Judging from articles that appear in the outside press on what is called "open" towns, an idea seems to be prevalent that the parties to the Hague Conference signed a Convention that only fortified towns were to be liable to bombardment. Unfortunately this is not so. At the Hague Conference in 1899, prohibitions bearing on this mateed to as regards fighting on land. They are as follows:—

ment of towns, villages, habitations or buildings which are not defended. Art. 26.—The commander of an attacking force, before commencing a bombardment, except in the case of an assault, should do all he can to warn

Art. 27.—In sieges and bombard-ments all necessary steps should be taken to spare as far as possible edifices devoted to religion, art, science, and charity, hospitals and places where the sick and wounded are collected, provided they are not used at the same time for military purposes. The besieged should indicate those buildings or places by some particular and visible signs, which should be notified to the assailants.

Art. 28.—The pillage of a town or place, even when taken by assault, is prohibited. These rules as to hostilities adopt

AIR FIGHT AT SHEERNESS. LONDON, To-Day.

Christmas brought no rest to the armies at battle. It found the Russians still fighting desperately in snowy Poland against the fierce attacks of Germans and Austrians. The French are making a spasmodic thrust against the long German line of renches in Northern and Eastern France. The British and Belgians are almost at hand to hand warfare against the Germans. In Flanders yesterday things were generally quiet, says the German bulletin. The French report intermittent artillery firing. The French claim several successes along the centre of the eastern line, while the Germans declare they have taken British trenches in Belgium. Both sides assert they have repulsed attacks at various points, which indicates that a feeling process is under way all along the lines. So close are the trenches of the Allies and Germans at many points that almost the only weapons used are hand grenades, since it is impossible for men to expose themselves even to so small a degree as would be necessary to use their rifles. There have been informal dividuals, what is equivalent to them is used between nations."

TALK OF GERMAN RETREAT. LONDON, To-day. The Daily Express despatch from Amsterdam says: My correspondent in Belgium states on the authority of first hand information that the Germans have now plans for their coming retreat from Flanders. They are now concentrating 200,000 Landstrum troops in fortified positions in and around Antwerp, in order that they may be enabled to make a firm stand there, when the Allies hurl them back. there, when the Allies hurl them back. A German lieutenant in Antwerp said, if we are repulsed in Flanders we shall retreat at once on Antwerp not even attempting to defend Ghent, but our defence at Antwerp will be desperate and it will take years to drive us out, as I expect we will have five army corps there.

IS IT TRUE?

COPENHAGEN, To-day. A German squadron of considerable size is reported to have sailed out into the Northern Sea early to-day, proceeding towards the coast of England to give battle to the British fleet.

PARIS, To-day.




