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BRIDGETOWN SCHOOLS

Favorable Conditions Than Ever Before.

Principal Archibald who again has charge was greeted by a goodly number of High School pupils all of whom looked happy and ready for the problems of the higher grade that they are about to undertake.

Of last year's class of nine in the Eleventh Grade, nine succeeded in obtaining their "B" Certificates. In the 10th Grade there were 20 last year and so far 15 of these have succeeded in obtaining "C" certificates. This is the largest number of successful students of this grade in the history of the School.

The 9th grade pupils still wait impatiently for the results of their examinations, from the Educational Office in Halifax, but Mr. R. Messenger who had charge of this Grade for the last part of last term and returns to the same room this year, is very hopeful for a large per cent of his pupils making a pass mark and securing their "C" Certificates. During the vacation an extra room has been provided by uniting the Library and Laboratory rooms and in this aid the room formerly used by the Principal the whole High School grades will be cared for by Principal Archibald and Mr. Messenger.

The common school rooms which were squirming and writing with new life and activity on opening day are cared for by the following new teachers:

Miss Crowell—Grades 7-8.
Miss Hardy—Grades 5-6
Miss Ritchie—Grades 3-4
Miss Mallman—Grades 1-2
Miss Newcomb—Primary one and Kindergarten.

Grades one to seven were assembled in the Primary room and addressed by Mr. Archibald, and the new teachers introduced by the chairman of the School Board, Dr. Armstrong, before dispersing to their several rooms.

As soon as the "D" class have received their returns of last year's work the School Board and Teaching staff contemplate a public meeting when the prizes, which were provided last year by a number of interested citizens and friends of the school will be presented to the successful prize winners and the prize list for school work for the coming year will be announced. It is hoped this function can be arranged for in a hall or public building where both pupils and parents can be accommodated.

THE CITY OF VICTORIA



Parliament Bldg, Victoria

The charming city of Victoria, on Vancouver Island, the portal to the Pacific, the ocean gateway to the Orient, is one of the most favored spots in the world in beauty of situation, equability of climate and magnificence of scenery. Surrounded by water on three sides, the city is situated in a setting of low-lying wooded hills, in a foreground of the loftier ranges of the Island Cascades. Across the Georgian Straits, the Olympian range is distinctly visible the crowning glory of the scene being Mount Baker, which lifts its dazzling cone in solitary splendor, to a height of 11,000 feet.

Victoria is recognized as possessing one of the finest climates in the world. The winters are very mild and the summers cool. In May and June Victoria is especially enchanting with the gardens of roses, hedges of laurel, bushes of sweet briar. In the stately groves, the air is laden with the pungent odor of the pines.

The city is approached through a channel of wooded islands. On the left stretches the harbor, sheltering craft from all climes. Directly in front, behind a crescent-shaped embankment, the Empress hotel stands out from its surroundings of lawns and gardens. This stately C.P.R. hotel could not better have interpreted the character of the city.

Victoria is the new home-centre for hundreds of English folk, a reminder of the British Isles in Canada. Rockland avenue, with its lovely homes and enclosed gardens, is one of the most picturesque winding driveways in the city.

To the motorist, Victoria is the gateway to the land of pleasure, for Vancouver Island is entered by miles of excellent roads and pleasant scenes. There are many places of interest—the Dominion Experimental farm at Hazan Bay, the high explosives works at James Island; the big cement plant at Tod Inlet; the provincial prison farm; the naval station at Esquimalt; the cosmopolitan and meteorological observatories, and numerous mountains and lakes. The trip over the Mahabat Mountain is one of the most famous expeditions the tourist can embark upon.

Within easy access to the city are innumerable beaches. A pleasant memory picture is the view obtained from the yacht Clubhouse overlooking the bay.

Evangeline Immortalized in Bronze

Five continents were represented at the unveiling of the statue of Evangeline, Grand Pre, Nova Scotia. Nearly all those present belonged to the Imperial Press Conference party, and the unveiling ceremony was performed by Lady Burnham, who said:

"Evangeline is the beautiful conception of an American poet whose verses we learnt to read on both sides of the Atlantic when we were children. History has shed another light on the Acadian story. We see today that British policy was not as black as it was painted. Whatever may be the truth of this story, as a woman, and an English woman, I shall always regard it as one of the most painful episodes in our annals. Thank God those cruel old days lie behind us forever, and from the fate of Evangeline has sprung a great wave of sympathy which has been carried on the healing hand of time. It is a good omen that the beautiful sun, God's healing hand, should be resting upon us all today, who are here to do honor to that sweet woman. Under those rays in your wonderful land so full of beauty and promise the old hatred is dead. I have now the great honor and privilege of unveiling the statue of Evangeline."

The statue, which is of bronze, is the work of Henri Hebert from a model by his father the late Philippe Hebert, a descendant of the Acadians of whom Evangeline was one. It is a magnificent work of art, and was presented to the Park at Grand Pre by the Dominion Atlantic Railway, which is now part of the C. P. R.





TUXIS BOYS AND TRAIL RANGERS
 BY Firelighter
 LEAVING SCHOOL TOO EARLY

One of the features of our modern life is the tendency for boys to leave school before they are adequately equipped for the work of life. Two reasons for this course exist. One is that the boy himself is attracted to the industrial world because of the many possibilities on every hand for making good wages under very favorable conditions. The other is that under the strain of the high cost of living parents become unduly anxious for their boys and girls to become wage earners as soon as possible.

In this there is a real danger. Years ago when boys started at the bottom of the ladder and worked their way to the top, earning, while they were learning, only a nominal wage, the factory did not look so attractive, and more time was spent in school. Under present conditions any capable boy can earn attractive wages, hence the temptation to cut corners and get started quickly.

Yet there never was a time when education was so valuable, and promised such great rewards as it does today. The call for trained men in every branch of industry is insistent. There is plenty of room at the top, but the lower rungs of the ladder are painfully overcrowded. Parents who permit their boys and girls to leave school before they have secured an adequate training for life, except under the most dire necessity, or boys and girls who leave of their own free will, are placing a mortgage upon their future for the sake of a little money at present.

The statistics show that those who remain in school until they are thoroughly equipped for the work of life, always overtake in earning power those who start out so early that they are inefficient. Nothing is more heart breaking to a boy or girl at some time than to find the path of promotion and reward blocked by insufficient education. The lesson is that it is better to go slowly and get thoroughly equipped.
