

Eighty Per Cent of Men Vote To Accept Findings of Board.

Montreal, May 19.-The award of the

board of arbitration which sat in the Montreal tramways case was announce Montreal tramways case was to the tramways employees at a mass meeting Saturday. The rank and file of the employees regard the award as favorable, and ever 80 per cent of them voted for its acceptance. The award is tavorable, and ever 80 per cent of them voted for its acceptance. The award is to go into effect on July 1. Increases run from 6 to 12 cents per hour, for those paid by the hour, and 20 to 25 per cent for those paid by the month. There were no changes in the working conditions.

The conditions of the award were as follows: For motorrors and conditions. first-year men, 37 cents per hour; sec-ond-year men, 40 cents an hour; third-year men, 44 cents an hour, and for men of upwards of four years' service, 48 cents.

The present wages paid to the four respectively Receive Flat Increase. The shop workers are to receive a flat acrease of 12 cents per hour. At pres-

ent they get from 20 to 35 cents.

All other men paid by the hour, such as switchmen, hill men, etc., are to be increased to 30 cents per hour, the present scale being 23 cents.

In the case of those paid by the month, such as clerks, inspectors, etc., those at present receiping these. those at present receiving less than \$100 per month are to be increased 25 per cent, while those being paid more than \$100 receive a 20 per cent increase. The men asked for time and a half for Sunday and holiday work, but this demand was not granted, the working conditions remaining as they consider the second state of the s


