
# HAIG'S ORDER MARKS NEW PERIOD IN WORLD STRUGGLE

London, Sept. 11 .- Field Marshal Haig's historic order issued yesterday set beside his famous Back-to-the-Wail order of six months ago, pointedly marks the end of one of the most critical periods in British hisis ungrudgingly and gratefully attributed to the timely aid given by the United States nation, not only in the field of arms, but also in the econ

It is universally felf that Field Marshal Haig's order marks the be ginning of a new period in the world struggle to which the nation is able to look forward with hope and confidence. There is growing evidence that the enemy will withdraw to the Hindenburg line and try to make his stand there, and begin a new phase of its defensive warfare. For the moment there is comparative lull in the fighting operations

partly due to adverse weather conditions.

The British public is now speculating with confidence on where and how Marshal Foch will strike his next blow, and it is firmly believed that it will not be long before the great American forces will be found taking a prominent part in the operations. In the meantime all dispatches from Germany and Austria bring evidence of a new and rapid growth of the peace offensive movement and the tottering of the enemy's home front. Prominent among these dispatches are renewed reports of a coming political crisis in both Germany and Austria.

While no estimate of the kaiser could have given a conception of the man's capacity for evil deeds, as proved since he launched the world into war, the personality had given many signs of determination to dominate ruthlessly all with whom he came into contact. From early childhood he was a singularly restless and active personality, and as a youngster he elicited from Prince Gortschakoff, the Russian chancellor, the prediction:

"This young Hohenzollern will considerably outshine all his predecessors on the throne. He will be the mainspring of Germany, and his influence will be felt throughout the world. When the time comes he will astonish Europe!"

The first momentous clash came when the kaiser announced his plan of calling an international Socialist congress, to which Bismarck was unalterably opposed. N A conservative estimate it is stated by the fuel controller that \$150,000 can be saved in Canada next Sunday if gasoline consumption in motoring is reduced to the necessary minimum. "While the "motorless Sunday" idea looks like a direct inspiration from Washington, where so many Canadian campaigns and movements have originated, the lateness of the appeal will be forgiven by everyone who realizes that the time has come to conserve gasoline and to save, wear and tear on motor cars. The production of motor cars has been cut down by a large percentage, and the present cost of used machines indicates just what value should be placed upon all such vehicles, while the seriousness of the fuel situation this winter demands that all kinds of heat-creating material should be saved to the last gallon and pound.

A vigorous appeal will be made to the people of Canada during the next few days, and it is certain that the response will be made in a spirit of real service to the whole community. Motorists have had an exceptional summer, and few drivers ever before ran up such a mileage as in 1918, when weather and roads made the appeal of the open so strong as to be irresistible. Gasoline was never consumed before in such large amounts, and a day's saving will work no injury.

In a recent letter home he spoke of his extreme "good"



luck," but said he had a premonition that this was due to break soon.

Born at Oil Springs in 1889, Corp. Bennett moved to Melbourne with his family a few years later, and spent all his earlier life there, having many friends throughout Caradoc and Ekfrid Townships. At the time of his enlistment he was engaged in the mercantile business at Elrose, Sask., near Saskatoon, with his brother, George Bennett, Another brother, A. S. Bennett, was formerly proprietor of the Oil Springs Chronicle. He was the youngest son of a family of seven.
