Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The general impression that the cost of living is climbing higher every day is confirmed in statistics published in the Labor Gazette for February. Grains, flour, bread, meats, live stock, potatoes, fish, textiles, hides, metals, lumber, and raw furs are specifically mentioned in the Gazette as more expensive today than they were on December 31 last.

The cost of a food budget for the average family is shown at \$15.30 a week, compared with \$14.73 in December last, \$13.78 in January, 1919, and \$7.73 in January, 1914.

The Hague, Feb. 20 .- Before answering the last allied note relative to the extradition of former Emperor William, the Dutch Government is expected to assure itself that the erstwhile monarch is willing to settle down for life at Ioorn, and not disturb the world's peace. While, on answering the original demand for extradition, the Dutch Government acted without consulting Count Hohenzollern in any way, a different course may be pursued in the present instance. ferent course may be pursued in the present instance.

Holland will undoubtedly reply that she is willing to guard William of Hohenzollern closely at Doorn, and accept responsibility for preventing any danger to the world peace, but it will probably be necessary to consult the exile before replying.

No difficulty is anticipated in this connection, as Count Hohenzollern is reported to be ready to accept Doorn as a haven for the rest of his life.

Neglect of the patients by the nurses at the asylum was charged by a former patient in her evidence at the investigation into conditions at that institution this morning.

On one particular occasion two patients had been bathed in the same water. One of the nurses, when taking her patients out for a walk, had refused to take one of them. As a result the patient who was left behind had secured a butcher knife and was about to cut her throat. No nurses were in the ward at the time, but the other patients averted a tragedy. The fact that the empties have to go back into the United States at Detroit or Windsor is making the traffic much heavier in this district, and many more







CHURCHILL REBUKED.

The typically rash utterances of Hon. Winston Churchill respecting the ability of labor to form a government in England should it succeed to power receive merited rebuke from the Manchester Guardian, which puts the ques tion whether labor would be likely to find a worse war minister than the present incumbent of the nost. The Guardian asks if any labor minister of war would do some of the things that Churchill has done in the last year, backof British money through Denekin's sieve, for instance. So, too, in the matter of housing or conduct of foreign affairs or Irish chaos, is it likely, asks the Guardian, that these questions would be muddled worse by any government consolidation, medical and dental inspection, than they have been muddled during the last;

clear that the general opinion of the country is settled that a new government of some kind is coming, be it labor or whatever it may, and whoever may form the new cabinet will find ! their first and chief task to straighten out the mistakes of their predecessors. It may be that for this first big problem labor is lacking in men of big intellectual grasp joined with parliamentary experience and skill in administration. Here is where an alliance of some sort between the Liberal remnant and labor would result in the formation of a strong parliamentary group. It is to be presumed from their protestations that the Labor party is more intent upon the bringing about of its aims and ideals than upon merely holding and continuing to hold office. But mere devotion to ideals will hardly suffice to carry any party very far if it is so other-worldly as to neglect to keep its parliamentary machinery in good working order. Here is where Liberal experience would count and count strongly.

A Labor government, the Manchester Guardian points out, would have one asset in its comparative freedom from old traditions. Liberal governments have arrived in England only to find themselves hedged about by court and society's atmosphere and no Liberal government has ever yet broken with the subtle entanglements that come from these two influences. Labor could do what no Liberal government has yet been able to do in refusing to accept titles and even refusing to confer them except for certain well-defined reasons. And such a course, while it would be highly unpopular with large and powerful elements, would nevertheless not be without marked influence on the policies of the two older parties.

BOOKS ON SPIRITUALISM.

Of late there has been a vulgar rush after the spirit sensation. And whenever there was a mob butting ahead in some unconsidered direction, there you could find Ella Wheeler Wilcox waving her timbrel in the forefront or home close up. She was the poet of the populace, sure enough. She "sensed" (as probably she would say) the spirit craze, publishing a transassassinated in 1814. It strikes anyone with a tariff as it now stands.

It is rather tragic, however, than humorous that Sir Oliver Lodge should be mixed up with a lot of charlatans. Even to bracket him, a real scientist, with Sir Arthur Conan Dovle is cruel enough. In his aside on spiritualism in "The Undving Fire." H. G. Wells makes use of the malice of it. But in the past, strong minds have often been strangely diverted. Napier and Newton wrote commentaries on the Apocalypse, prophesying a speedy end of the world in their day. John Wesley was a believer in witchcraft and the punishment of it. If one scientist can today be quoted as a supporter of spiritualism, hundreds could be named as supporters of atheism or something not easily distinguishable from it by the simple mind. But is that a convincing testimonial for

It is notable that much of the opposition to spiritualism today comes from the orthodox church people. To them Conan Doyle mainly addresses his arguments or threats. The orthodox rationalists, so to speak, are in general not taking much trouble to combat what strikes them as an ignorant craze, any more than Shakespearean scholars lift a finger against the Baconian theorists. To the scientist or philosopher spiritualism is interesting merely as a psychological phenomenon, just as a person using an out-of-the-way dialect or peculiar type of slang is an object of curious and amused study to the philologist. Formerly orthodoxy was friendly to the occult, so long! as it kept to fairly biblical lines, but perhaps of late spiritualism has tried to dress up like liberalism on the one hand or oriental mysticism on the other. Hence it is orthodoxy rather than rationalism that takes the front of battle against the old delusion

SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION.

A steadily growing agitation to introduce and possibly hot lunches in the rural schools throughout the province is another indication Perusal of the English press make it quite that the farmer is awakening to the social and economic needs of his community. These are but few of the coming changes that promise to revolutionize the present system of rural education which has guided, with little change, the destinies of the country youth for generations. With the coming of the consolidated school the with its desks bearing the initials of our forefathers, that nestles at nearly every cross-road will pass into history. Instead of a small school in each section, one roomy, modernly equipped, palatial schoolhouse will educate the children of four or five combined sections. The great problem of getting the children from the outlying districts over the several miles to the school, would be solved by the operation of motor-buses and sleighs, by the schoolboards. over regular routes each day. This plan would save the children even the present tramp of often over two miles through deep drifts and of your speech a cat walked on to the stage. It thereby insure more regular attendance.

A great feature of the consolidated system is the proposition to include in the rural schools. continuation classes by which the boy or girl would be enabled to secure higher education without being forced to leave home or the farm, and thereby being saved from the great danger of being weaned from the inherent years spent in the city. Consolidation would require fewer teachers, therefore higher salaries could be paid to those required, resulting in a better class of teachers. By the adoption of the system two of the greatest problems that face the nation would be solved to some extent, the question of keeping the boy on the farm and the alleviation of the shortage of teachers. By keeping the boy on the farm production would be increased and by giving the student a brighter and better environment his desire to in the turning out of trained men. These two form the greatest need of the country during its period of reconstruction. Medical and dental inspection has given such great results in the town schools and in the few rural districts where it has been tried that no arguments can be found against it. The one great difficulty in conducting it in rural districts—the scattered schools-would be overcome by consolidation. Up to the present time the Government has left consolidation to local option, but it has promised to increase the grants by one-third to those schools adopting it.



How Labor Plans To Winthe Government

Can American Labor elect a Labor Government without the aid of a Labor party? For nothing less than this, in the opinion of the New York Times (Dem.), is the purpose behind the non-partisan political campaign of the American Federation of Labor. If the Federation could control the votes of one-third of its membership "it could dominate the situation," remarks the Baltimore News (Ind.). The Federation's plan, the Chicago Unionist reminds us, is another application of the methods by which the Anti-Saloon League won its overwhelming victories after the prohibition party had failed to get political results. In Congress, Representative Blanton of Texas, characterized the American Federation of Labor pronunciamento as "the greatest menace ever sounded." For, said Mr. Blanton, "when an organized minority of less than five per cent of the people can control legislation, and now threaten to elect a Congress of serfs, it is indeed a national crisis, threatening the institutions of the country." According to the Indianapolis Union however, "the American Federation of Labor does not seek to govern; but it is eminently right in taking steps to edueate its members as to which side their political bread is buttered on."

It is essential, therefore, that acid spots upon textiles be neutralized at once before they are allowed to dry, by the application of an alkaline solution. produce stains upon white ey may change or de-of any dyed material, destroy the fibre. Strong by virtue of its drying destroys the fibres of linen and

Methods of removing acids:

1. Try Water. Rinse the spot several times in a large volume of water. This treatment serves to stop any further action of the acid, but cannot have any effect upon discoloration due to the acid.

2. Use an Alkaline Substance. apply an alkali to the acid spot; the alkali forms a salt with the acid which must be removed later by rinsing or sponging with water. The acid should be neuwith water. The acid should be neutralized completely with the alkali or the discoloration will appear again after a time. To determine when an acid is completely neutralized taste the cloth. If it is alkaline it will taste bitter, and if acid it will taste sour. It should taste bitter. Either of the following alkalis may be used.

1. Ammonia. If it is a small spot, hold it to the mouth of the ammonia bottle and the fumes will neutralize the acid.

2. Baking Soda. Sprinkle baking soda upon the acid stain, on both sides if possible, moisten it with water and allow it to stand until it ceases to efo dry, turns the fibres of silk and wool o a permanent bright yellow and final-low it to stand until it ceases to ef-fervesce, then remove any excess by


SOCIALISTS EXPECT TO CONTROL GOVT. OF UNITED STATES

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 19.—A summary of the main points in the Allied reply to President Wilson's Adriatic note, cabled by the Rome correspondent of La Nacion, discloses that President Wilson threatened to withdraw his signature from the British-French-American treaty establishing security for can treaty establishing security for France, to which the Allies' reply that such action would destroy absolutely the "new French policy." The fundamental points of the reply to President Wilson, according to the correspondent,

are:
First, the Allies' answer the accusation of having prepared a convention for the annexation of Fiume to Italy, which pre-supposes bad faith on the part of Italy, by saying that President Wilson is unable to demonstrate this.
Second, the Italian petition for the establishment of territorial contiguity with Education and the stable of the stable o with Fiume is a very small thing compared with the cession of Dalmatia, which the whole world is able to prove merely examining the map of

Europe. Create Buffer State. Create Buffer State.

Third, the Allies observe that the project of President Wilson, which comprehends the creation of a buffer state, has been rejected by the Jugo-Slavs, and the allied nations have been uppelled to insist upon it.

Slavs, and the allied nations have been unable to insist upon it.

Fourth, the strip of territory necessary to establish the contiguity of Flume with Italy has not sufficient value to justify procrastination in reestablishing the peace of Europe.

Fifth, Italy entered the war inspired by ideals at a moment at least as critical as that when the United States entered. She suffered sacrifices in blood and money incomparably more serious than those of the United States.

Threatening To Withdraw.

Sixth, the president, in threatening to withdraw his signature from the treaty of Versailles, which established the security of France, gravely injures the very new French policy for which he invited protection. Finally, it is important to use good seed and good varieties. Thorough cleaning and grading of the seed will insure a better stand and add several bushels to the yield. A good fanning mill or other seed grader should be a part of every small grain grower's equipment. The results of experiments conducted for several years at the Ohio. Kansas. Minnesota and Canadian Experiment Stations with oats, have shown an average increase of large, heavy seed as compared with small and light seed. Good seed must be free of plant diseases. Most of these are readily preventable by proper seed treatment. eed and good varieties. Thorough clean-

CONCRETE FLOORS RETURN COST. By increasing the value of manure produced, concrete floors for feeding stables will return their cost in about one year. This is shown by tests at the Ohio Experimental Station. The extra crop returns from manure kept on concrete floors is due to the soluble plantfood saved.

The cost of concreting floors generally amounts to about \$5 an animal in the ordinary feeding stable, and the saving in manure is equal to this amount of every 1.000 pounds in live weight of steers or cattle fed for the year, as compared with animals kept on earth floors.

Concrete floors also make it easier to provide sanitary places for animals.

VETERANS ENTITLED TO FREE MEDICAL SERVICE

Not Necessary to Spend Money Doctors' Bills.

F. S. Fisher, unit service officer of "F" Unit of the D. S. C. R., said yesterday that a large number of returned men in the district were paying out considerable money for medical treat ment unnecessarily, and that they given out as soon as the returns are were overlooking the fact that returned men were entitled to free medical treatment for a period of twelve months from the date of their discharge. They could secure such treatment by applying to the medical

branch of the D. S. C. R.

The assistance was provided for by the Government, which realized that many men might be subject to sickness or a recurrence of war wounds from time to time after discharge. Mr. Fisher pointed out that blame could not be attached to the doctors, for there was no law compelling them to tell a returned man that he was entitled to free treatment.
