INTER-STATE COMMERCE. The U. S. Senate Committee's Report

A Document of Interest to

Washingron, May 5.—The report of the Senate Committee on Inter-State Commerce on Canadian railways has been made public. It is a long and elaborate document, and one of profound interest to the shareholders of the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific as well as to the Canadian people at large. It deals with the alleged diverting of commerce from the railways of the United States to those of Canada and the alleged discrimination on Canadian canals against American vessels.

In concluding the report the committee says that the entrance tee of 50 cents and clearance fee of 50 cents or \$1 every time an American vessel visits a Canadian port on the great lakes and their tributary bays,

an American vessel visits a Canadian port on the great lakes and their tributary bays, rivers and straits, constitutes an unjust discrimination against American vessels, Canadian vessels being exempt from such charges by a license fee of 50 cents payable once a year. Such discrimination violated the spirit if not the letter of the Washington treaty of 1871. The laws of Canada place American and Canadian vessels upon the same terms as to entrance

Canada place American and Canadian vessels upon the same terms as to entrance and clearance fees, but the discrimination is made through an order-in-Council.

The committee recommends that so long as such discrimination continues all Canadian vessels should be required to pay entrance and clearance fees of equal amount on entering and clearing the ports of the

dian vessels should be required to pay entrance and clearance fees of equal amount on entering and clearing the ports of the United States on the great lakes or their tributary navigable waters.

The report also says that the rebate of 18 cents per ton in tolls on certain products of the United States passing through the Welland Canal if bound to Montreal constitutes an unjust discrimination against ports of the United States on Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River. This discrimination is an open-violation both of the spirit and letter of the treaty of Washington.

The committee recommends that so long as this discrimination is made a discriminating toll on the tonnage of all Canadian vessels shall be imposed every time they pass through the Sault Ste. Marie Canal.

The report says that the proposition that Canadian railways which compete with American railways for tariff between different points of the United States shall be subjected to the same requirements of law and regulations which apply to American railways, must command the assent of every fair-minded person. The Canadian laws justify Canadian railways in disregarding the long and short haul clause of the InterState Commerce Act.

The committee recommends that either The committee recommends that either such a license system shall be established as will be applicable to the Canadian railways doing business in the United States, or that some other plan not injurious to the country be adopted which shall secure to American railways an equal chance in competition with Canadian railways.

Mr. Platt, a member of the committee, dissented from the above report. He wants the long and short haul clause and the pooling clause of the Inter-State Commerce Law repealed.





6. No second entrance accepted until the first 300 shots are fired.



cross and follow me." He said if men continued to take a natural view of (Christ's religion they could never understand why it was necessary for Christ to die, for the mind of man is carnal. They forget that sacrifice is necessary to further the kingdom of Christ; besides, men say that all that is necessary to establish a kingdom and make men better is education, good laws and public opinion. But the Scriptures teach us that it is wrong to suppose that prohibitory laws will elevate humanity; nothing will do this but law in conjunction with the Gospel of Christ, one of the foundations of which is "truth" As soon as men are willing to look at things just as they are, without prejudice, then truth will predominate. The next is "right." Some say anything done to bring about a good end is all that is necessary, such as "the end justifies the means." The kingdom of heaven shall be established on three great laws—"truth," "right" and "love." How are we going to carry these into every day life? By bearing tribulations patiently by work and prayer. Christ suffered and we are to do likewise. This prepares a man for his heavenly home. Some people would like to get into heaven by folding their arms and silde as if on a to-boggan; they hope to get there but do not wish to work. Do the right, no matter what it is, for your reward is great. Why should we deny ourselves? Because we depend on Christ. Man's life depends on the enjoyment in accordance with the Gospel. How long is this life compared with eternity? The rich ungodly man has prepared no home for himself but spent all he had in this world. "For what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"
