FIRST REPORT UNDER MOVING PICTURE LAW

MR. SPENCER EXPLAINS Says Many Children Were Sent Away From Unique—Asks Some Questions Relative to New Regulations

Noting that the Unique Theatre had been reported for failing to adhere to the new regulations last Saturday afternoon by admitting children under the age of ten unaccompanied by adults, Mr. Spencer this morning gave out the following:

"You will note that according to the reading of the act that a child of nine accompanied by her sister of sixteen or more could not be admitted to the theatre, and their refusal was a common occurrence at the motion picture houses last Saturday. The laws says the party accompanying the parent must be an adult."

"Again at night the age limit is fifteen. One evening last week I queried two big lusty boys who looked like young men regarding their ages and learned that in each instance it was fourteen, and further questioning elicited the information that they had both been lying about their ages. Are these boys to be deprived of the pleasure and profit derived from motion pictures without any reason, and without any question as to the fact that those responsible for this new law admit that its adoption was not the result of either common sense or pressure, a Provincial Commission has been established which means that the picture will be censored three times before it is shown here."

THOUSANDS FAREWELL ARCHBISHOP CASEY AT THE UNION DEPOT

Demonstration of Affection by His People on Departure For Vancouver

A remarkable demonstration of affection and esteem was given His Grace Archbishop Casey last evening in the Union Depot on his departure for Vancouver, there to take up the duties of the exalted station to which he has been elevated by Pope Pius. It was perhaps unequalled in the record of public tributes to church dignitaries in this city, except on the return of His Grace from Rome after his visit to the Sovereign Pontiff eight years ago as Bishop of St. John.

While many had called on the Palace to bid a personal farewell, it was left for the last hour of His Grace's residence in the city to show what a strong hold had become his on the love of his people.

The train was to leave at five minutes before six o'clock and half an hour earlier the people began to assemble. Soon the large train shed took on a most animated appearance. Thousands of people were added to the general throng in hope of seeing His Grace without getting into the crush.

As he passed through the car some one was seen to bend the knee and receive His Grace's blessing; so, too, later on his return to the depot. The minutes there were spent in handshaking with all who could reach the steps, then the gong chimed and a mighty cheer went up as "All aboard," and the train started, then another cheer and the sound of a torpedo as the wheels passed over it. His Grace made his way hurriedly through the car to the rear platform and there bowed his last goodbye to his cheering, hat-waving people. Many eyes were moistened by tears but the sorrow was lightened by the knowledge that the farewell to His Grace had been so great and spontaneous a demonstration.

Rev. F. J. McMurray of Woodstock and Rev. M. T. Murphy of Debec were to meet Archbishop Casey at Madam's and accompany him some distance, probably to Montreal.

THE EXPRESS COMPETITION

Opposition in Parliament May Now Demand Rights For Other Companies Over C. P. R.

(Ottawa Citizen) The announcement by Hon. Frank Cochrane that the Dominion Express Company has been given rights on the Intercolonial Railway, a privilege heretofore enjoyed exclusively by the Canadian Express Company, has aroused considerable interest here.

As the breaking of a monopoly by the minister's action is very favorably viewed. It was stated today, however, that the opposition now will demand that steps be taken to secure for other companies similar rights over the Canadian Pacific where the Dominion Express operates exclusively. The matter is to come up in the house at an early date.

Negotiations for full running rights for the C. P. R. trains over the I. O. R. from St. John to Halifax have reached no conclusion. It is said to be simply a matter of terms.

Provisional officers were elected, and it was decided to act for a charter. J. E. Tighe organized the union. There were about sixty checkers present.

TEMPERANCE MEETING



**MR. FARMER SAYS HEAD TAX IS FAR BEHIND THE TIMES.**

"If it were told to the people of Ontario or the western cities that St. John had a head tax of \$7.50 it would be just like saying that the city was dead—if they came here they would be looking for policemen patrolling the streets in the costumes of medieval days."  
A. B. Farmer of Toronto, secretary of the Tax Reform League of Ontario, who arrived in the city today on the train from Boston, where he had been attending a tax-reform convention, laughed at the idea of having a head-tax like this in a city which is being "boomed" and which it is intended to "boon" still more.

**WINTER PORT NOTES.**  
The Empress of Ireland which sailed from Halifax yesterday morning had on board 119 first, 400 second and 840 third class passengers, a total of 1,360.  
The Victorian, which will sail from St. John on Friday next will take away 909 third class passengers. Her second cabin accommodations is also fully booked and the first cabin is already well filled. She will also carry a full cargo of freight.  
The Empress of Britain, which is due here next Friday is bringing sixty first, 173 second and 529 third class passengers, a total of 772. The entire accommodation for the outward voyage in the second and third cabins is entirely booked in advance.  
The Royal Mail steamer Victorian, Captain Outram, arrived in port yesterday afternoon after a stormy passage from Liverpool. The steamer brought 644 passengers, 226 of whom disembarked in Halifax. The Victorian also had on board 3,000 tons of freight and a large amount of mail.

**FAIRVILLE WEDDING.**  
In the Church of the Good Shepherd in Fairville this morning at half past ten o'clock Mrs. Ellen Edsforth of Arrington and Herbert H. Smith, one of Sunbury's most prosperous farmers were united in marriage by Rev. W. P. Dunham. The bride was attired in a handsome grey silk dress trimmed with lace and with hat to match. She was attended by Mr. and Mrs. Smith left by C. P. R. for a wedding trip in Nova Scotia.

**CHINESE SAYS CONSPIRACY TO FORGE THE NOTES**

More Evidence of Interest in Local Case Includes Card Playing for Money and Smoking of Opium

Allegations were made in the Police court this morning during the hearing of the case of Hum Yung vs. Hum Foo, in which the complainant is suing the defendant for one of eighteen notes amounting in all to \$800 which the plaintiff says he loaned the defendant several months ago. The case has been given several hearings already, the defendant insisting on the contrary that the matter is all a conspiracy to put the defendant out of business, and that the notes presented to the court were forgeries.

The only witness called this morning was Lem Choon, who conducts a laundry business in Carleton. He swore that he was in Hop Lee's shop in Mill street on or about May 13 he went to Hop Lee's shop in Mill street. While there he met the plaintiff and also Hum Bo Thomas, Hum Ging and Hum See. He heard the latter four discussing a scheme by which they would make out eighteen notes for a total of \$800 and sign Hum Foo's name to them. The witness said that he was a Christian and believed in the Bible, that he belonged to the Congregational church and was baptised in China. He said that on or about May 13 he went to Hop Lee's shop in Mill street. While there he met the plaintiff and also Hum Bo Thomas, Hum Ging and Hum See. He heard the latter four in conversation and said that Hum See told Hum Bo Thomas that he would give him \$400 with which to buy Hum Foo's business. Thomas said that Foo had refused \$400 and wanted \$200 for the business. Hum See refused this amount. The witness then said that Hum See said he would give \$200 to a fund to make trouble for Hum Foo, and that someone suggested that they would make out six notes for \$200 and sign Hum Foo's name to them. The witness said that Thomas did not think that amount enough, and suggested \$10 notes for \$600. The other three witnesses said that this amount was too much and it was finally agreed to make the amount \$200.

He said he saw the same four Chinese together on the following Monday night in Hop Lee's store, that he heard one of them say that Foo was stupid and that they could easily scare him out of business. The witness said that he knew Hum Foo's writing and when the note was shown to him he swore that the signature was not that of Foo, but resembled greatly the writing of Hum Bo Thomas.

On cross examination, the witness told practically the same story, but was somewhat mixed as to the dates and the hour of meeting. He said that the night that he had met the four Chinese in Hop Lee's that they were playing cards for money in a backroom of the shop. He also played for a while. He said that several Chinese were sitting around smoking and that there were quite a number of Chinese in the shop. He went to bed at three o'clock in the morning and the other four were then playing cards. He did not know when they left the shop.
