Delays of Justice

Legal records supply many in-stances of long intervals between the crime and the arrest. The leading case is that of Eugene Aram, who was hanged for the murder of Clarke fourteen years after the offence. In the eighteenth century a man named Horne was executed for the murder of his child thirty-five years after the crime. There is also the well known case of Governor Wall, who was hanged in 1802 for a murder committed in 1782. But Sir James Stephens recalls what is surely the most remarkable case on record. 



A BIG FIRE

Man Nearly Burned to Death-Considerable Damage.

At 4.50 p.m. yesterday the fire alarm rang bringing the Central and West End Companies, Southside Re-serve firemen and members of the crew of the surveying ship Ellinor to the house owned and occupied by Mr. Glynn, on the Southside.

The origin of the fire is rather, a foolhardy story, as learned by a Telegram reporter who was on the scene.

Between 4.30 and a quarter to five Frank Glynn went to light the kitchen fire to get tea ready. The wood and shavings did not act as quickly as he desired so he added an overdose of kerosene oil. Pouring the oil from a can which he held over the top of the stove where it came in contact with the flames from the wood and an ex-plosion followed. Glynn's clothing first caught and then various parts of the kitchen. He immediately ran to the street in his burning garb which were taken from his charred body by neighbours. In the meantime Glynn's father, an invalid of nearly 80 years of age, gave the alarm. Frank Glynn was then suffering the most excruciating agony. Dr. Campbell responded and found that Glynn's arms and legs were fearfully burned as well as portions of his abdomen. The ambulance was then despatched promptand conveyed the injured man to dospital. The wonder is that Glynn scaped with his life.

By the time the fire companies arrived on the scene the fire was well inder way with flames gushing from the windows and volumes of smoke ascending the heavens. The Southside Volunteers were the first to get to work with their hose and hand pump. However, the next house occupied by Mr. J. Kelly had then been caught and the fire had reached such serious proportions that their efforts were really of no avail towards sub-duing the blaze; all the houses in the neighbourhood were threatened with destruction and had there been any wind blowing it is questionable whether any of that part of the city would be left standing at all. as Cousen's cooperage is close by with a large amount of stock there. After considerable delay the West End firemen got a stream of water from Job's Bridge, and a few minutes afters the entral had their hoses out playing on the fire. Hundreds of people surounded the burning buildings and the firemen had it tedious and difficult performing their work but worked like trojans until they quenched the fire in the wo buildings but not before Glynn's house was gutted and Kelly's badly wrecked. The all out signal was sent

The loss to Mr. Glynn is heavy as he carried no insurance on his pro-perty, but we understand that Mr. Kelly is fully covered. Although it is unnecessary to state the excellent services of the regular firemen. yet particularly praiseworthy were the efforts of the men belonging to the Ellinor. The old homestead occupied by the Glynn family, now no more, is nearly a century of years in existence. It was the birthplace of the late Mr. Foran, father of Mr. T. J. Foran, of the News staff.

M.G.B. Armoury Destroyed.

DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT \$20,000. The Methodist Guards Armoury, situated at the junction of Springdale Street and LeMerchant Road, and con Street and LeMerchant Road, and containing band instruments, luggage, rifles, library, stock, records, campoutfit, tents, trophies won in athletie events the past years, amongst which are the Montgomery and Blackwood shooting cups, the rowing cups won the past two years, company section shield, etc., and utensils, went up in smoke to-day, doing damage of not less, than \$20,000 damage. Only fifty of some 300 rifles were saved. The fire as far as could be learned has a mysterious origin, though there is a slight theory that it was caused by men who were seen tarring the roof.

were seen tarring the roof.

The first intimation of the fire was at 11.15, when an alarm was sent in from Box 313, bringing the three brigade companies to the scene as well as members of the scheme as well. as members of the police force. The central men first reached the danger zone and had a stream of water playing on the building, but this seemed to have little effect until the combined efforts of the west and east end fire-men was had. From the outset the blaze was awful, reflecting the sky-for quite a distance. Burning embers aided by a slight breeze, flew in all directions, as a result of which Mr. Comeford's cooperage on Casey Street and Barn on LeMerchant Road, was ignited, but were quenched with very little damage. On either side of the Armoury were houses, and in imminent danger of destruction. To prevent the blaze from spreading citizens, Methodist Guards boys and members of sister brigades, gave volunteer help while the fire fighters were confining their efforts to the Hall. Inspector General Sullivan was present and rendered yeoman service in directing his men to keep the anxious throng back. Only after an hour and a half

was the fire got under control. The all-out signal was sent in at 1.30.




