IRISH BANKS GAIN IN CASH DEPOSITS

Half Yearly Report of the Government Bureau Shows Prosperity.

Dublin, Ireland, May 30.—The half yearly report—July to December, 1909—just issued by the department of agriculture and technical instructions for Ireland, in Irish banking and railway statistics, shows that in December, 1909, there was an increase in deposits and cash balances in the Irish joint stock banks, as compared with the corresponding period in 1908, of 985,000 pounds, while there was an increase of 1,149,000 pounds as compared with the June half year of that year.

There was an increase of 330,000 pounds in the deposits of savings banks in Ireland in December, 1909, as compared with the close of the year 1908, there having been an increase of 682,000 pounds in the sum in the post-office savings bank, and an increase of 38,000 pounds in the amount in the trustees' banks, there being an increase of 241,000 pounds as compared with June of the same year—282,000 pounds in the post-office savings bank and 8,000 in the trustees' banks.

The Agricultural Credit societies in Ireland for 1908 numbered 268, as compared with 271 in 1907, while the membership was 17,467, as compared with 17,121 in December, 1907. The total loans granted in 1908 amounted to 53,113 pounds 2 shillings nine pence. In 1907, were 512 pounds 8 shillings 12 pence, leaving a reserve fund amounting to 1,968 pounds 4 shillings.

The return showed that the total receipts for the Irish railways for 1909 was 4,180,613 pounds, an increase of 74,484 pounds as compared with the figures for the previous year.

THE JEALOUS HUSBANDS ON AFGHAN FRONTIER

Cut Off Their Wives' Noses as Punishment for Infidelity

London, May 29.—After having spent eighteen years among the wild tribes of the northwest frontier of India, Dr. Theodore L. Pennell, medical missionary of the Church Missionary Society, has just returned to London on a brief visit. Below are some of his remarkable experiences which he related in an interview:

"On the Afghan frontier a husband is very jealous of his wife's honor," he said, "and if he has a suspicion that anything is wrong he just cuts off her nose. Some time ago a husband who had shown his displeasure in this barbaric manner brought his wife to our hospital at Bannu, and said he was very sorry. There was very little of the nose left and there was therefore very little he could do.

"I told him that if he would pay the money we could get his wife an artificial nose from England. He asked how much it would cost, and I said \$10. He began to hesitate and I asked him the reason. 'Well,' he said, 'I could get another wife for \$24.00. Eventually he agreed to buy the nose and his old wife was patched up.'

Dr. Pennell gave another illustration of matrimonial jealousy. "One day he said, 'an Afghan chief had been across the border and saw his wife speaking to a man over the wall in his compound. He then drew his sword and cut off her head and threw it to the man, saying, 'if you want to speak to her now, you can.'

Many of the patients at the hospital are the victims of frontier raids. One man who was admitted there for treatment had been shot by his uncle. The bullet had gone through his lung, and when he was brought to the hospital, he was very near death. However by dint of careful nursing, they pulled him through. "When he was convalescent," said Dr. Pennell, "he called me one day to his bedside and explained that he had a petition to make. I asked him what it was. He said, 'O. Sahib, I want you to give me a pistol. I want you (pointing to his chest). I shall have this score to pay off.' I said, 'I am very sorry to hear that. We have had a difficult time to cure you, and now very shortly we shall have the same trouble with your uncle.' He said 'Oh, no, you need not be afraid of that Sahib. I am a better shot than he is. We did not get the uncle in, and we heard eventually that he had killed him.'

BOMBS STUFFED FULL OF POISONOUS NEEDLES

New Weapon Now in Use by the Hindus Against the Foreigners.

London, May 30.—Cocoon shell bombs filled with poisonous needles are the latest weapon used by the seditious Bengali against the English. A copy of what is described as the most outrageous incitement to murder Europeans yet in the Indian press has just reached London. It is held fully to justify the recent rigorous application of the press law in India. A passage from it reads:

"We once more appear before you to preach our revolutionary doctrine to all for redemption of our mother from the atrocious hands of Feringhis (foreigners), more particularly the English. Your life is not worth even dust or straw if you do not soil your hands with blood of our oppressor, Feringhi. 'You must kill as many of these white sheep as you can have,' says whether men, women or children. And yourselves with bombs and despatch Asuras soon to Yama's abode. (Yama is the Indian Pluto)."

"Then follow directions as to how arms may be procured from arsenals, assurances that British soldiers may be counted upon to offer 'only a faint-hearted defence,' and suggestions that domestic servants may assist in work of extirpating the British by poisoning their masters, a method which is described as smooth despatch, in contrast to the use of poisoned needle bombs."

A DANE CURES MENINGITIS

A Hitherto incurable Disease Succumbs to Science

New York, May 30.—Records of another step made by science in its war on human ailments are brought to this country by Dr. H. Myring of the University of Copenhagen, whose work on cerebral meningitis, considered incurable until the discoveries of the Rockefeller Institute in this city, has lately been attracting the attention of the medical world.

"A case of meningitis has always been believed to be hopeless," he said today, "and physicians have not even tried to cure it. I have proved, however, that it can be successfully treated by operating. I have had a large number of cases and have attained remarkably good results."

"The operation consists in opening the skull to the brain and removing the inflamed membrane. This should be done within a very short time after the trouble sets in. I get patients into my hospital and operate within forty-eight hours when it is possible."

SCHOOL LAND SALE IS OVER

High Prices Prevailed to the Last—Irrigation Co. Bought

Medicine Hat, May 27.—The sale of school lands was concluded this morning and the bidding today was even keener than any of the previous days. The land sold today lay mainly between the Bow and the Belly Rivers in ranges eleven to sixteen. By far the greater part of this land was bought in by the Southern Alberta Land Company of this city, this land lying in and about their large tract in that locality, and most of it will be served by the irrigation canal now under construction.

The prices today were very fair on the average, the highest being \$24 per acre and the lowest \$10. The former price was paid for the N. E. quarter of 29-12-11. This section averaged \$21.55 an acre and was purchased by the Southern Alberta Land Company and H. A. Bior of Taber. Section 11-13-11 averaged \$19.25. This price was also paid for section 29-13-11. Section 29-11-12 brought an average of \$11.25, two quarters selling for \$12. Section 11-12-12 brought an average of \$20, the south east quarter bringing \$21. The west quarter averaged \$12.50, a little over \$12 per acre, practically all of this being bought in by the Southern Alberta Land Company.

The land in range fourteen averaged about \$15, section eleven in township 12-13-18 sold for \$19, and the south east of 13-18 for \$18.25. Out of a hundred pieces offered this morning only seven remained unsold. In all seven hundred and forty-seven pieces were put up, and the total number sold was 654.

The sale and the prices realized from it are a great deal of significance to this district in particular, and to Southern Alberta in general. The fact that the land in its raw state brought \$15, section eleven in township 12-13-18 an acre means that the value of this land and of this country as an agricultural country is just beginning to be realized. The high prices paid in almost every case were by the farmers and not the speculator, a fact that bodes well for the permanence of the enterprise of these men who have opened up the district for farming.

GAZETTEER SHOWS MARVELLOUS GROWTH

Population of This Province Has Nearly Doubled in Five Years.

Calgary, May 30.—British Columbia's remarkable industrial and commercial expansion is given latest expression in a volume of 162 pages, the first H. C. Gazetteer and Business Directory which the Henderson Publishing Company has issued in five years.

In 1905 when the company issued its latest Gazetteer, the twelfth edition, a volume of 72 pages was sufficient to cover the commercial and industrial province of that year.

In that issue 70 municipalities, villages, towns and cities were described. In 1910 these have increased to 1470. The population of the province is shown to have nearly doubled within nine years. In 1901 it was 190,000. The new issue places it at 347,000 at the close of last year—white population 280,000, Indians 58,000, Chinese 12,000, Japanese 16,000 and Hindus 1,000.

Every industry is shown to be in a flourishing state. Vancouver is growing so fast that the company has not attempted to record its population in this business directory.

"Our annual city directory will be ready for distribution next month," said Mr. Henderson. "It will show a substantial increase in population."

ALASKAN BOUNDARY AGAIN DISPUTED

Nice Point in Connection With Ownership of Tide Flats

Vancouver, May 30.—Up at the head of Portland canal the Alaska boundary dispute has pushed its weary head above the snow banks, rattled its frosty bones into activity, and to complete the resurrection has plumped itself down in the middle of the tide-flats to feast on a local squabble which may develop into another little game of draw for the international politicians to sit down to.

At the last session Uncle Sam had what is technically known as "busted flaps" but he sat down in the pot while Johnny Cannon, looking over John Bull's hand, was using the latter to go the limit.

Since the development of the fact that the mineral resources on the Canadian side of the boundary are very rich, the town of Stewart has sprung up as the headquarters of Canadian activity. Although not yet a year old, many Americans hurried to the point in Alaska nearest to the prospect.

Marked by Monument. At tidewater the boundary line is marked by a monument and a wide scar across the face of the forest glade of a mountain marks the point where Canada and the United States divide jurisdiction.

FLYING MACHINE IN FUTURE WAR

Ten Thousand of Them Will Cost No More Than One Battleship.

New York, May 30.—The wonderful feats of the Wright brothers, of Farmington, Pa., and of DeLagrange, of Pauhan, Belriot and DeLagrange have demonstrated that in the next great war the flying machine is going to play the most active part.

"It carries all positions," he continued, "because it overlaps them all. The aviator can laugh at coast fortifications and the flying machine is going to play the most active part."

THE INDIAN PAGEANT Is it Too Costly to the Indian, the Church and the State?

Much interest has been taken in this subject during the past two years by associations of the people who stand for the highest well-being of the people, irrespective of color. Several serious efforts have been put forth to bring a realization, to the people and bodies who are responsible for enticing the Indians from their homes to these exhibitions, of the terrible price the Indian is paying on behalf of those who are entertained in this way.

The question is as to whether this fad is costing the church and state too much to be answered in this way: Why this great expenditure of money on the part of both these bodies? Is the object to provide amusement for curious crowds of the more fortunate brethren and sisters of this dusky race? Or is it to seek to win them away from their former habits of life and to the higher standards that we are supposed to have? A very sincere effort is being made by the workers in these departments to use this money in an economical way and to get the largest percentage of advancement for the laborer as to be dissipated and the people caused to retrograde just for the supposed educational influence on a public which is quite capable of securing this education in less costly and less harmful ways than it is quite evident that as honest business people we cannot afford to allow the matter to proceed any further.

When the Golden Rule is applied to this entire question it of course, falls prostrate in a moment. I often wonder how we would look upon a proposition from the board of an agricultural fair asking us, as descendants of the Britons to put on show the habits and practices of our forefathers as recorded on the page of history. We are far enough removed from those days so that the show would not be likely to bear any vitiating influence upon us and yet it is safe to say that the average citizen would turn down the proposition with a look of withering scorn. Why then impose upon these natives of our adopted land just because they cannot discern the trend of events?

We have taken their lands, we are their guardians, let us then do our part to protect them and educate them, as we would our own children.

THOUGH AGED 114

Indian Has Five Generations Around His Chair

San Antonio, Tex., May 30.—Only one wish is left to Juan Vargas, one hundred and fourteen years of age, probably the oldest man in the United States, that he may be spared to see the 14th of September, the day on which Mexico will celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of her independence.

To that date he would like to live and smoke a few cigarettes, for life without the weed of the true Oaxaquena is unthinkable. After that the old man will not care what happens. There is so little, says he, that can keep one of his age and infirmities interested in life and its kaleidoscopic changes.

For years Juan Vargas has lived in this city, and before that he spent forty years in his native Mexico in Oaxaca, the country to which the Aztecs fled after they had been conquered and dispersed by the Spanish under Hernando Cortez. Old Juan is an Aztec, for it is doubtful whether he would otherwise have reached the great age that is his. Down in Oaxaca the mothers raise none but pure bloods and even the slightest infusion of Spanish or other foreign blood is looked upon as a pollution. The Mayan Indians as they are now called, are as race proud today as they were when the Montezumas held court in the city in the middle of the lake and when thousands of them on the great feast days ascended the teocalli to have their living hearts torn from quivering bodies without a sound to punctuate the drama.

Born in 1796 in the mountains of Oaxaca, where President Diaz comes from, as the old man remarks with a great show of pride, Juan Vargas was born on January 1, 1796. In early youth he became a warrior, although he did at first no more than carry provisions for the men. The old Mayan Indians and the Zapotecs were still at war with the Aztecs, who had invaded their territory, and against whom they owed many grudges, for on these people the Montezumas had made war for centuries, and thousands of them had been carried off to end their lives on the sacrificial stone at the feet of Huitzi. War was the only training Juan had. Schooling he did not have, for the last thing the Spaniards would do would be to establish a school in Oaxaca.

But Juan's early training served him and his country in good stead. To the little Oaxacan pueblo there came rumors that the hated Spaniards would be at last driven from the country, and that the Aztecs might once more come into power. Juan went to Mexico City in 1808, and in the following year he was one of the patriots who served to fan the fires of revolution and of freedom under Padre Hidalgo. He was one of those who shouted, "Viva Mexico, viva libertad!" when Padre Hidalgo raised aloft the banner of revolt at the pulpit of the little chapel at Dolores, on September 15, 1810.

After Padre Hidalgo had been shot Juan decided to return to his evergreen hills in tropical Oaxaca. The revolutionary fever in him had subsided, principally because liberty and Mexico stood not for a regime purely Aztec, but for that of a race of men who had been produced by the contact of the natives and the Spanish conquistadores. Juan realized that the old days of glory would never return,

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been pressed into service, this time to serve as a memorial. Since then Juan Vargas has lived in San Antonio. He has never travelled on a railroad, only twice on a street car and has always had his quota of gruel and corn mush, the only things he has eaten for many years, peppy food and fiery liquor, he no longer consumes and the only stimulant he has never been abstemious in either eating, drinking or smoking, and that his long life is due to racial rather than individual traits, an assertion supported by the fact that the Indians of Oaxaca are remarkably long-lived.

Juan is Poor. Juan Vargas is poor. Like all of his people, he has been improvident. Had he held all the property he once owned in this city there is no doubt that today he might be a wealthy man. He has owned and lost a great deal of real estate now in the very heart of the city.

"But I am afraid the worry would have sent me to my grave long ago," he said, speaking of this. "You see, the care of wealth would not have permitted me to live the life so free from worry about anything, senior, and that, I think, is to a large degree responsible for the many seasons I have seen."

B. C. Forestry Commission Sitting. Victoria, B.C., May 30.—The British Columbia Forestry Commission resumed its sessions today, hearing three witnesses, G. Chapman of the Dominion government's geological survey; F. McArthur, secretary of the B. C. loggers' association; and J. O'Brien. The chief point under consideration was that which involved the removal of the prohibition of export of rough cedar. The commission adjourned at noon until tomorrow.

Took the Wrong Medicine. Arwood, Ont., May 30.—Mrs. Samuel Love, who lived a short distance from here, died in bed this morning as the result of a dose of medicine given by her husband for rheumatism, from which she suffered. The medicine was supposed to be that prescribed by the doctor.

HOW TO LAND FACTORIES

An ex-Louisian Gives Kansas City Some Pointers.

(Kansas City Star.) Some ideas as to how to land factories for Kansas City were suggested this morning by a banker who watched St. Louis obtain them. He is Dr. John T. M. Johnston, chairman of the board of directors of the National Reserve Bank. There are five shoe factories in St. Louis that produce five shoes a minute. "The way to get factories is to get them," Doctor Johnston said. "How's that?" he was asked. "Go after them."

Fish With the Right Bait. "Go with blandishments, baits and allurements," the banker said. "When a man goes after fish he selects a bait that is best considered to make the fish rise. That's the way to fish for Kansas City factories. "Kansas City went out to catch navigation and it caught a boat line. And let me say that boat line was a big catch and it's going to do wonders for this town. When Kansas City went after navigation it baited with more than a million dollars. Suppose we went fishing for factories with that kind of bait? Do you think we would come home with no fish? Not by any means. "That's the way St. Louis got factories. And by that I don't mean that we must go out and buy factories. We could bait with free sites, free water, free power and free taxes for a certain length of time.

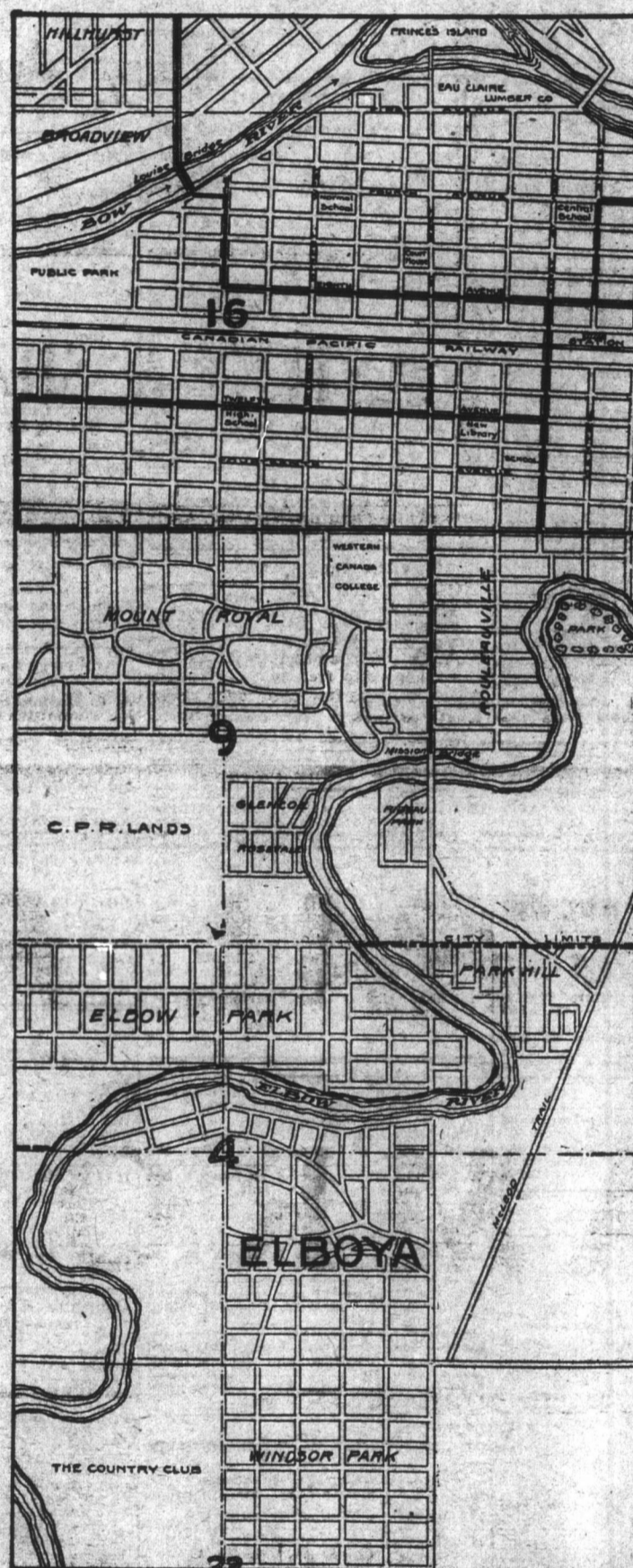
