

News of the Storm. One of the worst storms of wind and rain that we have had for some time visite1 this Province on Wednesday last. and continued until Thursday. Much damage way done to shipping, and reports have been coming in of disasters from all directions. At Tignish the storm was very violent, the crops being considerably damaged and fences razed everywhere. A barn containing 25 tons of hay belonging to J. H. Myrick & C ., of Tigpish, was struck by lightning on Wednesday morning and the barn and conten's were burned. The schooper A. J. McKean, owned by the Populand Packing Co., dragged her anchors during the night, and drifted ashore at Kildare Capes, and will likely prove a total wreck. The crew were rescued with great difficulty. Much credit is due to Captain McGrath, who at the head of a picked crew, succeeded at the risk of their own lives in catching a line from the schooner, and thus saving the lives of the crew. This is Capt. McGrath's third experience in the lifesaving line, and it is the general opinion that his services ought to be recognized in some substantial manner. The schooner Lady Aberdeev, from Douglastown for Cape Hastings, laden with railway ties, lies a total wreck at Savage Harbor bar. The crew were taken off by a wrecking party under the leadership of Mr. Jas. A. McDonald, light keeper of that place, who, assisted by two companions, aunched a dory, and at the risk of their own lives, went out and saved the whole crew. The schooner Marcella, Capt.
