The brute, on the other hand, treads water, remains on the surface, and is virtually insubmergeable. In order then to escape drowning it is only necessary to do as the brute does, and that is to tread or walk the water. The brute has no advantage in regard of its relative weight in respect of the water over man, and yet the man perishes while the brute lives. Nevertheless, any man, any woman, any child, who can walk on the land may also walk in the water just as readily as any child, who can walk on the land may also walk in the water just as readily as the animal does, and that without any prior instructions in drilling whatever." There is much in this, and if people who cannot swim would endeavor to impress it on their minds when in the water they might be able to practice it in case of secident.

The long strike was thus precipitated.

It has been well proved that the dominance of the high tax party at Ottawa was secured by two most questionable agencies: (1) The support of the rings and monopolists, who believe that with the advent of the Liberal party to power their legalized right to profit at the expense of their fellow-taxpayers would cease; (2), the boodling contractors, who have paid out many thousands of ill-gotten gains, at the solicitation of the Conservative leaders, in order to maintain the men in authority who over a long period of years have so shamefully allowed these wholesale peculations to prevail.

The most significant admission was Aragged out of the son of Sir Hector Langevin yesterday that he went to Larkin, Connolly & Co., the Universal Providers of Con-servative campaign funds, and solicited \$5,000 to spend in securing Sir Hector's election in Three Rivers. With a coolness characteristic of the whole gang, this son of his father explained that he took it for granted that big Government contractors were proper victims to bleed, and that \$5,000 was a very small sum to aid in parrying a single constituency. The young nan was as unwilling to reveal the truth as men with kindred associates generally are, but in large measure he corroborated the evidence of the leading witnesses that Mr. Tart has produced.

We refer to the developments in this connection to show how the influences of plunder bind the present Administration and its followers together, and the

ecessity for all honest men, no matter to what party they have hitherto been allied associating to aid in their speedy downfall. That so fair a resolution as that proposed by Sir Richard Cartwright should be ejected by a majority in a House elected on an issue of falsehood and deceit, and supported by self-seeking monopolists and contractors who have for years been fattening at public expense, might, under all the circumstances, have been expected; but the outcome is none the self-seeking to the contractors. utcome is none the less lamentable. The time must soon come when the people will arise in their might and say that they have had more than enough of the friends, patrons and beneficiaries of the corrupt ontractors and of the monopolies estab lished by class law.

EXPERT CORROBORATION.

Some people, anxious only to provide excuses for wrong-doing in high places, have seriously doubted the reliability of the witnesses adduced in the exposures of Government mismanagement and official wrong loing at Ottawa. To all such, the first report of Messrs. Cross and Laing, the expert accountants, should be a sufficient reply. It is shown from the books of the ontractors, mutilated though they have peen to conceal many questionable payments, that the firm drew \$3,138,234 from the public funds, of which, it is believed, \$2,184,259 was expended in a legitimate way, leaving about \$1,000,000 as profits and swag. How a portion of this money was willingly accepted by the offi-cials, in exchange for liberty to pilfer from the public purse, has already been made plain. But more evidence has yet to be adduced by the ex perts. The rascalities practiced in connec tion with the Kingston graving dock, which has cost double the original estimated cost, and the Langevin block wholesale hievings, have yet to be fully exposed, and there are many minor peculations to e taken up.

This is the record which has been piled p under Sir Hector Langevin's supervision. This system has been going on with the onnivance of men who, like the Minister. have placed themselves in the power of contractors by accepting valuable presents from those depending on the Government for favors. It has been carried on by the insolent Engineer Arnoldi, who has not only contravened the law of the land and thrown his oath to the winds, but has insulted the representatives of the people when they charged him to tell the whole truth.

OTTAWA, July 29.—When the House resumed this afternoon the Election Franchise Act amendment introduced by Sir John Thompson was again taken up. The time for voters to apply to have their names put on the lists is extended from July 29 to Aug. 15 in the bill, which passed its third reading. Revising barristers are to be notified at once by telegraph. The supplementary lists are to be made up from the assessment rolls of the current year. When the revising officer gives public notice of his final transcript he shall keep the list open for public inspection not less than six days. for public inspection not less than six days.


