





Perhaps nothing better could have come to the Allied nations at a time of so great depression than the opportunity to give Germany a direct, almost humili-ating, rebuff. Their flat refusal to dis-curse part mercury company's outlined cuss not merely Germany's outlined proposals but any proposals whatever of peace discovers to themselves a united confidence which will act as a united confidence which will act as a

which which will act as a much needed tonic. The effect of its reception in Germany will be awaited with much more interest, for it will be even more important: indeed it is the only thing of real importance in the whole situation. We can afford to discovered the importance of the second

disregard the imperial blasphemy and hypocrisy and avoid the temptation to wax sarcastic upon the Chancellor's humanity theme. These things do not matter. What does matter is the inmatter. What does matter is the in-terpretation, after some days of re-flection, which the enemy peoples will put upon the attitude of the Allies. For it is certain to have a great moral effect, and where whole nations are at war moral effects cannot be ignored.

In the first place, with both sides ostensibly confident of victory, Ger-many has been the first to offer peace. This is not the part of a victor, save as a gracious mark of clemency to a a foe utterly crushed and overwhelm-

ed, and the London and Paris press have made it plain even to Germany that they see in her proposal a pre-science of defeat. It will not be pleasant to Germany to see that she has been correctly judged. In the second place, to pass from the Prus-sian funkers to the real German na-tion, the Allies' absolute trust in vic-

tory which looks out through their in-stantaneous rejection and ridicule of

Germany's overtures will probably cause them not a little mystification and lead them to think more deeply than they have done. In a sense this is the first occasion in which we have

been able to get in touch with the Ger-man people, though the medium is so roundabout and the process an infer-

roundabout and the process an infer-ential one. We shall have made them ask themselves questions. They have been told they are continuously vic-torious: of what use are victories that bring no peace? Why do not their enemies admit the inevitable and make peace? Are they really victorious? Finally, since the Allies are in such bad case to-day, can it be that their confidence is based on to-morrow? These questions seem natural enough to us, but it is probable that they have occurred to comparatively

they have occurred to comparatively few German subjects, who have wait-ed blindly and obediently until their leaders should offer peace and a con-quered foe gratefully accept it. The of the conquered foe will come as rather a shock to them. Their goal of






