

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

THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

MINUTES OF THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL MEETING, held April 15, 1896.

THE PRESIDENT'S REMARKS.

Friends, before the annual reports are read, permit me to offer a few remarks as to the past and present of our Institution. We esteem it a cause of gratitude to the Giver of all good to have been so long spared, and to have seen the beginning of this work, and the wonderful way the Father of all has watched over our efforts in providing for, and sustaining a home that has proved by His blessing so useful during the past thirty-two years ; and among the many benevolent institutions in our city, our own stands one of the most useful. I may be forgiven by a few reminiscences of our early history, as follows :

The Institution was incorporated on May 10, 1863. Those who made the application to Government were twentyfour, all of whom are gone to the Land of the Leal, with the exception of three now living. Of those who have been honored to engage in this work continually are two, both of whom live in the city. The

work was began and carried on for years, whose Presidents were : first, John Redpath ; second, William Murray, and third, William Workman, men who took deep and earnest interest in carrying out the duties of the Home, while spared to us, and left afterwards substantial legacies to help carry on the work so thoroughly began in behalf of the friendless poor. The work widening in the city, what had long been thought of, was to utilize the farm, kindly bequeathed to the Institution by the late Thomas Molson, Esq. After much consideration and renewed subscriptions on the part of fellow-citizens, the present Home at Longue Pointe was established, and has proved to be a cheerful and health-giving Home since its opening. To many who have not known, a wing was added to the first building by the late Wm. Workman, Esq., which gave more room for the work of the Institution, and which was much needed. Excuse me for referring again, as was done in remarks made at our last annual meeting as to the Moore Home for convalescent and incurable sufferers. This, indeed, has been the missing link in the beneficent work of this Institution erected by one of our Governors, and furnished by two others of our numbers whose interest in the Home still continues unabated. As to this department of our work, it has proved most useful to us-the adaptedness for its purposes, all those who have visited the Home gladly testify. It is very encouraging to your Board of Management to find the sympathies and good will of our fellow-citizens still continue through all these years, as is evident by their kindly gifts. Nor should we forget the interest taken in our Longue Pointe Home, as well as in the night Refuge in the city, by several organiza-

tions who contribute not a little to the happiness of our inmates by concepts of music, addresses, and readings etc. The Ladies of the Industrial Rooms have 'been most attentive to the wants of our Homes, not only giving work to needlewomen in large numbers, thus encouraging self help, yet find time to send a deputation of their number pretty regularly to visit our Home, not only giving comfort to our inmates, but saving words of encouragement to our Matron, Mrs. McMillan and her two assistants, Misses Wallace and Grant. These ladies often send to aged people suitable articles of underclothing, which are so useful and helpful. We can assure these ladies that they have the sincere thanks of the Governors of the Institution. Permit me a few words more. One by one our Governors are passing away, whose faces we see no more. By looking at the last year's report, how few of those who saw the first stone laid are now remaining. Out of the two hundred and sixty-two, only eightynine are spared; the lesson is a solemn one. Let us be in earnest and faithful in doing this work. Most of us who have been in the harness for all these years are getting towards life's close, and being on what might be called Royal Bounty, and we long to see young and whole-souled men take hold and prosecute this benevolent duty. Fellow-workers the duties that we try to discharge are worthy of all your self-denying labors put forth in its behalf, being akin' to that of Him who came to help the suffering and the scrrowful who left us this example. as much as you have done\ it unto one of the least of these you have done it unto me."

THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL RE-PORT FOR YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 1896.

INMATES.

The average for the year, 121; the highest number, 131; the lowest, 116; showing an average of 8 less than last year. In the George Moore Memorial Home an average of 30, the highest 37, the lowest 22; in Home at present 36.

NIGHT REFUGE.

Number of lodgings given in Night Refuge was:--men, 38,300; women, 904. Total, 39,204, being 4,196 more than last year.

SOUP KITCHEN.

The quantity of soup and extra meals was 98,944, being 9,838 rations over last vear.

MAINTENANCE.

The cost of maintenance has been \$14,506.10; the sum of \$7,538.38 was

expended for food, being \$2,017.84 more in this item than in 1894-95.

DEATHS.

Thirty-two, 19 men and 13 women; total 32. In Country Home, 17; Moore Home, 5; in Refuge, 3; died in Hospital, 7.

KINDLING WOOD.

This industry is carried on as usual, and the returns are satisfactory, as will appear by the Treasurer's statement. A stock of dry wood is kept on hand, and it is hoped that the friends of the Institution will continue to patronize us.

OUTDOOR LABOR.

During the Fall and Winter men were, as formerly, sent out to work, and gave general satisfaction. Owing to a lack of snow in the early part of the season, as well as other causes, very little demand for men was had. The proceeds carried to revenue account was \$131 as against \$429 last year.

POOR RELIEF.

The Committee met weekly on Monday morning during the year, the pressing needs of the Moore Home required weekly meetings during the summer as well as the winter. Their duty is to attend to all that relates to the internal arrangements of both the City and Country Houses.

INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

The Ladies of the Industrial Rooms and Visiting Committee are entitled to the thanks of the Governors and the community for their unremitting attention to the work committed to their management. Their report will be laid before you.

BOARD OF OUTDOOR RELIEF.

The thanks of the Governors and of the Public are due to the Board of Outdoor Relief for the efficient manner in which they have discharged the onerous. duties committed to them.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

The Board place much value on the faithful and self-denying attention shown by the Ministers of the city, and others who attend to the moral and religious interests of our people, both of those of the Night Refuge and the Country Homes, and their weekly services at the Country House on the Lord's day.

ENTERTAINMENTS GIVEN TO OUR PEOPLE.

The Board desire to express gratitude to the garious churches, societies, and other kind friends who have contributed by social gatherings at both City and Country Houses, with music, songs, recitations, etc., thus giving pleasure and enjoyment with kind words to our inmates, especially during the cheerless winter evenings. For all such and increasing interest our Board are sincerely thankful.

It will be seen from the financial statement that our expenditure is in excess of our receipts for the year in the item of food. There is an increase of over two thousand dollars. One of the reasons for this, is the increased expenditure connected with the George Moore Memorial Home, and its administration. The Board will look to their kind friends to remember us and our work by increased liberality.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF OUT-DOOR RELIEF FOR WINTER OF 1895-96.

The Board beg to submit to the subscribers of the Outdoor Relief Fund the annual report of its proceedings during the past year, together with the account showing the receipts and expenditure for the same period. On December 12th,. 1895, a meeting was held of city clergymen, representatives of some of the National Societies and Committee of House of Industry and Refuge, with a view to arrange for the winter's work. After fully discussing the subject of relief, it was resolved that the operations of the Board be carried on as usual, and the following gentlemen were appointed as a Committee for that purpose, and to make an appeal to the public, through the press, for donations to sustain the work, viz.--Charles Alexander, A. F. Gault, James Moore, Hon. J. K. Ward, Wm. Reid, Joseph Richards, James Wilson, Jeffrey H. Burland and Rev. F. Riedel. The meetings of the Board for the distribution of relief commenced on Thursday, December 19th, 1895, and were continued weekly, on Thursdays, to March 10th, 1896, as shown by annexed statement. Since the Board closed, a number of destitute families, widows, and deserted wives are being cared for. The relief given consisted of fuel, wood and coal, bread, oatmeal and flour, tea and soap, new and second-hand clothing. Each case brought under the notice of the Board was carefully investigated, and if found worthy was relieved.

The Board acknowledge and return thanks for the very generous support afforded by the citizens and friends at a distance, to Mr. George F. Hartt for five tons stove coal, delivered to twenty families through the city; to the city newspapers, viz.: Gasette, Herald, Wilness, Star, the Board desire to return sincere thanks. The Board desire to record the valuable services rendered to them by the Rev. Messrs. Patterson, McCManus, de Gruchy, Duclos, Massey and Roy, Mr. P. McLeod and other Christian workers in attending the Board, visiting and reporting cases that came under their notice.

The account current with D. McMillan, Secretary-Treasurer, duly audited, is herewith submitted, showing a balance due the Treasurer of \$275.20.

During the summer months there are several widows depending on occasional support from the Board through the year, and we therefore appeal to our friends to help to continue this needful work.

ATTENDING PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

To the Board of Management of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge.

GENTLEMEN,—The health of the inmates during the past year has been fairly good. In the early part of the winter a large number of them suffered from influenza, mostly of a mild type, but in' several instances with fatal results.

Thirty two deaths occurred during the year in the three houses, divided as follows :---

Country House, 17; Moore Convalescent Home, 5; General Hospital, 4; Royal Victoria Hospital, 2; Notre Dame Hospital, 1; City Refuge, 3. Total, 32.

The total for last year was nineteen. The great increase is, to some extent, accounted for by the larger number of persons under the control of the management, as the Moore Home is included.

One half of those who died were considerably over 75 years of age. Seven of them were over 80, so that in a general way, senility might be called the cause of death.

The institutions are visited at all times when called upon to do so, and it is satisfactory to state that the instructions given by the medical attendants are carried out with a zeal and will that reflects credit upon the staff of both the Country House as well as the Moore Home.

As predicted last year, the Moore Home is gradually becoming better known and appreciated by the general public, and has been the means of greatly benefitting numerous cases convalescing from protracted illness.

The Annual Bazaar, held in December, realized \$4,052.12. This Bazaar is our principal means of disposing of the accumulated stock; garments being brought in by the workers at the rate of 300 per week through the winter.

The amount realized at the fancy-work table, viz, \$351.29, was expended in purchasing clothing to distribute among the different charitable institutions and individual poor, thus performing a double charity. This should prove a great incentive to further help in this direction.

The annual spring sale took place this month and realized \$483.15. Over 6,000 garments still remain to be disposed of, and we earnestly appeal to all kind hearted friends to help us to reduce this accumulated stock, and thus enable the Committee, not only to carry on but greatly extend their benevolent aid.

Through the generosity of friends, our workers were all provided with Christmas dinners and gifts of clothing. A full list of contributors is appended. A kind friend sent \$40 and another \$30 to provide summer trips for some of the poor women, and still another helped us to provide coal or wood for 18 families.

Mrs. John McDougall kindly provided "A Tea" in March for the inmates of the Old People's Home at Longue Pointe, also to the women workers. A thoroughly enjoyable afternoon was spent, one and all expressing their gratitude for this gleam of sunshine shed on the routine of, daily life.

We record with the deepest regret the removal by death of Miss Rintoul and Miss Todd, two of our most valued members, whose kindly sympathy and active aid will be much missed and long remembered.

We are deeply indebted to the Rev. J. Edgar Hill, Rev. C. J. James, Rev. Donald Grant, and the Rev. Thos. J. Renaud, for the short services held with the women while waiting for their work on Friday morning.

The Old 'People's Home has been regularly visited, and we rejoice to know that our aged poor are so well cared for.

We desire to thank, most heartily, the ladies of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's Church Ladies' Aid Societies for visiting and enquiring into the needs of applicants, and for much practical help given. In many cases reported upon, we have found it necessary to supplement the amount paid for work by help from our Gratuity Fund, and we take this opportunity to heartily thank the kind donors to this fund.

We are grateful to the management of the General Hospital and Jones' Convalescent Home for orders given, also to ladies who send us in orders for fine clothing, and thus enable us to provide mote remunerative work for our competent workers. "The Rooms" have been painted and decorated, and we desire to cordially thank Mrs. Gault, and Messrs. R. C. Jamieson, Alex. Ramsay, Colin McArthur, Robt. Munro, and Robt. Mitchell, for donations in kind for same.

Miss Rhind, our able Superintendent, remains in charge, fulfilling the duties of her office in a most faithful and efficient manner.

We would again most heartily thank all those who, by the generosity of their contributions and donations, have enabled us to carry on our work. Specially would we mention the generous collections from the different churches, and the many who, outside of our own Committee, gave practical aid at the time of the Bazaar. We would also extend our sincere thanks to Messrs. D. Bentley & Co., for printing ; Messrs. Burland & Co., for tickets ; Editors of Gazette, Star, Witness, Herald, for insertion of notices, and to all who in any way have helped us in our work.
