It is now thought by the police that it was a case of suicide, the remains afterwards being mutilated by a propeller's screw, the testimony having been given to the effect that such cuts could be inflicted in this manner.

Checking the Chinese.

The Chinamen so arrested will be held until the courts decide whether the exclusion act continues in force two years longer by virtue of the amendments made to it in 1884. Mr. Mulkey believes that several hundred British Columbia Chinamen will attempt to float into Washington and Idaho, after May 6, if the Chinese exclusion bill is not re-enacted.

New Italian Cabinet Formed. Rome, April 19.—The formation of a new cabinet is completed. The programme included retrenchment in the army budget. The new members are: Signor Cadollina, minister of finance; General Ricciotti, minister of war, and Signor Genalla, minister of education. 




