


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

### FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE SOCIETY.

I give and bequeath to "The Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor," instituted in London in the year 1823, the sum of

Pounds sterling, to be raised and paid, for the purposes of the said Institution, out of such part only of my personal estate as shall not consist of chattels real, or money secured on mortgage of Lands or Tenements, or in any other manner affecting Lands or Tenements; for which Legacy the Receipt of the Treasurer for the time being of the said Institution, shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors.

\*\* Bequests for charitable or benevolent purposes, of lands or tenements, or of money to be laid out in the purchase thereof, or charged on, or otherwise affecting lands or tenements, or of money secured on mortgage of lands or tenements, are void; but money, stock, or other personalty, not falling under any of the above descriptions, may be so bequeathed.

# LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

- I. This Society shall be designated THE NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SOCIETY FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.
- II. The Schools shall be managed by Masters and Mistresses of the United Church of England and Ireland, and conducted, as nearly as circumstances may permit, on Dr. Bell's System.
- III. This Society shall consist of a Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary or Secretaries, and also of Governors, and Life and Annual Members, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for conducting its affairs.
- 1V. Each Subscriber of One Guinea annually, or upwards, shall be a Member.
- V. Each Subscriber of Ten Guineas, or upwards, at one time, shall be a Member for Life.
- VI. Each Subscriber of Five pounds annually, or of Twenty Guineas at one time, shall be a Governor, and entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.
- VII. An Executor paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, or upwards, shall be a Member for Life.
- VIII. The business of the Society shall be conducted, and all its Officers appointed, by a Committee of not less than Twelve; of whom Nine, who shall have attended the greatest number of times during the year, shall be eligible for the ensuing year.
- IX. The Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, shall be considered er-officio Members of the Committee; the ordinary Meetings of the Committee shall be held once every mouth.
- X. Three Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum; and in case of equality of votes, the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.
- XI. Five Auditors, three of them not being Members of the Committee, shall be appointed by the Committee annually, for the purpose of auditing the accounts of the Society, of whom three shall be a quorum.
- . XII. A General Meeting of the Members of the Society shall be hald in London annually, on the Second Wednesday in May, when the Proceedines of the foregoing year shall be reported, and the Accounts presented, and a Committee chosen.
- XIII. A Special General Meeting of the Society may be called at any time, at the requisition of the General Committee, or any nine Members, by letter addressed to the Secretary.
- XIV. Ten days' notice of all General Meetings shall be given in at least three Newspapers. Those Members of the Society who reside within the limits of the Three-penny Post, shall be summoned by letter to attend; and when such General Meetings are Special, the object of them shall be mentioned in the summons.

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XV. At all General Meetings, and at those of the Committee, the Patron, or, in his absence, the Vice-Patron, or should he be absent, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, who may be present, or in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer, and, in his absence, such Member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the Meeting.

XVI. None of the Laws of the Society shall be repealed, or altered, nor any new Law established, but at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose.

### RULES FOR AN AUXILIARY SOCIETY.

1. That the object and constitution of the Newfoundland and British North America Society for educating the poor, having the cordial approbation of this Meeting, a Society be now formed, to be called "The Auxiliary Newfoundland and British North America School Society of "for the purpose of co-operating with that institution."

2. That all persons subscribing One Guinea per annum, or upwards, or Five

Guineas or upwards at one time, shall be Members of this Society.

3. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee, consisting of not less than Members; and that three Members of this Committee constitute a quorum. That the Committee shall meet once every quarter or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

- 4. That the Committee divide this town and neighbourhood into districts, and appoint two or more of their members for each district, who may associate with themselves any Subscribers, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants thereof; and that they establish proper agents and correspondents in different parts within the limits of the Auxiliary Society.
- 5. That this Auxiliary shall furnish the Parent Society, on or before the first week in Murch in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.
- 6. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

#### RULES FOR AN ASSOCIATION.

- 1. That we form ourselves into an Association in connexion with the New-foundland and British North America Society for educating the poor, for the purpose of contributing towards its object, and that this Association be denominated. "The Association."
- 2. That all persons subscribing the sum of Five Shillings or upwards per annum, or making a donation of One Guinen or upwards at one time, or collecting to the amount of Two Pounds or upwards, shall be Members of this Association.
- 3. That the business of this Association shall be conducted by a Committee to be chosen annually, consisting of a Treasurer, Secretaries, and not less than other Members, and under the patronage of such other Honorary Members as the Society and Committee shall select and obtain.

4. That the Committee meet once a quarter, or oftener if necessary, on a day to be fixed by themselves, and that Three Members be empowered to act.

5. That for the purpose of soliciting and collecting donations and subscriptions, the Committee divide this neighbourhood into districts, and appoint one or more collectors from among themselves to each district; and that these contributions be paid to the Treasurer at the Committee Meetings.

6. That this Association shall furnish the Committee of the Auxiliary Society, on or before the last day of February in each year, with an Abstract of its cash account, &c.

7. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

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

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# SERMON.

These words spake Jesus, and lifted up his eyes to heaven, and said, Father, the hour is come; glorify thy Son, that thy Son also may glorify thee.

John xvii. 1.

The prayer uttered by our blessed Saviour in these words, expresses the great ends of the Gospel, which are the glory of God, and, as subservient to that, the glory of Jesus Christ. These ends are answered by it: our Lord received glory from God during his sufferings, and he receives still more from their stupendous consequences. He was glorified when God bore witness to his Sonship, by the darkened sun, and by the trembling earth; when his reviving body left the grave to visit his own heaven; and when, at his triumphant ascent, angels predicted his glorious return. He has a higher glory now, from the universal sovereignty allotted to him, in which he controls all agents at his pleasure, guides every foreseen event to its destined issue, renders devils and wicked men the involuntary instruments of his will, and will eventually put down their rebellion. But as he receives peculiar glory from the conversion of sinners, it was to this result especially, as I believe, that his thoughts were directed, when he said, "Father, the hour is come; glorify thy Son, that thy Son also may glorify thee, as Thou hast given him power over all flesh that he should give eternal life to as many as Thou hast given him." So, then, whatever most tends to convert sinners, most glorifies Christ, and, through him, most honours God. This consideration will determine the course of my address to you at this time, in which I shall, according to my ability, show:—

- I. That the operations of this Society tend to convert the unconverted among those to whom they extend.
- II. By leading to their conversion, it gives glory to God through Christ.
- 1. To illustrate the former of these two points, consider, first, the principal sphere of these operations.
- 1. The British population of the Island of Newfoundland is now about 90,000, of which about half are Irish: of this whole number, if one-fifth be taken as the proportion of children from six to fifteen years of age, there are 18,000 of those ages. From this number if I deduct 3000 as children which would not require the advantage of these Schools, there are 15,000 of the poor requiring to be instructed. For these, by the Report of the the Society for 1826, there was only one free day School, and about fifteen other Schools; and if these sixteen Schools be supposed to contain sixty children each (too large an average, perhaps, for Schools on the old system), there were, in 1826, (that is, three years after the Society was formed) 1000 poor children receiving instruction out of 15,000, who ought to have been instructed: 14,000 children, therefore, then required instruction. They had a right to ask it from England, not only because this country is rich, and they are poor—this is well supplied with means and they are destitute-for these are claims which may be urged by every heathen land; but because they were a colony of Great Britain, anciently connected with us, and still altogether British. They are indeed distant from us; but distance alone cannot determine their claims upon our care, otherwise France, which is a stranger to us, would have superior claims to Ireland, which is part of ourselves. Relationship forms one great claim, and that these islanders pre-eminently possess. They are closely connected with us; they are poor, and they are destitute of education: need I advance any other claim? We know how corrupt our hearts are by na-

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ture, and how sins naturally spring up and luxuriate there, where there is not Christian training; and what can we expect from the poor of Newfoundland? what rare and strange exception may we look for to the melancholy, but universal perverseness of our species, which is naturally averse from piety, without God, and without hope? If you consider, next, whence one large portion of the population is derived, and remember the habits of the poorer Irish, both in southern Ireland and in the metropolis, you cannot but feel a melancholy presentiment of what must be their habits on the other side of the Atlantic. In 1823 these habits were thus described by one who had, apparently, studied their case: - " By degrees a population of considerable extent became settled; but they did it altogether unnoticed. They had neither Schools, nor Churches, nor Christian instruction. Many of them had never heard a sermon preached, and some had never witnessed the performance of religious worship, never having seen a minister of religion. Sometimes they had the opportunity of hearing a missionary on his way out; and the Catholic priests occasionally visited the remote districts, to baptize the children. But the Sabbath was not only not kept, it was scarcely known: the fishing went on night and day, without any intermission, during the whole season. in great abundance, very cheap, and much in use: and wherever the inordinate use of spirits prevailed, it not only tended to disease the body, but to degrade the mind. The children were, of course, most dreadfully neglected, and their wretchedness was beyond all description. No place on earth could, perhaps, be found, which claimed more strongly the exertion of Christian benevolence."\* In 1824 a Missionary in the colony wrote thus to the Methodist Missionary Society at home: - " Few places, perhaps, in his Majesty's dominions, not entirely pagan, stand more in need of your help than Newfoundland; in many places an occasional visit of a Catholic priest is the only opportunity

afforded of receiving religious instruction; irreligion is too manifest among all classes; and gross immorality shows its unblushing front wherever we turn our eyes. Sabbath-breaking and drunkenness are the crying sins of this country. On inquiry I find, that in this town and its vicinity, between twenty and thirty during the past year have been found dead in their beds, or in the open streets, through excessive drinking; and nearly as many have fallen over wharfs, sides of vessels, &c., and have been drowned in a state of intoxication. Sabbath-breaking, though not so common as formerly, still prevails to a lamentable extent. It is no rare occurrence for vessels to be discharging and taking in cargoes; for hundreds of men to be employed in curing fish; for stores to be open, and dealers to be receiving their supplies, on the Lord's day, even in the chief port of the island."\*

For the children trained amidst such habits, what Christian instruction is provided? Besides some Roman Catholic priests (to whose instruction I cannot attach much value) there are about ten clergymen from the Propagation Society, and ten Methodist Missionaries. Now if these were nearly enough for 90,000 inhabitants, yet the pastoral labours of such of them as are devoted to their work, instead of superseding your efforts, would be the means by which they may be rendered effectual; for one of the first objects of a good pastor, in any circumstances, would be to secure an efficient School; but, in the circumstances of these Clergymen and Missionaries, Schools of instruction become essential; for how can they, unaided, reach the wants of a people scattered among the coves and bays of a sinuous shore, along about 800 miles of coast, especially where there are no roads, and the rocks run down to the very margin of the sea. Accordingly, there is, in fact, great want of Christian instruction. In 1823 few of the women of the island could read.

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There was not more than one place of worship along fifty miles A person of a serious disposition has been known to be destitute for years of all the public means of grace. In one spot 500 persons' have embraced Popery, through want of Protestant instruction; and still, as the agents of this Society pass from cove to cove, they write of villages in succession with many children, but no Schools. To meet these moral wants, the modest, but efficient Society for which I ask your aid, has commenced its operations. Its simple object being to send out schoolmasters, everything, obviously, just as in a Missionary Society, depends upon the selection of the men: that selection has hitherto been scrupulously made; and, through God's Their masters are, I believe, without goodness, successfully. exception, pious and diligent. And it is the effect of their agency you are to contemplate. Were the Schools of this Society like some national Schools which I have known in this country, I could not feel much anxiety for its welfare. I cannot dilate enthusiastically on the praises of mere secular learning, as contrasted with ignorance, though it has its advan-I should not think it worth while to hold up to your sentimental affection the sight of little beings, neat and clean. and busy in some sheltered cove, mixing their little hum with the murmur of the ocean, though the sight would have its I would not talk of the claims upon your sympathy. put forth by innocent but untaught babes, because I know too well that childhood is very far from innocence; and if the only merit which I could attach to these Schools was that of perfect mechanism, of complete order, and of much Scriptural knowledge, where reading was fluent, and the progress in arithmetic wonderful, I should still feel them to be wholly failures with regard to the great ends of education; for in such Schools, at home, where all these means and results are visible, but there is no pastoral care, no address to the conscience,-the habit of secret prayer is not inculcated, the need of God's grace is not explained, nor the holy law of God expounded in all its extent

and spirituality. A child may learn much of Seripture History, and yet may get with it a flippant and irreverent fluency; he may, learn more evil from the bold and bad children to whom the School introduces him, than good from his well-behaved instructor. He may learn good rules, and form bad habits; his intellectual training may be excellent, while there is no moral training at all. On such Schools I cannot but look very coldly indeed: but the case is reversed under the agency of a pious and well-fitted teacher, who loves his children and his work. The great importance of such schools in missionary stations is illustrated by the fact, which cannot have escaped your notice, that a very large part of the work of an ordained Missionary in many parts of the heathen world, consists in forming and superintending schools. How should this be, unless the Missionary himself, and the So-. ciety which trusts him, were well convinced that much of Missionary success depends on the seed sown in infant minds in a well-conducted school? Precisely that good may be looked for here. A Master is carefully selected with reference to all the qualifications which contribute to success. He is placed in the midst of a neglected population run wild for want of moral training. His first work is to teach the children who throng his school. He initiates them into the doctrine of the Gospel, furnishes their minds with Scriptural knowledge, expounds to them the pure morality of the Bible, and forms them to corresponding habits. Certainly those children will not generally fail to derive some advantage from his Christian care. this is not all; the child sickens and he visits it—the child dies and he weeps over it with the weeping parents; children are negligent in attendance, and he pursues the little vagrants to their cottage homes, and he expostulates with their parents for their neglect; the parents begin to take interest in him as the general benefactor—other villages begin to wish their children had such advantage, and he meets their wishes by establishing branch schools around him; the neighbourhood is interested in his work; he has access to many families, and

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though without the office and authority, yet where there is no other Pastor, he may execute that important pastoral function, to instruct by domiciliary visitation the ignorant and the sick. Where a loan library of useful religious books is placed at his disposal, and he is enabled to superintend a Tract Association, or to distribute a grant of Bibles, he becomes the agent of still more extensive good. All this is not hypothesis, but fact. It rests not alone on the testimony of the Masters themselves, but on the corroborative evidence of the pious and trustworthy agent, whom the Society has sent out to inspect its operations. Yet I will not trust the credit of the Masters to his statements, though additional to their own. The people of Newfoundland have given unanswerable testimony to their usefulness. one class alone, but all have given it. They have given it not by words which cost nothing, but by deeds which cost much. Indeed I know not how more conclusive testimony could be afforded. It was such as secured the favour of that conscientious Statesman\* who was at the head of affairs when this Society was founded, and of two Colonial Secretaries in succession. It has obtained from Government free grants of Land for some of the Schools—a salary for one Master, and a free passage in King's Ships for all. It has secured grants from various Societies at home, each of which would make it their business to learn previously the worthiness of the Institution. The Bible, the Tract, and the Praver-book and Homily Society, have each aided it with grants; - and the Methodist Missionary Society, which has Stations on the Island, equally to its own credit, and the credit of this institution, subscribed in the early years of its infancy and weakness, annually 201. to its funds. What then was the amount of the Colonial testimony? The Governor of the Island favoured the Society. The late Chief Justice and the present are its friends; can we have more competent and less prejudiced or more responsible witnesses? Interested

as I am in this good work, I feel thankful to them for co-operation which is so truly valuable, but I find testimony to my mind still more powerful than theirs; I find it in the considerable list of contributors from Gentlemen of Newfoundland, appended to the Reports; I find it in the numerous petitions for Schools with which the Society is from want of funds unable to comply; I find it in the kind reception with which the inhabitants have welcomed our Masters; I find it in the througed Schools, and most of all in the laborious co-operation of the people. They give money and ground towards the Schools. They bring timber from the woods, to erect buildings at great expense of time and labour, and they have even erected Schools in the mere hope that Teachers would be provided for them. By the last Report of the Society, fourteen such School-rooms were then rising, through the zeal of the inhabitants, a zeal which would adorn the land with many more, could the Society promise them any subsequent assistance. Now this seems to me a peculiar feature in the case. This insular co-operation not only affords proof of the usefulness of the Society, but it also furnishes great facilities for the work.

Economical considerations are not to be overlooked, but it is the temper of mind in which the inhabitants who have made such efforts will receive the expected Teacher which is most to be considered. In other Missionary Stations, what preparatory labours must be undergone before Missionary work can be attempted! Often a strange language must be learned, strange manners must be studied. The Missionary must wrestle with Heathen prejudices, surmount barbarous ignorance, and disprove a whole system of inveterate opinions. He must perhaps go through the labour of translating the Scriptures into a tongue in which perhaps no books exist. He must procure credit for his new book as a revelation from Heaven, he must surmount incredulity before he attacks error, and when all his laborious preparations are made, he sickens with the enervating or noxious climate, and returns enfeebled, or surrenders his life ppe-

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among the people whom he had wished to convert. Here all the preparatory work is done, the climate is bracing, and the people willing to be instructed. They own the Bible, they believe, theoretically at least, some great doctrines of Revelation. They have our manners and ways of thinking—they have no more obstacles to conversion than we have—they feel the value of education—they are prejudiced in favour of your efforts—they have enlisted themselves on your side,—they themselves invite you to do them religious good.

Although the Society is in its infancy, there have been already some fruits from the Christian fidelity of the Teachers which it employs. One instance of conversion in a child, well substantiated, should be matter of much gratitude to God, when we remember in our own Schools, how many are permanently benefitted, and perhaps become ultimately pious, for one who gives decided proof of piety in childhood. I will not dwell merely on the extent of the Spiritual Blessings to which the Society has, under God, introduced that one child, who without this instruction would probably have remained in utter ignorance; for although those blessings are incalculable which comprehend a return to God—his eternal favour—the guidance of his Spirit—the renovation of our whole nature—and eternal bliss in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ; yet a Society may properly and ought to look for more than the conversion of one, or two, or ten. God has made it our duty to seek the conversion of our fellow-creatures generally; the design of His Word is to convert them, and he has promised to accompany his word with his blessing (Isaiah Iv. 10, 11). The Society should therefore pray and look to God for many conversions both of parents and children; -for this the teachers do, I believe, pray and labour, and the two or three conversions reported furnish, to my mind, proof of the kind of instruction which is given, and are pledges of more extended effects behind. Through human instrumentality the Sun of Truth has shone upon that land a little while, and having brought out already some solitary blossoms, will it not quicken many others also into bloom, and diffuse over the whole landscape a luxuriant and fragrant vegetation? The few instances of conversion recorded do not stand out as instances of sovereign grace to be received with devout acknowledgment, but not expected to recur—instances indeed they are of sovereign grace, for what conversion of a ruined and helpless sinner is not? But they are proofs of that effectual working of the Spirit of God which rarely if ever fails to accompany the prayers and labours of his servants to that end. They are the usual results of a serious inculcation of the truths of God. They accomplish the very end of the Gospel by giving God glory through the glory which they bring to Christ. To this point allow me now to direct your attention as furnishing peculiar motives to continue stedfast in this work.

II. How, it may be asked, does God by the conversion of sinners, bring glory to Christ? Let us remember that every sinner is converted for the sake of Christ by the Spirit which Christ has procured, and through the revelation of Christ to the soul,—that Christ alone is the meritorious cause—the Mediator —the Sacrifice—the Intercessor and the exalted Lord, by whom the Holy Spirit is commissioned and sent forth. All the glory, therefore, of a sinner's conversion accrues to Christ. By it he rescues a wretched creature from immense sorrow, raises a corrupted being from the deepest degradation, and provides for the friendless and the destitute blessings which shall never be exhausted, and friendships which are as lasting as they are pure. With one exception, the most melancholy ruin in the history of the universe, is the wreck of the human soul, and this ruin Christ reconstructs into a temple to be lit up for ever with the glory of God. Who besides Christ could have merited such a blessing from God? If man could have merited it, superior beings would not have been tasked with the achievement. If angels could have merited it, God would not have become incarnate—none other than He could procure the pardon of one sinner. It was needful he should suffer, and when therefore a

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sinner's pardon is granted to him, that is given which no other merit could have won. Had the Almighty seen the universe in tears before his throne, and had He heard its universal groan over a lost soul, that could not have relaxed the severity of his justice. Had legions of bright angels volunteered the largest sacrifices, or spent years in supplicatory intercession for a single criminal, the Almighty would not in a single instance have relaxed it. He would not because he ought not. Their services and intercessions would be no atonement, and without atonement he could not justly pardon; but that which no service of angels-no tears of men-no groans of the tortured, and no intercessions of the blessed, could have won from a holy God, the merit of the Lord Jesus has secured. God has accepted Christ, and has pardoned sinners for his sake. By this he has proclaimed that in his view (and his view is truth) the sufferings of Christ are a greater punishment for sin than the sufferings of the damned; his obedience more honourable to God than the perfect obedience and perfect love of a sinless world; and that God counts Him worthy to save even the most criminal of the race.

Again, who besides Christ could accomplish the renewal of the soul? Nothing but grace effects it, mere outward means fail; yet how powerful the means which have been used! God has displayed to us all his power to awe, and his goodness to enchant us—has demanded our gratitude by ten thousand blessings—has commissioned all the objects of nature to win us to him, and given a tongue to every event of Providence. He has spread out in his Word the terrors of hell, to deter us from offending him. He has unveiled the glories of heaven to attract us to obedience. He has chastened us by trials, solemnised us by threatenings, guided us by precept, and cheered us by his promises. He has set before us examples of good and ill; has wrought upon our conscience, and has, above all, in the gift of his Son, showed such kindness to rebellious creatures, as might seem sufficient to compel the most unkind and obdurate to re-

turn to Him. And when all these means and motives fail (as fail they always do of themselves), then Christ by his Spirit conquers what nothing else could conquer,—the human will; and he who was lately careless and traitorous towards God, has become His humbled, affectionate, and devoted child.

Recognise now what Christ has achieved in the conversion of but one person. By no common agony, he has rescued an immortal soul from the grasp of no ordinary foe. He has rescued it from extremest peril, to invest it with inestimable good. No calculation can reach the amount of either the disaster he has averted or the bliss he has secured. Compared with this, all earthly conquests fade into insignificance, all perishable trophies vanish, and in every rescued soul you see a glorious demonstration that Jesus is the friend of the friendless, the patron of the unprotected, the benefactor of the indigent, the conqueror of the human will, the victor over Satan, the champion of the rights of God, the restorer of the blessedness of Heaven, the object of Heaven's eternal adoration, and the supreme delight of God. Thus illustriously has been fulfilled the prayer of the text, "Father, glorify thy Son."

III. But the glory of Christ as God incarnate is meant ultimately and as its chief design, to render glory to God. "Father, glorify thy Son, that thy Son also may glorify thee." In all the glory of Jesus Christ, God is glorified, but particularly in that glory which comes to Christ from the conversion of a sinner. For any creature glorifies God as far only as it illustrates his perfections. To illustrate any one perfection of God, as for instance his justice, is thereby to give him glory. To illustrate several perfections, as for instance his holiness, justice, and goodness together, is to give him more glory; and the highest glory is given to him, when the greatest number of Divine perfections are illustrated in the highest degree; all things that are, will ultimately glorify God, for he will vindicate the honour of his Divine perfections in all that he has done, and all that he has permitted. He will be glorified, I doubt not, by all the

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phenomena of nature, and all the evolutions of Providence; by the persecutions which have harassed his Church; by the blasphemies which have defied his wrath; by the disorders which have vexed his empire; by the severe discipline of the good, and by the awful punishment of the damned. But more is he glorified by the things which show not only his justice, but his love. He is glorious in the holiness, the goodness, and the bliss, of the angels whom he has formed; every hallelujah which rings through heaven, and every exhibition of creature excellence, render the good and great Creator glorious. So he was glorious in the perfections of men, formed in his perfect image, and meant to represent to angels and to each other all his Divine perfection: but most is he glorified in Christ: Christ, in his humiliation and agony, has more than all other creatures rendered illustrious the holiness of God, who could not otherwise forgive sin, and the goodness of God, who would let him suffer for such transgressors. And now what Jesus Christ asks, is to be enabled to give his Father additional and fuller honour by his exaltation. And so he does; for what can give greater glory to God than the recovery of a deprayed and perishing soul? If Jesus Christ is the immediate cause, God is the original; God, therefore, does it through Christ. What could more display his condescension than to care for such beings, and draw them to himself when reluctant? What can more mark his goodness, than to receive them back to favour, and to make them the heirs of an untold immensity of bliss? What could more mark his holiness than to bring back a sinner only by restoring him ultimately to his lost perfection; giving him all the rectitude of will, and all the holy and ardent affections, he had previously lost? By what could he more signalise his power and wisdom, than by thus restoring, in a way which should do no dishonour to his holiness, nor violence to the nature of man, such a depraved offender? In short, what can more illustrate all his Divine perfections, than his reigning again over willing, obedient, devoted subjects, resisting sin in an evil world; striving

to bring every thought into captivity to Christ; benevolent among the selfish; devotional among the profane; peaceful among the restless and the wretched; heavenly-minded among the worldly and the sensual, and progressively advancing towards complete conformity to himself? To have created men with these dispositions at all, and to have kept them thus excellent in any circumstances, would have glorified all his perfec-But to have recovered them to this state from such depravity, and to keep them in it when surrounded by a world of minds which are yet rebellious against Him, renders his goodness, power, wisdom, holiness, and truth, inexpressibly illustrious. Convert a soul, then, and you are instrumental in doing that which will render much glory to God for ever and ever, for which angels will glorify him and redeemed saints; but more than all, the renewed soul itself in the exercise of perfect virtues and the fruition of celestial joy.

My friends, had you stood by Jesus Christ on that memorable evening when he prayed that all this might be accomplished; could you have seen his eye lifted up to heaven, and have heard his own voice supplicating, "Father, glorify thy Son;" would not that prayer have been reiterated by as many of you as were really his disciples; "Father, do thou glorify Him;" would not that prayer, think you, have been ardent in proportion to your gratitude? why then should it languish now? His desire remains still unchanged. Are you his disciples? Then your desires must respond to his. But what sort of desire is that which does not act? And if you would act to give Him glory, because you desire Him to be glorified, then endeavour now, by giving your timely aid to a Society which tends to glorify Him, to give at least in one necessitous district, effect to His prayer. The Society has still the feebleness of infancy; is there no one here that can materially strengthen its growth? It is involved, through the entreaties of those who longed that their children should be taught, in oppressive debt: are there none here that will make

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
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a generous effort to extricate it? It wants permanent incomecan none that hear me form small associations to supply it? When the colony so much requires your Christian aid—when the means employed to do them spiritual good are scriptural and effective—when the colonists themselves give even zealous co-operation—when God has been pleased already to bless these efforts, by making them effectual to conversion; and when each true convert renders the highest glory to God through his dear Son, shall these Christian instructors be recalled? or, rather, will you not, as far as may be permitted to human instability, stamp a perpetuity on their operations; renovate, by just reflection, your missionary zeal for the execution of this enterprise, and then communicate your own spirit to those around you who may be still indifferent or averse?



### THE

# EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SOCIETY FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.

THE proceedings and general circumstances of your Society during the past year have furnished many causes for thanks-giving; they have also afforded occasion for the exercise of much faith and patience.

Notwithstanding the hope indulged at the last Annual Meeting, of a speedy commencement of operations in British North America, your Committee regret to state, that they have not yet met with that decided support and encouragement from the Christian public which could alone justify their taking such a step. Their own wishes have undergone no change with respect to this important subject; nor have they been wanting in urgent appeals in various ways on behalf of our poor fellowcountrymen in those colonies. The delay has been a source of much anxiety to your Committee, especially as it may have disappointed the expectations of some of their best friends, who have not been apprized of the difficulties to be surmounted. The path of usefulness lies still before them; and your Committee will gladly enter upon it, whenever they shall have received the sanction of that liberality, which is the best expression of public confidence.

In Newfoundland, the operations of the Society have been carried beyond the limits of any preceding year; and had your Committee possessed the means of meeting the wishes of the inhabitants, there is little doubt but the number of Schools might have been very considerably increased.

Mr. and Mrs. Flint, who were present at the last Anniversary, have been placed at Twillingate. Two more Masters, and one Mistress, have also been sent out by the Society during the past year; but, as their arrival in Newfoundland was late in the season, and some partial changes in the Teachers' stations are contemplated, their destination is not yet permanently fixed.

His Excellency Sir Thomas Cochrane, the Governor, is still the kind and liberal patron and supporter of the Society. The gentlemen connected with the Colonial Government, and the merchants generally, are its steadfast friends; and, in short, the same favourable sentiments towards it, which have been mentioned in former Reports, continue to pervade all classes of the community in the Island.

Mr. Willoughby is still in Newfoundland: his stay there has been protracted, partly in consequence of the difficulties already mentioned with regard to British North America, which made his crossing over to the Continent a matter of little moment; but chiefly on account of the advantages resulting, not merely to the Society, but also to the Colonists, from his superintendence of its affairs in the Island. The constant presence of an agent there is in fact, on various accounts, become almost indispensable; and your Committee know no one better qualified than Mr. Willoughby for the discharge of such an important trust.

The subscriptions raised in the Colony are increasing. The year before last, they amounted to about 2001.: this sum has been expended in building Schools on the Island. The precise sum raised in 1830 is not yet known; the subscriptions, however, certainly exceed those of the preceding year, both in number and amount; these are very encouraging facts; they show the estimation in which the exertions of the Society are held, especially when the distress occasioned by a considerable failure of the fishery (now for three seasons in succession) is taken into the account. The zeal of the inhabitants also, with regard to erecting School buildings for the Society, has suffered no diminution, there being several in progress.

# STATEMENT OF SCHOOLS.

## ST. JOHN'S.

The daily attendance at the Central School has fluctuated in the past year, between 114 and 169. In a letter, dated December, Mr. Jeynes remarks, that "the Schools have been better attended than in any former year. Several scholars have been lately admitted, and more are coming after the present vacation." This expectation appears, by a subsequent letter, to have been in some measure realized. Mr. Jeynes also speaks with pleasure of the eagerness shown by the children to obtain copies of the New Testament, which he had promised to those who should have made the greatest proficiency in learning portions of it by heart during the holidays.

At Portugal Cove a new Branch School-Room, built by the inhabitants on a plot of ground granted by the Governor, was opened in December last. The School had been previously kept in a small place of worship. The inhabitants, who amount to about 600, are, for the most part, extremely poor; the parents who were present engaged, however, to complete the work, by putting up a fence about the ground.

At Quidi Vidi the Branch School continues to thrive; but this place has no other School or place of worship of any description. The Settlement is not, however, worse off in these respects than a multitude of others, there being many small ones not very remote even from St. John's, in an equally lamentable condition.

As a contrast to the darkness in which such places are enveloped, it is gratifying to find here and there in others, some delightful consequences of the dawn of spiritual light upon them. Mr. Jeynes' last letter contains particulars of two children who had died during the year, after giving good ground for believing that the religious knowledge imparted to them in the Society's Schools had been made a blessing to them;

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a third, lying as was feared upon a death-bed, had also expressed to her Mistress her gratitude for the spiritual instruction she had received.

The total number of Children admitted into the Central School since its establishment is 823—of Adults, 221.—Total, 1044.

Among the improvements at St. John's, is the formation of a Bible Depôt for the whole island, which may be deemed another pleasing evidence of the benefits arising from the establishment of this Society.

### TRINITY.

In this School, as well as in the Branches connected with it, there has been an increased attendance during the past year; a small new Branch School has also been opened on the south side of Trinity Harbour, making the fifth of these interesting auxiliaries in the neighbourhood.

Mr. Fleet speaks with much pleasure of the proficiency of the Scholars generally, and mentions a few highly interesting anecdotes of some of the Children on whom his instructions appear not to have been bestowed in vain.

A Bible Class for adults had been opened, which was to be continued every Wednesday evening during winter.

There is a lamentable deficiency of the means of grace or of instruction of any kind in several of the numerous settlements down Trinity Bay, for which there appears to be no prospect of any remedy, unless it be afforded by the Christian sympathy of those who know the value of religious privileges and feel for the eternal interests of their fellow-men.

### HARBOR GRACE.

The Schools in this district continue to be well conducted by Mr. and Mrs. Kingwell. By the last return there were in the Day School 155 Children, in the Sunday School 162, and 35 Adults in the Evening School, making, with those in the branches attached to this station, a total of 548 individuals receiving there the blessing of Christian instruction. The Branch Schools give Mr. Kingwell much satisfaction, and are a most useful appendage to that at Harbor Grace.

## PETTY HARBOR.

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Your Committee are happy to remark, that at this station also there has been an increased attendance in the Day School during the past year, it having risen at one period as high as 105, in the Sunday School there are 78 Children, and about 22 Scholars in that for Adults. Mr. and Mrs. Martin are much beloved by the Children and their Parents; the feelings of the latter were strongly marked on a recent occasion, when in consequence of the illness of Mr. King, the Master at Green's Pond, it was proposed that Mr. Martin should exchange stations with him for a season; it was not without considerable reluctance that they would part with their teacher, and then only on the promise that he should return to them again.

The Committee have also pleasure in stating, that strong proofs of attachment on the part of Parents and Children have been frequently experienced by others of the Society's Teachers.

## BONAVISTA.

At the last Annual Meeting no returns had been received from the Schools here, since their re-opening under the care The accounts subsequently transof Mr. and Mrs. Meek. mitted have been very gratifying; the new School-Room is in progress, and the completion of it was anxiously looked for; in his last letter, Mr. Meek remarks: "It gives me great pleasure to inform you that the state and prospects of our School are very encouraging, much more so than on our arrival we could have anticipated, and the greatest difficulty we now appear to have is, the want of room for the number of children in attendance; as the dimensions of the room are only forty feet by twenty, you will readily judge how inconveniently full it must frequently be, when I state that the average attendance for some time past has been from 150 to 160, and though I fear this is not likely to continue through the winter from the general distress prevailing, yet could shoes and clothes be obtained, this number would be very considerably increased, as we have now many more on the books who are desirous of coming, but who are in so destitute a condition as to be unable to get out."

The distress here noticed appears to have been much aggra-

vated by the almost total failure of the fishery, which was felt the more severely, as the preceding year had been marked by a similar calamity: upon this subject Mr. Meek observes, "The Society will form some estimate of the distress, when I inform them that on a late inquiry, it was found that there are 587 persons in the Harbor, whose whole winter supply averages about three barrels of potatoes for each, without either bread, fish, or any other article of food, so that starvation must in all probability be the inevitable consequence." To meet this distress the Government had been obliged to send potatoes for their support during the winter.

In the Sunday School there were generally from 100 to 110 children present. The Adult Evening School contained forty-eight Scholars, all of them very diligent and rapidly improving.

A Friday Evening Bible Class had also been formed, in which, Mr. Meek adds, "we have about 100 children and young persons generally present, with sometimes a few of the neighbours. We find it a highly profitable and interesting engagement." "The result of Mr. Willoughby's late visit," Mr. Meek goes on to say, "is satisfactory, as, though the sum collected is not very large, and the building is likely to remain unfinished some time longer, yet a very general feeling in favour of the School is manifested, and when the distressed state of the people is considered, they have done more than could be expected; about 30l, in money has been collected, besides labour and materials."

#### GREEN'S POND.

The illness of Mr. King has already been alluded to in speaking of Petty Harbor; it is gratifying to be able to state that the change of air and diminution of labour which was afforded him at that place, produced under the Divine blessing such material improvement in Mr. King's health, that he was enabled to return to his post at Green's Pond in September last. Your Committee desire to testify their thankfulness to the Supreme Giver of all good for the mercy thus shown to the cause in which they are engaged. Nor can they here refrain from recording also their gratitude for the manifold kindnesses with which they have now for seven years been favoured in the general preservation of the health of the teachers connected with them.

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The latest returns state that in the Day School there were 111 children, 142 in the Sunday School, and 49 Adults. The branches at Swain's Island and Fool's Island are suspended during the summer months, the children being occupied in the fisheries.

Mr. Martin bears his testimony to the attachment shown by the children to Mr. and Mrs. King, and (in another part of his letter) observes: "This will prove not the least interesting of the Society's stations; the parents are kind, the children are engaging, simple in their manners, and generally glad to receive instruction."

#### PORT DE GRAVE.

This has become one of the most considerable of the Society's spheres of usefulness in Newfoundland. The Report of last year mentioned its opening, and that there were 55 Children in the Day School; this number has since increased to 150; in the Sunday School are 229, and 28 in that for Adults; an Evening Class has also been commenced for the elder Children, the object of which is more especially the reading of the Scriptures, and questioning them afterwards on what has been read.

In addition to the two branches previously existing in connexion with the Port de Grave School, and which contains 66 Scholars, a third was opened at Bare Need in January last; the inhabitants had shown much eagerness respecting it, and there is every reason to expect that it will be well attended.

#### TWILLINGATE.

In consequence of the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Flint at this post, where a Mistress was requisite as well as a Master, Mr. Walker has resigned his temporary charge of the School there. His labours, though of too short continuance to admit of great immediate results, seem to have laid a foundation on which his successors may build with advantage. In allusion to this subject, Mr. Walker remarks, "I do humbly hope that some little good has been done, particularly in the Catechetical Class, at which many regularly attended, I trust, not without a desire for spiritual improvement. One young man came to me to purchase a Bible, and expressed to me the pleasure and the profit he felt in attending, and his determination to do so regularly;

many young men were in the habit of coming for tracts and loan library books; much cause was also given for gratitude in the sale of Bibles, Prayer Books, &c., the amount of which exceeded 20l." Mr. Flint also speaks of having had a considerable demand for books, many of which he has sold to persons from the neighbouring harbours, especially Spelling Books. His Schools were on the increase as winter approached, there being in the Day School 65 children, 82 in the Sunday, and 50 Adults, together with 134 Scholars in the two Branch Schools.

From the preceding statement it appears that the Society has in all, eight principal Schools in the island, and in connexion with them nineteen branches, by means of which instruction is given in daily, Sunday, and Adult Evening Schools, to 2308 individuals. In this enumeration no scholar is reckoned twice, and should he belong to both the Sunday and Day-School, or the Adult-School, he is included in only one of them in the total now presented. The entire amount of individuals in the Society's Schools exceeds that stated in the last Annual Report by 1268. The number of Teachers employed by the Society is 34, viz., 19 in the principal Schools and 15 in the branches.

Your Committee cannot better close this part of their subject, than by adducing the testimony of Mr. Willoughby, the Superintendent of the Schools in Newfoundland. He states that "the Schools are better attended in every station, and that they are assuming a steady character; that the people are becoming more and more sensible of the value of education; that the children are more attached to their Teachers, and a relish for reading is more general, whilst in the circulation of the Scriptures, of books and tracts, there is a progressive increase."

## HOME PROCEEDINGS.

After the favourable representation which your Committee have been enabled to make of the proceedings and prospects of the Society in Newfoundland, they are truly sorry to be compelled to state, that it has suffered during the past year a diminution of income at home. This circumstance, coupled with the additional expenditure consequent upon the redemption of its pledges (although to a limited extent only) in Newfoundland, has entailed upon it a debt of about 700l. It is some satisfaction, however, to be able to state, that the defalcation of in-

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come has arisen solely under the head of benefactions; a branch of revenue which, however important, may yet vary in any given period, without permanently affecting the prosperity of the Institution.

In bearing up under the present difficulties of the Society, your Committee have an arduous and anxious duty imposed upon them; they derive, however, their chief encouragement, in striving to fulfil that duty, from the hope and conviction that their Christian friends will afford them that prompt and liberal aid which at this crisis of the Society's affairs is indispensable, it may be said, even to its very existence.

In thus urging their friends, the Committee feel it to be due to themselves to state, that the excess of expenditure over the income of the Society has arisen necessarily and unavoidably from those very circumstances which it was the main object of the Society to create, viz., an ardent desire in the Colonists for education; and it is delightful to know that the same circumstances which have occasioned the embarrassments of the Society have led to great blessings to numbers in Newfoundland, and that the money thus expended, will prove to be as bread cast upon the waters, which shall be found after many days.

Another point of great interest in the home proceedings of the Society, is the state of its Associations, on the productiveness of which its efficiency so much depends. The duty of visiting them systematically has been dwelt upon in former Reports, as well as the various difficulties which from time to time have retarded its fulfilment.

In the course of the past year, your Committee have made such exertions as they could to surmount these obstacles, and the result leaves little room to doubt, that had an earlier and more extensive adoption of the plan been practicable, they would have been enabled to meet the pressing calls for greater exertions in Newfoundland without incurring their present debt. There has been an increase in the sums remitted from all the places which were visited; from some it has been very considerable, particularly from Bristol, Manchester, and Liverpool. It is not, however, merely by the impulse given to previously existing associations that the benefits of the late visitations are to be estimated. There is good reason also for believing that at several other places where the Society was unknown, or

where its interests had almost become extinct, a way has been opened either for their extension or revival.

Mr. Codner being at Clifton in June last, was enabled by the kind co-operation of several friends, to form a Ladies' Association there in connexion with the Bristol and Clifton auxiliary. It gives your Committee peculiar pleasure to state, that the Association has received the patronage of Mrs. H. More, whose support the Society has uniformly experienced. The Association is ably sustained by many active and benevolent ladies, and has already paid about 701. to the parent Society. To the Officers connected with it and with the Auxiliary, the sincere thanks of your Committee are justly due for their great exertions.

The Annual Public Meeting was held at the Town-hall, in November, when the Rt. Hon. Lord Mount-Sandford took the Chair, and at which the Rev. D. Nantes and the Rev. John Peers kindly assisted. Sermons were also preached by each of these gentlemen for the Society.

The total income received from Bristol and Clifton during the year, was 1121, 10s. 7d.

Mr. Nantes, who with his accustomed kindness had accompanied Mr. Codner to Bristol, proceeded with him to Bath, when, through the powerful assistance afforded by the Hon. and Rev. B. W. Noel, who happened to be there, an Auxiliary was formed at a Public Meeting.

A Meeting was also held at Taunton;—and at Wellington an Association was formed under the patronage of the Rev. Robert Jarratt, who has long been the tried and liberal friend of the Society.

At Liverpool, in July last, several mercantile friends gave Mr. Codner liberal donations for the Society, in the hope that its efforts would speedily be extended to British North America. The Committee was also strengthened.

At Dartmouth the sums raised have increased from about 15l. to 54l., including the produce of a Ladies' Association formed there in March last.

From Bristol the Rev. J. Peers proceeded with the Secretary to Birmingham, where he preached at St. James's, Ashsted, and where a Meeting was also held, the venerable Archdeacon Spooner in the Chair. At Cheltenham, the Rev. F. Close

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ecretary shsted, deacon Close kindly presided at a Meeting. There is reason to believe that at both these places the interests of the Society were materially benefited.

At Gloucester, three Sermons were preached by the Rev. S. R. Capel, of Bristol, who had very kindly joined the Secretary there, and though no collections were made after them, yet there is little doubt that they considerably increased the attendance at the Public Meeting which took place the following day, the Rev. J. Kempthorne in the chair. To the Hon. Lady Le Poer Trench the thanks of the Committee are especially due, for the facilities afforded to the objects of the deputation through her influence.

Several of the Associations in other parts were visited by the Rev. Thomas Harding and the Secretary. In the course of this journey, the following gentlemen kindly allowed the cause of the Society to be pleaded in their churches:—Rev. H. Gipps, at Hereford, where a Meeting was also held; Rev. J. C. Bird, at Mordiford and at Dynedor; Rev. W. Madden, at Woodhouse; and Rev. P. Maddock, at Huddersfield: at the latter place some donations and subscriptions were also received, and it is hoped that the foundation of a future Association was laid.

At Manchester, a Public Meeting was held at the Town Hall, Salford, Rev. H. Stowell in the chair, which was well attended, and which has been followed up by an active canvass on the part of the officers connected with the Auxiliary and Ladies' Association; 1061. has been remitted from Manchester to the Parent Society within the year.

Worcester, Halifax, and Sheffield, were also visited. At York an Association was formed through the influence of the Rev. John Graham, and a few other gentlemen; and from the spirit in which it has been commenced, and the character of the friends who support it, there is little doubt but considerable advantages to the Society may be looked for.

Mr. Harding being obliged to return to London, the Secretary proceeded to Leeds, when the Rev. H. Bathurst kindly presided at a Meeting. A similar favour was shown at Nottingham, by Henry Smith, Esq.; and at Burton-on-Trent, by the Rev. P. French. Several other places were also visited with varied success.

The produce of the Associations in London and the neighbourhood, is somewhat less than in the preceding year. That of the City of London Ladies', amounts to 76l.; that at Camberwell, to 42l.; and that at Westminster, to 9l. 11s.\*\*

Your Committee have, however, been encouraged by the establishment of an Association for Pentonville, in January last. Amongst its members are several ladies and gentlemen warmly attached to the Society, and whose activity bids fair to create a valuable and permanent addition to its resources. It has already raised about 301.; and measures are in progress which are likely to increase its productiveness considerably in the course of the year.

The total revenue arising from Associations within the last twelvemonth, is  $1128l. 3s. 0\frac{1}{2}d.$ , which sum, notwithstanding a considerable reduction in the amounts received from several places not visited, presents, upon the whole, a gratifying increase of 132l. when compared with the produce of 1829.

The Committee acknowledge, with gratitude, the receipt of two legacies. One under the will of the late Mrs. Hebson, amounting to 771. 2s.; the other bequeathed by the Rev. W. Yates, late of Brighton, amounting to 451., after deducting the legacy duty on each.

They have also much pleasure in noticing donations of books for Loan Library use (some of which have been very valuable) from friends as fondon and the neighbourhood, as well as at Hereford, York, Manchester, Cheltenham, and Burton-on-Trent; also for some seasonable gifts of clothing from benevolent individuals in and about town, and from ladies connected with the York Association, who have very handsomely volunteered to repeat their kindness, by sending up every year a box of clothing

Such is the statement which your Committee have to lay before the Meeting relative to the present circumstances of the Society, on which, before they close their Report, they beg to offer a few remarks.

They have already touched upon the causes which have led to their present financial difficulties, and have also adverted to the hopes they entertain of being extricated from them. Whilst, however, your Committee are thus compelled to make

these large demands upon the liberality of their friends, they take leave once more to express their satisfaction in the consciousness that their present embarrassments are not the result of improvidence, but the necessary consequence of the first establishment of so many Schools, in redemption of their early pledges to Newfoundland—and they feel a confident hope that if once effectually relieved, they will be able in future to confine the expenditure within the limits of the Society's income; they venture upon this declaration the more confidently, as the experience of the past year has fully justified their previous conviction, that the foundation on which the Society rests is firm and good; that its object is one which strongly commends itself to the sympathies and to the judgment of the friends of Christian instruction in the mother country; and that it is not suffering from any actual decay of its powers, but merely from an exertion of them beyond their present strength.

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to em. ke In conclusion, your Committee beg to assure their friends that their confidence in God is unabated; the work is His, and as in the prosecution of it they desire to have no aim but His glory, and the welfare of His creatures, they believe that their extremity will prove an occasion of provoking the love and the liberality of all who fear His name, and who seek the prosperity of His church.
