There might have been more if certain prohibition lest spring instead of usprohibitionists had gone to work for prohibition last spring, instead of using so much time and energy in their endeavor to get revenge for a fancied injury by defeating the Ross government. There might have been less if certain Tories, who have no love for prohibition, had not voted Yes yesterday with the hope of embarrassing and perhaps securing the defeat of that same Ross government. But these are speculations. The fact is that the vote polled does not indicate a sufficient oreponderance of public opinion in favor ponderance of public opinion in favor of prohibition to justify the applica-tion of that drastic and doubtfur remedy for intemperance. A renewed campaign of education is in order. The more temperance and the less prohibi-tion there is in it, the better will be its effect upon the conduct and tempe of the people.



EAST END SEWAGE SCHEME

Sent Back to Council by Works Committee on Recommendation of Residents.

THEY ARE WILLING TO PAY FOR IT

regard to sewage disposal east of Woodbine-avenue, was yesterday afternoon sent back to Council by the Works Committee. When the matter was discussed in Council last Monday, it was opposed by East End aldermen, and there were different opinions as to whether the city at large should not pay for the bacteria beds and septic tanks, instead of having the whole assessed as a local improvement. When it was further broached in the Works Committee yesterday afternoon, Engineer Rust reported that, if there is any probability of the sewage disposal scheme for the entire section of the city being proceeded with in the near future, it would be advisable to allow this matter to stand in abeyance, as by so doing, the sum of \$7600 would be saved. The total cost of the proposed work is \$45,000; the cost of the bacteria beds and septic tanks necessary for the proper treatment of the sewage, \$7600; pumping plant, etc., \$8000, the balance being for sewers. In any event, even if the system of disposal for the entirecity is proceeded with, these sewers and pumping plant would be required. Robert Moon appeared before the committee on behalf of residents of Leuty-avenue and vicinity. He said the people wanted the system established, as a local improvement, and they were willing to pay for it.





TO HEAD OFF NEW MOVEMENT

United States Railroads Alarmed at the Emigration to Canada's Golden West.

ST. LOUIS CENTRE OF ORGANIZATION

Fund Subscribed to Divert Flow From Garden Spot of All the States.

The movement from the States toward Canada's productive Northwest during the past summer has caused more alarm apparently in the southwestern part of the States than in other sections of the Republic. At any rate the drain has proven so serious on Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma that the great railroads covering those States have just formed a powerful syndicate for the purpose of preventing a similar movement toward Canada from that part of the boundless west next year. This is the strongest confession the lamerican corporations have yet made that Canada is proving a serious rival in their work of settling up the Western States. In the Republic the large corporations controlling the railroads radiating all over the States west of the Mississippi River are the real pioneer agencies. It has proven so in the past, and they will be no less factors in the development of the western territories in the future.

But not in the history of western development in the States has such a gigantic combination been formed for the purpose of diverting immigration as that which was given birth to in St. Louis a few weeks ago. There is every reason to believe that the stream pouring into Canada from that part of the world is responsible for this combination.
