

Even at the present time that class is very limited, but does include a father or mother or a child. In England it was held that as it was a special privilege it only enabled British subjects to sue, and liens could not take the benefit of the act. If you had known this you would probably have not made such an attack

upon the American courts. "In 1901 this law was, as I say, reconsidered, and now an alien can take advantage of Lord Campbell's Act.
