



### WOMAN SUFFRAGE IN BRITAIN.

The present position of the Woman Suffrage movement in Great Britain is highly interesting. The general franchise measure to be introduced by the Government at the coming session of Parliament will contain no provision for the extension of the franchise to women. It is a question on which the Cabinet is divided. The Premier is strongly opposed to votes for women. Mr. Asquith received last month a deputation from the National League Opposing Woman Suffrage, and told the delegates that he believed the extension of the parliamentary franchise to women would be a disastrous mistake. He said

which might make it impossible for Mr. Asquith to construe in office. Such a disruption would bring the Conservatives back to power, and that would not help the Woman Suffrage cause.

This is the justification given by Mr. Asquith and Sir Edward Grey for the conclusion that has been reached. The measure will go to the committee stage as introduced and then it will be open for any member of Parliament to propose the addition of a clause giving votes to women. On this clause the vote will be taken without Cabinet in disease. Ministers and private members will divide on the question, and the decision of the House of Commons will be accepted by the Government as effective. If the Woman Suffrage clause is accepted it will theneforth be a part of the Government as effective. If the amended measure should be rejected it would be a defeat of the Government.

# LABOR MEN OPPOSE HIGHER FERRY TOLL

Trades and Labor Council will Provincial Immigration Super-Discuss Matter Tonight -Will also Discuss the Woman's Suffrage Movement.

One of the matters which will come up before the meeting of the trades and labor council this evening will be the action of the common council in raising the ferry tolls. The decision to raise the tolls has caused considerable indignation among the workingmen, and especially among the longshoremen who are obliged to use the ferry so frequently.
