At the City Hall.

Yesterday afternoon the Mayor and Council met for their weekly session. In reply to an application of Const. Cleary for the position of orderly at the Park, he was told there was no vacancy.

The Council will consider the request of R. Avery for the engagement of the City Band to play in the parks during the summer.

The Engineer was directed to attend to the application of Wood & Kelly for the laying down of the street line on the south side of Pleasant St. for the Brazil Square.

The Road Committee and the Engineer will attend to the street property of the late C. F. Bennett at the Southside.

The Secretary will inquire into the matter of the arbitration about land of the Cons estate taken for the widening of Bambrick Street.

If possible the Council will extend the water service to the Southside this year.

The Engineer will go into the basis of E. Ehsary's claim for \$450 in addition to 10 cents per foot for land the Council propose to take over on the Southside.

The Engineer will look into the matter of repairing wall near Cook's premises on the Southside.

Hearn & Co. request for the sprinkling cart along Forest Road to keep down the dust which interferes with the work of the Buterine Factory, will be acceded to.

Inspector Baker was given power to dismiss employees who disobey his orders in reference to the watering of the streets.

The R. N. Co. will be requested to accept their agreement as to sprinkling.

The Council will deal with the Cochrane Street Church property on Flavin Street at a special meeting on Wednesday next and the decision conveyed to Mr. J. P. Blackwood.

Mr. J. Browning informed the Council that he had interviewed a number of prominent citizens on the plan of placing oil on the streets to lay the dust, as he had seen done in a number of American cities. Those he had consulted were willing to defray half the cost of the experiment, if the Council would pay the other half. He suggested the formation of a committee to deal with the proposal, and hoped to be able to furnish in a few days particulars as to the manner of conducting the experiment and its probable cost. The Council has already communicated with the Municipal Authorities of Boston, and when the information sought is obtained, the proposition will be taken up for consideration.

The lighting committee will consider the matter of placing a light on Saggerty's Street.

The Engineer will give an estimate of the cost of installing water pipes along Fing Street.

Mr. G. C. Pearn on behalf of the Board of Trade and the Fire Underwriters' Association, inquired what decision the Council had arrived at in the matter of providing a fire boat for use on the harbor. He intimated that insurance rates would certainly be raised, if nothing was done. Nothing will be done until the Premier's return, as this is held to be a Government matter.

The application of G. Parsons for sewerage connection with his garage on King's Road will be considered.

C. Coffin was given permission to install an electric motor in his factory on Prescott Street.

The plans of K. Noah for the extension of his Water St. store were passed.

The refuse receptacles near the premises of Baine Johnston & Co.'s premises, Southside, will be cleaned off, and later the construction of a sewer will be attended to.

The breastwork at Monroe's Cove will be repaired.

Permission to repair the premises of Maunders, Duckworth St.; Casey's Water St.; Mayo's, the Beach; and Butler's at Newman's in the West End, was granted.

Engineer will report on plan of R. J. Green's proposed house on Pennywell Road.

Tender will be asked for the supply of quarry spawls.

The Engineer will attend to the complaint about sewer on Leslie St.

The contract for painting Barrerman Park was given to Fleming and Reed.

Hon. John Harris was given permission to build an annex to his house on Rennie's Mill Road.

The pay rolls were passed and the meeting closed at 6 p.m.

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

I have almost done. I have but touched the fringe of the Movement. Yet it has led any out of the forests of prejudice and given them a view of the clear blue sky of the ultimate aim of Socialism—the writing of these papers will not have been without reward.

If those who have faith in their fellow men and in their inherent moral nature, who believe in human progress, and who do not stifle thought by the material considerations of life, it will be apparent that the Socialist brings in sight the culmination of the Universal Brotherhood of Man.

I have written mainly for those who have despised Socialism or at any rate

place of worship, or from marrying, or being faithful to his wife, or from keeping and bringing up his children at home?

There is nothing in it to destroy religion nor the home, nor to foster vice.

But there is something in it to kill ignorance and to destroy vice. There is something in it to shut up the goals, to reduce crime and drunkenness, and wipe out for ever the sweat-ers and the slums, the beggars and the idle rich, and to make it possible for sober and willing workers to live healthy and happy and honourable lives. For Socialism would teach and train all children wisely; it would foster genius and devotion to the common good; it would kill scamping and loafing; it would give us better health, better homes, better work, better food, better lives, and better men and women.

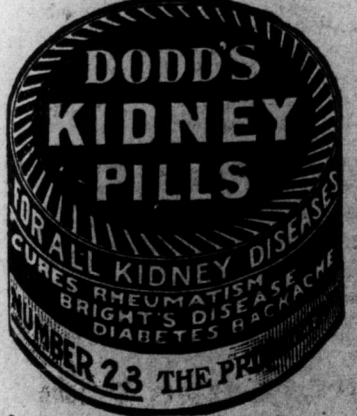

And, further, that Socialism is not Anarchy but order—not Communism but Justice—it does not propose to abolish competition but to regulate it—nor to abolish property but to concentrate it—nor abolish the Home, but to make the Home possible—not to curtail liberty but to enlarge it.

Socialism is not Syndicalism. Syndicalism aims at getting as much out of private capital as possible, and as Stead says, does its work minus common sense and the ten commandments.

Trade Unions and 'Stockers' are not necessarily Socialists. The now celebrated case of the McNamara's was used as an argument against Socialists, but as a matter of fact neither of the brothers were Socialists.

On the other hand, the public imagine that Socialism is Utopian; but it is only an intelligent, practical system for providing humanity with the necessities and comforts of life with the least waste, the least effort and the least injustice. And what is there in it to prevent any man from being a Christian, or from attending a

duced and distributed the things they needed, upon what is called "the competitive system," in which every man engaged in production and distribution is in a measure competing with every other man in it, each trying to make out of his particular calling the largest amount of money possible. That this system has resulted in great waste, misery and disease is shown only too well. One prominent feature of the system is that men do not work for the purpose of supplying the needs of their fellow creatures, but produce things simply for the purpose of making money for themselves. This competitive system is going to the wall, giving way to the Trusts, which are able to eliminate much of the waste but do not make the position of the labourer any brighter nor lighten the burden of the consumer. The latest in the Trust line is the movement of the Banks in Canada which are slowly merging into one. Where there were forty or fifty twenty years ago they have dwindled to less than half that number now, and the merger of the Traders Bank and the Royal Bank lately is causing uneasiness in Canada as to the ultimate end of it all. But it is all paving the way for State control!

It is shown that were the production of the necessities of life placed on a proper footing that it could be accomplished in less than half the time that it takes now.

The enormous losses caused by strikes and lock-outs and the erroneous wastes of getting the market add in no small way to the present ruling of high prices. All this unrest in England, all the demands which come from the labourers everywhere spring from the tyranny and injustice of present day business methods.

As Lloyd-George says: While wealth has increased so wonderfully the worker has not got his share.

The two books that I should recommend the reader to procure are "The Socialist Movement," by J. R. McDonald, M.P., and "Twentieth Century Socialism," by Edmond Kelly, both of which can be bought here—the former for twenty-five cents and the latter for one dollar and eighty. These will enlarge what I have endeavoured to put before you and will give you a fair and practical view of Socialism, and for the principles which should underlie our daily work read Ruskin's "Unto the Last," and Carlyle's "Past and Present."

It has been an eye-opener I suspect to many to read that Socialism comes as a revelation of God's power to care for the material welfare of mankind. The Socialist State will come through political power. Indeed many of their demands are being granted even now by parties not calling themselves Socialists.

But, by the way, is it not heart-rending to see how apparently easy it is to raise hundreds of thousands of dollars for a palatial hotel for the 'idle rich' tourist to spread in, and we are blinded with dust, filled with germs of all kinds, and our people live in hovels hardly habitable? And on what authority can the Government guarantee the interest on any of the money required? Wake up! Indeed, with two hundred lives murdered every year by indifference.

Another word of thanks to the Telegram for the use of its columns, and to those who have taken the trouble to follow the articles. W. T. Stead says that we are all Socialists, plus common sense and the ten commandments, and if I have started anyone in applying the ten commandments and the chief one of "loving thy neighbour in its full meaning, to the methods of business and our daily work, I am content to leave the outcome. You may not want to become a Socialist but you will find in an unprejudiced study of the movement, that it has opened the avenues of escape from the predatory methods of our time.

Money rules—rules Society—rules those who have it and those who have not.

The Socialist State is more of an Evolution than a revolution in the common meaning of the latter term.

The Socialist stands for the universal brotherhood of man, while no one can say "Thy Kingdom Come on Earth with any true meaning in the words and imagine that the direction of effort in the world to-day is in the way of that wonderful kingdom. There are attempts it is true and many deserving ones, to make the conditions under which the kingdom can be accomplished, but they are in the nature of Charity, not Justice. And it is not Aims that is needed but a friend. Not what we give, but what we share. For the gift without the giver is bare. The motive power behind Socialism is not merely mechanical and social economy but life itself.

Hence around it are ranged the living impulses of religion, of ethics, of art, of literature, those creative impulses which fill man's heart from an inexhaustible store of hope and aspiration, and which make him find not only his greatest happiness but also the very reason for life itself, in pursuing the pilgrim road which, mounting up over the hills and beyond the horizon, winds towards the Ideal.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

PHOENIX, Arizona, May 31. About 6,000 votes were cast at the Democratic State Primaries. According to returns tabulated yesterday, Champ Clark obtained 90 per cent. of the total.

HALIFAX, May 31. The man arrested in connection with the shooting of Donaldson and wounding Cody at Birch Cove, yesterday, was brought here from Windsor to-night. His correct name is Hubert A. Grant, of Boston.

BERLIN, May 31. Die Post learns that new official regulations according to which all German passenger steamers carrying 75 or more persons, inclusive of the crew, must be equipped with wireless apparatus with a radius of 100 miles, will go into force next October.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 31. Despatches from Dawson, Yukon Territory, say that forest fires are still burning north and south of Dawson, and that a large acreage of standing timber has been destroyed. A hundred square miles are now barren. There has been no rain in the Yukon this season.

LONDON, May 31. Claude Graham White announces his intention to organize the greatest aviation meet yet held. He will invite two hundred air men to take part in the competitions for the purpose of raising a fund to erect a memorial to Wilbur Wright. He says that Wright might almost be described as the Edison of the air.

NEW YORK, May 31. It is announced that the new 50,000-ton White Star Liner to take the place of the Titanic in the fall of 1913 will be named the *Britanic*. She will be the same length as the Olympic. The White Star Line has had

two vessels bearing the name of *Britanic*, both of which earned large sums for the company. The name is considered lucky.

WINNIPEG, May 31. It is reported here that to-morrow the Publicity Commissioner of Moosejaw, Sask., is sending out 50,000 post cards bearing the slogan, "To hell with poverty; come to Moosejaw." Orders have been issued by the Postmaster General's department, Ottawa, to turn all these over to the dead letter office.

LONDON, May 31. "Open or closed shop" is the cause of the dispute in dockland, and at present there is no sign of the employers' consent to debar non-unionists from employment, or that the strike leaders will agree to permit their men to work alongside non-unionists. The joint conference called by the Government for this morning proved, as anticipated, futile, not a single employer putting in an appearance. The Government, however, submitted fresh proposals for the consideration of the men. Whether Tillet and Gosling have succeeded in making the dispute a national affair will not be made known until after the meeting of the national executives to-morrow; but indications are that the Sailors' and Firemen's Union will probably have the deciding vote and oppose the movement on the ground that the present time is inopportune, primarily because of the financial condition of the Unions' treasury. Should the decision be against national support, the strike appears doomed to failure. Numbers of non-unionists are working along the docks daily, increasing the provisioning of London, which goes on uninterrupted. Having failed to bring employers and men together, the Government is tackling each side separately, and at to-day's meeting of the Board of Trade, at which strike leaders alone attended, the Government suggested setting up a joint conciliation board, with power over all parties.

tics working in the port. The strike leaders promise to give the men's reply June 4th. This is believed to be the policy the Government purposes to carry out, and it is understood they are prepared to enforce the authority of the conciliation board by legislation, the same as in the recent case of the coal strike.

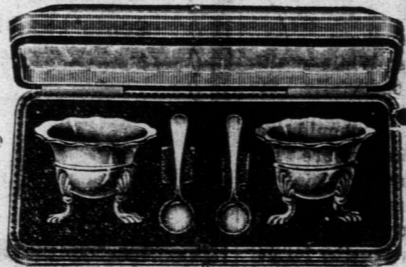
