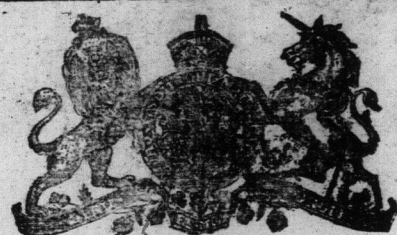

## A Sailor Drowned

Fred Pardo, master of the schooner Linda Pardo, which arrived at Brigue from Sydney recently with a load of coal, reports that one of his crew, Robert Hatcher, aged 32, married, of Grand Bank, was drowned on the 18th inst. through being washed from the jibboom.

It is generally understood among sailors that it is due to carelessness on the part of the captain or wheelsman when a man is washed overboard from a jibboom. When it is necessary to send a man out on the jibboom the vessel should be "kept away," which allows her to "run easy." If this is not attended to and the vessel comes "to the wind" the danger is great because of the dipping of the jibboom.

We are not saying that there was any carelessness in this case, neither do we know if an investigation was held. We do know, however, that another precious life has been "snuffed" out, and a wife and possibly children are left to mourn and struggle along without their bread-winner. Will an investigation be held? Or will the drowning of this poor fellow be simply recorded in the press? The man was in a dangerous position, a place where numbers of sailors lose their lives every year. Was the vessel handled properly while Hatcher was on the jibboom? Was every attempt made to rescue him after he fell in the water? Were there lifebuoys on board and were they utilized as they should have been?

**HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY**

(Concluded.)

MONDAY, MARCH 9th.

The House met at 8 pursuant to adjournment.

MR. DOWNER presented a petition from St. George's for Temperance Reform.

MR. HICKMAN presented petitions from Botwood, Northern Arm, Peter's Arm, New Bay, and other places, on Temperance Reform.

DR. LLOYD presented petitions from British Harbor, Ireland Eye, etc., re cottages; also, from Smith's Sound, re roads.

MR. DEVEREAUX presented a petition from Point Verde, for drainage.

MR. STONE presented a petition from Whale's Brook, for Electric Road Board, and re Telephone; also from New Perlican, re mills.

MR. HALFYARD presented a petition from Fogo, on various public matters, and for a canal; also from Tilling, for a well; also from Seldom-Come-By, for a bridge; also from Fogo, for Temperance Reform.

MR. TARGETT presented petitions from New Melbourne and Brownsdale on Temperance, and from Blaketown, re Electric Road Board.

MR. HICKMAN presented a petition from Bay-de-Verde, Daniel's Cove and Grate's Cove, re road.

MR. COAKER presented a petition from Charlottetown, re Temperance.

THE PREMIER presented petitions from St. John's West, re Temperance. The Premier (for the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, absent through the sickness) presented the report of the Fisheries Commission of the Legislature.

**NOTICE OF MOTION.**

It was moved and seconded and carried that the Rules of the House be suspended in relation to all matter now before the House.

**ORDER OF THE DAY.**

Second reading of Council's Amendments for Sealing Bill.

MR. KENT said that some of the amendments to the Bill were extensive and there were now sections added. He proposed a departure from the usual rule of two readings and that the House go into Committee of the Whole on the amendments.

The motion being put accordingly was carried.

MR. PARSONS took the Chair of Committee.

The amendments were read by the Prime Minister.

The Committee rose and reported having passed the amendments with some amendment.

The Council's amendments were concurred in and ordered to be sent to the Legislative Council with a message.

Second reading of Council's amendments to Saw Mills Bill.

THE PREMIER shortly explained the amendments, which were unimportant. The amendments were read the second time and concurred in, and a message ordered to be sent to the Legislative Council accordingly.

The Pilotage Bill was read the third time and ordered to be sent to the Legislative Council for their concurrence.

Third reading of the Bill to amend the Revenue Act, 1906.

MR. KENT desired to refer to the question of the balance of trade. No other conclusion could be drawn from our trade figures as furnished, except that we were drawing upon our reserves.

The question of the balance of trade depended on the particular country in question, and its circumstances. There was no parallel between English or Canadian conditions and our own. Both countries were drawing on reserves; England, because she had the accumulated wealth of her past energies, and invested it in shipping and foreign enterprises, and in connection with acting as the financial agent of the world.

Canada, on the other hand, was anticipating her future borrowing on the security of her future development. Canadian borrowings of all sorts were enormous. We on the other hand, borrowed little or nothing, except what the Government had lately. Our trade figures showed practically our whole financial or commercial position. He could see no justification for the taking off of a large sum last year in the taxation, and the restoring of the other taxes this year. There was no necessity for such an increase as had been made in taxation. Last year's predic-

tion of the Opposition had been verified, that the Government would be unable to carry on its services with that reduction of taxation. Extravagance had prevailed in many branches of the public service. Proper care had not been taken in estimates, and proper supervision had not been given to expenditure. posed the other evening that the merging of these two undertakings be allowed only on condition of their giving up their monopoly to some extent. The grant of such a monopoly, however unobjectionable was always objected to. In the case of a company in a small business, and a locality of small population, such as this, where the margin of profit was very small, and no enormous increase of population was to be expected, they must be given some advantages to induce them to establish. The selling company in this case had found their own undertaking impossible, and were merely getting out with their bare expenses. The purchasing company gave a good service and a cheap light, and were always under the competition of cheap kerosene oil. The companies represented that this monopoly would be their only protection in the investment. He therefore moved the adoption of the Amendment.

MR. GRIMES thought that to give such exclusive rights to any company might have disastrous consequences. He objected to monopolies generally; they had everywhere been found objectionable. As to the forfeiture clause, it seemed that the company was not bound to light all the towns referred to. He might leave any one town, and it would in practice be impossible for one town to light itself without the co-operation of the others.

MR. HIGGINS said that the actual fact was that the monopoly was not being created to-night. It was granted last year. But if the two charters were before him now, he would vote for them. This question of creating monopoly had been dealt with in other cases already. No one would create companies of this kind without some guarantee that he would be protected. At present the people of Harbor Grace and Carbonear had very satisfactory light and power much cheaper than in St. John's. We might expect the same of other companies and localities. The prospects were that no other company could or would provide as light and power as we had. It had to be done by one company anyhow. The question was, should the company have a monopoly, or would the places do without light altogether. The dividend paid last year was \$5,800, as he understood, and not \$20,000 as Mr. Grimes stated. The dividends were very backward in the matter of modern conveniences; and if we could in any way facilitate the introduction of electric lights in these places, they should try to do so. The shareholders in these concerns were not foreigners, coming here for privileges, but our own people.

MR. GRIMES said that his intention was that the Government should give the present privileges only on condition of the company giving up its monopoly in some measure.

THE PREMIER said that he had risen to the Committee yesterday out of courtesy to Mr. Grimes, to ask the companies if they would give up their monopoly rights. This was of course helpless; they would naturally not hear of it. The privileges had been given years ago to the companies, as the preliminary to getting them to go there at all. No sane man would invest money otherwise.

THE PREMIER said that in 1902 the United Towns Electrical Co. got their concessions; and for 12 years they had given every satisfaction, and a cheap

(Continued from page 2) light. It was obvious that if a company did not keep its rates down, it would not sell its light at all. People did not have to take in the light, and if it were dear, they would not. They would use kerosene, which was cheap. A company had been incorporated by the House for Twillingate, another for Trinity and Bonavista, and now this Conception Bay Co., and not one of them could get the capital, and every one of them was dead now except the Conception Bay Co., now under consideration, and that was now asking to sell its rights for the bare expense it had gone to. On the general principle of not granting monopolies he agreed with Mr. Grimes, but here was a case where it had to be done. These dangers were always predicted, but in this country they had never come to pass. The Committee rose and reported having passed both bills without amendment. Both Bills were read the 3rd time, passed, and sent to the Legislative Council. Committee of the Whole on Public Service Bill. The Committee passed the Bill, and it was sent to the Council.

Home Rule Again Before the Lords

London, June 23.—In introducing the amending bill the Marquis of Crewe dwelt much on the religious difficulties surrounding the question of Ulster, but while he admitted the necessity for some form of exclusion for those who deemed themselves affected by the Home Rule Bill, he contended that the exclusion of the entire province of Ulster would involve great injustice. The Government consequently, he said, had reiterated in the amending bill Premier Asquith's proposal of exclusion by counties from the operation of the Home Rule measure. The Marquis of Crewe made it quite clear, however, that the amending bill was not necessarily the Government's last word. The bill gives the widest possible latitude for an amendment, he said, and he explained that under the civil government in the excluded areas would be administered by the Lord Lieutenant through officers to be appointed by him. The Marquis of Lansdowne, Unionist leader, said he was profoundly disappointed at the fact that the bill merely embodied proposals which had been already rejected. He asserted that it was shabby and undignified for the Government to present an unacceptable bill with an open invitation to the Opposition to give its assistance in converting it into a workable measure that would avoid civil war. The Government, he declared, was perfectly aware that the amending bill was not sufficient for that purpose. The Marquis expressed relief that the Government had at least realized the necessity of making some effort to avert an imminent danger. He wished he could add that its contribution to day had met the need for fundamental changes in the Irish Home Rule Bill which alone could make it workable. The bill was then read a first time but it is understood that extensive changes are to be made by the Unionist majority in the House of Lords when it reaches the committee stage and that afterwards there will be an opportunity for compromise and negotiation.

Quebec, June 20.—Two bodies, the first recovered from the lost liner, the Empress of Ireland, arrived here today on the Ocean Limited C. P. R. train from Rimouski. They were recovered late yesterday by divers from the schooner Marie Josephine. The first corpse brought up was identified as Mrs. Marshall. She was about 40 years old. The second body was that of a man named Criswell, of Lethbridge, Alta, about 58 years old. Both bodies were found lying on the hull of the Empress, caught fast between railings.

Making Acid-Proof Iron. The firm of Berchers & Monatz of Aix-la-Chapelle, has just brought out an iron amalgam consisting of 35 per cent. iron, 60 per cent. chromium and from 2 to 3 per cent. molybdenum, which is said to be proof against all acids. The new Cunard steamship Aquitania, which has just arrived in New York on her maiden voyage, is not the largest vessel in the world, but she is the largest under the British flag. She is 901 feet long, while the Imperator is 919, and the Vaterland 950. If not the largest, she is believed to be the fastest of the big steamships. On her voyage across the Atlantic she averaged 23.63 knots an hour, and on one day the average was 24.24. She seems also to be better handled than the German ships. She was docked without the least mishap in the Hudson river, where the Vaterland had so much trouble recently, both in getting in and out. Captain Turner in charge of the Aquitania, became well known to patrons of the Cunard line as commander of the Lusitania and the Mauretania. He has circumnavigated the globe several times.

Hon. A. W. Piccott, Minister of Marine and Fisheries for Newfoundland, who spent last week in this city, is now winding up his calls on old Newfoundlanders in Vancouver and leaves shortly for eastern points on his way home. Ladner and other points on the river were visited and a motor car trip made to Fraser Mills, where an extra big stick happened to come under the saws just at the right moment for the visitor's entertainment.

While here Mr. Piccott met and talked with Mayor Gray, Col. J. D. Taylor, M. P., Chief Inspector F. H. Cunningham, of Dominion Fisheries, and other prominent local men. His visit to the coast being entirely unofficial Mr. Piccott's many old acquaintances here and in Vancouver have kept his time well filled with various forms of entertainment since his arrival. He had grown out of the recollection of many who had not seen him since he was a boy, for he weighs about 240 pounds now, but his welcome by the local Atlantic islanders was warm.

Ten thousand people attended the service in the Arena, Toronto, and 100,000 citizens lined the streets when the funeral cortege of Mrs. Commissioner Rees, Col. and Mrs. Sydney Maidment, and 14 other Salvationists were buried in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.
