

ABANDONED TO THEIR FATE
LIVES SAVED BY SMALL BOAT

Thrilling Experience of Crews of
Dredger and Scows Off
California Coast.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 12.—Struggling desperately all night against the terrible southeast gale which swept upon the coast yesterday afternoon the tug Sea Rover clung to a dredger and two lighters, upon which were thirty-five workmen bound for San Pedro, until it was beaten back in the seething breakers on Duxbury reef, and was compelled to abandon the unwieldy craft and twenty-seven of their human freight to their fate.

Before leaving her charges, the Sea Rover saved eight men on the barges, several jumping into the sea and swimming to the tug. One or two were seriously injured.

The other twenty-seven men it was learned to-night, reached shore in Bolinas Bay in the small boats which were carried on the dredges and lighters.

The Sea Rover returned this afternoon to the scene of the accident in an attempt to save the dredger, valued at \$100,000, and the lighters, each of which is worth from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

STOLEN OR MISLAID?
Literary Woman is Placed in a
Serious Predicament.

Cornwall, Jan. 12.—(Special.)—Miss Josephine Smith, a literary woman who has been devoting considerable time to the gathering of data regarding the U. E. Loyalties and the early settlement of Eastern Ontario, was charged with the theft of a prayer book the property of A. G. Drew of Morrisburg.

The prayer book, it seems, was printed 400 years ago, and Miss Smith was entrusted with it by Drew for the purpose of having value placed upon it by some of the historical societies. She claims that it has been mislaid.

She was committed for trial. The grand jury brought in a true bill, and the trial was adjourned until the next session. Miss Smith is held in \$400 of her own bail and \$400 in another surety.

C.P.R. OFFICIALS AT QUEBEC

Quebec, Jan. 12.—D. McNeill, first vice-president, M. While Dr. Torrey was asking for converts a man in the audience cried: "There are no Christians here."

PREFONTAINE'S REMAINS START ON JOURNEY HOME Taken from Jetty to Battleship Dominion by Torpedo Boat of French Navy. (Canadian Associated Press Cable) Cherbourg, Jan. 12.—A special train conveying the remains of Hon. Raymond Prefontaine left St. Lazare Station, Paris, at eight o'clock this morning. Early the hour was a large number of friends of the deceased were present, among whom were Louis Beaudin, Montreal; Suzor, Cote, of Arthabaska; Captain Morgan, naval attaché, British embassy; Garcel Guindar, representing the minister of foreign affairs; Albert Vignal, representing the minister of commerce; Maynard, the minister of the interior; Anatole Poincaré, agent for the Dominion of Canada in France; Doctor Robert du Plessis, Doctor Latrelle, Marquis Dalgheaux, the last three from Montreal. All excepting Beaudin and Cote accompanied Mr. Lemieux to Cherbourg. On arrival at Cherbourg the train was switched on the track leading to the arsenal jetty. On passing thru the arsenal jetty the train was met by several yards which presented arms. At the admiralty jetty Admiral Besson and staff received the train. He expressed the thanks of the Canadian government for the honors paid the remains of M. Prefontaine. Admiral Besson briefly replied, expressing the sympathy of the French navy. The coffin was placed on board the torpedo boat Zouave, and with the band playing the Chopin funeral march, the coffin was conveyed to the battleship Dominion, lying some distance out in the harbor. DAIRYMEN CONCLUDE. President—Butter, Re-Elected. Peterboro, Jan. 12.—The Eastern Ontario Dairy Convention was brought to a close this morning with the re-election of D. Derbyshire, M.P., president. The other officers are: First vice-president, John R. Dargavel, M.P.; A. Elgin; second vice-president, G. G. Publow, Kingston; third vice-president, T. B. Carlow, Warkworth; fourth vice-president, J. H. Singleton, Newboro; directors, Ed. Kidd, North Gower; William Eager, Morrisburg; Levi Patton, Brockville; James Whitton, Welham's Corners; Alex. Hume, Menie; Henry Glendenning, Manilla; hon. director, R. G. Murphy, Brockville; treasurer, John R. Dargavel; auditors, Morden Bird, Stirling; F. W. Brenton, Belleville. Some idea of the growth of the butter export was given this morning by the Kingston Dairy School. The exports for last year were 50,000 packages more than in 1904, and 25,000 packages more than in 1903. The price obtained was three and one-half cents in excess of the figure for 1904. The output in Eastern Ontario has kept pace with the expansion, there being an increase of 25,000 pounds in the average output of twelve creameries which had reported. The special committee on licensing factories believed in a thorough measure of inspection of cheese and butter factories and dairies, and will petition the Ontario government for legislation to ensure factories, dairies, etc., being kept in a clean condition with a pure water supply. THE DEAD. At Warrenton, N.C.—Mrs. Lucy E. Polk, sister-in-law of President Polk, died at New York—Dr. E. C. Dent, superintendent Manhattan State Hospital, died at London—Sir Mountstuart Grant Duff, former under secretary of state for the colonies, governor of Madras, and president of the Royal Geographical Society, was born in 1828. The death occurred at 25 McCaul street on Thursday evening of Andrew J. Cottam, a prominent resident of the city, connected for years with Collier's of New York, and more recently with the Morning Publishing Company, Toronto. He was a member of the separate school boards and for four years was on the old high school board. Mr. Cottam also took an active part in athletic affairs, being a member of the Toronto Rowing Club for fifteen years, and an officer of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen. He never married. One sister, Miss Lillian Cottam, resides in Toronto, and he leaves also one sister in Los Angeles, and three brothers in New York. He was 47 years of age. The funeral will take place at 8 1/2 o'clock Saturday morning to St. Patrick's Church, thence to St. Michael's Cemetery. The death occurred last evening of Henry Swaffield, a Crimean veteran of the Coldstream Guards. He was a native of Somersetshire, and was born June 26, 1828. He was appointed sergeant-major of the 24th regiment when it was organized. For twenty years he was a resident of Toronto, and for the last three or four years was an inmate of the House of Industry. The funeral will take place from Daniel James' mortuary on Yonge-street to St. James' Cemetery, where interment will take place in the St. George's Society plot. He was an early member of the Army and Navy Veterans, who are asked to attend the funeral. Swaffield's daughter is also an inmate of the House of Industry. Ex-Police Inspector Ward, who died last week in Manitowish Island, and Swaffield, were comrades in the same draft which was sent to the Crimea. John J. MRS. CHADWICK BEGINS TIME MAY HAVE TO DO WASHING

Is Identified by Woman as Madame de Vere—Good Behavior Brings Release in 1912.

Cleveland, Jan. 12.—Mrs. Cassie Chadwick, escorted by United States Marshal Chandler and a deputy, left Cleveland this morning for the state penitentiary at Columbus to begin her sentence of ten years' imprisonment.

Shortly before leaving the train Mrs. Chadwick said: "I am going to try and be brave and keep up now to the last."

No special preparations were made in the women's department of the prison at Columbus for Mrs. Chadwick, she will be compelled to sleep on a cot in the corridors of the prison, as the women's department is filled and every bed occupied.

The prison officials say they are in the belief that Mrs. Chadwick is Madame de Vere. After she had filed her name with the clerk, the following card was made in the book at the prison:

"Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick, alias Madame de Vere, 30 years, consoling to work a national bank—Cuyahoga Co.—Received Jan. 12, 1906; expires Jan. 12, 1912—Good time November, 1912."

The prison officials think the reports that Mrs. Chadwick has heart trouble are groundless and after an examination, if it is found she is able, she will be put to washing or other heavy work.

An ex-convict in the secretary's office of the penitentiary was brought to the prison and after taking a good look at Mrs. Chadwick, unhesitatingly pronounced her the same woman who had served a term in the penitentiary from Lucas County, beginning in 1901, for forgery, under the name of Madame de Vere. Mrs. Chadwick was identified when she was admitted or denied that she was Madame de Vere.

ARTILLERY TO FIGHT BOMBS. Nearly 350 Persons Killed or Hurt at Tiflis Encounter.

Tiflis, Caucasus, Jan. 12.—Nearly 350 persons were killed or injured as an outcome of an attack by Cossacks yesterday on the Armenian Seminary here, following the throwing of two bombs from that institution at a passing patrol.

Four Cossacks were wounded and killed by the explosion of the bomb. The artillery was immediately called up and the seminary was surrounded and shelled.
