Electricity Throws Out Pipes With Far Less Trouble and Expense.

The electrical apparatus for thawing out frosted pipes was put into working order yesterday afternoon, and the first trial of the apparatus was made in the case of a pipe on the corner of Bellwoods-avenue and Arthur-street. The result was very satisfactory, the desired effect being achieved in twenty minutes, whereas under the old system it would have taken a day or more to dig out the frozen pipe, and to replace the pipe with a piece of wood to supply the necessary heat.
