NEWEST TOWER FOR CROWN LANDS **BEING BUILT**

The Department of Lands and Mines of the Province of New Brunswick has received a report from Edward Baldwin one of its officials at Bathurst, that the construction of the ookout tower at Red Pine is proeeding satisfactorily.

This tower with its accompanying ranger's cabin is situated on the height of land between Chatham and Bathurst near the centre of a large area of Crown Lands. The location is some eight hundred feet above sea level. A ninety-foot tower is being built with watchmen's cabin on the top. Windows on all sides of the cabin will permit of an unobstructed view of the surrounding country. A wide area will be under observation from this tower.

Telephone Connected

Through co-operation of The Snowball Lumber Company, telephone con? nection will be made with the line Red Pine with the line of the New Brunswick Telephone Company.

To Use Fire Finders

The intention is to instal one of the instruments known as Osborne Fire Finders in this tower for the use of the watchman. The Geodetic Survey of Canada will make use of this tower for making observations for precise levelling. The Dominion and the Province are dividing the cost of construction. S. Godin of Bathurst has the contract for the erection of e tower at a price slightly in excess of one thousand dollars.

It is expected that the Red Pine Tower will be an object of great pubc interest during the summer as it highway between Newcastle and Bathurst and is within easy access of hose who might use that road. Numerous visitors to the tower are expected as the view from it will be over a large sweep of country.

Tiger of France Intends

To Conquer the Prejudice ***************

That Followed the War

M. Clemenceau, the world-famous Tiger of France, celebrated his eightieth birthday recently, and then came news of his severe illness. Yet it is just possible that in a few months, or even weeks, his name may be ringing through the country as it rang in the dark days of 1917, and es it had rung, at frequent intervals, for more than forty years before. Clemenceau is in temporary eclips because the French people believe at the moment that the Peace of Versailles was a snare and a delusion, and that Clemenceau was largely responsible for it. Clemenceau's own contention is that the treaty gave France everything she was entitled to, and that the fault for the present situation lies with those who succeeded him and who failed to enforce the provisions of the treaty. He has been attacked by pacifists and puling philosophers abroad as a raging militarist, while at home the masses of Franch people have been taught. of French people have been taught to regard him as a timid weakling who in France's great hour refused to pluck the fruits of victory.

It would be unjust to blame the French people for this ingratitude to their greatest citizen. The blame lies with the politicians and of all

lies with the politicians, and of all politicians the French politician is perhaps the most virulent. In the

course of his career Clemenceau has course of his career Clemenceau has made many enemies. Just now he appears to have far more enemies than friends. The present Government is not unnaturally inclined to blame him for what it has been unable to accomplish. The nerves of the French people are far from normal. The fear of Germany has not been wholly removed, and for this they hold Clemenceau and the Treaty of Versailles responsible. Thus the statesman who was regarded as the savior of his country three years ago has sunk into disrespect.

Clemenceau declines to coincide in Clemenceau declines to coincide in the justness of the popular attitude. He refuses to take it lying down and intends to return to the political arena. Veteran newspaperman that he is, he will return through a newspaper. It has not yet been started, but it is understood that it will be called the French Nation, and will be edited by Andre Tardieu, formerly French High Commissioner to the United States. Georges Clemenceau will be the chief editorial contributor, as Theodore Roosevelt was after tor, as Theodore Roosevelt was after their command, was to launch the enterprise two years ago, when Clemenceau returned from Egypt. The business arrangements were then in the hands of M. Loucheur, formerly a Minister in Clemencesus. merly a Minister in Clemenceau's Cabinet, and Clemenceau asserts that Loucheur betrayed him. He is now a favorite of Briand's and must be reckoned one of the Tiger's enemies. In making the announcement, Tardieu said that the intention is for Clemenceau to write one article a week, but he has confidence that once he gets started there will be no stopping him, and he is likely to dominate every issue of the paper. If Tardieu's remarks about the news-If Tardieu's remarks about the newspaper situation in Paris are correct, a great future awaits the French Nation. He says that, with the exception of a few Royalist organs, like the Action Francaise, all other papers in France are exactly alike. The French people do not get the news. Indeed, a presentation of news for the sake of news is not a feature of French papers. The Petit Parisien is about the only paper in France that would be accepted as a modern journal by people used to English-speaking newspapers in large cities. The others consider their own political opinions the vital news of political opinions the vital news of every issue.

The "Zonda."

MAKING DIAMONDS.

Be Done But It Is Costly.

Diamond fakers are many, and they ply a good trade among the gullible, palming off white sapphires as Brazilian diamonds of the first water, and obtaining high prices for flashing stones which are known as diamond "doublets."

"Double's" are no more genuine diamonds than are bits of glass. They are nothing but faked stones, with a thin slice of real diamond cemented by invisible cement to the front of a bit of crystal or one of the lesser

precious stones.

With diamonds fetching such high prices, it seems, on the face of it, an absolute certainty that a fortune awaits the man who can find out the way to make genuine diamonds.

Dozens of men have spent half their lives and all they possessed in trying to make real diamonds, but their efforts have only led them to penury.

There is no doubt that people would be very surprised if they saw

one day in a shop the legend: "Real diamonds made here. Orders taken for any size and quantity." Jewelers all over the world would show great concern, and diamond dealers generally would exhibit signs of panie. If ally would exhibit signs of panic. If, however, the notice in the window were restricted to the first sentence would leave the jewelers cold. It the last sentence that would cause

dismay.

The fact is, that genuine diamonds diamonds exactly similar to those that are mined in the blue earth of Kimberley, or found in the river beds of Brazil, can be made by man. Dia-monds, and carbon, and the black-lead which is brushed on firegrates, and with which we write in the form of a pencil, are all the same stuff. They are all carbon; the only difference is that diamonds are crystallized carbon.

How nature makes diamonds we do not know with any certainty. It

is certain, however, that there mus have been great heat and enormou pressures involved in the making of these gleaming precious stones. Men of science have at various times car-ried out many experiments to obtain these great heats and pressures, but all their money and time was wasted

Then Moisson, the French chemist set up an electric furnace which produced heats more intense than scientists had thought possible. The ordinary fire we burn to heat our rooms in winter is icy cold compared

with the temperatures that Moisson attained with his electric arcs. He found he could obtain the tem-perature he needed. The problem remained whether he could obtain the pressure. It is a well-known fact that molten iron expands as it cools: Moisson wondered how to make use of this property in iron so that it would help him to make diamonds. Eventually he took a crucible and melted iron within it. Then he mixed some carbon into the molten iron, and dis-

Taking the crucible, he inserted it in his electric furnace and subjected it to a heat of 4,000 degrees Centigrade. Whipping the crucible out of the furnace, he plunged it straight into a crucible full of molten lead. The queer thing is that the tem-perature of molten lead is so much lower than that of molten iron that it was like plunging the iron into cold water. The iron immediately on making contact with the crucible be-came solid at once, and as it solidi-fied it exerted enormous pressure on the molten metal in the centre.

Moisson, waiting until the iron was solid throughout, gradually dissolved away all the iron by using acids, and in the centre he found several minute diamonds, all black and discolored, and one or two diamonds, that were the transfer of the words. monds that were quite white. Thus he showed men how to make dia-

But it doesn't pay to make them. They cannot be made big enough to be of commercial value. You can buy a bigger diamond for \$50 than

puy a Digger diamond for \$50 than you can make by spending \$50,000. Experiments in making real dia-monds have not been quite fruitless. After one experiment that was car-ried on in the United States at enorexpense, the experimenters in vain for the nice-sized diamonds they rather expected. Instead they found a quantity of fine black dust that was practically as hard as a diamond. That dust is now known as carborundum, and it is more use-ful than diamonds in the realms of commerce. It is used both in the form of powder and made up into wheels and blocks by being mixed with wet fine clay and felspar, moulded and pressed.

Oxide of Iron.

Slosson, in his remarkable new book, "Creative Chemistry," says that every year the blast furnaces of the world release 72,000,000 tons of iron world release 72,000,000 tons of iron from its oxides, and every year one-four:h of that quantity reverts to rust. Should man cease his efforts in this direction for a generation there would be little left to show that he had ever learned to extract iron from is ores.





Although Queen Helen of Italy is daughter of the late King of Montenegro and despite the fact that the former sovereign dynasty of Petroviez and its followers, have been a terribly heavy tax upon the enerosity of the Italian crown and Government, yet the Montenegrin refugees in Italy, and especially at Rome, including the former Cabinet Ministers, Popovitch, Antonievitch and Plamenatz, have been behaving so badly that the Police Department in the Eternal City has been obliged to make a descent upon the pseudo Montenegrin Legation and Consulate-General, also upon the residences of the three former Ministers. and to seize all the documents and papers there, with a view to criminal
