

Attilla Tedious Voyage

The barq. Attilla, Capt Morgan, arrived here at 5 p.m. yesterday, 31 days from Pernambuco in ballast. In the Assembly.

At 3.30 yesterday afternoon the business of the House opened with the presentation of petitions, from Odeira, by Mr. Howley for telegraph extension, supported by Mr. D'Almeida; by Mr. Winsor, from Glovertown, for a road, and from New Harbour, for a bridge; by Mr. CHIT from St. Patrick's and Little Bay, for a road from Three Arms, Lush's Bight and Baird's Harbour, for a breakwater at Deadman's Bay, near Cape Freels; by Mr. Earle from Seldom, Change Islands and Fogo, also for breakwaters. These were supported by Sir R. Bond and Capt. Winsor.

Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond gave notice of questions (1) to ask the Premier if any American vessel was allowed to take herring in White Bay last fall; (2) to ask the Minister of Marine & Fisheries if any letter was received at his department from any member of the Executive requesting him to grant a permit to certain American captains to export herring to the United States, or to use same for bait purposes.

Mr. CHIT gave notice of question as to allocations made in the District of Twillingate.

The Peat Manufacture Bill passed the Committee stage without amendment, and was ordered to be read a third time on Monday next.

The Minister of Agriculture, Hon. S. D. Blandford, moved the second reading of the Canker Bill, and emphasized the gravity of the mischief that might ensue if proper steps were not taken to stamp out this disease. He said that the disease, which had come amongst us, and which was giving a lot of anxiety and worry to farmers, was first discovered at Red Island, P.B., in 1909, and the attention of the department was drawn to it by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, where the discoverer had sent a diseased potato for examination. The disease is practically unknown on this side the Atlantic, though in 1900 it was discovered in Saxony, and in 1907 made its appearance in England. Dr. Gussow, of the Department at Ottawa, came to this country, and after making very careful examination, cautioned the department as to its very great seriousness. Dr. Robertson and Professor McPhail also made inquiries concerning it, and the result has been that every care is being exercised in Canada to prevent the importation of potatoes from this country.

Mr. Clift gave notice to ask the Minister of Agriculture & Mines to lay on the table a statement of all money expended in connection with the Canker, including the sums paid Dr. Robertson, Professor McPhail and Professor Gussow, in connection with their respective visits to this colony.

The Premier asked for the deferment of the Cold Storage Resolutions. The Leader of the Opposition had therefore to postpone his amendments which have for their object the safeguarding of the Bait Policy and the protection of our people against duties which differentiate against them and in favour of Messrs. Trefethen and Lord.

Five Men Hurt at Bell Island.

People from Portugal Cove to-day say that a dangerous accident occurred at Bell Island Tuesday last by which five men were hurt, two of them seriously. The accident occurred in No. 2 slope of the D. I. S. Co. The men were engaged "face clearing" in the mine and were mounted on ladders to do the work more effectively, when of a sudden there was a heavy fall of ore from the top of the slope and it came directly on the workers, who were hurled from the ladders, two of them being almost completely buried by the heavy material. Their cries for help brought several "loaders" to their aid and after great difficulty the injured men were extricated. All were severely cut about the head and face and had their bodies badly bruised, while the two who were buried in the ore suffered severely. One man had his leg broken above the knee, and the other had an arm broken, while each were terribly cut about the head, face and hands and their bodies were covered with bruises. These were placed in hospital and given every attention, while the others had their wounds attended to by the doctors. All concerned had a narrow escape from instant death.

His Excellency in reply expressed his pleasure at the meeting, and paid a tribute to the work done by the Society through the schools, which he had only recently visited and which were superior to anything of their kind he had seen.

Continuing by way of Military Road, High Mass was attended at the Cathedral. Rev. Father Sheehan delivered the panegyric on the Saint of the day, and the discourse from one who had only recently arrived from the homeland was particularly earnest and interesting. After Mass the Society's honoured Patron, His Grace Archbishop Howley, was visited at the Palace.

In response to the congratulations tendered by the Vice-President His Grace made his customary happy acknowledgment and wished the body continued years of prosperity. The day's celebrations were very fittingly terminated by a presentation in the Theatre in the afternoon, and night by the Society's dramatic troupe of an

appropriate Irish Drama. The play was performed with the excellence for which the troupe is so deservedly noted, whilst an equally satisfactory result was the handsome amount which the net receipts totalled.

The President had the distinguished honour of being present at Boston on the occasion of our National Festival, as the guest of the Charitable Irish Society of that City. To our sister organization he presented the compliments of this body, and our wishes for the future were right heartily reciprocated.

During the year the civilized world, and in particular the members of the British Empire, deplored the loss of Edward the Peacemaker, whose reign formed so remarkable a period in the history of Britain's rule and whose liberality and diplomacy contributed

so much to peace and harmony amongst the nations of the earth. Appropriate resolutions of condolence to the Queen Mother and Family, and of loyalty to the new Sovereign were adopted at the regular quarterly meeting in May.

On Tuesday, December 13th, in company with representatives of the various Catholic Societies, your officers attended the Requiem Mass at the Cathedral for the repose of the soul of the late Very Rev. Dean Born, afterwards taking part in the funeral.

Twenty names were added to our roll during the year, but we regret to record the loss by death of the late Robert J. Moore, who for many years was a member of the Institution. In accordance with the rules your officers paid a last tribute of respect to the memory of our deceased brother mem-

In this direction a particularly gratifying feature of the recent Industrial Exhibition was the display given by the boys of our Manual School of their work. The general chorus of approval from the thousands of visitors in a high compliment to the Rev. Bro. Cashman who is in charge of that department.

The Industrial Department has disposed of all the twine made up for the year, and given the usual amount of work to poor people who can so well appreciate this opportunity of earning.

The School Committee during the year installed a new boiler which has given entire satisfaction and is capable of heating the whole building.

The Literary and Amusement Committee have our thanks for their year's work. The rooms have maintained their name for comfort and convenience, and an especial amount of pleasure has been given the members by the card and billiard tournaments which have been in progress for some time. To those gentlemen who have presented prizes for these competitions we are indebted as, in addition to the pleasure afforded those who participate, the tournaments are of considerable financial assistance. The musical and literary sections have also arranged for their annual programme, the former having already provided two concerts, whilst the debates committee begin their programme as usual with the opening of the Lenten Season.

During the year Mr. W. H. Davidson of this city presented this Society through the Christian Brothers, with a large number of ornamental trees. These have been placed along the front of the grounds and we trust that the generosity of Mr. Davidson will be repaid by a growth that will satisfy his well-known taste for arboriculture.

From the Treasurer's statement it will be seen that the total receipts for the year have been \$5,424.43; expenses \$4,264.96, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,159.47.



ADRIFT ON THE ICE.

Bell Island Men Driven Off This Morning, But Are Rescued Later.

The sensational news was phoned from Port aux Basques this forenoon that several men had been driven off from Bell Island on the ice and were being rapidly swept out to sea. The men, eight in all, as far as we could learn, left Bell Island during the early part of the forenoon to walk to Portugal Cove over the ice, but a S.W. gale sprang up very quickly and the ice began to move out the bay very fast when the men were about midway across. Boats put out hurriedly from Horse Cove, Broad Cove and Bell Island when these predicament was observed and all were rescued. The Premier had a message from Magistrate Power at Bell Island at 11:30 saying that the ice was moving out the bay with the men on it, and he wired the Progress to get ready and sail from Bell Island to rescue the men. Later he had another

message from the same source saying that the men were supposed to have been taken from the ice by boats from Broad Cove and that the Progress could not get clear. It also intimated that it might be advisable to send boats from Portugal Cove if the Euphrates, which is there, could not butt out through. I. G. Sullivan was also advised of the affair, but was told that the men had been picked up by boats from Broad Cove and Horse Cove, and this was stated by phone from the operator at Portugal Cove. Mr. H. W. LeMessurier also had a wire from Mr. R. J. Costigan at Bell Island, saying that Broad Cove boats had picked them up. This incident shows the danger that attends crossing this bay on the floe, and it is evidently a case of "all's well that ends well."

The s.s. Bruce got clear of the ice off Low Point at 2:30 p.m. yesterday and proceeded on to Louisburg. The Reid Nfld. Co. had a wire last night from Capt. Drake that the ship was then of Scatterie. No news was received since. The R. N. Co. believe that Capt. Drake arrived at Louisburg this forenoon O.K., and that he will be ready to leave this afternoon for Port aux Basques with the mails and passengers sent up from Sydney. After landing the mails and passengers at Port aux Basques to-morrow the Bruce will return to Louisburg, unless the conditions for going to Sydney are very favourable.

The Fiddians and Collegians were the contesting teams in this morning's inter-collegiate hockey match at the Prince's Rink, the former winning by a score of 5 to 1. This gives the Fiddians the Shield for three years running. Although the score was a big one it is no indication of the game, both teams being very evenly matched. Birds Without Nests.

There are scores of different kinds of birds in and around the coasts of Britain which never dream of building nests. These either steal nests or do without them altogether.

The kingfishers and the woodpeckers, as well as the cuckoos, never build, but dump their eggs into the nest of any other bird that comes handy. Our commonest little hawk, the kestrel, has a fancy for the discarded nest of a carrion crow or magpie if she can find one at a sufficient height above the ground to suit her. That odd-looking bird, the nightjar, makes no nest, but, choosing some hollow on the bare ground sheltered by bracken, there lays its two mottled, lead-colored eggs. Game birds mostly have no nests and lay their eggs in a hollow on the ground. None of the plover family take much trouble about nest-building. The stone curlew, or Norfolk plover, neglects even the few benches which the plover generally places below her eggs. That rare number of the plover family the dotterel, lays its four pear-shaped eggs in a depression of the sand or shingle on the summit of a hill or mountain.



CHAPTER IX.—INCIDENTS ON BOARD THE S. S. ADVENTURE.

On board the Adventure we were fortunate enough to form the acquaintance of Mr. Hamlyn, an engineer, and a gentleman who had travelled a great deal in foreign parts. Mr. Hamlyn happened to be on a visit to his home in St. John's, and with his brother had, like ourselves, decided to spend the afternoon at Ferryland. We found Mr. Hamlyn very kind indeed, and by permission of Mr. MacLaughlin, the Chief Engineer, he showed us through the engine room, and all the apartments thereof. He took us right down to the stoke-hold, among the furnaces, and out into the after part of the ship over the main shaft. We had often seen furnaces, and engines, and shafts, but never before had we ventured to inspect them while at sea and while in motion.

To us it was a world of study, and a revelation of wonder. Wheels, great and small, gauges, telegrams and tell-tales, cranks, pistons and cylinders, batteries, revolutions and actions, furnaces, fire and heat, oils, vapours and odors, coals, ashes and men, besides us was a new one, and it afforded a rare opportunity of seeing the real practical workings of a mighty and up-to-date steam engine. As we watched and mentally compared its mechanism with that of forty years ago, we felt sure that if even James Watts, the father of the steam engine, or William Stephenson, the father of the railway engine, were in our place, they would have looked with equal amazement upon what had been wrought, and wonder at the marvellous developments that had followed their own genius.

Of the different departments of the engine room, that which elicited our keenest interest was the stoke-hold. This was not because of its mystery. No! It was not very different in a manner from the furnaces that may be seen in any of our large factories. Our interest was not from a mechanical or scientific standpoint, but it was from a humanitarian standpoint. Here were men whose lives were being spent in an inferno, and who had to work very hard, and keep watch amid the scorching heat of those chambers. The heat was intense, and for four hours in twelve they had to tend those huge fires. Stripped almost to nudity, and with pickers, shovels, and chisels at hand, they silently toiled on, faithfully doing their part in the propulsion of the great ship. Unseen they were by the crowd of excursionists, but none the less they were important factors in the concern. They were very obliging and respectful, and opened the furnace doors and gave us a chance to look in upon the great white fires. They explained to us the use of the bars and prisms near at hand. They told us how many tons of fuel they had pitched into these furnaces since we had left St. John's, and how much ashes they had removed. They told us about the trimmers who are the coal from the bunkers, and place it near the furnaces for use. They informed us that they were well treated by the ship's owners, and that everything was done to lighten their task. They told us that they had good

depths, and crawled the recesses of its unexplored bottom. What hopes unfulfilled lay buried in its chasms, and how many of the children of men had been swallowed up. How full of mystery was it! As full of mystery as of tragedy, and as full of life as of motion.

For centuries men have dragged their waters in conquest of its denizens, and, as if in toll, ten thousand times ten thousand of them have paid the death penalty to its treachery. Mrs. Hemans in her beautifully pathetic poem: "The Graves of a Household," says:—

"The sea, the lone blue sea, hath one, He lies where pearls lie deep."

To us as a maritime people these lines convey a touch and pathos that more than once have moved to tears, but such is the price that humanity has ever paid in its struggle for existence, and which every Empire has paid for expansion beyond the seas. We do not know what ratio Newfoundland has paid, but it has certainly been very steep.

Annual Meeting.

OF BENEVOLENT IRISH SOCIETY.

Hon. J. D. Ryan, the President, occupied the chair at the annual meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society held last night. The reports of the officers for the past year were submitted and indicated that the institution was still hale and hearty in its 105th year. All the officers of last year were re-elected, viz.: President, Hon. J. D. Ryan; Vice-President, J. M. Kent; 1st Asst. V.P., J. L. Slatery; 2nd Asst. V.P., J. P. Kelly; Treasurer, M. J. McCarthy; Secretary, W. J. Higgins; Chairman of Schools, T. J. Nash; Chairman of Charity, J. C. Pippy; Chairman of Review and Correspondence, P. F. Moore; Secretary of Schools, W. S. Dumphry. The President's address was very interesting. He has broken all the B. I. S. records as regards duration of the tenure of his office. He is now elected for the 17th time in as many consecutive years. There have been in all 18 Presidents since the establishment of the Society in 1806. The six who held office longest were Hon. Edward Morris, 16 years; Hon. Patrick Morris, 15 years; James McBraire, 13 years; Hon. L. O'Brien, 11 years; R. J. Kent, 8 years; Hon. J. D. Ryan, 17 years. President Ryan showed his appreciation of the honor conferred upon him by the Society by donating \$200 to the fund to mark the event. He would give a similar sum next year provided a successor were nominated for the office. The Society, however, even at the risk of losing the \$200, are not going, if they can help it, to allow him to retire. After the appointment of the committees the usual votes of thanks were passed, special thanks being given to Messrs. W. J. Higgins, M. Power and N. McGuire for holding entertainments in aid of the funds.

Through smoked and grimy the men were in good spirits, and like ten thousands of their class, they were watching faithfully at their posts. The hour was midnight, and as we left the bottom of the ship and climbed up to the engine room proper, and then still higher to the deck, and then up to the poop, and leaned on the strong iron rail and looked out over the vast expanse of waters, we for a moment or two paid mental tribute to the worth of "those who go down to the sea in ships, and who do business upon the great waters." We had seen much in the engine room and are the richer for it. When starting on the trip we did not entertain the least thought of venturing down into these apartments, but being so fortunate as to meet Mr. Hamlyn we found the way clear for us. We have not seen Mr. Hamlyn since, but take this opportunity of thanking him.

For a while we enjoyed the sensation of midnight on the ocean, and in every direction we found food for reflection. When the fog lifted the sky was quite clear, and a myriad stars looked down upon us. The night being somewhat dark, the stars seemed to sparkle in greater contrast, and the longer we looked the greater number there appeared to be. What a study is the sky, and how little we really know of it! Do we look up enough? or are our heads bowed down too much with baser things? The midnight view from the bridge of the Adventure as she steamed along, with Cape Spear light in the distance, was in itself a lesson not soon to be forgotten.

Inoculation For Typhoid Fever.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—The first inoculation for the prevention of typhoid in Ottawa was successfully made on Saturday, when J. A. Machado, manager of the American Bank Note Co., submitted himself to the treatment at the hands of Dr. Laidlaw of the St. Luke's Hospital staff. This form of vaccination is a guard against fever, is comparatively little known, but was employed with great success at several encampments of the United States Army last summer.

The patient after the anti-toxin is administered exhibits for a couple of days all the symptoms of typhoid, but these pass away leaving him in his usual state of health.

Mr. Machado is to-day quite recovered from its effects.

Rats Cost Millions.

England, Losing £15,000,000 Annually, Resolves on Drastic Measures.

London, Feb. 7.—The Lord Mayor presided yesterday over an influential meeting, which had been called to discuss the question of the extermination of rats in this country. There was perfect unanimity among the large company present as to the fact that it was one of the pressing necessities of the day that rats should be exterminated if possible, but the methods by which this could be accomplished were acknowledged to be difficult and costly.

Sir James Crichton Browne said that the rat was a wholesale destructor, and levied his heaviest toll on agriculturists. Experiments had shown that each rat consumed grain or did other damage to the extent of a farthing a day. If there was one rat to every acre in England the agricultural loss due to rats was £15,000,000 a year. If the rats were exterminated, England might reduce the importation of grain to the value of some millions yearly. The upshot of the meeting was that great pressure would be brought to bear on the Government to induce the appointment of a royal commission to deal with the subject.

PEKING, Feb. 17.

The ultimatum from the Government of the Czar was taken under consideration to-day by the Imperial Council, and a reply was formulated, which has not yet been made public. It is understood that the Chinese Government considers the discretion in the present dispute to be the better part of valour, inasmuch as China's army is in no wise prepared for war, the troops being poorly equipped and lacking in discipline. Moreover, the Empire has too many troubles upon its hands at this time to prepare for war. It is believed that China will renew the Treaty, and guarantee a strict adherence to its terms in the future.

LONDON, Feb. 17.

So seriously is the Annexation resolution, introduced by Congressman Bennett in the United States House of Representatives taken here by the Imperial Preference party, that it will be made a subject for interpellation of the Government in the House of Commons. The Premier will be asked if he intends to send any communication on the subject to the Government at Washington.

LONDON, Feb. 17.

A discovery which promises to provide a cure for mental diseases, is announced, the discoverer being Dr. Oswald, of the Glasgow Royal Asylum. It consists of a substance to be injected into the patient suffering from madness, and it is alleged, not only cures, but makes the patient immune to further attack.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.

The House of Representatives Committee on Foreign Affairs voted against the Bennett resolution to enter into negotiations with Britain for the annexation of Canada, by 9 to 1.

A collision on the Essex Coast, resulted in the sinking of the steamer Montpark, from Cadiz to Yarmouth. Thirteen of the crew were drowned.

The announcement that Emperor William of Germany would unveil the Memorial to his grandmother, the late Queen Victoria, on May 16th next, is officially confirmed.

The bye-election in the Horncastle division of Lincolnshire, rendered necessary by the late member, Lord

Willoughby de Eresby's succeeding his father, the Earl of Ancaster, in the Lords, owing to his death on December 20th, has resulted in the return of Captain Weisall, the Unionist candidate. No change.

LONDON, Feb. 17.

An attempt will be made to force Russia and China to refer their differences to the Hague Tribunal for arbitration.

Without waiting for China's reply to the ultimatum, Russia began preparations for actual warfare to-day.
