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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a Member for life.

V. Each subscriber of Twenty-five Guineas annually shall be a Governor.

VI. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a Member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six

of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XII. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the general meeting, and at meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating Honorary Members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

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REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in
1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

LAWs AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
Nova Scotia Bible Society.

I. This Society shall be called THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz: to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of Scriptures *gratis* to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.

II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.

III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.

IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.

V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.

VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.

VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.

ST. JOHN'S PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH,

Monday, 27th January, 1890.

THE Seventy-Sixth Anniversary of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society was held on the 27th Jany., in the St. John's Presbyterian Church. The HON. S. L. SHANNON, Q. C., President, in the chair. There was a good attendance of citizens. The meeting was opened by the REV. H. H. McPHERSON, who gave out the 19th Psalm, read the Scriptures, and engaged in Prayer.

The PRESIDENT reviewed the early history of the Auxiliary and named the men who took a special interest in its maintenance, and referring to the wonderful progress of the parent society.

The SECRETARY read report. (*See page 12.*)

REV. F. ALMON moved the first resolution,

"That the report now read be adopted, printed and circulated with the usual appendages under the direction of the Committee."

Which resolution was duly seconded by JAS. S. HUTTON, Esq., who from various points of view presented the claims of the Parent Society.

The second resolution was moved by REV. J. A. ROGERS, and seconded, by REV. PRESIDENT FORREST.

"That while warmly thanking the various branches throughout the Province, by whose aid the Auxiliary has been enabled to maintain its work during another year, and earnestly looking to them for the continuance of such help, this meeting humbly expresses its gratitude to Almighty God for the success which he has granted to the Parent Society's labours in the past, and its entire dependence on His blessing and guidance in the future."

A. M. BELL, moved, and REV. JOHN McMILLAN seconded, the next resolution.

"That the officers and committee be re-elected with such changes as may be deemed necessary."

During the evening vigorous speeches were delivered on the progress of the work of the Auxiliary. The REV. DR. FORREST pressing the importance of the missionary work among the Indians, and the BISHOP insisting upon individual effort among the professing Christians, intimating the necessity of each individual on retiring with the resolution, "I must do so and so," instead of saying "*they* ought to do so and so." It is a pity *they* don't do it," &c., &c.

REPORT.

It is once more the duty of the members of this Auxiliary to lay before its members and friends their annual report. The work of the Society is work to which the admonition of the Apostle, "Not to be weary in well doing," is very applicable. It is work which has to be resumed and repeated year after year, and to which we can see no end. It is work in which we have to be engaged for many years, and which has, with some, lost that special interest which novelty imparts to new undertakings. It is work which the results, and especially the spiritual and most precious results, are far away from us and widely spread, and do not present themselves to us in tangible form and cannot be definitely estimated and summed up. It is work which apart from its objects is of a commonplace and uninteresting, not to say disagreeable character, for it mainly consists of the asking for and the collecting of money.

It is a work therefore in these respects in which we are in danger of losing our interest and letting ourselves be tempted to grow weary of it; and to preserve us from this and stimulate us to persevere with heartiness in the work of our Society, we need to keep the purpose and the object of it steadily in our view. And the most important use of our Annual

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Meeting is to remind us and to revive our impressions of this ; and to this end the Auxiliary has now held *Sixty-one* Annual Meetings in the course of seventy-six years in which it has existed, this being the sixty-first report. Anniversaries have been held, but even they have been kept up under much discouragement, for the attendance at such meeting is not always encouraging, and so far as the city of Halifax is concerned scarcely ever brought results equal to the trouble involved in their maintenance.

In past years when the Auxiliaries were held in the old Mason and Temperance Halls, the members of committee were always counted upon as holding their seats on the platform. But many of those who then took a public part in the proceedings are now no longer here ; and among the number we with sorrow record the names of Nepean Clark, John S. Maclean, and the Rev. Dr. S. T. Rand, all of whom have been removed during the past year, but of whom reference more in detail will be made when noticing the local affairs of the Society. Meantime in passing let us all learn to consider the important lesson, "Whatever thy hand findeth to do do it with all thy might, for there is no work or device in the grave whither we are all hastening." As members of this Committee and officers of this Auxiliary, we have to confess we have but a poor account to give even of our attendance at the Annual or other meetings of the Auxiliary.

Meantime, as usual, the Committee would refer for a bird's eye view of the Parents Society's operations

throughout the world, to the Eighty-Fifth Annual Report or the Abstract :

1. 2. The figures are : Issues from the Bible House—Bibles, 641,902; New Testaments, 870,146; Portions, 275,033 ;—in all, 1,787,081. Issues from abroad :—Bibles, 168,239 ; New Testaments, 613,536 ; Portions, 1,108,348 ;—in all, 1,890,123. Total issues for the year 3,677,204.

A certain bond, alike of race and history as of common faith, unites the western nations, of France and Belgium, Italy and Spain. Differing among themselves, they differ still more widely from their Teutonic neighbours, as well as from the Slavonic peoples, through whom one passes to the vast and populous spaces of the East. Especially from a religious point of view this group of Western peoples is one. Among them, with least hindrance, the power of the Church of Rome has held sway ; they have shown as, perhaps, nowhere else the natural results of its influences and its spirits. There is, in a report of the Bible Society, a natural fitness in turning to these nations first.

From France, from Belgium, and perhaps from Spain, the accounts are distinctly grave. Italy is different ; a broad, if a somewhat faint, light stretches across its fields. The same light is not absent from Spain, but it is less apparent. France seems darker, and the shadow is, perhaps, deeper in Belgium, and most ominous of approaching storm.

The story of last year from FRANCE was one of evident hope. There was no remarkable advance ; but the accounts suggested steady progress towards a more spiritual life. M. Monod was inspired by pleasant hopes, and reviewed his past with something like triumph. This year his mood is

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sensibly altered. The circulation has lessened to the extent of twenty-three thousand copies; nor can it be accounted for by the indifference of the colporteurs; M. Monod's veterans in service, his most proved and trusted men, have been precisely the least successful. The usual and the irreconcilable enemy of the popular Bible is still active; but the priest is by no means the most serious foe. An invisible power, threatening the Papal Church itself, and yet largely her own creation—a fatal Frankenstein hanging over religion like a doom, *La Libre pensee*—seems to grow into huger proportions year by year. It is a familiar story, but not the less painful. One, however, is not entirely prepared for the accounts which are seriously and sorrowfully given. M. Monod is quite aware of the amount of evangelistic work carried on in Paris and elsewhere with conspicuous success; he knows with what facility copies of the Scriptures can be had gratuitously—the gifts rather of zeal than of discretion; and he is fully conscious of the widening tide of Protestantism in his native land. Even towards the end of his survey, as page after page of the ever-interesting record of colportage is read, the tone of despondency is lightened, and he closes his report with words of pleasure and of hope. But no one can read the general summary without the sense that a cloud broods over the spiritual temper of France, and that a poison works in the nation's blood. Next year all may be brighter—and what is a year in a people's history?—but to-day the report is sensibly touched with disappointment.

• South of the Pyrenees, what light there is in the sky seems to be slowly increasing. The description which is true of France will, however, practically apply to SPAIN. There is the same overshadowing materialism of thought—the vast majority of the men, and many of the women, are agnostics or spiritualists when they are not atheists; it is, as Mr. Jameson says, 'The legitimate result of the sway of Romanism—the only presentation of Christianity the nation has had.' Behind this most formidable enemy are two others—the Papal Church itself, and the general ignorance and paralysis of thought among the people. These acute and painful symptoms may, however, indicate the transition to better days. 'Spain is passing through the same inevitable crisis as all Roman Catholic countries;

the decay of faith is alarming and profoundly sad, but there is hope in the latter end ;' and Mr. Jameson, who has known the country for twenty years, grows more sanguine instead of more despondent. The circulation since last return, though slightly less, is not unsatisfactory, and though the work in this sad land is as difficult as it can be in any heathen country, there is on the whole a real, if a very gradual and interrupted, progress to that age of light and truth of which the Evangelical movement in Spain of twenty years ago was a somewhat impassioned dream.

The plains and the mountain valleys of ITALY seem to be spiritually, as well as literally, in the earlier and larger lights of dawn. The circulation has remarkably increased ; it is the highest total ever reached in the peninsula ; but a more impressive and perhaps more significant fact is the appearance—to use Sig. Meille's words—of 'three unexpected allies to the Bible Society.' The Editor of one of the most widely circulated newspapers in Italy is an agnostic, but he has an acute perception of what will be popular, and last year there has been issued from the office of the *Secolo* of Milan the first number of an illustrated People's Bible in $\frac{1}{2}d.$ parts, with a weekly circulation of over seventeen thousand copies. In the same city the head of the great publishing house of Treves is a Jew, but he, also, has felt the spirit of the new times, and his presses are busied with an edition of the New Testament, also in serial parts, resplendent with the illustrations of Dore. To complete the impressive story, one of the most prolific authors, and perhaps the best Greek scholar in Italy, Sig. Bonghi, has begun to publish in Rome a *Life of Jesus*, and the book is practically a literal translation of the Gospels, ably and sympathetically edited. Sig. Meille adds a significant sentence. 'These three publications have been the great literary events of the year ; no work of any special importance has appeared to compete with them in the attention of the people. It is as if Providence had silenced every other voice in order that the Scriptures alone might be listened to, and of 1888, more, than of any preceding year, may it be said with perfect accuracy, that it has seen the largest diffusion of Scriptures that was ever made in Italy.' These evidences of the serious occupation of many minds with spiritual truth is pleasantly illustrated

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by the general tone of the report, and the year, though one of great economic depression and anxiety, may be remembered in the records of the nation's higher and more hopeful history.

North of the Italian Alps, and eastward from the frontiers of Belgium and of France, there is another group of nations, as closely united as those which have been passed in review. Switzerland, Germany, Holland, and Denmark are still the possessions, as they are the historic homes, of the Reformation; on their plains and in their mountain fastnesses the battles of religious liberty were, in the sixteenth century, fought and won. They may justly be grouped together on this page, for, in the report of the year, one outstanding fact is the same in all. This is the increasing activity of each of these countries with reference to its own Bible work; the supply, from its own energies and resources, of its own people. SWITZERLAND, though still drawing her supplies from the stores of the Parent Society, is actively pursuing the work of supplying her children, among their romantic mountains or by their inland seas, with the Word of Life. 'The distinctive fact of the year, in regard to Germany,' says Mr. Watt, 'is the advance of the native Bible societies.' HOLLAND, and perhaps DENMARK, are gradually preparing for the same nobler position of self supply. It is a position of things worthy of the past and full of promise for the opening history of the future, that it is the distinctively Reformation nations of the Continent which are busying themselves in putting into the hands of their children the sword with which their fathers conquered and the staff on which they leaned for rest.

Some fuller reference must be made to GERMANY. The central fact of the year, as has been said, is the developing work of the native societies. The circulation of the British and Foreign Society is, according to its policy, gradually lessening, and ten thousand copies fewer were circulated last year than in 1887. But the German issues have risen by eighteen thousand, and there are many evidences of growing activity. Colonel Klefeker is rendering invaluable service to the army; the number of copies distributed has increased from twenty-one to twenty-eight thousand, and this may be confidently

expected soon and rapidly to increase. The colporteurs have been busy and successful, but their work is hard, and there are still districts in the Fatherland as thoroughly Roman Catholic as Belgium or Spain. Even more depressing is the unspirituality of so many with whom the profession of Protestantism is little but the assertion of practical indifference or hostility. A single sentence from Mr. Watt's report touches in the most impressive way the tragedy of the death of the late Emperor Frederick: 'One day in early summer a notice was received from the Chancery of his Majesty that the annual subscription given by his late father to the Bible Society would be continued by himself. The following day the Emperor died.' But the son of the dead Hero seems of kindred spirit, and Mr. Watt closes the year's report with a sentence which illuminates all that goes before: 'The exemplary family life of the young monarch Wilhelm II. stands out conspicuously beautiful, and the unmistakable and firm attitude which he, with the Empress, has assumed in favour of everything which tends to promote purity, truth, and godliness amongst his people, must fill the heart of everyone with thankfulness who desires to see Germany prosperous and happy.'

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY is in itself a group of nations. The Bible Society's work in this Agency alone is a miniature of its work throughout the world. There is the same appeal to many nationalities, the same polyglot issue, and almost every friendly or hostile power which is elsewhere encountered from east to west is represented within this varied Empire. Nowhere is there a more interesting field; unhappily much of the interest is painful, and directly suggested by the past. The lover of spiritual liberty and of the devout simplicities of the first days turns to Austria with sorrow often stronger than hope. These are the fields, these the mountain solitudes in which religious intolerance secured some of its completest victories—its victories and its everlasting shame. Happily Mr. Millard is able to forget the things which are behind in his eager and joyful reaching forth to those that are before. His spirit is so sunny that he sees the whole of his Agency lying in the same delightful glow. After all, it is the better as well as the happier way; and for the

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past year there are substantial facts to support the cheerful estimate. Never before, excepting in the year of the Vienna Exhibition, and scarcely even then, has there been so large a circulation in Austria-Hungary as during 1888. It almost touches two hundred thousand, and is nineteen thousand beyond the number of 1887. This is not all: there are everywhere pleasant signs of life. Not by any means that the difficulties are fewer, or that there are not also occasional evidences of spiritual decline. From almost every district there is a miserable monotony in the report that 'the influence of the priests is increasing,' 'the hostility of the Church is more bitter,' 'the efforts of Rome are more pronounced than ever.' Mr. Millard only sighs as the words are read, and, turning to the brighter side, finds an increasing circulation of the Scriptures and a more devout temper among many of the people. 'Had we but to do with the people themselves,' he writes sorrowfully, 'the people uninfluenced by prejudice and left to their own desires!' From almost every quarter, happily, there is a report of advance. In Hungary the circulation has been 'most extraordinary,' the accounts are 'most encouraging.' Nowhere so much as in Bohemia 'do we meet with so evident tokens that the Word of God is held in reverence, and is taking root in the hearts of many.' In Bosnia, Bible work, though difficult, has been successful; in Roumania, though 'indifference prevails to a large extent among the better classes, and ignorance among the peasants, there is every reason to be glad and of good courage.' Poland, from the story of its year, varied as everywhere else, 'suggests only gratitude for what has been accomplished;' and in the various sections 'whatever cause there may be for regret over spiritual barrenness and alarming unbelief, there is much earnest searching after the truth, and longing desire to seek and find peace.' The report concludes with an outburst of blended praise and prayer, touching because evidently unaffected, and eloquent because it is sincere.

Moving still eastward the narrative becomes occupied with another group of peoples, whom, to a large extent, common faith and a common government naturally unite. In this rapid review the TURKISH and the EGYPTIAN

AGENCIES may be considered together, for though it is a wide interval from Constantinople to Alexandria, both are centres of Turkish rule, and the same time of the faith of Islam. Greece and the Greek Church form an exception, but it is the only considerable one; all else from the Roumelian frontier across Asia Minor to the utmost range of Arabia and of Egypt is under the crescent of Muhammed. It need hardly be said that not only political, but to a large extent Christian interests are deeply engaged on those borderlands between east and west; here the powers of disintegration are working rapidly on the old, and a new future is shaping itself from the chaos of departing monarchies. In a comprehensive sentence Dr. Thomson indicates how difficult the tasks of the Society's forces are: 'To visit the countless islands of the Ægean; to penetrate into the uplands of Albania and Macedonia, the haunt of bloodthirsty brigands who keep the land in terror; to testify for the truth of God amid utter indifference and mockery on the part of some, and fanatical hatred and violence on the part of others; to uphold legal rights in opposition to local authorities who are ignorant of the very law they administer; to meet by patient labour the infidelity so prevalent in Bulgaria and elsewhere;—such was the work to be faced, and your Agent is thankful to be able to say that in spite of all these difficulties not a little has been done.' This modest estimate is more than borne out by the long and circumstantial report which follows; the circulation has increased, and the year has been one of steady and encouraging work. One sentence may, perhaps, describe the most notable fact of the year, and it is full of deep significance and hope: 'It is my growing conviction,' says Dr. Thomson, 'that the truth is taking hold of the members of the Greek Church in a manner unprecedented for many centuries.' This is immensely important. Nor is there a less remarkable statement from Mr. Weakley, who is referring specially to the Muhammadan populations, and who also reports favourably of his work: 'In the estimation of faith it is no light matter that some copies at least of the Books which contain in the language of the people the Divine message of love and life to sinful men have been placed already in nearly every part of the district. Men of South

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Arabia have taken them to their homes in Hadramoot and Yemen. Merchants have carried them across the Gulf of Aden to the African coast and up to Harrar. Shut out from Abyssinia the Holy Books have been found and gladly received by the people of that mountainous land who have crowded down to the sea coast. A few have been planted in Suakin among the Muslim traders; some have been set in Muslim hands at Yeddah, and rumour says that even well-guarded Mecca has been invaded by the silent messenger. Certain it is that the children of the Libyan Desert have not scorned to possess them, and that their brethren of the Eastern waste—the way of the Philistines—have at least one New Testament to spell out by the camp fire. Thousands have passed into the hands of men dwelling in the great cities of Egypt. With much difficulty and seeming defeat in places, the Muslim villages in Palestine and Syria have had here and there a copy of God's Word left in them. Among the lawless dwellers in the mountains of Moab the heavenly precepts are daily read; and among the people of the ancient Churches everywhere the long-neglected oracles of God are gradually once more being received and studied. Official Islam and sacerdotal Rome here and there bitterly oppose with the instinct of fear, yet, were the work of the Agency at this moment to be wholly suspended, so widely has been sown the seed, though sparsely, that the planting of the Kingdom of God throughout the whole district might be taken as a fact to be rejoiced over, and regarded with intelligent hope. No estimate of the year can be more authoritative than this, and none can perhaps be more encouraging.

But we are already standing on the threshold of the East; its vast spaces open before us, and we hear the voice of the ocean, whose waves break against the shores of three continents. One immense empire is yet unmentioned; it belongs to both worlds. The sun, rising from the Yellow Sea, and touching its frontier hills with his first ray, travels across its territory till the evening, and sees its utmost limit only when he sinks in the west. But RUSSIA fascinates the mind with a higher charm than that of territory. The portrait of one of its Emperors hangs in the Bible House, the story of his devotion to the Scriptures

continues itself among his people, and his spirit seems largely to animate the great world-power which is sure yet to stand among the dominant forces of the future. The history of Bible work in Russia concerns both east and west, and is one of the chapters of the history of humanity. It must be welcome news that the report of the year, both from the Northern and Southern Agencies, has a great deal to encourage; in some instances it is strikingly favourable. Mr. Nicolson, whose territory stretches absolutely from the Baltic to the shores which look across the icy seas to America, cannot announce a rising circulation; but one of the reasons for its decline is itself a hopeful and suggestive fact—it is that the British Society has distributed fewer copies because the Russian Bible Society is increasingly endeavouring to provide and distribute its own. Mr. Nicolson adds: "Vast as the dimensions of European and Asiatic Russia are, one may look hopefully to the time when Bible workers will be found all over the Empire, nor are there so many places now completely beyond the call of the colporteur;" and he proceeds: "The good work of selling the Scriptures in villages and small towns of the Empire is going forward with a great measure of success; the official persons with whom we have to do in the provinces of the Empire never showed us more goodwill." The narrative which follows, and which touches with its human and endlessly varied detail the successive provinces from Lithuania to Eastern Siberia, is absorbingly interesting, and there is not a page on which light does not shine. Nor is there any lessening of interest, nor any less pleasant light on the records of the Southern Agency. In this quarter the circulation has swiftly increased; it is the highest ever realised; in some districts, to use Mr. Morrison's words, it has 'enormously increased,' 'notably advanced,' 'proceeded by leaps and bounds.' These references are to Cis-Caucasia and the Don Cossack country, to Kharkoff, and to 'the Russian Jerusalem,' Kieff. This broadening tide of Scriptural literature is seen better when the eye looks back half-a-dozen years. In 1882 the total circulation in the Agency was eighty-two thousand; it is now a hundred and seventy-two thousand; then we heard little of Trans-Caucasia and Turkestan; but since 1882 the Bible pioneers have pushed

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forward their frontier six hundred miles, and annexed provinces which were then a *terra incognita*. There can be little doubt, from the evidence of both these important reports, that there is substantial reason for taking a very favourable view of the prospects of Bible knowledge throughout the Russian possessions. Everywhere the soldier is the colporteur's friend; the authorities are frank and generally friendly; the Church is becoming an independent source of supply. Let us hope well and, if possible, work more devotedly for the people with whom so much of the world's future will in all probability rest.

So immense is the Russian Empire that, in Continental Asia, but two other considerable peoples remain—the myriad races of China, and with these may be grouped the Japanese—and those of Hindustan. Nothing need be said to indicate the importance, in a Christian survey, of each of these, nor to point out that it is an importance increasing every year. The part to be played in the next century by 'the British of the East' and by the awakened intellect and energies of India may be impossible to define, but it is certain to be great. And it will be a power for good or for disastrous evil, according as the higher aim of the Bible Society is realised or may be pursued in vain.

The report of Bible work in CHINA for 1888 indicates a considerable advance of circulation in the Northern and about equal decline in the Central Agency. The reason of the lower numbers is, however, not from any lessened interest among the people, but solely from the less effective state of the colportage force; and the same truth meets the student of these reports in other fields—one of the most impressive ways of saying that were only more colporteurs available the Society's work would stride where it now steps with difficulty, and advance by percentages which are now the exception instead of the rule. The surveys of the Chinese provinces breathe everywhere a spirit of healthy energy: the press is active, the colporteurs are devoted, but the tragedies of pestilence and of famine—the legacy of the overflow of the Yellow River—darken every page. The circulation in JAPAN is one of the pleasant cases of swift progress—the increase has been over a hundred per cent.—thirty-seven thousand instead

of the sixteen thousand of 1887. Yet this also was a remarkable advance on that of the year preceding. The journals of some of the forty-eight Japanese colporteurs read like a new chapter of the Acts of the Apostles; the dew of youth is on the ardour of their primitive and tender piety. There is something more remarkable than this; it impresses the thoughtful mind with the vastness of a silent but national revolution. It is the publication, almost within the same year, of the new Japanese Bible--the gift of Western Christianity to the child of new thought in the East; and of the Emperor's edict proclaiming universal religious liberty in the Empire. And this in a land where, fifteen years ago, the Government warned away, on peril of life, 'the Christian foreigner and his God!'

We have at length approached INDIA, and great as must be our concern for other fields, it is deeper, more genuine, perhaps more anxious, as we survey the solemnising scenery of the ever-spreading Anglo-Asiatic cities, the crowded harbours, the vast and fruitful plains, the temples and the palaces of Hindustan. Here the subtlest intellect of the East has its home; here it has built its school of Hindu contemplation and of life. Even the architecture of Greece cannot entirely throw that of Mediæval India into the shade, nor its superb literature withdraw admiration from the florid splendours of the Sanskrit epics and dramas, or the metaphysical fervours of its books of ritual and devotion. We have already witnessed—and it is one of the greatest historic spectacles—the social regeneration of India under the influences of government seated in an island which, in the balmy days of Hindustan, was a home of savages. We may yet hope for a far more astonishing and a far nobler revolution—the consecration of the best powers of the Indian character, and the erection, among the ruins of the temples of Buddhism, of a great school of Christian learning, which shall throw its powerful rays, not only across every part of the vast peninsula, but into the furthest and the darkest recesses of the idolatries of the East.

There is a peculiar quality in each of the Indian reports; it is noticeable year after year, and, though perhaps unconsciously present, it is the highest degree suggestive and inspiring. It is the quietness of confidence

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which every summary breathes, the sense of the resistless progress made in stillness and calm by the rising tides of Christian thought, the assurance that, whether distant or near, the possession of India by Christ is merely a matter of time. Occasionally, as this year in the case of the Madras Presidency, it is necessary to notice an intensifying of opposition to Christianity, but the symptoms of hatred or fear do not trouble the confident record; it is merely 'a new stage of development,' and, 'one among the many indications that the truth of God is felt to be a growing power in the land.' The same calm of conscious victory is felt in noting remarkable advance—the circulation both in Calcutta and in the Madras Presidency is the largest ever yet known—but there is no feverish delight expressed; it is only what is taking place a little earlier or a little later, but which has long been foreseen. The same spirit seems not unknown among the natives, and if many oppose Christianity with the instinct of alarm, a much larger number regard its advance with philosophic indifference, and admire the clearer truth which is dispersing the earlier shadows of the mind, and which is destined to conquer because it deserves. Everywhere the record of the year seems favourable; the river of Christian literature broadens as it flows onward; the higher Education is steadily undermining the popular theologies and preparing for that 'knowledge of Jesus which is the most excellent of the sciences;' the distribution of Scriptures among the students is continuing with excellent results; the work in the Zenanas is universally spoken of as of immense value and importance; and there are other and isolated incidents which have all the value of omens of approaching change—the formation of a Young Men's Society for the study of Christ; the suggestion of a native editor that, unless Hinduism is to be swept away, the example of the Bible Society must be followed, and an association formed to spread the Shastras among the people: the introduction of the Bible into some homes for family reading instead of the Ramáyana and Mahábhárata. These are small things, but they are straws which show how the deep and mighty stream of tendency is setting in the realm of the Hindu and Muhammadan mind.

One of the most graphic chapters for the year has been written by Mr. Haffenden, as he tells the story of his return to MALAYSIA, and the work of his colleagues there. It will be remembered by many that in last autumn five young men left England with Mr. Haffenden, won in several cases by his eager appeals, and stirred by his contagious zeal. They have now vigorously set about their work, and though the change must sometimes be felt a trying one from the meadows of Kent or Sussex to the crowded by-streets of Singapore, or the rivers of Borneo, there is no trace of despondency or of regret. Indeed, the report is one of most stimulating progress. The circulation has leaped rather than moved from nineteen to thirty-seven thousand copies, an increase of ninety per cent. : but the purely Malay sales have gone up to a hundred, and this fact Mr. Haffenden regards with special joy. In this advancing circulation some thirty-two languages are represented, and not less than forty-four editions ; but the leading tongues are Chinese, Malay, Tamil, Javanese and English. The total circulation since 1882 has been about a hundred and fifty thousand ; but when one recollects that the population of this island-world is thirty-five millions, the true comparison will instantly be drawn, and it will be felt that all the successes of the past shrink before the immense task which yet remains to be done.

Only one other, and that the slightest, reference can, in this rapid survey, be made.

It is to the colonies of our own people—to AUSTRALASIA, to SOUTH AFRICA, to BRITISH AMERICA, to the WEST INDIES ; and to these not as the haunts of a vanishing or a lingering heathenisms but as the homes of 'that new world which is the old,' the almost measureless spaces for the possession and the upbuilding of the Anglo-Saxon races of the future. It is to that 'Greater Britain' the eye turns at the last, before it rest again upon the shores from which this journey of the mind began.

Two remarkable journals reproduce the year for AUSTRALIA. In Mr. Robjohns' letters, quick with movement and energy, the half-foreign, half-familiar conditions of

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colonial life make themselves strongly felt. We have the sense of the ceaseless unrest of travel ; the half-organised and perilous means of distant communication ; the picturesque stretches of forests and mountain scenery ; the young populous cities ; the crowded or the scanty meeting ; the representative committees, deliberative in turn about spiritual affairs and ever-urgent finance ; the Sunday school ; the lady collectors—all so English, so homelike, yet evidently so moulded by the influences of a new hemisphere. For it is not the land of one race only—this new continent ; nor are its neighbours such as we know on our shores, or in our streets at home. If in Mr. Robjohns' page we feel the beat of life, we see in Mr. Davidson's the visible picture of this new world, touched with the glow and breathing the spirit of the writer's genius. 'The field itself is of characteristic and, to me, transcendent interest. To find the Rev. Daniel MacDonald in Melbourne taking oversight of the printing of our Efatese New Testament, with a consignment of arrowroot which the new converts had sent to help to pay for it ; to meet the Rev. W. Gray in Adelaide, ready to go back to his Weasisi people, that they may both hear and read "what comfortable words our Saviour Christ saith" in the Gospel of St. John ; to worship with timid inquirers from the "Flowery Land," and see them follow us with anxious eye as we talked to them of the Redeemer, and they verified the words of Eternal life from the Evangel we had placed in their hands ; to visit the extemporised tents of aboriginals in this great continent who had been taught the Word of Life at Point MacLeay ; to catechise a Papuan child concerning Jesus of Nazareth ; to be served by servants who read of Him in Pali, and converse with pearl-divers who trace the precious Word in Pangasinan ; to sail with Syrians, and read Moses and the Prophets with rabbis of Israel ; to preach at Catlowie with critics capable of studying Immanuel Kant as one's hearers from the fatherland of thought—all this reminded me that I had come to do work in a segment of our far-reaching arena where one's best abilities would be both required and rewarded.' Happily the rewards are already being liberally given, and the year which fills its record with picturesque sketches can also add the evidence of

widening interest in the Society and of deeper devotion to its work.

The last words of this record must now be written ; they are the most difficult justly to write or hear, for, if true, those only they must be which interpret the spiritual voice of the year and express its Divine message. That voice we cannot catch except in the silence from our own thoughts and our passions, nor obey except in the submission of our will. Yet surely it is no muffled message, it is no obscure oracle. Are not its words to us that all Divine work is completed but in the slow lapse of time and with infinite sacrifice ; that they serve God best who love Him most, and who cease most from their own wisdom ; that it is for us to be obedient, to be patient, to be assured of the end ? 'We are working now as they worked at those superb palaces and tombs which still dominate in India, though in ruins, the towns of the Muhammadan conquest. Far down into the foundations they sank, with what infinite patience we may imagine, vast masses of dull red sandstone, and built it up in mighty walls that only lose their gloom when glowing in the setting sun ; but on the summit they placed, as if to last for ever, some structure of fair white pierced and fretted stone, so fitting and beautiful, so airy and delicate, that it seems like a marble dream.

'Let us be patient and continuous, working bravely at the foundation of this Christian empire, pouring into it true hearts and noble lives—the named and the nameless there together, treasures of thought and treasures of the priceless years. There is already rising on that foundation the vision of our faith and hope, once a dream, but now the fair and stately fact of a Christian world-empire, a fragment, yet complete in itself, of that great city—the holy Jerusalem, which descends out of heaven from God, and where the nations of the saved walk in the light of His glory.'¹

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Referring again to the work of your Auxiliary we would desire to bow in humble submission to the Divine Will, which has so lately deprived us by death of the farther aid and assistance of our late esteemed associates, Nepean Clark, John S. Maclean, the Mic-Mac Missionary, Dr. S. T. Rand, and His Honor Judge James of the Equity Court. The first two named have been members of the Committee for many years. Mr. Clark's name first appears among the members of Committee in 1857, from which time he and Mrs. Clark, his wife, took a deep interest in the work of the Society. He as active member of this Committee, who on all its meetings was a constant attendant when he was active and able. She as President of the Halifax Ladies' Bible Association, which office she held for many years, and filled it with industry, for it was during her presidency that the late Rev. Alexander Russell was first engaged as colporteur, which with other offices he filled with so much success. John S. Maclean's name has been known as a household word among the Christian workers, not only of the City of Halifax and Province of Nova Scotia, but in the neighboring Republic, where in Washington, on the 24th May, 1871, he opened a convention of the Y. M. C. A., and was succeeded by the then John Wanamaker, now the honorable head of the Post Office Department of the United States. Mr. Maclean was a subscriber to the funds of this Society from 1862 till the year of his death. In 1867 his name first appears as a member of its Committee, in

which capacity he also took an active interest in its affairs; his was a very active interest, when we remember how much he was engaged in so many other christian enterprises during his active life, many of which he was the originator, and of so many he filled the office as president, as the Y. M. C. A., the School for the Blind, the Industrial School, and others over which he presided for so many years. The beneficiaries of all institutions, indeed all the benevolent institutions of this city cannot fail to feel a debt of gratitude to his name and hold in sweet remembrance his faith and fortitude which accomplished so much towards leaving this world so much better than it was when he found it. Of him it may well be said, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

In the last Annual Report, 65th, we published a report from Rev. Dr. Rand, the venerable Mic-Mac missionary, little dreaming that it would be his last. In that report he noticed in modest terms the story of his life work among the Indian families of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, delineating his efforts to conquer their language, and at last his success in securing the publication of the Scriptures in their language. The balance of those Scriptures, for the binding of which, by and with the consent of the parent Society's committee, we paid, are still in store. There is also a considerable portion of land belonging to the mission held by trustees. But upon whom shall the mantle of the departed missionary fall? It is often asserted that the Indian race is fast falling

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away. It is true that they do not increase as the white race, as they are without immigration, that source of supply which so much belong to the white race but statistics or the last census show that their decrease is not what it is generally thought to be. However, it is feared that little can be done now for them by the Protestant teachers. Dr. Rand has departed, but has left a record behind him to which but few have attained; and it will be part of the duty of the committee to be elected now to see to the proper disposal of the Scriptures remaining, and to report generally about the Mic-Mac Indians. For the past forty years Dr. Rand was a welcome speaker at Anniversaries. His reports were always interesting at the meetings of committees. * His was an active self-sacrificing life, and now he has entered into his rest. "The grass withereth, the flower thereof fadeth, but the word of the Lord endureth forever."

And yet another prominent worker has fallen from the ranks in the person of the Hon. Alexr. James, Judge of the Equity Court of this Province, who was for many years a leading member of this Auxiliary when in Halifax, and when removed to Dartmouth took an active part in the work there till his death. Another worker fallen, but the saying is yet true that God often buries the workers that He may carry on the work in His own way, then be it ours to labour when it is day.

In the Parent Society's Report, p. 92, we find the following credits to Nova Scotia :—

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In analyzing the above statement of the remittance from Nova Scotia, at Halifax, there is an increase over the previous year of about one hundred and thirty-six pounds, sterling, but that is accounted for in the bequest of the late Doctor Avery's, \$500, and therefore does not show a permanent increase. It is a subject of regret that so many of the recent legacies are showing a decrease of Annual Subscriptions, as but comparatively few of the representatives of those who devised those bequests have been induced to follow in the footsteps of the original benefactors.

Your Committee have much pleasure in noticing their continued approbation of the labours of your

agent, who has continued to discharge the laborious duties to which he was assigned.

The Ladies' Bible Association has also continued to labour with much energy in the practical work of their Association,—having at present two Bible Women who are actively engaged among the poor under the superintendence of their committees, and mother's meetings are held, and Scriptures are disposed of among the families of the poor.

Your Committee would also thank the various Branches, and especially the several collectors throughout the Province who have collected for this Auxiliary, several of them having done so for twenty years. Some interesting items might be gleaned from old reports. In the Reports of 1841 we find Newport or Hants Branch, per Wm. Allison, Esq., £14 5s. Now; in 1889, we have to acknowledge Newport Branch \$51.00, which is just about keeping up the record nearly fifty years after, and the men and women in that section, and so can be said of several other branches.

The old stock of settlers have been withdrawn and in some cases their children have bravely kept up the record, as in those days funds were required to translate and publish the Scriptures prepared by Williams, Duff and Livingstone on fields of Heathendom. We on this day can look back on the past and thank God for the success with which he has been pleased to bestow upon our feeble efforts. So in our day every

new section of the human family in what was always known as the Dark Continent presents a new call even to us. Not to weary in well-doing but to persevere, and even to us the promise will be fulfilled. "The wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for them, and the desert rejoice and blossom as the rose."



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AGENT'S REPORT.

*To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia
Auxiliary Bible Society.*

GENTLEMEN,—

Through the goodness of God I have been again permitted to finish another year's labor in the cause of Bible distribution, or rather in gathering to your treasury the silver and gold needed for that most blessed of Christian charities, the British and Foreign Bible Society; and it is due to its contributors as well as to you that I render an account of my stewardship, and present in due form for publication the financial support from the eighty Branches in the Province. I deeply regret my failure to secure all the annual returns from the Branches within the limits of the fiscal year, and the consequent impossibility of definitely presenting the annual advance or decline in the gross contributions. Some very liberal Branches have great difficulty in securing collectors before December, and then it too often happens that some unforeseen incidents in such localities still further retard the work of the collectors, hence their much desired contributions arrive at your treasury after the close of your accounts, and in some cases in instalments partly in December and partly in January. Although in my annual visits and by printed circulars, sometimes oft repeated, I endeavour to spur on the local committees to a *timely* canvass of their districts, but every year tells the same tale against poor human nature,—it may be

against some of our kindest friends, or alas! against my own inefficiency as agent. I think, however, that notwithstanding the manifold charities of the present day, and the incessant calls for their support, that our cause is responded to with increased liberality annually, and I sincerely hope that for many succeeding years I will have the honor of establishing some new Branches, and be instrumental in marshalling into line of advance against the powers of spiritual darkness many of God's sons and daughters who hitherto have not come to the help of the Lord against the mighty.

On March 25th I commenced visitation work, as usual, in the STEWIAKKE VALLEY, where I am always heartily welcomed and kindly assisted at the meetings by the Ministers, and when necessary, conveyed cheerfully from place free of expense. The new Branch of LOWER STEWIAKKE is now equipped with officers, and doubtless will soon do its duty in our cause. The people there have sprung from a Bible loving and Bible guided ancestry, and as the place is fast becoming a business centre, an annual increase in contributions may be fairly anticipated.

The contributions from MIDDLE STEWIAKKE shews a decrease, but I hope such will be the only exceptional one in its history, indeed we can trust to our warm friends there henceforth for an annual remembrance proportionate to their financial ability.

The returns from UPPER STEWIAKKE have not yet reached our treasury, but as that branch has lately shewn a steady increase, no fears need be entertained; you will probably hear favourably from it ere this goes to press.

SPRINGSIDE, like some other branches, continues to hand its stated quota to your agent on his annual rounds, and here as elsewhere in this lovely valley, Bible Society meetings are well attended.

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On Sabbath morning, the 7th April, I addressed the congregation of DEAN SETTLEMENT, and was indebted to Mr. Redmond for conveyance to UPPER MUSQUODOBOIT for a service in the afternoon. At both places the churches were well filled with evidently interested people, and I received their respective contributions of \$2.67 and \$5.40, but I regret that no house to house canvass for our support has since been made. There are two elegant and commodious churches in the midst of a fine agricultural district, and a stranger would naturally judge that the Bible Society would receive a more liberal support from the community than it does, but surely failure in that respect is due rather to lack of method in collecting funds than disinterestedness in the kingdom of Christ.

On the following night the meeting was fairly well attended at MIDDLE MUSQUODOBOIT, and your agent ably assisted in the presentation of the Society's work and claims for support. Its active and estimable Secretary deeply deplores the slight falling off in its contributions, but the collectors as usual have made a very extensive canvass and merit our warm thanks.

I succeeded in organizing a branch at Little River, LOWER MUSQUODOBOIT, but so far we have only received the president's gift of \$2.00, the rest will, I trust, be remitted before long.

The annual meeting at SHUBENACADIE was well attended and all seemed interested in the work. The financial returns of that branch are good, and there is no reason to doubt its future success. We regret the departure of its able and active Secretary, his interest, however, in the Society will undoubtedly be evidenced in his new sphere of ministerial labours.

On Sabbath, 14th April, I was privileged to address the congregations of GAY'S RIVER and MILFORD,

and received their respective contributions of \$4.60 and \$10.75. In this branch our Society has lately lost a generous contributor, and your agent will henceforth miss the warm hospitality and genial companionship of one deeply interested in the spread of the Bible, and whose conversation on mission work betokened at once the extensiveness of her knowledge and the depth of her missionary zeal. Never can I forget my last meeting with Mrs. A. B. Dickie, and the fervor of her expression when on this topic. Physical weakness compelled her to say, "but sir, I feel that I must cease speaking and be resigned to the position of an attentive hearer, and only to hear of the Society's success and that of other christian missions is indeed most cheering.

The meeting at WINDSOR was held in the Presbyterian Church and was only fairly attended. While cheering speeches were delivered regrets were expressed at the smallness of the meeting in the interest of such a great cause. Deep regrets were also felt at the continued infirmity of the ex-president, the Rev. R. Morton, and his absence on that account, we hope yet to see him at many future meetings, for if only seated on his chair, the presence of that patriarch at such meetings would be eloquence potent in itself to kindle enthusiasm in the young. I am glad to notice a steady improvement in the Windsor contributions, and hope for an increase of fifty per cent next year,—such an aim would not be too high for a city of its size and christian culture.

Our next meeting was at AVONDALE, in the Methodist Church, and as on former occasions, your agent was encouraged by an attentive audience. Our treasury has duly received Avondale's gift,—a marked advance on its former liberality, and an earnest of greater munificence in the future.

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The state of the weather and roads prevented many from attending the Annual Meeting at BROOKLYN. This to the absent friends was a loss, for when the Rev. E. McNab addresses a meeting in the interest of the Bible Society, the audience is sure to be provided with a literary treat. The Rev. Mr. Ashbury also and the venerable president, in short but comprehensive speeches, so encouraged the cause that a marked improvement in the hitherto good contribution of the Newport Branch has accrued.

Travelling along the shore on foot from BURLINGTON to MAITLAND, and as is usual in Spring, over very muddy roads, I met with only partial success, either as regards meetings or monies. The meeting at BURLINGTON was small, so was that at KEMPT SHORE; that of CHEVEREE was larger, and its returns shew an improvement; but the erst good old branch of NOEL shews a sad declension from its former record. As NOEL possesses a few very staunch supporters of our cause, we trust that their liberality will inspire others to increase their annual gifts. Writing of NOEL reminds me of LIGHTS AND SHADOWS which make a deeper impression than the ups and downs of mere financial affairs. On my annual rounds I never fail to hear that some old friends of the Society have been removed by death from every Branch; but the home of my erst hospitable friends in NOEL has lately been darkened by the removal of two sweet and lovely children who often hung around my neck. I wrote their names on the record within the boards of the 'family Bible;' the shadow of the dark angel's wing has swept over that page written by the frail finger of man, but it is chased away by the healing and resplendent effulgence of the Sun of Righteousness, for in the sacred pages of that Book the finger of inspiration has traced the divine Redeemer's love,

“Suffer the little children to come unto Me for of such is the kingdom of Heaven;” and their names being written on the Lamb’s Book of Life, “their angels do always behold the face of their Heavenly Father.” O for that happy day when the broken heart and hopeless eye of Heathendom will be healed and brightened by these same sacred oracles, and for the universal possession of that faith which now cheers the bereaved parents of the ransomed children, Helena Augusta and Benjamin Gladstone O’Brien.

Unfortunately the notices of meetings in MAITLAND and vicinity were imperfect, and only a few persons assembled in the Congregational Church; and owing to the absence from home of some old contributors my canvas did not quite realize as much as on last year. Again I feel constrained to renew my annual appeals to the Christians of Maitland to organize a *Working Branch* of the Bible Society. A committee of ladies could not fail of success in a community so wealthy and generous, favored as it is with christian pastors of more than average ability and missionary zeal.

On Sabbath, 28th April, I addressed the congregations of CLIFTON and GREENOCK, and now rejoice at the marked advance of liberality as shewn in our financial columns.

After labouring about two months in New Brunswick I resumed the visitation of the Nova Scotia Branches, beginning with meetings at FOLLEIGH and DEBERT on Sabbath, June 23rd. These congregations have this year responded generously to our call, and Mr. R. Morrison, the venerable and ever zealous president of that branch, handed to me from his sick couch his supposed parting donation of \$8.00.

The meetings at BELMONT and DEBERT were well attended and the plate collections were respectively

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\$8.80 and \$5.07, a small additional gift was subsequently forwarded to Halifax from the former place.

At ANTIGONISH I received from the collection plate \$7.85, and a subsequent remittance from there swells the donation to \$34.68. This sum is considerably less than that of last year, but as the amount comes chiefly, if not altogether, from one section of the church, it shows how much might be accomplished for this universal charity if all the denominations in that town were equally loyal to the cause.

From June 27th till July 15th I laboured with good success in the beautiful Island of CAPE BRETON, collecting personally and addressing meetings at NORTH SYDNEY, SYDNEY MINES, LITTLE BRAS D'OR, SYDNEY, BRIDGEPORT, RESERVE MINES, COW BAY, BIG GLACE BAY, GLACE BAY, WHYCOCOMAGH, PORT HASTINGS, and PORT HAWKESBURY. I failed to obtain meetings at some other places through lack of announcements, I also missed the usual contributions of many old friends who were absent from home. You will notice in the financial columns quite an advance in the contributions of SYDNEY, NORTH SYDNEY and HAWKESBURY. That of NORTH SYDNEY is especially worthy of our warmest thanks, while WHYCOCOMAGH, for many years dead to our cause, again joins our ranks and cheers us with its gifts. It is always a pleasure to visit CAPE BRETON; its hospitality is so generously offered and keenly enjoyed, while its sea breezes and lake scenery are so exhilarating, that even under incessant travel and public speaking one improves in vigour every day, and with reluctance bids adieu to its hills and lakes, its refreshing air, friendly inhabitants and generous steamboat proprietors,—for there, as on the River St. John, your agent is always granted free passage go where and as often as he will.

From the 10th to the 25th September I was engaged visiting the branches, LOCHABER and UNION CENTRE, SHERBROOK, TRURO, ACADIA MINES, GREAT VILLAGE, PORTAUIQUE and BASS RIVER, ECONOMY, FIVE ISLANDS and AMHERST, and from the 15th to the 27th November those of OXFORD, WALLACE, PUGWASH, SPRINGHILL, RIVER HEBERT, PARRSBORO, CANNING, CHURCH ST., CANARD, WOLFVILLE, HORTON, KENTVILLE, LAKEVILLE, SOMERSET. WATERVILLE, AYLESFORD, WILMOT. BRIDGETOWN, ROUND HILL, ANNAPOLIS, DIGBY and BAY VIEW, WEYMOUTH, YARMOUTH and BARRINGTON. In most of these places there is little new to report. As on former occasions I was everywhere kindly received, and at the meetings interest was generally manifested. Looking over the contribution lists will, in some cases, produce deep depression of spirit, and in others outbursts of joy. TRURO shews a slight declension, but I hope that next year she will more than retrieve her honor, — indeed that fine and prosperous city might now becomingly double her highest record on our list. Will the ladies of TRURO come to the rescue and lead in the good cause? The contributions from AMHERST, SPRINGHILL, OXFORD and WALLACE give cheering evidences of the business prosperity of these places and their growth in grace. I was greatly encouraged, when, at the close of my address at ACADIA MINES, a gentleman placed in the collection plate his check for \$10.00. He had often contributed to our cause but that was his first attendance at the Bible Society meeting, and he declared that henceforth he would annually contribute to the cause if enabled to do so. This circumstance should encourage the Society's friends to work for the promotion of large meetings everywhere. You will share my joy and pour out your congratulations also at seeing the liberal contribution from WALLACE.

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In former years my predecessor was so discouraged by the incessant and virulent clamour of the enemies of the British and Foreign Bible Society, that at last he abandoned that field as hopeless; but in 1887 we received \$5.07, in 1888 \$24.30, and in 1889 \$62.89, —an increasing and most forcible protest against that bigotry which could lift its hands and shut its eyes in super-holy horror at the *impious obstinacy* of our young lady collectors in "*daring*" to raise funds for the diffusion of DESAHEY'S TESTAMENT among FRENCH papists, and other '*corrupt*' bibles elsewhere in Europe! Yes, it is indeed a fitting protest against such inane jargon as would imprecate God's wrath against the Romish priesthood for denying the Bible to the laity and in the same breath condemn our Society for giving them the precious book. And while the christians of WALLACE know that that same version has guided Father Chiniquy and forty priests with also forty thousand of their French co-religionists into the pure faith of Protestantism in Quebec Province, and also hundreds of thousands in old France, they will not henceforth be prevented from responding nobly to our appeals for help to continue the same blessed work.

I regret that we receive so little from the township of WILMOT, but am encouraged to expect an awakening in that place next autumn to its sense of evangelistic duty and privilege in this respect.

The town of DIGBY, too, is behind in the good work; indeed but for the liberality of a very few good people there, its name and influence in the diffusion of the written word would be almost unknown on our books and unfelt in the world. What a pleasing contrast is furnished by our young branch in the neighbouring village of WEYMOUTH. There, a deep interest in our cause was aroused on its first presentation, which has

steadily increased, and I feel will continue to grow as the years roll on, and its most charming environments become more thickly dotted with the residences of its thrifty and cultured citizens. May the genial president of this branch never lack a worthy descendant to occupy its honorable chair.

Our meeting at YARMOUTH was, as usual, pleasant, and the contributions from that fine city higher than of yore; and they would have been still greater had sickness not prevented me from making a more thorough canvass for support. There I collected \$74.90, and the ladies, who had just preceded me, a still larger sum. YARMOUTH always does well, but were some of its monied magnates to contribute in proportion to that of their neighbours of smaller means, she would still more highly honor her good name.

Arrangements were made for three meetings in BARRINGTON branch on Sabbath, 17th November, but I was able to fill only one of these appointments. During my travels through the counties of Annapolis, Digby and Yarmouth, I laboured under poor health. Hope of improvement urged me on to fill the many appointments for meetings, but my sufferings daily increased, and while in BARRINGTON I was completely prostrated and had to cancel all appointments between BARRINGTON and MAHONE BAY. Although my health was still impaired after a fortnight's rest, I visited DARTMOUTH, MAHONE BAY, LUNENBURG, LAHAVE, DUBLIN and BRIDGEWATER where I held some meetings and returned home on the 21st of December.

Our thanks are again due to the kind ladies of BRIDGEWATER for their zeal in the cause, as manifested in the handsome gift of \$75.00, and their promise to continue in the work. May their labours be ever well crowned with success, and may they, together with those who respond to their call, receive their reward.

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You will notice with much pleasure that our friends at LUNENBURG have at last adopted our general plan of branch operations. Its attendant success will, also, I trust, encourage them to continue the work, annually, on the same lines. My personal canvas of that town last year realised \$60.74, but the ladies have now rolled up the handsome sum of \$78.88, and had all the old friends of the Society been at home during their canvas, the amount would have been even more munificent.

In closing this hurried and imperfect report I have only to add that I very much regret the smallness of success which my canvas for *new* subscribers last January met with in HALIFAX. I believe that there are hundreds of your fellow-citizens who would readily join our ranks, and also that there are many present contributors who would more than double their annual gifts were our most worthy cause duly presented to them. That this may yet be attained, and our highest hopes for the Society's success elsewhere be speedily consummated, is ever before the eye and deep in the heart of
