





Hidden Gold.

Cortez and his handful of Spaniards destroyed the Aztec civilization in their mad lust for gold. To-day a collection of Aztec and Inca gold valued at a million sterling is on view at the

times and in various places, from the caves and hiding-places in which it covers almost the whole range of uses to which these two lost civilizations put what was to them their commonest metal. Nor can it be doubted that millions more of similar treasure lie hidden, awaiting the pick and spade of the enterprising explorer.

Treasure seeking is the most fascinating pursuit in the world, and once a man is bitten with the craze he nevpedition is not fitted out to search for some hidden hoard, and although success does not come to one in a hundred, yet the certainty that such treasures do lie hidden on lonely bays or at the bottom of sandy bays is ever the bait for fresh effort.

Some do achieve success. Witness the famous case of John Phinns, who began life as a ship's carpenter and ended it as Sir John Phipps, Governor of Massachusetts. His fortune was founded on the recovery of thirty-two off Hispaniola (Hayti).

La Fitte, a famous French caneer, buried a great hoard in the Leeward Islands, and was killed in a sea fight in the Gulf of Mexico in 1819, without being able to recover it There is every reason to believe that a certain little vessel of 400 tons, fitted out in the Thames in 1888, carried a company who successfully retrieved

There are heaps of treasure in Hayti. When, in 1790, the blacks rose and the French planters were forced to flee for their lives, they buried their gold in gardens and houses. In or about 1898 a poor man at Cape Haytien suddenly began to buy land, horses, and boats. He had found £3,-000 in a chest under the half-ruined house in which he lived. A speculator then bought the house, pulled it all down, and discovered further treasure worth £40,000.

But the most famous of lost trea sures is that supposed still to exist among the Cocos Islands, which lie some 500 miles west of Panama. No less than twelve million pounds is the value spoken of, and within the past twenty-five years half-a-dozen costly expeditions have vainly sought for this enormous fortune.

The story is that in 1835, when Lima was threatened by insurgents, the rich citizens put all their valuables aboard the barque Mary Dyer and sent her to the Cocos for safe keeping. Her crew quarrelled, most were killed and the secret of the hiding-place was

Talking From Earth to An Aeroplane.

Wireless Wonders One Can Scarcely Believe True.

We shall have to prepare ourselves for a new shock—a shock which may come at any moment and almost any-

A voice can now be projected through space, and may reach the person for whom it is intended as if from another world.

This marvel is effected by wireless telephony. Recently an oral message was sent across the Atlantic-from Ballybunion, in the south of Ireland. to a station in Nova Scotia-without any connecting wire, and the voice of the speaker was easily recognized at the receiving end. The energy necessary for this achievement was actual ly less than is provided on an ordinary

Wireless telephony has also been applied to the fire brigade service, though only experimentally. By fitting a fire-engine with an apparatus that anybody can work, its crew can keep in touch with headquarters over distances exceeding even those covered by the London Fire Brigade.

Still more remarkable, perhaps, is a further expansion of wireless telephony. It is possible for a business man, sitting at his desk, and using the ordinary telephone at his elbow, to "call up" somebody who is in mid-air forty or fifty miles away.

The application of wireless tele phony to aeronautics began during the war, and since then it has been extended to commercial aviation, many of the aeroplanes now carrying goods and passengers between London and Continental cities having been equipped by the Marconi Company with wireless telephones. These, however are more powerful than those which were used for military purposes, their working range extending to between one hundred and one hundred and fifty

At present the connecting links is a special line which the Post Office authorities have installed between London and Croydon Aerodromeline which was first used for com mercial purposes a few week ago. Anxious to communicate with the pilot of a certain machine on its way



Some of the Scotch packing factories have commenced operations. On Saturday A. G. Brake at Meadows took about thirty tubs. Eugene Baggs, Itd hegan taking herring on Monday and Bagg Bros. have their factory in readiness. R. B. Boak's factory at Miss M. O'Quinn, Mrs. A. H. Vinetz, Middle Arm was to commence on Monday. Bashas were ready to commence on Monday. Maurice Boland commenced on Saturday, and others will likely commence this week.

On Saturday some herring sold at \$2.50 a barrel and others at \$3.00. On Monday the general price was \$3.00. Only a few of our people yet have any gear in the water but by the end of the present week however, it is expected the fishery will be in full swing.

We have heard of two Gloucester vessels coming for salt bulk. The two Howard schooners are also expected here from New York for salt bulk cargoes and it was rumored on Monday that some two or three Nova Scotia vessels were coming for cargoes. Unless a number of vessels come seeking salt bulk cargoes some of our fishermen say that they will not engage in the voyage because of the factories in the past being unable to handle any thuna from Sydney with three cars ion. great quantities of fish at one time, and when there is big fishing it is difficult to dispose of all the catch owing to the limited market with the ab-

Recovering **Vast Treasures** From the Deep.

Goods and specie to the value of nany hundreds of millions of dollars are awaiting recovery from the ottom of the sea around the coast of Great Britain.

Of the 5,612 ships belonging to the Allies which were sunk by mines and German submarines, over 1,000 vessels of from 200 to 10,000 tons are lying in less than twenty fathoms (120 feet) of water around the Brit-

The Admiralty has prepared a char

of these, showing the position of every sunken vessel between Dungenes and the Tyne. They are indicated by little black dots, which show that the Germans reaped their richest harvests off Deal, Aldeburgh, and between Flamborough Head and Whitby, while the mouth of the Thames is a chain of wrecks.

Salving operations were conducted during and after the war, with the result that of the 5,612 ships sunk 500 have been salvaged, the value of the recovered ships and cargoes being estimated at \$300,000,000 timated at \$300,000,000.

It is believed that at least another \$1,250,000,000 can be recovered, and double that amount if anyone can invent a new method of deep-water sal-

At present it is not possible for a diver to operate at a greater depth than 120 feet if he is trying to recover the ship itself, although cargo can be recovered at greater depths.

Remarkable Salvage Feat. Perhaps the most remarkable salving feat is that which is being carried out in connection with the White Star liner Laurentic, which lies in twenty fathoms of water off the North Coast of Ireland. The Laurentic was sunk, either by mine or submarine, while on a voyage to the United States in the early part of 1917. She carried \$45,000,000 in gold and silver.

An attempt was at once made to salve the specia, but enemy submarines discovered the salvage vessel and attacked her several times. On one occasion the salvage boat had to run for safety without waiting to haul up the diver, who was towed through the water. Fortunately his life-line held and he was eventually saved.

In spite of these dangers, however, and the fact that divers could not remain at such a depth for more than half an hour, as the water pressure was over fifty pounds to the square inch, a way was blasted to the strong room and specie to the value of about \$30,000,000 was recovered.

An effort is now being made to recover the remainder of the gold and silver. The Admiralty salvage ship Racer, which has been fitted out with the object of salving the remaining treasure, has on board a pump which will lift 800 tons an hour-not only water, but coal, mud and debris.

Wonderful Apparatus. Science and invention have equipped the salvage diver of to-day with some wonderful apparatus. To cut holes in the sides of sunken vessels he now uses a flame cutter. This is so devised that an oxy-acetylene flame can be used under water. The flame issues from two jets, and is projected by a stream of compressed air coming from two other jets in the same cable, which blow the water away from the flame. The usual plan, however, is to blow a hole in the side of the vessel with explosives.

In efforts to raise sunken vessels it has been found possible to "lift" ships of 3,0000 tons. The usual plan is for divers to lighten the vessel, so far as possible, by taking out the cargo. Submersible pumps then clear the hold of water, and hawsers are attached or passed beneath the ves-

It was by this means that a Government collier weighing 3,500 tons, which was sunk by collision in twelve fathoms of water, partially blocking an important channel, was raised some time ago. She was lightened by various methods to 2,800 tons, and sixteen 9-inch wire ropes, each with a breaking strain of 250 tons, were placed in position and attached to four Admiralty craft over the wreck. cupy beds or undergo treatment at the Hospital. 


