PROVINCIAL SECRETARY FLAYS OLD GOVERNMENT FOR FRENZIED FINANCE

In His Budget Speech He Exposes the Methods of the Former Administration—Unsuspected Bill of Nearly \$50,000 More Against Central Railway.

Fredericton, N. B., May 14.—Quite a sensation was created here this afternoon by the announcement of Provincial Secretary Flemming in his budget speech that the Intercolonial Railway authorities had rendered a bill to the government for \$47,498.34, for rail and passenger supplies to the much discussed Central Railway, and many people, particularly members of the legislature, are wondering what will come next.

Premier Hazen, when seen this evening in reference to the matter, stated that he had received the bill and was reviewing it this morning and was for rails and material supplied to the Central Railway in years 1902 and 1903. Enclosed with the bill, he said, was a letter from W. C. Hunter, manager of the Central, stating that the transaction was entered into before his connection with the road and therefore he knew nothing about it. He said, however, that he understood the bill was for material supplied to the Chipman-Minto section.

The premier said that, on enquiry, he had learned that the bill had been rendered to the old government when that section of the road was under construction by the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Company, and the government by order in council had undertaken to pay for the construction of the house in London. On the last day of December, 1903, \$4,925 was paid, thus reducing the bill by that amount, but nothing has been paid since that date.

He went on to say that when the government in 1905 became responsible for this amount it was on the understanding that security in the way of a bond guaranteeing the province since 1903, Mr. Hazen said he was not surprised that at the last session of the legislature the public accounts committee had been refused permission to examine the accounts of the Central Railway and this furnished an excuse for the government's friends in the legislature to make during the election campaign as to the amount the road had cost the province up to that time, had been very much understated.

The premier added that he had heard a rumor to the effect that the old company had claimed that they had an offset against the Dominion government, on the ground that they were entitled to a double subsidy on the portion of the road from Chipman to Minto, but an investigation, he had lately instituted, did not furnish any corroboration for any such report.

Fredericton, May 14.—The House met at 2 p.m. Several bills were read a third or second time. Hon. Mr. McLeod presented a report of the standing rules committee. Hon. Mr. McLeod, in reply to Mr. Munro, said that the attention of the government had been called to irregularities and violation of the secret ballot in the polling booth at Arturbette poll and had been verbally informed that the hon. member for Victoria, Mr. Tweeddale, had made a statement to the effect that the ordinary expenditure of the province for the last year was \$800,000 and the ordinary income \$800,000, leaving a surplus, according to these figures, of over \$8,000. He had to take exception to the way in which the hon. member's report had been made and was made up and to the conclusions arrived at.

Taking up the various items of expenditure he first referred to that of agriculture, amounting to \$36,534.84, the largest expenditure made by this department for several years. Examining this item, which, no doubt, think it meant that special attention was being given to their interests by the government. A little investigation would, however, dispel this illusion. The money was spent but not upon ordinary modes assisting agriculture for over \$9,000 of it was to pay losses on business management of the department of agriculture in importing horses and sheep. It was found that this was a most expensive business. The loss on the horse importation was \$3,792, on sheep \$1,225, and so had to be deducted from the ordinary expenditure for agricultural purposes.

No charge was made in this item for exhibitions, and the amount charged for the exhibition was \$1,225. The total loss on these three items when deducted from the agricultural expenditure for the year was an aggregation of grants made previously and carried over. The amount paid to exhibitors held in 1907 had been carried over to 1908.

This loose and wasteful system did not apply only to agriculture but to every department of the public services. Juggling with the accounts was practiced throughout the year and the work of an honorable gentleman, not now present, it is possible for the government to come out each year with a surplus. In 1907, for game protection, he directed the attention of the house to the fact that the different counties in New Brunswick some fifty game wardens had been employed, receiving a sum of \$4,500.00, an amount in comparison with others where the needs of game protection were equally great. And the worst part was that this expenditure was that it was not under the order or control of the chief game commissioner. Mr. LaBelle assured the house that these game wardens rendered their accounts under oath, and said full statements must be in the crown land department.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer stated there was no trace of them in his department. Hon. Mr. Fleming said there was an election in Restigouche, which perhaps explained why so many game wardens were necessary and the unsatisfactory condition of returns.

Needless to add the result of the Restigouche election was quite satisfactory to honorable gentlemen, which was one of the reasons why the government had been so successful in the Restigouche small county where there was an expenditure for game protection which no man of good sense or common sense could justify.

Hon. Mr. Fleming—I would not expect any answer from the hon. gentleman, for I would never attribute sound judgment to him. Continuing Hon. Mr. Fleming, he stated that the government had begun to do the correct amount. Hon. Mr. Fleming then referred to the expenditure on the railway as reported to the expert auditor's report. After criticizing him (Fleming) for his statements in regard to the financial position of the province and ignoring the challenge for a joint debate in the city of St. John, he had attempted to throw dust in the eyes of the people by employing an auditor from Toronto to make a statement in regard to provincial accounts, and when he got this statement he did not give it to the public because it condemned their system of bookkeeping from start to finish.

The late government lost the confidence of the people because they did not deal openly with them and let them know the true state of affairs. The interest on the Central Railway bonds had not been charged, and other interest accounts were constantly cropping up. There could be, he said, no justification for putting in the public accounts untrue statements. Taking up the item of public works, on page 146, there would be found an over-drift of \$11,000, which nowhere appeared in the general account. Not only was this done, but large sums of money which were expended during the year were carried over to the next year, and the over-drift was as part of the year's business.

"Surely it was an easy matter to figure out a tidy surplus when all over-drifts were left out. Last year, however, the ingenuity of the government was severely taxed, and in desperation they began as early in the year as May 20th, to charge to a suspense account expenditures which should have been charged against the public business and they carried over this expenditure to the extent of \$67,000. No sane business man would or could justify such a proceeding. The hon. gentleman opposite knew during the last campaign that the suspense account existed. Yet he never took the people into his confidence nor gave a correct statement of the accounts in the public works department. The only excuse that could be offered for such a proceeding was that the necessity for dealing out public works for election purposes was so great that some means had to be devised to find the money without letting the



people know the true state of the accounts. To figure out the fallacious surplus of last year the government not only had to leave their over drafts unpaid, but they had to swell the income by holding open the books for the receipt of money for over a month after the close of the year.

Revenue was thus added in that which did not belong to the year at all. In connection with the payment of the increased subsidy, which was one of the reasons credited, there was legislation proposed that \$15,000 of it should be left on deposit at Ottawa. But so good did this money look when it arrived that the government could not bear to part with it, which had apparently been handed down from generations and which the late government never thought worth while to mend. By the new audit act it was hoped to put the accounts on a business basis. The hon. gentleman opposite had said it was merely a lapse of memory that prevented his mentioning his intention to frame a new audit act. He had promised everything else—free school books, a new highway, etc., etc. In fact all the hon. gentleman opposite had been prolific in promises. The chief-commissioner, who

was elected by the assistance of his fifty game wardens, had promised bridges to every county in the province. They all had talked much, meant little, and accomplished nothing.

Mr. Copp—Because the rails were purchased from the I. C. R., did it make them poor? Hon. Mr. Fleming—As the government which the hon. gentleman supports at Ottawa deals so largely with middlemen perhaps he thinks the I. C. R. in this case was acting with the capacity, but can assure the hon. gentleman that such is not the case. The rails were discarded by the I. C. R. and turned over to the province.

Continuing, Mr. Fleming said it was his duty as a public man to present things as they were, and not as he would like them to be. He was sorry that provincial affairs were in such a condition, but the people were entitled to all the information obtainable. Before finishing his remarks he would endeavor to lay a full statement of financial affairs as they existed today before the house.

Mr. Fleming wanted to include other liabilities which they would be called upon to discharge sooner or later under the authority of legislation which had been passed for the purpose.

There was \$400,000 liability on the guaranteed bonds of the International Railway, and \$60,000 on account of the cold storage plant at St. John, making a total of \$460,000 more to be added to the provincial liabilities.

In addition to these there were some further expenses authorized, some of which had been paid since the close of the fiscal year. There were others for which payment would in a short time have to be made.

Mr. Fleming said he had not forgotten the St. John Valley Railway, and was coming to it in a minute or two. There was a balance guaranteed on the International Railway of \$676,000, which liability would have to be assumed and payment made at no distant date.

This sum brought up the total liabilities of the province to \$7,248,122.22. There was nothing whatever, he was sorry to say, visionary in that statement. It was all to be found in recent years. But that was not all. His hon. friend opposite had referred to the St. John Valley Railway and had spoken of his (the speaker's) having voted for the guarantee of \$15,000 a mile for that railway, and asked why he did not apply the same principles which prompted him to vote for that railway to the International.

He (the speaker) was always glad to answer this question. The liability of the province after the guarantee of the Canadian Northern Railway would be one of practically no responsibility, and the condition on which the province was to guarantee the bonds of the St. John Valley Railway was that the Canadian Northern Railway should give their guarantee first.

He had not put this prospective liability in with the others as it was not yet required to be dealt with, while they were face to face with the others.

He wished to refer once again to the bridges which were included in last year's "Letter" Act. It was estimated that they would require another \$80,000 to complete the whole lot. This would therefore require another \$80,000 in addition to the amount previously ascertained.

Lastly, there was the St. John Valley Railway which, if they estimated at 167 miles at \$15,000 a mile, would require \$2,505,000. That would bring the total amount of actual and contingent liability of the province up to \$10,253,122.22.

There was nothing imaginary about this. Unfortunately it was all too true, and yet the hon. gentleman opposite characterized the liabilities of the province as a mere trifle.

PLAYS AND PLAYERS

KIRK BROWN AS OTHELLO

Another Excellent Performance at the Opera House Last Evening.

Othello, that perennial success with St. John audiences was splendidly produced by Kirk Brown and his excellent company before a large and appreciative audience in the Opera House last evening. In the matter of staging and costumes Mr. Brown's production of Shakespeare's great tragedy is far superior to anything of the kind ever given here and it seems to improve with every presentation.

As the Moor, Mr. Brown was superb in his exquisite scene before the Duke of Venice in the final scene of the first act. Never was that long and beautiful speech one of the greatest in Shakespeare's writings, given with such dignity, grace and distinction. His elocution was perfect and carried just sufficient force to make the scene a triumph. All through Mr. Brown gave a vivid, clean cut, brilliant performance and at times rose to dramatic heights of genius.

Mr. Brown showed scholarly judgment. He made his Othello a creature of considerable physical charm. The production was magnificent, staged, costumes, and lighting. Scenically the court scene and the garden scene were beautiful. Stage pictures, while the costumes were most elaborate.

As Desdemona, Miss Field displayed all the deft artistry of the finished actress. Her conception of the part was eminently proper and acceptable yet never commonplace or conventional. In her scenes with Othello she was wise, firm, lovable and handled her emotional lines with all the requisite strength.

Mr. Crosby's Iago was a suave cynical characterization and the type was most convincing one. Miss Dow was excellent as Emilia while the same may be said of Mrs. Bird as Cassio. The chorus, including a brilliant rendering of Grieg's Peer Gynt Suite (No. 1), as a piano duo. Mr. Fox also acted as accompanist most acceptably.

Mr. Beckley is to be congratulated on the result of his first recital in St. John. He showed himself an entertainer of versatility and excellent taste.

FOR HEARTH AND HOME. The presentation of "For Hearth and Home," which is to be made at the Opera House on next Monday evening, May 18, should prove highly diverting. The play is clean, it is wholesome, its atmosphere is that of a southern, and its humor is of the healthy kind.

SUPREME CHIEF RANGER ADDRESSES FORESTERS

Lively Meeting in Calvin Church Last Evening Discussed the Question of the Increased Rates.

Organizers for the I. O. F. were met by the assertion "Your rates are not sufficient and if they are you have 110,000 members whose rates are too high." He contended that the public are entitled to know the truth. But some would say that the rates were too high, and they meant to have it. He asked if the Foresters were brethren or Shylocks who must have their pound of flesh.

The average insurance, he said, previous to 1899 was between \$1,300 and \$1,400. Since 1899 it had become reduced to \$700. However, he said, the rate of the members of a fraternal society to provide the money necessary to meet all its future obligations as it was their right to participate in its benefits.

Dr. Stevenson then took up the recommendations made by the royal commission to meet the situation. These offered no alternative to increased rates to the other members. He then introduced the proposition given in the opening of his article. At the end of 1908 he said there were only ten members in the order over seventy years of age and a few more over seventy so that the cost would not be great.

Some one in the body of the church house asked what guarantee there was that the rates would not again be raised in a few years. He replied that actuaries had said the present rates were sufficient on two conditions. The first was that they were for a life contract. The other that the money of the order earned 5 per cent. interest. He anticipated no difficulty on these points.

Another inquirer wished to know the amount of salary paid the executive officers. The speaker said the supreme chief ranger receives \$15,000 and there were three other officials at \$7,500 each. In answer to D. D. Lingley, Dr. Stevenson said that the last year he had been in law business in the States he had earned \$55,000.

At the afternoon session of the High Court, D. G. Lingley, P. H. C. E., moved that: "In the opinion of this court it is not expedient that any change in rates be made for at least five years."

This resolution was seconded by Dr. W. H. Grey, W. B. Jonah, Dr. W. Macrae, High Secretary F. W. Emerson, R. D. Hanson and Mr. Clark who supported the proposed increase in rates.

"As soon as you adopt the belief that the earth is hollow, perplexing questions will be easily solved, the mind will be satisfied, and the triumph of sensible reasoning will come as a delight never to be forgotten."

CLERGYMAN NOW CHARGED WITH HERESY. Rev. Dr. Cotton Denies the Virgin Birth of Christ.

St. Paul, Minn., May 14.-The Rev. Robert Hamilton Cotton, aged sixty-seven, who for a quarter of a century has served the Episcopal denomination in this State, in which time he has been rector of St. Paul's church and Christ church, both in the city, has been denied a license to preach in Minnesota by Bishop E. C. Edson of the Episcopal diocese, and charged with heresy. The denial of a license practically means his expulsion from his denomination, since the bishops of other dioceses have been notified and will not, according to their practice, grant him the right to preach elsewhere. Dr. Cotton says little of the action except to vigorously assert his belief in Christ and in Christian doctrines and teachings.

"I am a Christian first, last and all the time," he said. "The only heresy of which I am guilty is no heresy. For years I have reasoned with myself and I know now, and teach, that the doctrine of the virgin birth and of the resurrection are not true. "I expect to be excommunicated, though it is hard. The church does not want thinkers. Word has gone forth that ministers of advanced thought and progressiveness are barred." Dr. Cotton's dismissal from the pulpit is an echo of the famous Dr. Crapsey case. Dr. Cotton believes with Dr. Crapsey and so announced himself. Bishop Edson wrote the aged minister, asking him whether it was true that he agreed with the Crapsey doctrine, and in reply received a letter from Dr. Cotton saying that he did. The refusal of a license followed. Dr. Cotton explicitly states the beliefs which promise to result in a sensation in the Episcopal denomination in the Northwest, and perhaps another heresy trial, as follows: "In the doctrine of the Episcopal church, there are two points which I sincerely believe and contend are untrue, and because of this I am accused of heresy. The two points are: the virgin birth of Jesus and the resurrection. "I locate the virgin birth in the divine life of Christ, and not in the human life of the Mother. The story of the resurrection is beautiful, a beautiful story which has been the inspiration of thousands and is used never to be in an insinuation if it is rightly placed, but it is untrue. It is merely a fairy tale, beautiful as it is. "To be the first and last great heresy of the Church, the cause of all her modern troubles, is a practical denial of the humanity of Christ."



Lawlor, of Chatham; Deputy Grand Knight Dr. Mulvey, St. John; Council Knight, J. P. Hallway, Truro, and J. B. Lambkin and several from Halifax. There was quite a delegation from P. E. Island, and quite a number of clergymen among the visitors. The officers of Moncton Council are as follows: Hon. P. J. Sweeney, Grand Knight; Dr. L. N. Bourgeois, Deputy Grand Knight; Camille Bourgeois, financial secretary; D. J. Legere, recording secretary; H. Kelly, treasurer; G. Gallagher, inner guard; Gordon Cassidy, outside guard; Jos. Graham, was on duty as guard; A. Geary, John M. Den; councilors, J. A. Geary, John M. Lyons and H. H. Melanson. This makes the seventh council in the maritime provinces, and the membership is increasing very rapidly. State Deputy W. J. Mahoney, of St. John, will return to Moncton later and install the officers.

WILL FLY THE FLAG JUST WHEN WE LIKE

Interesting Flag Discussion in the Canadian Senate Yesterday.

Ottawa, Ont., May 15 (Special).—There was a flag discussion in the senate yesterday. Senator Domville read a despatch stating that the prime minister of England had stated in the British house of commons that he did not regard it advisable to order the hoisting of the Union Jack over public buildings on Empire day. He over what effect this was to have in Canada and what the effect of this would be in view of the Quebec celebration the occasion for flag flying. Would the Union Jack be flown there?

Hon. Mr. Scott said there was no intention of restricting the flying of the Union Jack in Canada. If it was not flown in England the only effect in Canada would be that of flying it more. Sir MacKenzie Bowell declared it was time the premier of England should know that Canada intended flying the Union Jack whenever it pleased. An expression of opinion by the Canadian parliament might not be out of place.

Senator Toran declared that if there was any man who should know when the Union Jack should be flown it was the premier of England, the chief advisor of his Majesty the King. Senator Landry was told by the Hon. Mr. Scott that the government had come to no decision as to taking over the liabilities of the Quebec Bridge Company, as it had authority to do under the contract of 1907. He was told that Mr. Parent had refused a bonus of \$3,000 to him and that the company does not owe Mr. Parent any sum. He was told that Mr. U. Barth, secretary of the bridge company, had no claim against the company beyond his month's salary. That had been \$2,400 a year since May, 1906, and previously was \$2,000. Senator Landry also informed that orders had been given to expedite the work of repairing the wall in connection with a porpoising the Dufferin Terrace at Quebec and it was expected that the corporation of Quebec would be able to complete the terrace in time for the celebration.
