## BOARD OF TRADE ELECTS OFFICERS

**Enthusiastic Meeting of Board Held in Firemen's Hall Friday Evening.**

A largely attended meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the Firemen's Hall Friday evening, President Champoux in the chair.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A communication re freight rates and other important matters from the secretary of the Maritime Board of Trade was read and referred to a committee composed of President Champoux, Stewart, Napier, W. S. Richards, W. H. Miller.

W. D. Duncan read copy of memorial prepared for forwarding to Quebec government. The memorial was endorsed by the Board.

A. T. LeBlanc reported from the delegation which waited upon the Provincial government that the delegation had been well received and promised favorable consideration of bridge matter. A definite reply would be presented later.

W. H. Wallace moved a vote of thanks to the members of the delegation.—Carried.

The secretary read the annual report of the Board, which showed the finances in a fairly good condition.

W. H. Wallace read the report of the Publicity Committee as follows:

To the President and Members of the Campbellton Board of Trade:  
Gentlemen:

Your Publicity Committee appointed last year beg to report as follows: During the winter and spring of 1920 the committee compiled a small directory folder of Campbellton and issued 1000 copies. There were speedily distributed and a further edition of 1000 copies was issued. This was not accomplished without much work on behalf of the committee and others interested, and here we wish to thank all who by their assistance contributed to the success of this our first work in Campbellton publicity. Many compliments have been received by your committee from different Boards of Trade, business men of other towns and cities and many newspapers commented favorably upon the make-up and usefulness of the folder.

Your committee also took an active part in the preparation for the reception and entertainment of the American National Editorial Association in June last. Each member of the party was presented with a copy of our folder and many promised to make a special note of Campbellton in their papers. In this way we were able to reach tens of thousands of American tourists and reading public and placed Campbellton on the map.

Your committee also prepared an article upon Campbellton's progress in 1920 which was published in the local papers besides many in Eastern Canada. From time to time special articles re the Bridge and Campbellton have been forwarded to a list of daily papers and have appeared therein.

The publication of a more pretentious folder, with illustrations had to be postponed because of the high production costs and the lack of funds. We feel sure however that funds could be secured for such work had we any one who would devote the time to the work.

We feel that the work of our committee and the whole Board of Trade has been hampered because of the unfortunate fact that we now have no Town Hall and Board of Trade rooms.

## COUNCIL APPOINTS NEW ASSESSORS

**Meeting Tuesday Evening Transacted. Important Business.**

A special meeting of the town council was held last evening in the fire station with Councillors St. Onge, Bissett, Wallace, Belle-Isle, Chamberlin, Moores and Duncan present.

In the absence of His Worship Mayor McKay, Deputy Mayor Belle-Isle took the chair. In calling the meeting to order he pointed out the meeting was a special one principally to appoint the assessors for the ensuing year, though any business could be brought before the meeting, after the appointment of assessors had been dealt with.

On motion Capt. Harry Eagles was appointed Assessor from Ward I. His Worship Mayor McKay then entered the meeting and took the chair.

On motion John T. Reid was appointed Assessor from Ward II, he to be Chairman of the Board of Assessors.

On motion Fred A. O'Leary was appointed Assessor from Ward III.

Councillor Wallace brought up the matter of the General Supply Co. of Ottawa making enquiries as to whether or not the town would sell its steam roller and rock crushing plant. Considerable discussion took place over the matter in which all the Councillors took part. The discussion naturally brought up many town matters, among them being the policy which would be adopted in caring for our streets, also as to what course would be followed in putting down permanent streets and sidewalks when the work was undertaken—whether the town would do it, or let a contractor for the work to some contracting firm.

In this connection the Water Street sewer also came in for discussion, many of the councillors feeling that before a permanent street was put down on Water street it would be necessary to have the sewer there enlarged, so that the street would not be damaged later on in having to excavate it to put down a sewer which the large majority of the councillors felt must be put in before long. On motion it was decided not to sell the steam roller or rock crusher, and the town clerk was authorized to notify the General Supply Co. to this effect.

Councillor Wallace submitted an agreement entered into by him on behalf of the town with R. P. Jago. The agreement was that Mr. Jago would sell to the town at his gravel pit what gravel the town required at 10¢ per single load and 20¢ per double load. The contract was ratified by the council subject to examination of title to property, and the agreement was ordered filed.

The Public Property and Streets Committee was given authority to rent at least four lots in different parts of the town upon which to store gravel for repairing streets. To be rented for a term of three months after snow goes off. Rent not to exceed \$1.00 per month.

On motion a complete audit of the town accounts by a regular chartered accountant, dating two years back, was ordered made, and his report or otherwise in the work and we trust that our successors will carry on the good work and we will be glad to lend every assistance.

W. H. Wallace gave notice that the Subway matter and the Town Manager plan of town management would be introduced at the next meeting.

P. M. Shannon said he would like to have the Housing Scheme discussed. He said that Campbellton needed two hundred houses this season to provide for new citizens.

The meeting adjourned.

## ELECTION PROTEST TRIAL DELAYED

**Non Arrival of Official Stenographer Ties Up Business.**

The election protest trial which was scheduled for yesterday did not commence as per schedule. The judge was in his place, and a large representative of the legal fraternity was on hand as well as a crowd of spectators, but because of the non arrival of G. P. Leonard of St. John the official stenographer, the case had to be held over until this morning.

Messrs. W. P. Jones and Peter Hughes are appearing for the petitioner while J. B. M. Carter and H. A. Carr are appearing for Messrs. Stewart and Diette.

On motion of Councilor Duncan the town clerk was instructed to lay before the council at its next meeting a statement showing the balances or deficits in the various town departments up to the first of the new year.

Councillor Moores reported that he had consulted with the town solicitor as to whose place it was to provide the Court Room for the town. The Solicitor advised him it was the town's duty to provide it. The matter entailing as it does many perplexing questions relating to our fire station was left over for further discussion at the next meeting of the council.

On motion the Public Charities Committee was authorized to discuss with the Committee appointed by the Municipal Council of Restigouche all matters in connection with the proposed erection of a Municipal Home for the County of Restigouche and report back to council.

F. W. Holt, C. E., submitted a partial report on the contemplated improvements in the Smith Lake reservoir. He also enclosed his account to date, amounting to some \$500, which was ordered paid.

A communication was read from the Mother Superior, Hotel Dieu Hospital, enclosing accounts, amounting to some \$200, for town patients at the Hospital, who on leaving, the institution claimed they were too poor to pay their accounts. Referred to Public Charities Committee.

A communication from Albert L. Tournau, a returned soldier, asking to be relieved of the payment of 1920 taxes was referred to the Assessment and Appeals Committee.

A communication was read from A. T. LeBlanc, solicitor for Mrs. David Smith, notifying the council that as yet no settlement had been made with his client who had her ankle broken upon one of the town streets, and that if a settlement was not made within six days he would bring action. Referred to the town solicitor.

The town clerk read an invitation from the Campbellton Fire Brigade requesting the pleasure of the members of the town council at a turkey supper to be held on Thursday, Feb. 24th. The town clerk was requested to acknowledge receipt of same and to accept their kind invitation.

J. Davidson made application for a license to conduct a dry goods store in the McLean building. Referred to Police and License Committee.

W. J. S. Walsh, temporary town engineer, wrote the council agreeing to perform the duties of the various offices to which he had been appointed temporarily, for the sum of \$75 per month up until May 1st, and to be subject to call at any time. The communication which was an acceptance of the agreement entered into with him was ordered placed on file.

There being nothing further before the meeting council adjourned.

**Close Games at Campbellton Curling Rink on Tuesday.**

The annual bonspiel between rinks chosen by the President and Vice-President of the Campbellton Curling Club was played in the local rink Tuesday beginning at 1:30 o'clock and the games were very close and keenly contested. 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**POINTS TO BE KEPT IN MIND**

When Making Your Income Return Remember the Following.

(Prepared by the Royal Trust Company.)

Tax payable along with return, April 30—at least a fourth. Better pay half, to allow margin for errors, which are heavily penalized.

Form for return must be asked for, not waited for.

Companies' and Employers' lists and fiduciaries' returns to be in by March 31.

Deferred instalments due June 30, Aug. 31, Oct. 31.

Tax reckoned on income of calendar year, Jan. 1 to Dec. 31; or on a company's year ended during that calendar year.

Confiscation of all unreported income, if understatement exceeds 20 per cent; or half, if from 10 to 20 per cent.

Tax increased 25 per cent if return is late.

Six months in jail and \$10,000 fine for false statement.

Normal tax, 4 per cent on net taxable income up to \$6,000, and 8 per cent beyond that.

Exempt from normal tax only: \$2,000 if married or with dependents of certain categories; \$1,000 if unmarried, no dependents; \$200 each for children under 18.

Surtax on incomes beyond \$5,000—rising from 1 per cent on first \$1,000 to 65 per cent on all beyond a million.

Five per cent of both taxes added if taxable income is \$5,000 or more.

Exempt from both normal and surtax: war disability pensions; tax-free bond interest; gifts and bequests; life insurance proceeds; certain incidental gains from turnover of capital assets outside the taxpayer's regular business.

Expenditures to be deducted when calculating taxable income: general business expenses; interest on business borrowings; taxes, insurance, repairs, depreciation, mortgage interest—own residence excepted; payments for own superannuation; carrying charges on securities, not exceeding income therefrom.

Deductions from tax: income tax paid to United Kingdom or other British dominions, or to foreign countries if they reciprocate; certain payments under business profits war tax act and special war revenue act.

Partners pay—not partnerships.

Companies pay normal tax, not surtax.

Executors, guardians and trustees pay for beneficiaries unable to manage their own affairs.

Accrued and undivided profits are taxable.

Married women with separate incomes make separate returns.

Farmers make returns on special forms.

**DECISION ON "NO" POLITICS" ORDER**

C.N.R. Directors Will Not Grant Leave of Absence to Political Candidates.

Toronto, Feb. 14.—President D. B. Hanna, of the C. N. R., has addressed the following letter to F. A. Acland, Esq., Deputy Minister of Labor, setting forth the view of the Government railway with regard to the finding of the Board of Conciliation in the matter of the president's "no politics" order. The letter is dated February 11, and says in part:

"The board of directors at its meeting yesterday gave careful consideration to the reports of the majority and minority of the Board of Conciliation and while not accepting any of them, desires to point out that both the majority and minority reports find that the granting of leave of absence for political purposes is a question that rests with the management, the majority report stating "the management may refuse leave of absence for proper cause if in its opinion it would be against the interest of the railway" and the minority report states (referring to cases on other railways) that "it was shown in each case that it was by special arrange-

Prince of Wales Received Judge Patterson—Will Visit France.

LONDON, Feb. 14.—The Prince of Wales has received Judge Patterson, captain of the Canadian curlers, and accepted the team's badge as a memento of the occasion.

The Canadian curlers will deposit a wreath on the cenotaph in Whitehall in memory of the curlers of the empire, and will go to France, where they will visit the Canadian battlefields and cemeteries.

**TO LIMIT QUEBEC RENTAL INCREASES**

Quebec, Feb.—Peter Bercovitch, member for St. Louis, Montreal, has given notice of the introduction of a bill to limit rental increases to 20 per cent over those paid during the rental year of May 1, 1920, to April 30, 1921. The bill is designed to deal with what Mr. Bercovitch considers to be an abnormal situation arising out of the war, rather than as a precedent to interfere with the rights of private property. The bill probably will meet with great difficulties, as the additions of this legislature are against the principle of such measures, but even if not accepted in some checks on landlords who want excessive profits may come from it.



RAPID INCREASE
IN AUTOMOBILES

Nearly Two Hundred Thousand
Dollars Received From This
Source Last Year.

It seems difficult to believe that
10,442 automobiles and 659 motor
trucks were owned and registered in
New Brunswick last year, yet that is
the number on which registration fees
were collected by the Department of
Public Works. This information is
all the more surprising because of the
fact that fifteen years ago there were
but twelve autos owned in the provin-
ce which paid registration fees to the
amount of \$54. When the old
government came into power in 1908
the number of autos had grown to 79
on which fees to the amount of \$234
were collected. In 1916, the last year
of old administration, the number of
autos registered was 2986, nearly all
of which were owned in cities and
towns and the total registration fees
amounted to \$38,482. It was thought
then by many people that the limit
had about been reached, but this did
not prove to be the case. During
1918 notwithstanding the war, the
number of cars more than doubled and
252 motor trucks were registered.

Although the greatest war in his-
tory was in progress at the time and
thousands of young men were absent
from the province the number of autos
and motor trucks steadily increased
and last year the revenue from this
source almost touched the \$200,000
mark, the exact figures being \$198,
111.76. Now the luxury tax has been
removed from autos, there is likely to
be a further increase during the pres-
ent year, and Hon. Mr. Veniot pre-
dicts a revenue from this source of at
least \$250,000. The following state-
ment shows the number of autos regis-
tered and the amount paid in fees
since 1905:

\$165; 1907, 79 cars, \$234; 1908, 104
cars, \$147; 1909, 167 cars, \$391; 1910,

\$11,116.50; 1914, 1260 cars, \$15,330;
1915, 1900 cars, \$23,116; 1916, 2986
cars, \$38,482; 1917, 4889 cars, \$61,604;
1918, 6259 cars and 252 trucks, \$90,
188.58; 1919, 7840 cars, 412 trucks,
\$116,565.97; 1920, 10,442 cars, 659
trucks, \$198,111.76.




HOPEFUL VIEW
OF LUMBER MARKET

Not so Bright for Pulpwood—
Crown Land Cut in New
Brunswick.

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 12.—With a
most hopeful view of the American
lumber market, which is expected to
pick up and afford a profitable outlet
for the surplus lumber New Brun-
swick may have to offer, R. W. McLe-
lan, president of the Canadian Realty
Co., Ltd., has returned from New
York.

As to the pulp wood market he re-
ports conditions are not so bright be-
cause the American mills are so
heavily overstocked, but the linen
trade, with which he is actively iden-
tified through his position as trustee
of the Cherry Moore estate, which
operates extensive mills at Belfast,
Ireland, is in a much better position
than recently and he believes the mill-
wrights to soon be back to their pre-war
basis.

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 12.—Esti-
mates received from leaders reaching
the Department of Lands and Mines
indicate a cut of approximately 200,
000,000 feet of lumber upon the crown
lands of New Brunswick this year.
This information given out by Hon.
C. W. Robinson, minister of lands and
mines.
Last year the cut of lumber upon
New Brunswick's crown lands was
about 860,000,000 feet and the curtail-
ment of almost fifty per cent that has
been made is about the same as has
been made in the case of privately
owned lands.
Hon. Mr. Robinson estimates that
the revenue from the crown land
stampage rates will not be less than

DR. E. A. SMITH
ON HYDRO POWER

Sees Likelihood of Expansion
Of the Power Plans in
N. B.

Dr. E. A. Smith, W. P. meshet
St. John, Feb. 11.—Hon. Dr. E. A.
Smith, chairman of the New Brun-
swick Electric Power Commission, who
was in the city today, said that the
work on the development at Musquash
was progressing as well or better than
had been anticipated. The weather
conditions this winter had been great-
ly in favor of the contractors, and they
had taken every advantage of it.

Speaking about the distribution of
the power which will be developed at
Musquash, Dr. Smith said that he had
received applications from some of the
municipalities between St. John and
Moncton. The City of Moncton,
while it had not yet asked for a sup-
ply of power, was now taking the mat-
ter up, he said.

In his opinion, it was almost cer-
tain that the government would have
to go ahead and develop the Lepreau
in the near future to satisfy the needs
of these municipalities, as it seemed
possible that all the power developed
at the Musquash would be taken up
here and the power from the northern
part of the province would have to be
carried for too great a distance to
make it economical.

He said that from day to day the
possibilities of hydro power in the
province become more apparent to
him. There were a number of small
rivers which in themselves offer no
great amount of power, but which
might possess excellent facilities for
water storage. It was the intention
of the commission to have these sur-
veyed to ascertain their capacities.
He said that so soon as the whole sys-
tem of power development in the pro-
vince had been completed and con-
nected up one with the other, the
province would present a great attrac-
tion for the establishment of many
industrial undertakings.

**THE HOCKEY WRANGLE.**

It would have won and had no protests if it had obeyed the regulations of those in authority for the league instead of acting as it did. The way to destroy sport is for those who engage in it to forget sport-manship and think only of winning prizes.—Chatham World.

**EARTHQUAKE IN RURAL SECTION**

So far as citizens here are concerned few recognized the tremor as that of an earthquake, but throughout Balmoral and Dundee it was said to be quite heavy and created some alarm. No reports of damage have been received.

**SIX PERISH WHEN HOME BURNED**

**Mother and Five Children Burned to Death Near Moncton.**

Moncton, Feb. 15.—In a fire which destroyed their home at Niagara Road, three and a half miles from Moncton, Mrs. Oliver Gaius Stevens, two daughters, and three sons, perished this morning.

The mother, two daughters and three sons were burned to death. The daughters were Hazel, aged 16; Beatrice aged 13. The sons were Winmore, aged 10; Emmerson, aged 6 or 7; and Gaius aged two years.

There are three surviving members of the family, Curtis and Orley employed in Haig's Mill in Albert County and Clara, who is employed in Moncton.

In conversation with the father, The Transcript was informed that he arose early, alighted a fire and proceeded to the barn to feed his horse.

He stated that they had no kerosene oil in the house, and he was of the opinion that the fire originated from a saucer containing grease, in which was a wick, used by his little daughter, Beatrice, as an improvised lamp. Other than this he could not understand how the blaze started.

Neighbors were soon on hand but the house was a total loss. It was a frame structure covered with tin.

**Fine New School Building Totally Destroyed Early Sunday Morning.**

The fine large school building erected at a cost of \$30,000 was totally destroyed by fire at three o'clock Sunday morning. The loss will be considerably more than \$30,000 while the insurance is only \$20,000.

About three hundred and fifty children attend this school which had ten class rooms.

**MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS**

Semi-Annual Report by D. Murray, M. D., Medical Inspector.

Chief Medical Officer, St. John, N. B.

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit, through Mr. Blanchard, Secretary for the Sub-Health District of Restigouche, my Semi-Annual Report, covering Medical Inspection of Schools, for the term ending December 31st 1920. The Medical Inspection acts under my jurisdiction, includes the Grammar School in the Town of Campbellton and the Rural Schools west of Campbellton. Number of Schools Districts visited

Number of School Rooms Inspected 23  
Number of teachers employed therein 25

Number of pupils examined 871  
I was unable to inspect the Schools at Manu's Mountain and Dawsonville, but will do at an early date. Glenlivet was without a teacher during the last term. All the other Schools within my Medical Inspection area were visited and the pupils examined, as shown in the enclosed report.

I may refer here, somewhat briefly however, to a few of the abnormal conditions found, as set forth more fully under the proper headings in the enclosed Statistical report.

**VACCINATION in the Town Schools**—practically all the pupils had been vaccinated, as the law regarding vaccination has for many years past been enforced and made an essential requisite to admission to school. In the Rural Schools however, the requirements of the Public Health Act in this respect had not been enforced, which accounts for the large number of unvaccinated pupils in those Schools. Several of these pupils have since been vaccinated and the remainder will be attended to during the coming summer.

**EYE AND EAR DEFECTS**—A few cases of Near-Sightedness and Defective Hearing were noticed and referred to Specialists for treatment.

**CONJUNCTIVITIS and BLEPHARITIS**—Quite a number of cases of Catarrhal inflammation of the eyelids and Conjunctival covering of the eyeballs were observed, nearly all of which resulted from Measles, where the eye were neglected during the treatment of that disease and the inflammation ultimately became chronic.

**"Weak eyes,"** so called, also resulted in some cases, necessitating the wearing of glasses to strengthen vision. In every instance I prescribed the required treatment for these conditions.

**ANAEMIA**—Quite a number of cases

of Anæmia and Malnutrition were observed and the pupils (through their parents) were informed that such a condition would retard their physical and mental development and were advised to consult their family physician for treatment.

**ENLARGED TONSILS and ADENOIDS**—134 cases of Enlarged Tonsils presented themselves. In some cases both Tonsils were enormously enlarged, almost blocking the passage for the mouth to the throat and seriously interfering with one of the natural functions of those organs. Unmistakable evidence of Adenoids was also present in at least 13 cases, mostly occurring in those pupils affected with enlarged tonsils. In both cases these conditions I advised immediate Surgical treatment.

**DEFECTIVE TEETH**—Out of a total of 871 pupils examined, 456 had decayed teeth. In every case where the teeth were properly filled by a dentist I classed them as normal in that respect, but in all other cases I strongly advised the pupils to have their decayed teeth attended to at once by a competent dentist and further emphasized the disastrous results which may follow the inability of persons with decayed teeth to properly masticate their food, the nerve racking effect of periodical toothache and the general anæmia and consequent heart fluttering and weakness due to the continual absorption of tooth pus into the blood circulation.

**SKIN DISEASES**—A few cases of Impetigo were noticed and subsequently subjected to treatment but not excluded as the disease is not considered contagious.

**SPINAL DEFORMITY**—3 cases of Curvature of the Spine with considerable deformity of the extremities came up for examination. These were reported to be the result of Infantile Spinal Paralysis. Difficulty in walking and handling objects is experienced but no mental deficiency was noticed.

**HEART DISEASE**—A careful Stethoscopic examination was made in the case of every pupil but only 1 case of heart disease was discovered. This case was traced to a previous attack of Rheumatic Fever.

**PULMONARY DISEASE**—A Stethoscopic examination of the lungs revealed impaired function in 7 cases. Defective breathing, due in some cases to Congenital chest deformity, known as "Flat Chest" and in quite a number of instances caused by the stooping habit and the consequent round shoulders, was particularly noticed.

In these cases physical exercise was advised with deep breathing in the open air, with the object of producing chest expansion and lung development.

3 cases of jerky breathing were revealed. This condition has long since been recognized as an early manifestation of Pulmonary Tuberculosis and whether associated with further evidence of that disease or not, the necessary advice was given regarding the importance of early treatment. Particular attention was drawn to the fact that Tuberculosis is a strictly infectious disease, from which no person is immune who neglects the necessary precautions against infection.

In conclusion I may say that previous to commencing Medical Inspection work in each school room, I outlined briefly the object which the Public Health Department of the Province had in view in organizing this work, which was not merely to obtain important Statistics regarding health conditions in our Schools, but to have the pupils examined individually and informed regarding any effects or ailments that may be discovered on examination, which would tend to retard progress in School or their means of success in after life as well as the means best adapted to remedy those conditions.

These requirements I endeavored to comply with fully and in detail. On completing the inspection work in each class room I took occasion to address the pupils collectively regarding the particular diseases and defects which were in evidence, as revealed by examination and the proper course to pursue regarding treatment and gave instruction as to the best means of avoiding diseases and the preservation of their health, so that when they will be called upon to assume the obligations of matured citizenship they will, as healthy men and women, be better able to cope with the intricate problems of advanced civilization.

Dear Sir:

I note by the Press reports that there is a move on foot in your fair county to establish an Alms House for the care of the aged and unfortunate for your locality. If you will allow me space in your valuable journal to briefly make a few remarks on this project that lies so closely to my heart and mind. This subject, has been before me from early boyhood. Well do I remember years ago when my honored father, the late Judge Geo. H. Wallace, who was also an auctioneer at that time, annually was called on at our Railway Station to sell to the lowest bidder those unfortunate of God's creatures. Before starting the bidding he would address those assembled on that method of caring for those less fortunate to the lowest bidder and in most cases to irresponsible persons, he would say at the close of his remarks, "we sing, Britons Never Shall be Slaves and then ask "him" to "sell" those unfortunate creatures." My father for thirty-six years was Sussex's correspondent to the leading morning and evening papers in Canada. He never lost an opportunity to assail this method of disposing by auction of less fortunate members of our community. I will not say poor for I have a creed that many rich men die poor, while many a poor man dies rich. One day we will all be judged by what we have done for fellowmen, not the amount of gold and bonds we herd up, while going through life.

Kings County has a Municipal Home of which every right thinking person is justly proud of, it is situated at Norton (near the center of the county) near the C. N. R. Railway and the old Post Road leading from St. John to Halifax. This Home is governed by five commissioners, a secretary and the warden of the county and the Mayor of Sussex are ex-official members of the board. The Commissioners meet the second Wednesday in the months of January, April, July and October. Special meetings, if necessary, by order of the chairman can be called, the secretary notifying the board. Warden Thos. Gilliland is chairman and J. P. Atherton, C. E., Secretary.

To be brief in this note the Main building for the Home is about 30x50, brick basement, with a two and a half story wooden building over the basement, a barn 20x36, a hen house about 12x12, hog house about 20x30. The farm consists of 40 acres of land. Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Walker have charge of farm and home. Mr. Walker is a practical farmer. The farm produces hay, oats, pork, butter and other products of the farm to supply most of the necessities for Mr. Walker's family and the inmates. The inmates at present amount to 23, the highest being 33 per annum. To be brief the secretary furnished in his report at the January meeting of the Kings County Council the following statement of the upkeep of each inmate less than four dollars per week, this covers overhead expenses, commissary salaries and travelling expenses, secretaries salary, caretaker's living and salary. There has been recently added to this institution a complete set of operating rooms, not only to be used for the inmates but for private patients. These rooms will be extensively used when fully understood by the public and the words, "Municipal Home" becomes better understood by the public.

At the January sitting of the Kings County Council, fifteen hundred dollars was appropriated for installing an electric light plant, which will make this institution second to none in the country.

Space in this note will not allow me to go further into details, in closing will say the commissioners would gladly go with any delegation your county may send to inspect the home and farm and give any information in their offices. Pardon a few words about the writer, while Mayor of the Town of Sussex for two terms, I was ex-official member of the board and each year since, I celebrated the anniversary of my birthday by going to the home and furnishing some treat for the inmates. Visitors are always welcome to visit this well kept institution at any time. The writer will at any time do anything to assist a progressive country in his native province to be up-to-date in establishing a home such as we have




