But this is an age of wonders and we should be surprised at nothing.

As children in school we have all heard how Watt saw the steam playing with the kettle lid and conceived the idea of a steam engine. As a matter of fact he didn't begin with the boiling kettle. Hero's engine was the first steam engine of which we have any record. He is described in a manuscript by Hero of Alexandria, who lived probably about 160. B.C., and was a crude form of the modern turbine. In the sixteenth century the Stalion engineer, Branca, made a paddle-wheel and impelled it by, a jet of steam. 

IRISH BANKS GAIN IN CASH DEPOSITS

ureau Shows Presperity.

Dublin, Ireland, May 30 .- The hal early report—July to December, 1909-just issued by the department of agriculture and technical instructions for Ireland, in Irish banking and railway statistics, shows that in December, 1909 there was an increase in deposits and balances in the Irish joint stock banks, as compared with the corresponding period in 1908, of 958,000 pounds, while there was an increase

of 1,149,000 pounds as compared with the June half year of that year. There was an increase of 320,000 pounds in the deposits of savings banks in Ireland in December, 1909, as comthere having been an increase of 582,000 savings bank, and an increase of 38,000 banks, there being an increase of 241,000 pounds as compared with June of the same year -232,000 pounds in the postoffice savings bank and 9,000 in the

rustees' banks. The Agricultural Credit societies in reland for 1908 numbered 268, as comwith 261 returned in 1907, while the cumbership was 17,403 as compared with 14,875 in December 1907 The total loans granted in 1908 amounted to 53,112 pounds 3 shillings nine pence. In 1907, were 572 pounds 9 shillings 1-2 pence, leaving a reserve

und amounting to 2,960 pounds 4 shillings. The return showed that the total re was 4.180,013 pounds, an increase of 74,464 pounds as compared with the figures for the previous year.



IN FUTURE WAR Ten Thousand of Them Will Cost No More Than One Battleship

New York, May 30 .- "The wonderful eats of the Wright brothers, of Farnan, of Paulhan, Belriot and Delesseps have demonstrated that in the next great war the flying machine is going to play the most active part," said Hudson Maxim last night in a speech on "Aerial Warfare" before the Aeronautical club, of which he is pres-

"It carries all positions," he continued, "because it overlaps them all. The aviator can laugh at coast fortifications and the coast line belted by fronclads. The flying machine places whole country at once on the firing line. We must have our aerial navies of the latest efficiency and upto-date pattern, and we must have will require new guns, new projectiles new instruments for taking snapshots, ranges and for observation."

Bombardment of Towns The lecturer was of the opinion that the bombardment of towns by aerial battleships would not be effective despite high explosives, be cause they would not cover enough area. He also was of the opinion that nothing short of dropping a projectile own the smokestack of a battleship

would be effective.

He also said that a projective having a flat trajectory might seriously damage battleships, while on from the air would have less chance of hitting. Rut despite these facts he was of the opinion that airships would be the fighting machines of the future, beeause they will be so very much heaper than battleships.

He said very soon it would be possible to build an airship for \$1,000 or \$1,500 each, and therefore ten thousand of them could be constructed for the cost of one battleship.

THE INDIAN PAGEANT

s it Too Costly to the Indian, the Church and the State?

Much interest has been taken in this ubject during the past two years by ciations in this province which stand for the highest well-being of the people, irrespective of color. Sev eral serious efforts have been put forth to bring a realization, to the persons and bodies who are responsible for enticing the Indians from their homes to these exhibitions, of the terrible price the Indian is paying on behalf of those who are entertained in this way. It may now be well to bring some of the facts before the eye of the public, who, it is fairly certain, do not stop to consider the question deeply. The most plausible reason for the uance of this practice is stated as an effort to place before the public real history and to make clear by these shows the wonderful development that nas taken place in the land of our doption. Surely we can secure our nformation from other sources if we ind that this method is costing too lear and there is no question that the fair-minded public will ask for a change of methods when they have in hand a few of the facts. The proper authority for such information is found in the workers among these Indian the active work, we find that with one voice the missionaries of all the churches condemn the practice because they find so apparent the degrading influences on the moral and spiritual life of their people. The Indian agents are not backward in stating that for weeks previous and for weeks succeeding these exhibitions, the Indians are of no use in connection with their work on the reserves. One case is known where the Indian agent had taken on behalf of the Indians of his reserve a \$1,000 contract for hay, and on the eve of fulfilling of this contract the Indians were persuaded to go on show at an exhibition, with the esult that they lost the hay contract. The inspector of indian agencies for the province of Alberta sums up the situation on page 196 of the Blue Book for 1909 in the following words: "I presume such backslidings here and elsewhere should be anticipated so ong as premiums are offered to the Indians to leave their homes and their public streets in war paint, and in of their forefathers. For years Juan Vargas has lived in this city, and before that he spent forty years in his native Mexico in Oaxaca, the country to which the Aztecs fled after they had been conquered and dispersed by the Spanish under Hernando Cortez. Old Juan is an Aztec, for it is doubtful whether he would otherwise have reached the great age that is his. Down in Oaxaca the mothers raise none but pure bloods and even the slightest infusion of Spanish or other foreign blood is looked upon as a pollution. The Mayan Indians as they are now called, are as race proud today as they were when the Montezumas held court in the city in the middle of the lake and when thousands of them on the great feast days ascended the teocalli to have their living hearts torn from quivering bodies without a sound to

Born in 1796 In the mountains of Oaxaca, where President Diaz comes from, as the old man remarks with a great show of pride, Juan Vargas was born on January 1, 1796. In early youth he became a warrior, although he did at first no more than carry provisions for the The old Mayan Indians and the Zapotecans were still at war with the Aztecs, who had invaded their territory, and against whom they owed many grudges, fer on these people the Montezmas had mawe war for centuries, and thousands of them had been carried off to end their lives on the sacrificial stone at the feet Hultzi. 




