mr. Fisher.

The Indians of Woodstock Reserve, in the County of Carleton, still withhold their concurrence to permit the Indian Department disposing of small quantities of timber which is growing upon that reserve.

Mr. Fisher here is the "Indian Department" and he has been repeatedly assured by the Red-men, that he "no longer" is a "white man." This Mr. Fisher classifies describes as "withholding their concurrence." Mr. Fisher is pleased to mark the sobriety among the "Indian people," and attributes this to the Canada Temperance Act, though he thinks it may be due to want of money, and adds that from his limited knowledge of human nature, he would not be responsible for certain periods in the Indian's life.

He says fishing is not much engaged in, the Indians generally catching but a small quantity of fish, of various small kinds. He says the "salmon is difficult to spear in consequence of the operation of the fishery laws," which may be taken to mean, that the operation of these laws makes the salmon wilder; but he concludes the paragraph by saying the Indians of St. George do a good fishing business "especially in the province of modern Jovial." (Of course the italics are ours.) And then Mr. Fisher signs his name.
