

Petrograd, Oct. 15.—German forces which landed on the Russian island of Ocsel, at the head of the Gulf of Riga, on Friday, occupied Arsenburg, the captial of the island, on Saturday.

The northern group of German warships, the statement adds, despatched a torpedo boat squadron between the islands of Ocsel and Dago, which pressed back the Russian patrols. Russian naval forces reinforced the patrol and accepted battle, whereupon the German ships retired.







Dr. A. M. Fisher Killed In France

Son-in-Law of Hon. F. B. Carvell Gives His Life While on Duty at the Front-His Career

A telegram received vesterday by Mrs. Fisher, of Woodstock, wife of Dr. Arthur M. Fisher, and daughter of Hon. F. B. Hon. Mr. Carvell left Ottawa Saturday afternoon for home and in order to make connections he arranged for his automobile to meet him at Danforth (Me.)
Mrs. Carvell and Mrs. Fisher went with the car to Danforth and the party motored back to Woodstock by way of Houlton. On their arrival home they got the news of Dr. Fisher's death. Mr. Carvell had planned to be in St. John tonight, but his arrangements are now







Germany Seizes All Stocks Dutch Stop Shipping Service Because of British Restriction

Amsterdam, Oct. 15.—The Measbode says it learns that all Dutch shipping to England has been stopped on account of the pending difficulties between Great Britain and Holland.

ENEMY HARVEST LESS THAN HALF NORMAL

Much Depends on Potato Crop-Worse Even in Austria-Hungary Than in Germany

London, Oct. 14—The Press Association, from a reliable source, publishes an economic review of the condition of the Central Powers, in the course of which it says that, as a result of a special investigation of the 1917 harvest as ordered by the chancellor, it is estimated that ed by the chancellor, it is estimated that the yield will be forty per cent lower than in normal years for wheat and forty-five per cent for rye, oats and bar-ley. The total harvest of wheat and rye amounts to 7,500,000 tons, compared to 18,000,0400 tons in 1918. The shortage will be partly compensated from the

Roumanian grainaries.

The reviewer considers that the food situation in Germany during the coming winter will depend mainly on the results of the potato harvest. At present potatoes are being delivered with fair regularity but should frost, lack of labor or other reasons cause a shortage in pota-toes, it may well spell disaster. The situation in Austria-Hungary, it is de-clared, is worse than in Germany.

A COMPLAINT ABOUT THE PATRIOTIC FUND AND AN EXPLANATION


