FRENCH CAVALRY WIN GREAT NAME IN FIGHT

Joffrey's Infantry, Too, Now Are Slayed "All Veterans"—Spirited Tactics Fighting Are Brought to Paris by Wounded

Paris, Sept. 30.—"It was by no means easy work," said one of the wounded at the Grand Palais Hospital, in describing the battle of Champagne on Saturday.

"Never have we seen anything like their hurled wire entanglements. Our shells ploughed up thousands of stakes but there was an immense number left which we had to pull up, under the enemy's fire. The wire was so thick that it was extremely hard to cut. In many places our attacking columns came against chevaux de frise behind which the Germans lurked. We felt them with bombs as hard as we could and the sappers who came behind us did the rest."

"The machine guns which stormed us—that you saw so many of us were hit in the legs—were soon put out of business. Then our cavalry turned up. They had gone so long without a chance to fight on horseback that they were keen to get into it. It was a fine dash, and the Germans bolted on all sides. What they left behind in the way of material, arms, effects and equipment was unimagined. Their flight turned into a panic when they saw our African contingents. Our shells ploughed up thousands of stakes but there was an immense number left which we had to pull up, under the enemy's fire. The wire was so thick that it was extremely hard to cut. In many places our attacking columns came against chevaux de frise behind which the Germans lurked. We felt them with bombs as hard as we could and the sappers who came behind us did the rest."

Germans Admit Being Hard Hit In Fighting In West

Copenhagen, Sept. 30.—"News of the offensive on the western front is taken very seriously here," says the Berlin correspondent of the Politikon. "The Tagblatt remarks that nothing would be more foolish than to overlook the terrible seriousness of the battles in the west, and that it would be equally wrong for Germans not to have fullest confidence in their troops and leaders."

Geneva, Sept. 30.—The Pan-American Straitsburg Post, in commenting on the British victory in Northern France, says: "We must, undoubtedly, acknowledge the bravery of this adversary. In the Champagne also our losses unapparently have been heavy, notably prisoners. In French warfare captures are unavoidable when men remain to the end. It is not a necessary rule that our losses are heavy, but they are correct. Our losses are painful, but are compensated for by results."

NOT ENOUGH RECRUITS COMING, SAYS KITCHENER; LAIS MILITARY BALLOT

London, Sept. 30.—Preference for continuation of the volunteer system is said to have been expressed by Earl Kitchener at a meeting of labor executives yesterday, addressed by the war secretary. He said, however, that the present rate of recruiting was not equal to the needs.

Earl Kitchener explained that his own plan, which had not yet been authorized by the government, was to apply the system of the military ballot. Every district would be required to furnish its quota of men. In case this quota could not be obtained by voluntary enlistment, the required number would be selected by ballot among the men of military age, and the enlistment of those chosen, would be compulsory. The secretary added there had been no slackening of the pressure to bring out recruits.

French Have Grip On Second Line Of German Defences

Paris, Sept. 30.—In continuation of the general offensive movement on the western front, the French have captured an important defensive work of the Germans south of Ripont. This was officially announced by the war office today.

In the Champagne the French troops have gained a footing at various points on the German second line of defences. The best of the communication lines was cut. The only resistance of the enemy in the Artois district has been a very violent bombardment of our new positions to the east of Souchez.

In the Champagne district we have secured a footing at several points in the trenches of the second line of defences to the west of Belle De Thauray, and to the west of the Marais farm. At this latter point detachments of our troops made their way through and resolutely advanced beyond the German lines, but it was impossible for them to maintain this advance because of a certain fire maintained by the German artillery as well as a very violent flanking fire. Our men, however, held firmly the points conquered by them on the second line of the enemy.

To the south of Ripont, we have enlarged and completed our conquest of the first line German positions, by taking possession of a portion of the important supporting works known locally as the 'ouvrage de la descente' (the descent railway).

In the region of Compiègne on the right bank of the Marne, the enemy attacked several times. At first all attacks were repulsed, but with the aid of reinforcements the enemy continued to repulse the Russians in the region of the Marne. The village of Novo Alexinac was three times attacked by the enemy on Tuesday, under cover of a hurricane of artillery fire. The enemy was repulsed on every occasion by the Russian concentrated artillery and rifle fire.

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VON HINDENBERG BRINGS UP FRESH FORCES AGAINST THE RUSSIANS

London, Sept. 30.—The Petrograd correspondent of The Times says that, according to prevailing opinion in Russian military circles, Field Marshal von Hindenburg, regardless of the menace to Germany's western front, has brought up fresh forces at Osmiana and is preparing another blow at the Russian right wing in order to sweep southward in an effort to bar the route of relief for the Muscovite Baronich army.

For this reason, the correspondent says, the general staff emphasizes the importance of the line drawn from Vilenka to Ivenets, thirty-five miles from Vinsk, as Von Hindenburg's real objective. The crossing of the Strv by large Tatar forces and the revival of the offensive at Kozki, also constitute a new and formidable factor with which General Ivanoff must reckon.

Army of The Crown Prince Now In Danger

Two British Generals Gave Up Lives In Great Drive In West

London, Sept. 30.—The British casualties on the western front include Lt. General Sir Thompson Capper and Major-General G. H. Theagar, both killed.

General Thompson, who was born in 1858, commanded the thirteenth infantry brigade, from 1911 to 1914. He had been awarded the distinguished service order and several other medals for his gallantry.

General Theagar had been promoted several times since the war began. He was born in 1868, and was the son of Lt. General C. W. Theagar. He served in the Nile expedition 1898, and in the South African war. He was inspector-general of the King's African Rifles from 1908 to 1913.

New Orleans Swept by 130 Miles An Hour Wind; Much Destruction

New Orleans, La., Sept. 30.—Ten persons are known to have been killed, 150 injured, and property loss exceeding five million dollars, caused by a destructive West Indian hurricane, which struck this city at six o'clock last night. At intervals a terrific gale swept through the city at a velocity of 120 to 180 miles an hour.

Galveston, Texas, Sept. 30.—A wireless message received here from New Orleans, stated that at an early hour the water in the streets was receding rapidly, and that the river was also going down. This message reported the number of dead in New Orleans at five. Indications were, the message said, that the damage to property had been considerable.

GENERAL HUGHES WIRE MR. FORD CONFIRMS NEWS OF MASSACRE OF ARMENIANS

London, Sept. 30.—Additional details of what are characterized as "wholesale massacres of Armenians in Asia Minor" sent by the Times' Cairo correspondent. He asserts that three of those slain had long been intimate friends of Talat Pasha, Turkish minister of war. In this list was included Madian Effendi, formerly minister of agriculture.

Refugees report that in many cases the Armenian population resisted the deportation order. In one instance 4,000 of them are said to have taken refuge in the hills and resisted the Turks for seven weeks. Similar resistance has been organized in other places, but in the end and colonies it is held to be almost hopeless.

TORREON CAPTURED BY GENERAL OBBREGON

Vera Cruz, Sept. 30.—The city of Torreon fell to General Obregon late yesterday, according to a brief telegram to General Carranza.

GAFFNEY NOW TO LECTURE ON BEHALF OF GERMANS. London, Sept. 30.—The Morning Post-Berlin correspondent says he learns from Munich, that T. St. John Gaffney, American consul general in Munich, has decided to resign and go on a lecture tour in the United States, on behalf of Germany.

SOLDIER WRITES MAYOR

In a letter to Mayor Frink, Wilfred K. Kelly, of No. 3 Company, C.A.C., says that the company was about to leave "for parts unknown." The letter was not dated. He says he and the other St. John boys are well and are looking forward to the new experiences. Speaking of tobacco supplies, he says they hear a lot about the quantity being sent over, but so far they have not seen very many gift cigarettes.

MILITARY IN FRANCE TAKE FIRST CALL ON CABLES. London, Sept. 30.—An announcement that may be fraught with significance because of the military activity in France, was made by the cable companies here today. The French administration has given notice that, on account of military necessities, cablegrams to France and through that country will be subject to indefinite delay.

THE SITUATION IN GREECE

London, Sept. 30.—An Athens despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company filed yesterday says: "Bills proclaiming a state of siege in Macedonia, providing help for the families of men called to the colors, and providing a credit of \$20,000,000 to meet the expenses of mobilization, were enthusiastically applauded and voted at a sitting of the chamber today. Premier Venizelos, who was given an ovation, gave the reasons why Greece was obliged to mobilize and emphasized the gravity of the situation. Former Premier Gounaris expressed his approval of M. Venizelos' declaration."

MOBILIZATION IN GREECE RATIFIED. Athens, Sept. 30.—The Greek chamber in a special session yesterday ratified the action of the government in decreeing a general mobilization of the army and authorized a loan of \$80,000,000.

MAY SLEEP IN THE EXHIBITION BUILDING

No definite word has as yet been received in this city as to when the infantry battalion which is to be stationed here for the winter will reach the city. It is expected that the time is near at hand. The nights are getting very cool for sleeping under canvas.

The idea is held among local military men that the exhibition buildings will be used for sleeping by the men, while the new army will be a recreation centre and probably a mess room for both officers and men. This is understood to be the recommendation of physicians who have reported upon the sanitary and ventilating conditions, believing that it is better to have 1,100 men in the more spacious exhibition buildings than the quarters provided at the army.

RETURNING MEN TO BE EMPLOYED

All Fit For Service Will Be Put on Guard Duty—Orders From Ottawa

Montreal, Sept. 30.—Particular care is being taken now by the Department of Militia that Canadian soldiers invalided home who are at all fit for service shall be given military employment. Many of the men coming back are no longer in shape for active service, but still sound enough for guard duty and it is proposed to give the men employment in this work. In this way the returned soldiers will not only be looked after, but they will take the places of other men fit for active service at the front.

In accordance with this idea the following letter has been received by Colonel E. W. Wilson, O.C., 4th Division, from Brig-Gen. W. E. Hodgins, Adjutant-General:

"I have the honor to state by instruction, that after their return from service overseas, members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who have been honorably discharged as invalided may be employed in Canada on guard duty, provided that they are fit for such employment and join the active militia, and it is intended that they should relieve militiamen who are now in performance of such duty.

"You will also please do everything in your power to make use of such returned soldiers whenever possible for any light military duties which they may be able to perform, giving them the first opportunity, wherever possible."

In accordance with these instructions prompt action was taken by Col. Wilson and already several returned soldiers have been sent to join the composites for guard duty.

Colonel Wilson said that this was an excellent move to look after the returning men as a number of them were quite fit for guard duty, although not in shape for service at the front, and their services would prove of value while they would also take the places of men going to the front.

THE WAR NEWS.

A line in the late despatches yesterday afternoon strengthened the belief that the fighting on the western front is more than a flash in the pan, however brilliant.

Field Marshal Sir John French, in reply to a congratulatory message sent him by London's Lord Mayor, said the cheering message encouraged his troops "to push the immediate success to a really decisive issue."

There is an important feature in the statement that the German Crown Prince's lines of communication are in danger. That opens up immense possibilities. Could he be isolated and defeated, a great step towards final victory would be taken.

A GREAT BEGINNING. Kitchener's new army has stood the test. It was well represented in the recent great fighting which swept the Germans back, and added a new and thrilling chapter to the story of British valor and victory.

Not less brilliant was the charge of the gallant Frenchmen, at that point of the German line selected for their attack. An amazing part of their achievement was the capture of more than 28,000 prisoners, and this shows, as the correspondent points out, what they will do to the Germans when they get them in the open.

Last night's cables said that the German Emperor had dismissed some of his generals, but if he pursues that policy every time his armies meet with a reverse from this time forward 'his stock of generals will be likely to run out in a few months.

And yet it would be folly to entertain hope of a speedy termination of the war. Germany still has several millions of fighting men, and is still carrying on the struggle outside of the borders of her own country.

There is a thrilling moment in some respects the most remarkable streets of recruiting was held in the Seaman's Institute last evening. A Catholic clergyman and a Presbyterian minister, who is an Ulster man, were the speakers of the evening, and when at the close of the minister's speech the priest crossed the platform to take his hand and congratulate him upon his brilliant address, the audience were thrilled by a sudden and new emotion, that found expression in prolonged applause.

Rev. Father Carney in his eloquent address set forth with great clearness and force the reason why we are at war, and the fact that this is Canada's war, and St. John's war, and dwell upon the

fact that in this righteous struggle there are no differences of race or of religion to divide the Canadian people. Rev. Captain Harrison rejoiced that he stood on the same platform with Father Carney, and force was added to his own appeal by the fact that he had been a member of the famous expeditionary force which marched to Khartoum just too late to save the life of General Gordon; and that now in New Brunswick he asks the sons of this province to go with him in another expeditionary force, and not to delay their enlistment, lest, as in the case of the Gordon relief expedition, they arrive too late to give the relief they ought to give to their Canadian brothers already in the trenches.

Long life to Father Carney and the Rev. Captain Harrison. May their broad-minded and single-hearted devotion prove an inspiration to every Canadian.

The committee which is seeking to secure music for recruiting meetings is having its own troubles to secure volunteers. Why? "Kitchener's Army" has been in its first important engagement and correspondents pay tribute to the manner in which officers and men upheld the best traditions of the British in the field.

We are beginning to hear of the price paid for the recent successes of our armies on the western front. The first announcements of casualties contain a report of the death of two British leaders, a lieutenant general and a major-general.

Such stirring meetings as those of last night, taken in conjunction with the glorious news from the battlefield, should be a stimulus to recruiting. There is a duty to be done, there is glory to be won. The instant call comes from overseas to back up the brave men who are so gallantly fighting for empire and home.

Happily the water supply situation in St. John last evening, for a time serious, was quickly relieved by energetic work on the part of Commissioner Wigmore and his men. For an hour or two the city was actually without service, and naturally the thoughts of those who knew what had occurred, turned to fire and the grim possibilities of an outbreak. Fortunately nothing so tragic occurred.

The news of the British victory in Mesopotamia came with the force of a surprise, and the press reports regard it as evidence that a new expeditionary force must have been sent into that country, possibly including Italian as well as British troops. The Turkish losses are said to have been very severe, and many guns as well as prisoners were taken.

Mr. John T. Hawker, who will address a recruiting meeting at the Seaman's Institute this evening, has delivered several addresses in Westmorland, Kent and Albert counties, and has also done much by his public utterances to arouse interest in and secure contributions for the Belgian Relief Fund. An Englishman himself, though now for many years a prominent New Brunswick journalist, he is admirably qualified to discuss the subject with which he will deal tonight.

The organization of neighborhood committees in different parts of the city to promote recruiting is a very proper sequence of the general meetings that have been held to arouse public sentiment and set fully and clearly before the people the issues of the war. Mr. H. H. McEllan and his friends who decided at the meeting in Victoria Park last evening to organize a committee of twenty-five for that section of the city, and to hold a regular series of meetings, have set an example which should be followed in every other section. The Times has long advocated the organization of neighborhoods for social welfare work, and there could be no finer beginning than in calling the people together, regardless of race or creed or political party, to labor for the maintenance of that social freedom which means so much to our Canadian life.

TWO ARRESTS AS SUSPECTS IN PORTLAND MURDER CASE

Portland, Me., Sept. 30.—The police have taken into custody two negroes who are suspected of having killed William E. St. John, a watchman whose body was found in a wholesale and retail hardware and sporting goods store in Monument Square.

Alexander McRae, of Providence, R. I., who was taken from a freight train from this city at Rumford Junction, and Joseph Jackson of Richmond, Va., who was taken into custody in a house in Deer street, were said to answer the descriptions of two men who were seen through a Congress street fruit store from the rear of the hardware store a little before the watchman's body was found.

Several new automatic revolvers, a shield and other tools which are missing from the store, are alleged to have been found on McRae.

St. John pulled his box at 8.22, and his failure to pull again led to the discovery of the murder. Three shots were fired at him and he was hit in both arms and in the back. Two colored men were seen in the store at 8.30, and it is the theory of the police that they managed to escape observation until after the store was closed and when found by the watchman shot him.

According to the Lewiston police who arrested McRae, the latter said he and a partner have been giving boxing exhibitions and conducting an "African Dodge" booth at county fairs during the last few weeks.

Offensive Continues

French Have Reached Hill 140—Heaviest Fighting Where British Are Pounding Germans' Third Line—Morning War Summary

London, Sept. 29.—The Allies' great offensive in Artois and the Champagne is still being persevered in and, according to the French statement, further progress has been made in both areas.

In Artois the French claim to have reached Hill No. 140, which lies directly east of Vimy, and is the culminating point of the crest named after that town. The importance of the hill lies in the fact that it commands the plains to the east, the network of roads and the railway which runs from Lens southward.

So far as Champagne is concerned, the French appear, at present, to be making their effort towards the railway junction north of Massige, which accounts for the desperate efforts of the Germans to stem the tide, and for the crown prince's counter stroke in the Argonne, as this railway connects the German army in the Argonne with its base at Vouleurs.

Perhaps the heaviest fighting since the offensive began is now going on, for the British are attacking the German third line of defence, south of La Bassée Canal, and the Germans have brought up reinforcements against both the British and the French and are making every effort to retrieve the last ground. Belgium, despatches from Holland say, has been despatched troops while German detachments are even being removed from the eastern front to meet what is now known to be the greatest effort made in the west since the armistice took up their present positions from Belgium to Switzerland.

The Germans are trying to divert the Allies by a heavy bombardment north and south of the Aisne, but plans having been made by General Joffre, the French are striking with all the forces at their command at the points selected. It is reported that the German emperor has arrived at the western front, and he has already dismissed some of his generals for allowing their lines to be pressed back to almost the breaking point.

Despite the transfer of some troops to the west, the Germans continue to strike hard at the Russians, practically all along their front. Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is directing heavy strokes against Drinsk, while his colleague on his right is pushing forward to the west of Vilka and Molotchno in an attempt to turn the Russian position, and has now reached a point to the north of Minsk, while another army is advancing up from the southwest.

Field Marshal Von Mackensen and Prince Leopold of Bavaria apparently are inactive, owing, doubtless, to the marches which are impracticable, but General Van Lindegen is still pressing hard on the Russians in Volhynia.

It is expected that the weather will soon put an end to the operations in the east, as with little continued rains the rivers cannot be forded and the Russians, wherever possible, are getting behind them.

These Turkish Armies Dispersed

The British have inflicted another serious defeat on the Turks in Mesopotamia. The Tigris army, after suffering heavy losses, is in full retreat. The three armies which the Turks sent to Mesopotamia against the Anglo-Indian invaders, have been scattered. The army of the Karun was driven back from Kurra to north of Amara, the army of the Karun was driven back from Ahwas, and the army of the Euphrates was last heard of in the north of the river, somewhere north of Nairi.

It is again reported that an Austro-German army, 800,000 strong, is assembling for an offensive against Serbia.

HON. MR. COCHRANE ON 8,400 MILE TRIP

Minister of Railways Averaged Over 400 Miles a Day on His Western Tour—Denies G. T. P. Rumor

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 30.—By the time Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways and canals, gets back to Ottawa some time during this week, he will have covered 8,400 miles of Canadian railway.

Mr. Cochrane has made a complete inspection trip of the new railways and terminals in western Canada. He went to Mile 297 on the Hudson Bay Railway but had to return to The Pass, owing to a sink hole on the road and also because he wanted to reach Winnipeg this morning.

During his western trip he has averaged forty miles every traveling day. Speaking of the Hudson Bay Railway he said that the work was progressing, but said that a couple of bad sink holes had delayed progress somewhat. He hoped, however, that the road would be ready for operation next year. J. D. McArthur, the contractor for the line, accompanied the party.

Referring to his trip west over the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern Railways, Mr. Cochrane expressed himself as being well satisfied with the roads, but that, of course, there was considerable work still to be done to make them of a permanent character. The C. N. R., he said would be able to open very soon.

The minister was somewhat concerned over the progress being made with the crop. "It is a wonderful crop, if you can only save it," was his remark. "The weather has been very bad. As we came along we could see miles of wheat in the stock being held up by the poor weather. The railways are able to care for it as fast as the farmers can get it threshed. The weather has been so bad in some places that the farmers haven't even been able to stack."

The minister went east to Fort Williams over the Transcontinental to inspect the terminals at the head of the lakes. He was accompanied by P. F. Co-

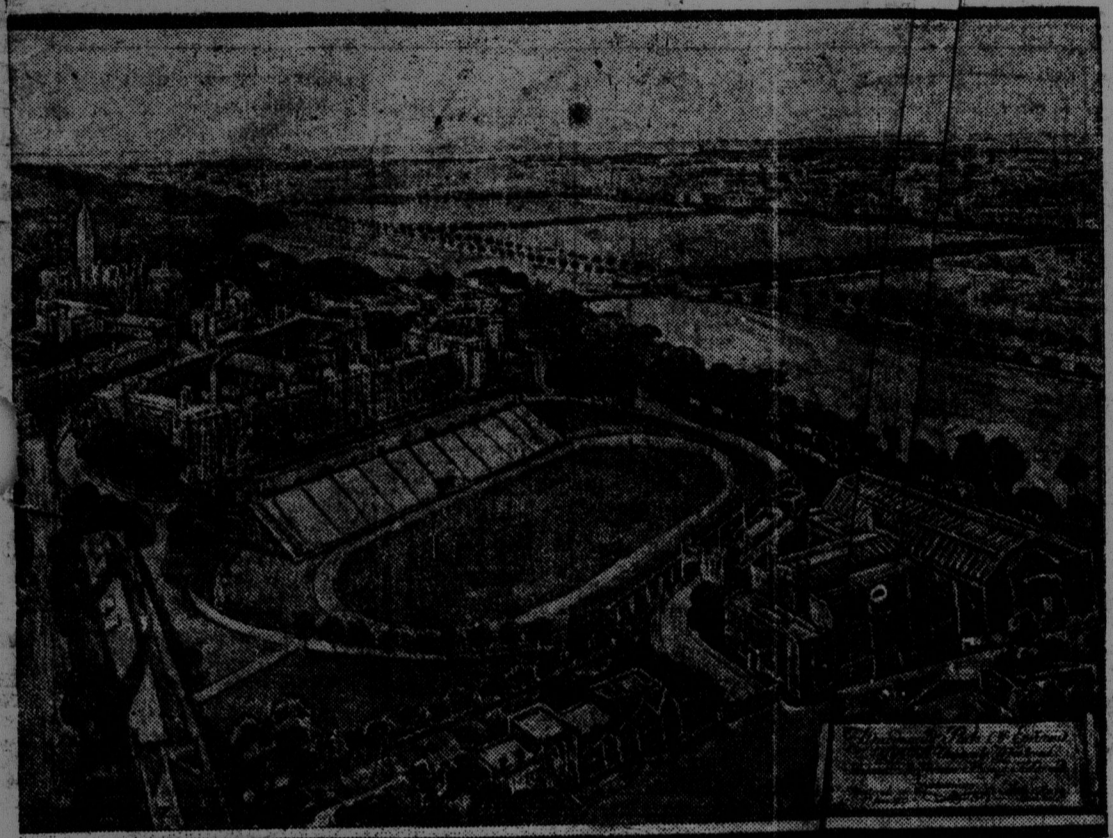

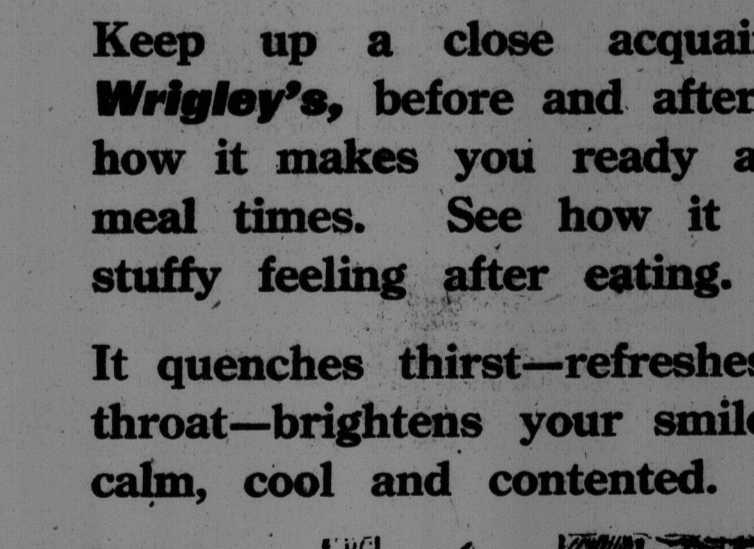

One of Best Singers St. John Has Produced—Had Been Ill Long Time
 The death of Miss Mary F. Coholan took place this morning at her residence in Main street, after a lengthy illness. She was a daughter of John and the late Alice Coholan. Besides her father she is survived by one brother, John F. Coholan, who is in the employ of the I. C. R., and two sisters, Mrs. Alexander McMillan, and Miss Nellie Coholan. The former is organist in Holy Trinity Church, and the latter in St. John the Baptist Church.
 Miss Coholan was a talented musician, and was one of the leading sopranos in the maritime provinces. When a young girl she showed exceptional talent and her singing attracted the attention of many. After studying in this city for some years, she went to Boston and there received lessons from a famous singing professor, Eichberg.
 After returning home, Miss Coholan sang at dedications of churches throughout the province, and also frequently appeared on the concert platform. Everywhere she was well received and her singing called forth much praise. She had a voice of great volume and musical sweetness. She was ever ready to assist at concerts for charitable purposes and became extremely popular.
 For some years Miss Coholan was leading soprano in St. Peter's church. Also she sang in the Cathedral choir and a few years ago she was soloist in the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Montreal, and immigration chaplain at Quebec and Halifax.
 Three years ago her health began to fail and she was forced to discontinue singing. Since that time she had been confined to her home and was a host of friends not only in this city but throughout the maritime provinces, who will sincerely regret to hear of her death.

NEW PRIEST-IN-CHARGE AT THE MISSION CHURCH

Rev. J. V. Young Coming Here From Mapleton, P. Q.
 The trustees of the Mission Church have appointed Rev. John Young as priest-in-charge of the Mission Church. He is at present rector of Mapleton, P. Q., and has been at the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Montreal, and immigration chaplain at Quebec and Halifax.
 Mrs. Young will be no stranger to St. John, as she was born here, a daughter of Dr. J. P. Hamilton of Montreal, but who lived here and was an attendant and trustee of the Mission Church. Rev. Mr. Young will arrive in St. John to take up his duties the middle of November.

HALF BROTHER OF DR. COX FOUGHT UNDER BOTH IN AFRICA

Fredericton, Sept. 30.—Matthew J. Cox of Manchester, half brother of Dr. Philip Cox of the U.N.B., served under General Botha in his recent campaign in German Southwest Africa. Writing under date of August 15, he says he was at Octavia when the Germans surrendered to Botha. The enemy had 2,500 regulars, 2,800 civilians, thirty-eight field guns, forty-eight machine guns and sufficient ammunition to carry on for two years. They also had 25,000 cases of rum, or 8,000 bottles.
 A German major told Cox that the wells had been poisoned by civilians. Some Germans out there, he says, believe that their army has captured London and will soon send reinforcements to retake their country from the British.

ROMLEY CASE TO THE JURY THIS AFTERNOON

The trial of the case of the King v. Mary Romley took place in the circuit court this morning. The prisoner was indicted by the grand jury on a charge of wounding with intent to do grievous bodily harm to William T. Hanley. The witnesses examined at the preliminary hearing gave practically the same testimony. The prisoner herself was the only witness examined for the defence. She was drunk, she said, and failed to remember anything of the affair. E. S. Ritchie addressed the jury for the defence and Attorney-General Baxter for the crown. The judge's charge will be given this afternoon following which the case will go to the jury.
