# Titanic Goes to the Bottom With Over 1,000 Souls Allan Liners Report That They Have No Survivors

### HOPE THAT OTHER BOATS HAVE MADE RESCUES HAS BEEN DASHED

Shipping Experts Believe That Titanic Struck Berg While Travelling at Top Speed and That Plates Were Ripped From Her Side.

The appalling magnitude of the wreck of the giant liner Titanic has been but little mitigated by the fragmentary information which has filtered in today.

The rescuing steamer Carpathia has 868 survivors on board, according to latest news received at the offices of the White Star line in this city. This increases the list of saved by about 200 from the number first reported. But except for this, the unfavorable details are insignificant compared with the supreme fact that the Titanic is at the bottom of the sea, and that the shattered wreck took with her about 1,350 victims to their death.

OVER 1,000 LOST.

The first reports giving the total survivors at 675 were varied by more favorable news early today, first from Captain Rostron, of the Carpathia, who gave the number at about 800, and later by the positive announcement of the White Star line that there are 868 survivors of the Titanic on board the Carpathia.

But with these figures there remain 1,341 persons who were aboard the Titanic, passengers and crew, who are today unaccounted for and apparently lost.

NONE ON THE ALLANS.

Hope clung desperate this morning to the belief that the steamers Virginian and Parisian, of the Allan line, may have picked up survivors in addition to those on board the Carpathia. This was practically dispelled at 11 o'clock, when the Sable Island wireless station reported that the Parisian had no survivors on board, and when the offices of the Allan line in Montreal issued a statement that the captain of the Virginian had sent them a wireless message saying he had "arrived at the scene of disaster too late to be of LONDON LADY ABOARD

Both the Virginian and the Parisian therefore appear to hold out no hope of further reducing the extent of the calamity. The Virginian has proceeded on her way to Europe.

ALL ON THE CARPATHIA.

The Carpathia, having on board the only survivors accounted for, is coming in slowly to New York. All hope for details of the tragedy and its effects are centred on this ship. She will be in wireless communication with Sable Island tonight, with Nantucket on Thursday, and she will reach New York some time Thursday

WORLD GRIEF-STRICKEN.

# MESSAGE FROM THE OLYMPIC

Carpathia First to Reach Scene of Disaster Found 675 Persons of human lives.
Worst May Be Believed. in Lifeboats of Titanic-Nearly All the Saved Were Women and Children.

New York, April 15.—The text of the message from the steamer Olympic, reporting the sinking of the Titanic and the rescue of 675 survivors, which reached here late tonight, also ex-

pressed the opinion that 1,800 lives were lost. "Loss likely to total 1,800 souls," the dispatch read in its con- of 860.

It is hoped and believed here that this is an error unless the Titanic had more passengers on board than was reported. The list as given out showed 1,310 passengers and a crew of 860, or 2,170 persons in all. Deducting 675, the known saved, would indicate a loss of 1,495 persons.

The Olympic's dispatch follows:

"Carpathia reached Titanic's position at daybreak. Found boats and wreckage only. Titanic sank about 2:20 a.m., in 41:16 N., 50:14 W. All her boats accounted for, containing about 675 souls saved, crew and passengers included. Nearly all saved women and children. Leyland liner Californian remained and searching exact position of disaster. Loss likely to total 1,800 souls."

THE WIRELESS APPEAL.

Seaward and landward J. G. Phillips, the Titanic's wireless man, was hurling the appeal for help. By fits and starts-for the wireless was working unevenly and blurringly-Phillips reached out to the world crying the Titanic's peril. A word or two, scattered phrases now and then, a connected sentence made up the messages that sent a thrill of apprehension for a thousand miles east, west and south of the doomed liner.

Other rushing liners besides the Virginian heard the call and became on the instant something more than cargo carriers and passenger greyhounds The big Baltic, 200 miles to the eastward and westbound, turned again to save life as she did when her sister of the White Star fleet, the Republic, was cut down in a fog in January, 1909. The Titanic's mate, Olympic, the mightiest of sea-goers save the Titanic, herself turned in her tracks. along the northern lane the miracle of the wireless worked for the distressed and sinking White Star ship. The Hamburg-American Cincinnati, the Parlsian from Glasgow, the North German Lloyd Prinz Frederick Wilhelm, the Hamburg-American liners Prince Adelbert and Amerika, all heard the C.Q.D. and the rapid, condensed explanation of what had happened.

VIRGINIAN HEARD MESSAGE.

But the Virginian was nearest, barely 170 miles away, and was the first to know of the Titanic's danger. She went about and headed under forced draught for the spot indicated in one of the last of Phillips' messageslatitude 40.32 north and longitude 61.18 west. THE RESCUE.

What took place in the next hour cannot be known definitely until the wireless finds itself in a steady, straightforward story, for out of the icy waste have come but two messages which appear to cover the time. One is that the Carpathia picked up many of the passengers, and perhaps half of the crew. The other was that the Titanic finally sank at 2:20 a.m. Capt. E. J. Smith, of the Titanic, the admiral of the White Star fleet, the careful veteran of the Atlantic, who has brought so many of the line's finest

ships to this port on their maiden trips, realized that there was no chance o? his vessel staying above water and that reliance must be had on the small boats. The women and children were placed in some of these boats, each boat in charge of an officer of the ship. #### LONDON MAN'S OPINION OF CAUSE OF WRECK

#### Says Presence of Icebergs Can Be Detected If Precautions Are Taken.

While it is next to impossible fo one to determine the contributing cause of the loss of the Titanic, the splendid monument to marine architecture at this time, there are numerous conjectures as to the probabilities, and among those we might mention one that has been conveyed to The Advertiser, while conversing with a master mariner of wide experience, twelve years of which were spent on the ocean where the Titanic met her

This gentleman, now a resident o London, was for some years a repre sentative of Lloyd's marine department, and consequently made a close study of the contributing causes of marine disasters. His conclusions are that where the vessel is in every sense of the word seaworthy ,the cause of less or damage is too much selfconfidence, or, in other words, a too great feeling of security in a locality much frequented. He says it is early in the season for ice to be met in the vicinity where the ship met her fate consequently the precaution of ultra-careful master may not have

been exercised. No matter what the probabilities may indicate, the temperature of the water should be frequently taken when crossing the North Atlantic, no matter at what time of the year or in what locality. This, if carefully followed up, with a reliable instrument, is almost an infallible guide in determining the proximity of ice. Whether this precaution was taken in navigating the Titanic or not cannot of course, be learned at present; but from

New York, April 15 .- The Titanic, of the White Star ilne, the biggest, most luxurious ship in the world, lies at the bottom of the sea just south of the Grand Banks of Newfoundland, and 600 miles southeast of Halifax. On her maiden voyage the Colossus of steamships shattered herself against an iceberg. Nothing availed to keep her afloat. CAPTAIN PROBABLY LOST.

The speed at which the Titanic was travelling when she shattered herself against the iceberg, will perhaps be known when the first of her surlyors reach here. Whatever her rate of progress, however, shipbuilders here and abroad must admit that while the modern steamship may defy the wind and weather, ice and fog remain an ever-present element of danger. No ship, they joint out, no matter how staunchly built, nor how many watertight bulkheads protect her, may plunge headlong against a wall of ice without grave results. The general opinion is that the Titanic's equipment was put o an extraordinary test which no vessel could have withstood.

PROBABLY CRUMPLED UP.

Louis E. Nixon, the eminent naval architect is inclined to think the Finance was either travelling at full speed or perhaps crashed into a berg so remendous that there was practically no give. "If the Titanic hit one of those great ice masses," said Mr. Nixon, "it is likely that she struck one that had no more give than a rock. St. Johns, Nfld., April 16.-Messages from Cape Race apparently indicate that a very large majority of the men who were on the steamer Titanic went down with the ship. A message re-ceived from Cape Race at 10 o'clock this forenoon accounted for about 800 people, and all of these were on board the steamer Carpathia. Messages picked up by the Cape Race wireless station and sent by the operator on the Carpathia state that all of the boats launched by the crew of the Titanic have been accounted for. The boats were filled largely with women and children, but had sufficient members of the Titanic's crew to guide them. The belief was general here this forenoon that all of the survivors are on board the Carpathia.

The steamer Virginian, which halted her voyage from Halifax to Livrpool, when near the scene of disaster, will not come to St. Johns, as reported. She saw no sign of surviv-




