

MURDER TRIAL OPENS AT KITCHENER MONDAY

KITCHENER, Feb. 8.—Charles Gerbig in the county jail charged with murdering his wife, will be tried first for his sanity, according to a statement given out this afternoon by Crown Attorney Bowlby. The crown has secured two of Ontario's most expert alienists. Both have examined Gerbig in his cell at the jail, and it is believed that they have agreed the alleged murderer is in his right mind. The Gerbig trial will open on Monday.

In addition to the Gerbig case there are three cases of sedition. Herman Oderberg and Isaac Neubaur of this city are charged with having uttered seditious words, and also Paul Leistner of Hespeler. The assizes will be the most important and perhaps sensational in the history of the county. Justice Masten will preside.

16-YEAR-OLD YOUTH CONDEMNED TO DEATH

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—It took a jury only twenty minutes today to decide that Paul Chapman, a 16-year-old youth, should pay the death penalty for having participated in the robbery of a Brooklyn store last October, during which Harry Regensburg, the proprietor, and his brother were shot to death and his wife badly injured. Chapman was implicated in the murder and robbery by another youth, Hugh Davis, who was wounded by the police when he attempted to escape arrest for the crime, and later died.

Davis also implicated his own brother, Leon Davis, who has yet to be tried on a murder charge.
