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A CONVENTION OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES

Announcement at Fredericton—St. John Representatives on Committee.

Fredericton, N. B., June 30.—It was announced at this morning's session of the Educational Institute of New Brunswick that a convention of school trustees would be held in the province soon.

The first matter to come before this morning's session of the institute was the election of the executive.

Of the twenty-four nominated the ten elected were Dr. B. C. Foster and A. S. McFarlane, Fredericton; Dr. H. S. Bridges, St. John; G. Oulton, Moncton; P. A. Dixon, Sussex; D. W. Wallace, Woodstock; G. P. Harrison, Chatham; W. J. Myles, St. John; Miss Beattie M. Fraser, Grand Falls; Miss Louise M. Scott, Fredericton and Miss C. M. Caldwell, Miss Sadie Thomson was elected representative of the institute on the Senate of the U. N. B.

The text book committee is composed of Dr. H. S. Bridges, W. J. Myles and J. Frank Owens, St. John; G. C. Oulton, Moncton; H. H. Hagerman and A. S. McFarlane, Fredericton and Miss Caldwell, Miss Sadie Thomson was elected representative of the institute on the Senate of the U. N. B.



Berlin, June 30.—Food disturbances occurred in the central markets here yesterday and several arrests were made. A large body of women marched to the chancellery and vainly sought an interview with Chancellor Fehrenbach, to protest against the higher cost of food.

At Frankfurt there were additional disorders. Five persons were killed in the recent riots in Hamburg, according to an official report. During disturbances at Wurzburg yesterday the troops fired wounding several persons.





**INTERESTING PAPERS HEARD BY TEACHERS**

Fredericton, N. B., June 30.—When parental influence is on the side of the teachers there seldom is any trouble in the schools, said Prof. Sinclair Laird, dean of the school for teachers, McDonald College, Montreal, addressing the Teachers' Institute of New Brunswick here last evening. He urged closer co-operation between parents and school children and more regard for the development of the individual lives of the pupils than for mere passing of examinations.

Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, provincial minister of public health, spoke on the relationship between public schools and public health.

In the afternoon I. W. Shinn of St. John urged greater attention to vocational training and a paper by Mrs. R. A. Jamieson of St. John on the parent's view of the proper relation between school and home was read by Dr. H. S. Bridges in the absence of Mrs. Jamieson.

Fletcher Peacock, director of vocational training for New Brunswick, expressed his great appreciation for Mr. Shinn's address.

Dr. George B. Oulton, of Moncton, asked what the connection is between vocational training and the schools.

A. J. Brooks, school inspector for the county of Kings, thought that the need of vocational training should first be pointed out before it was carried on.

The next number was a paper by Mrs. R. A. Jamieson, of St. John, on the subject of "The proper relation between the school and the home, from the parent's point of view." In the absence of Mrs. Jamieson the paper was read by Dr. H. S. Bridges, of St. John. This paper was read at the St. John county institute at its last meeting.

**SAID TO BE KING OF DRUG GANG**

In the police court yesterday afternoon a case against Laurent Delisle, charged with having in his possession morphine and cocaine for other than medicinal purposes, was resumed. Dr. F. R. Taylor, K.C., who is acting for the department of justice, said that the authorities at Ottawa suspected the accused to be king of a gang which is carrying on an illegal sale of drugs. William E. Haslam, customs appraiser, said that in December 1919 the accused arrived on the S. S. Empress of France and he had several pieces of baggage with him but he told the officials it had not all been taken aboard. On examination it was found that the bag contained white crystals which the accused said was sulphate of quinine but said later there was morphine among the goods. J. H. Dr. Glover remarked that he was satisfied that the woman's life had been prolonged.



### GEORGE CARVELL MATTER TAKEN UP IN COMMONS

A. B. Copp Brings up St.  
John Man's Case

Demand in House for Com-  
mission of Inquiry—Not  
Necessary, is Declaration of  
Railways Minister, Who  
Says Not Slightest Suspi-  
cion Ever Rested on Mr.  
Carvell.

The matter of George Carvell and the  
I. C. R. was given attention in the House  
of Commons at Ottawa last week  
brought up by A. B. Copp, M. P. of  
Westmorland. The following is taken  
from the Hansard report:

Mr. Copp brought up the matter of  
the dismissal of railway officials in St.  
John in 1917. He said that the matter  
had been taken up by two cabinet min-  
isters and one, if not two, private mem-  
bers in St. John had been before the de-  
partment of railways with regard to it,  
and he had now been placed in his hands.  
He said he referred to the dismissal  
of Mr. Carvell, who had been ticket  
agent for the Canadian Government Rail-  
way for eighteen years and who had  
been summarily dismissed after four  
days notice, and who was now asking

for an investigation into the causes of  
his dismissal.

A few days prior to his dismissal a  
burglary had taken place in the railway  
ticket office in St. John and the Inter-  
colonial police and the St. John police  
carried on an investigation which was  
called off and Mr. Carvell dismissed.  
Both Mr. Carvell and his wife felt keenly  
the implication that he was mixed  
up with the burglary, which was in the  
minds of some people of St. John. Mr.  
Carvell contended that he should have  
been reinstated.

Mr. Copp took the position that a man  
who had given service for eighteen years  
and against whom no complaint had been  
made, had a right to have his case en-  
quired into when he believed himself to  
have been dismissed without cause. It  
was a gross injustice that blackened his  
character and reputation and had no  
opportunity of defending himself. It  
was unfair on the part of the officials;  
he did not blame the minister.

The hon. member asked repeatedly for  
the railway department to appoint a com-  
missioner that he might give evidence  
under oath and clear himself, but this  
has been denied him. Mr. Copp said he  
wanted the minister to assure him that  
Mr. Carvell would have an opportunity  
of stating his case before a commission.  
If he could not clear himself, then he  
must take the responsibility.

J. D. Reid said that the late Hon. Mr.  
Cochrane had written Mr. Hayes on May  
24, 1917, asking him to look into the  
matter personally and let him have a  
detailed statement of the case.

Mr. Reid said—"Mr. Carvell had been  
for a number of years ticket agent at  
St. John and the records show that in  
the performance of the duties he was  
careless and negligent. Previous to this  
heft his work had not been of a satis-  
factory character, and the officials of the  
department had drawn his attention to  
the fact that he was not attending to  
business in a proper manner. Later on  
the theft, which resulted in the loss of  
several hundred dollars took place from  
the ticket office. The railway officials  
believed that Mr. Carvell was not looking  
after the office as well as he should, and  
that probably owing to his carelessness  
this theft occurred; but there is nothing  
to show that at that time or since they  
ever entertained the slightest belief that  
Mr. Carvell was guilty, or that they  
suspected him in any way of being con-  
nected with the theft. In fact they ex-  
onerated him of that in every possible  
way."

"Neither did the late Mr. Cochrane be-  
lieve that Mr. Carvell had anything to  
do with the theft. Having informed Mr.  
Carvell, or his friends, that no suspicion  
of the kind was responsible for his dis-  
missal, the late Mr. Cochrane thought he  
had done all that he could to clear Mr.  
Carvell's reputation in the matter. Mr.  
Carvell has brought the subject to my  
attention, and to the attention of other  
members of the government, and in order  
as the hon. member has just stated, to  
clear his reputation before the public  
These ministers whom he wrote have  
been shown the file containing the docu-  
ments relating to the case, and after  
looking over it they have concluded that  
no other action could have been taken  
than has been adopted up to the pres-  
ent time."

"My hon. friend does not ask that this  
man be reinstated; he simply asks that  
he be freed from any suspicion of theft.  
But he wants a commissioner appointed  
to take evidence in the matter. If there  
is any suspicion on the part of the peo-  
ple of St. John that this man had any-  
thing to do with the theft, I want to tell  
them that the officials of the railway in-  
vestigation had had the impression  
that he had anything to do with the  
theft. They absolved him from all blame  
so far as that is concerned, though they  
thought that he was careless in his  
duties. I repeat that they never be-  
lieved that he had anything to do with  
the theft, and as the Minister of Rail-  
ways representing the government, I  
say the same thing now. I have gone  
over the file several times, and I do not  
believe that Mr. Carvell had anything to  
do with that theft. If I can do anything  
further to clear his reputation, why I  
want to do it. I have never seen him or  
any of his family; I do not know any-  
thing about them. But we do not in any  
way implicate him; his character is per-  
fectly free so far as that incident is con-  
cerned. What would be the use in my  
appointing a commissioner to go down  
and take evidence, and hear some people  
swear that he had nothing to do with  
the matter? The statements that I have  
made here tonight should be sufficient  
to free him from any suspicion; there  
should be no necessity for further ex-  
planation. I hope, therefore, that if the  
people of St. John have any belief  
that kind they will remove it from their  
minds and let Mr. Carvell go about the  
city as an upright and honorable citizen."

Mr. Copp at this point said that he  
would like to clear Mr. Carvell from any  
suspicion in the matter and that there  
is only one way in which he could be  
cleared.

Hon. Mr. Reid: "I state here and  
now that the officials of the railway,  
whether at St. John or Moncton, never  
even insinuated so far as I know—"

Mr. Reid: "At all events the records  
on file show that they never insinuated  
that Mr. Carvell had anything to do  
with the theft. Now, if a commission  
is appointed to investigate the matter  
something might be said that might be  
interpreted in an entirely different way.  
If the hon. member will say what em-  
ploys make the statement to which he  
refers, we will take care of them; we will  
find out why they make those state-  
ments. But unless some evidence is  
forthcoming that such statements are  
being made surely this man's character  
cannot be more effectively cleared than  
by the statement which I have just  
made on behalf of the employees at St.  
John, Moncton or anywhere else on the  
railway. Why should we go to the ex-  
pense of holding an investigation?"

Mr. Copp said that in spite of the  
fact that it had been contended that  
Mr. Carvell was dismissed for incompet-  
ency, he had received information that  
three months prior to his dismissal, Mr.  
Carvell's salary had been increased by  
Mr. Hayes on a previous occasion he  
was asked to accept a position outside  
St. John with the intimation that he  
was being paid all that could be paid in  
the St. John office but that Mr. Hayes  
would be prepared to give him a posi-  
tion outside with greater responsibility,  
and at a higher salary.

Mr. Copp said that, writing to the  
minister of railways, Mr. Hayes said that  
the removal of Mr. Carvell was not en-  
tirely due to recent developments but  
rather to general incompetency. It might  
be inferred that Mr. Hayes was using  
two strings to his bow, that is the man  
was guilty of burglary he should be dis-  
missed and if he was not guilty, he  
should be dismissed any way on the  
grounds of incompetency. His case  
should be investigated at the time, and  
if the department did not feel like pay-  
ing to the expense of paying for a com-  
mission to investigate the case, Mr. Copp  
was of the opinion that Mr. Carvell's  
friends would bear the cost.

Mr. Copp said that Mr. Carvell had  
explained that on the night in question  
he was absent from the office until ten  
o'clock, ticketing military trains at the  
station.

It is stated that the change has been effected by the elimination of the Fort Arthur Ship-

building Co. and the Canada Foundries and Forgings Co., Ltd.

16-YEAR OLD BOY TO RUN FOR JAPAN IN OLYMPIC MARATHON (New York Times)

Although long distance running among schoolboys is not generally encouraged in this country, for reason of the doubtful physical benefit resulting, a different idea prevails in Japan, where the chief representative of the country in the Olympic Marathon will be a sixteen-year-old boy. The youth's name is K. Yashima, and he is said to be possessed of remarkable stamina. In a trial race in Japan he won the Marathon event in two hours thirty-six minutes and 54.5 seconds, a remarkable performance for one of his youth.

**PLANS FOR NEWMAN BROOK SEWER MAIN**  
The workmen of the water and sewerage department have been at work all this week, deepening the Newman Brook, in order to make the drainage of sewage from that vicinity more complete. **LOUIS J. KING GUARD KILLED IN MICHIGAN**  
Riot Follows All Night Meeting Addressed by King, Who Says He is Former Priest.  
Toledo, June 30—Albert Sherman, living near Port Huron, Mich., was arrested yesterday charged with the killing of Walter Gilday of Erie, Mich., on Sunday night, during a riot at North Whitford, Mich. He is alleged to have fired the shot which killed Gilday, following an all night meeting addressed by Louis J. King, who says he is a former priest and devotes his time to speeches against the Catholic church.  
Sherman who was acting as a temporary officer to guard King, against whom there was high feeling says he shot in self defence.  
A man named Louis King caused excitement in St. John some fifteen or more years ago when he addressed meetings here on religious matters. At that time there was nearly a serious disturbance.

**MORE BUILDING THAN IN 1919**  
Total Above Half Million for Six Months—The June Permits.  
Building permits covering construction costing more than a half million dollars have been issued in the city during the six months which ended today. The cost of the work for which permits have been issued since the first of the year is \$525,000, compared with \$60,000 for the same period in 1919.  
During June this year the total cost of work for which permits have been issued is \$213,300, as compared with \$9,500 for June last year, and including the construction of a concrete foundation and floor for the sugar warehouse of the Atlantic Sugar Refineries which will amount to \$200,000.  
Other permits issued this month are: Frederick King, stable, St. James street, \$3,000.  
N. A. Hornbrook, apartments, Peters street, \$5,700.  
Horace Hoyt, dwelling, Brittain street, \$4,500.  
The work at the sugar refinery will include the driving of piling and laying of a concrete floor and foundation under the present sugar warehouse, which is located on the wharf property alongside the plant at Ballast Wharf.  
Twenty-seven repair permits were also issued during June.

**ONE SIX YEARS; ANOTHER THREE**  
Judges Armstrong and Barry Mete Out Sentences in Stealing Cases.  
In the County Court His Honor Judge Armstrong this morning passed a sentence of six years in Dorchester upon Murray Chase, found guilty of larceny and entering the store of Charles Magnuson in Dock street and stealing therefrom. James Rodgers was remanded on the charge of acting with him.  
His Honor Judge Barry, in the Circuit Court this morning, sentenced David Henessey to three months' imprisonment on a charge of common assault. Norman Curley, found guilty of stealing jewelry from Robert Adams, West End, was sentenced to three years by His Honor. The court adjourned until Tuesday, July 6.

R. Taylor, K. C., conducted the prosecution.  
Martin Blake and Hugh McDonald were given in charge by Captain A. Musgrave of the S. S. Manchester Merchant as stowaways. They were sent into jail to await the sailing of the vessel.
