

THE FIRST EVIDENCE

Ohioan Got \$7000 for His Farm and is in Canada Heading for the Great West.

ENTHUSIASTIC ABOUT THE NEW LAND

The Kind of Young Man Needed for Development of the Grain-Growing Belt.

The stories of some of the people from the States now passing through Canada show the ease with which settlers are induced to leave the best farming sections of the middle States for that section. In the city yesterday were George Abbott wife and mother, en route from Bowling Green, Ohio, they were going, probably, to some point in Alberta, but their exact location would be determined later. The head of the family is just 21 years old, strong and vigorous and with a practical knowledge of farming.

"Yes, I have joined the army of invasion, if that is what you call it. Mr. Abbott observed with a smile to a world reporter. 'We are going to the Northwest to settle. How did I happen to conclude to make the move? Well, it was this way: We owned a hundred acre farm near Bowling Green, Ohio, in Northern Ohio, just north of the line between Ohio and Indiana. I was born and raised there, and there ain't no better farming land in the world than right down there. Wasn't it you that we got \$7000 cash for our hundred acres you will understand that interested in Canadian paper."

"Adjoining our farm is a family which came from Montreal years ago but they still take a Canadian paper. Two years ago I borrowed their paper. It is a weekly and had some mighty good stories in it—some of you know. Some time afterwards there was a story printed in it about the free homes in the Northwest part of Canada and we talked a good deal about it, but I can tell you frankly we never thought we would leave the States for that country. Several farmers we knew made trips out there last summer, and four or five of them never came back. But they sent for their families. They wrote letters telling us what a fine country it was and some more, and as much as we had heard of it, we were now a Britisher. But I was told that it meant that but I was told that it meant you had to serve in Canada's army if they wanted you. Anyway they wrote that they were mighty well pleased."

"Then I read another report in the Canadian story paper and my mind talked together about selling out and going there. I wrote a letter to a railroad company and they sent me a lot of books and papers. I found that you could get a farm for nothing, or you could buy a better one for ten dollars an acre."

"See the New Land. 'They also said I could buy a ticket from Windsor for \$18 that would take me as far west as Edmonton and let me stop over anywhere west of that. That was cheaper than I could go to Chicago and Minneapolis, and besides I thought if I was going to be a Canadian I ought to see as much of my new country on the way as possible."

"We had no trouble selling our farm for \$70 an acre, for we always produced from sixty to seventy-five bushels of corn on every acre. The stock we couldn't sell so well. I had two big teams. Two horses which weighed 1600 each, and a pair of \$400 for, and a team and outfit fetched us \$300, but they were fine animals which we had raised just ten years old."

"See Country at its Worst. 'Some people said we ought not to go up there in the winter, but I said to see the country at its worst. The people from our section go in there have mostly got to go and can pay their way. I am not a bit squeamish about becoming a Canadian, because I know lots of them that are in the States and they seem to be alright. They do say, tho, that in Canada the farmers drill their wheat up one side of the hill and down the other on the same side as close to the first drill as possible, while down our field, but I guess that don't keep me from drilling wheat like I want to. Then I am told their teams are lighter than ours, and that they walk faster in a plow, but that don't scare me. I am 21 years old, weigh two hundred pounds, was never sick a day in my life and lived thru three foot-ball games at college, where they crippled every man but me, and I can outwalk any darned Canadian broncho that ever drug a plow."

EAST END SEWAGE SCHEME

Sent Back to Council by Works Committee on Recommendation of Residents.

THEY ARE WILLING TO PAY FOR IT

Sub for the Board of Control—Another Pavement Protest—City Hall Notes.

The Engineer's recommendation in regard to sewage disposal of the Woodbine-avenue, was yesterday afternoon sent back to Council by the Works Committee. When the matter was discussed in Council last Monday, there were different opinions as to whether the city at large should not pay for the bacteria beds and septic tanks, instead of having the sewage disposed of as a local improvement. When it was further brought in the Works Committee yesterday afternoon, Engineer Rust reported that, if there is any probability of the sewage disposal scheme for the entire section of the city being proceeded with in the near future, it would be advisable to allow this matter to stand in abeyance, as by so doing, the cost of the proposed work is \$45,000; cost of the bacteria beds and septic tanks necessary for the proper treatment of the sewage, \$70,000; pumping plant, etc., \$8,000; the balance being for sewers, in any event, even if the system of disposal for the entire city is proceeded with, these sewers will be required.

Robert Moore appeared before the committee on behalf of residents of Leavelle-avenue and vicinity. He said the people wanted the system established, as a local improvement, and they were willing to pay for it.

Said City Should Not Pay.

Ald. W. T. Stewart took objection to the Engineer's recommendation that the cost of the Warren Bituminous Paving Co. to construct a street intersection of their bituminous macadam be granted, and that the city pay \$500 for it. Ald. Stewart could not see what right the city had to pay for advertising a firm's wares. If the company wanted to lay a sample pavement, they should do it at their own expense, as part of the cost of putting a new thing on the market.

Ald. Sheppard wanted to know if the Warren Company had a monopoly of the bituminous macadam. Mr. Rust replied that they claimed to have a patent, but he would not say whether they got any contract unless it was open to competition.

The committee turned out the Engineer's recommendation.

Sanctioned Board of Control.

The Board of Control, a little snub at the hands of the Works Committee, owing to an order that the City Clerk and the secretaries of the various city committees be instructed to hereafter forward to the board all material upon which clauses in the City Charter and the City Act are involved, and at the same time to inform the board as to whether the clauses were approved or not.

This did not please the aldermen, and they passed a resolution to the effect that the information asked in the order could always be got by application to the secretary of the committee.

Another Pavement Question.

A protest was entered by Alex. Dunn and ex-Ald. Pargue against the recommendation for an asphalt pavement on Wilton-crescent. They wanted the present macadam road repaired. It was agreed that the old road should be replaced with new asphalt, and that the cost of the paving should be paid by the city.

Dr. Moraes dies in Brazil.

Former President Succumbs After Being Ill for Years.

Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, Dec. 5.—Dr. Prudente Jose de Moraes was the first President of Brazil chosen from the will of the people. There had been two Presidents before him, but they had gained their power through military force.

Dr. Moraes was elected President in 1889, and served during the following four years. He was a distinguished lawyer. One of the principal features of his character was "inflexible moderation."

While essentially a man of peace, his drive against the military forces, which developed into numerous plots to assassinate him. Some of the plots were detected and severely punished.

Dr. Moraes had been in poor health for several years, and was afflicted by the liver. He was about 60 years old at the time of his death.

Dr. Moraes had a long training in political life. He was a member of the Chamber of Deputies during the empire. He eventually became the leader of the Republican party. When he was elected President of the republic he resigned the Presidency of the Senate.
