

PREMIER ROSS NOT YET READ'

Toronto, March 14. - Premier Ross gain confessed in the Legislature this afternoon that he was unable to say with any degree of definiteness when the temperance bill would be brought down. Three of the Russians rescued are engineers, and the fourth is a torpedo operator. Two of the captives were slightly wounded. They were all olaced aboard a Japanese battleship and were given food and medicine.

WHY A GUARANTEE?

To aid in putting the Soo industries on their feet, the Ross Government proposes to guarantee for two years the bonds of the Algoma Central railway to the amount of \$2,-

As security, the Government will hold a mortgage on this railway, ion another little railway, and on certain ships owned by the Soo com-pany, the total value of which (property is, according to Mr. Ross, estimated at between seven and eight.

This aid, the Premier says, is all that is necessary to set the wheels of industry going again at the Soo.

But doesn't it seem rather peculiar thing that a company which has many millions of dollars' worth of property to offer as security for a loan, cannot obtain from private capitalists the necessary \$2,000,000 on the strength of that security and without the necessity of a Govern-ment guarantee? If the security is good, why should the Government guarantee be necessary?

SWEET REASONABLENESS IN PRO-HIBITION.

In our haste we have sometimes accused the Ross government of being arrogant, tyrannical, etc. We now desire to retract, at least to modify these charges. Anything more sweet. ly reasonable than the premier's dealing with the liquor evil, we have seldom heard of. We speak by the book, that is, by the Globe. There was a caucus—a friendly meeting of Dr. Ross' supporters.

"How would you like," asked the premier, "a radical temperance measure, providing for the abolition of the bars throughout the province on May 1, 1905 (make a note of the date), and government control of the retail sale of liquor in packages?"

"Nay, nay, Pauline," thundered the

caucus in reply. Undismayed by the tumult, Dr. Ross calmly submitted another offer. "The premier then suggested as an altermative that the bringing into effect of such a law as that he had previously suggested should be left to a vote in each of the individual municipalities at the next municipal elections. It would be compulsory to submit to the people of each municipality two questions: Shall the hotel licenses in the municipalities be abolished, and shall liquor be sold in packages under government control? The license law would at the same

time be made more stringent." And a silence fell upon the assembly; and then one man said to his neighbor, as in the Homeric days: "What do you think of this?" and the neighbor replied, "Now this is something like a policy." And each man, in his heart thought of the refiscite and the pleberendum. Yet they would not accept, in haste, the word of the many-counseled Ross; but, as it is written in The Globe, "The last proposition was discussed until adjourned, no decision being reached. The matter will come up at another caucus next week."

At the next caucus it is understood that if Mr. Ross' second proposal is not accepted, something still milder may be offered. If so, we shall be prepared to retract all that we have said about the arrogance of this govnment and to admit that Mr. Ross is no dictator.-Toronto World.



CLAIMED BY CANADIAN

J. C. COUSINS, TORONTO, SAYS HE BUILT FIRST TORPEDO BOAT.

Ship Carpenter, Born in Newcastle-on Tyne, England, Who Has Had a Long and Varied Career on Land and Sea Sketch of the Initial Torpede Boat Which Worked in the American Civil

"I built the first torpedo boat that ever worked," said James C. Cousins, newsdealer, at the corner of Queen street and Spadina avenue, Toronto, the other day, in discussing the use of torpedoes in the Russo-Japanese war: "I was a ship carpenter at Charleston, S.C., when the Civil war began, and as there were a lot of Yankee vessels about there General Beauregraf asked me were a lot of Yankee vessels about there General Beauregard asked me one day to see what I could do in the way of a torpedo boat. I took some one-inch boards and built a cigar-shaped boat 30 feet long. At the bow we rigged a copper kettle, holding about 75 pounds of powder. The kettle was fastened to a pole, so that we could lift it out of the water when the boat was going and water when the boat was going, and then sink it about eight feet under water when we got to close quar-

pole was at an angle o so that the kettle would 45 'S 'S' S so that the kettle would strik the hull of the enemy below the water line. The kettle had some percussion caps on the top, and the force of the collision would make them explode the powder. The boat was made like this," said Mr. Cousins, and, pulling out a pencil, he drew the sketch given herewith.
"We rigged the hoat in Cautain

"We rigged the boat in Captain
James Eastman's yard, and called
it the Little David. That was in
1862. When it was fluished we saw 1862. When it was finished we saw the big 'wakee war vessel Ironsides just out he of Charleston harbor, and sent the Little David after her. The boar was in charge of Mr. Mills, who ker the Mills House, and the crew who Lieut. Lascelle, Charles Hanee, wo acted as pilot, and a big Irishmar. I forget his name. The Little I wid went straight for the Little I wid went straight for the Ironsides, the torpedo was lowered Irishmar I forget his name. The Little I vid went straight for the Ironsides, the torpedo was lowered and exploded against the hull. The water washed over the Little David, and some of it went down the smokestack and put out the fire. Lascelle and the Irishman jumped overboard, but Hance and Mills managed to get the Little David back into the harbor, and she often did good work after that. The Ironsides did not sink, but was so badly damaged that she had to be towed away by other vessels."

Mr. Cousins, who was born in Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, has had a long and varied career by sea and by land. After a trip through the Baltic he sailed for many years in the Mediterranean, and in addition to the seaports has visited Jerusalem and other cities of the east, and also Rome. He was unfortunate enough to be shipwrecked five times. He worked in a shipyard at Quebecabout 50 years ago, but, becoming tired of the lob traveled through

He worked in a shipyard at Quebec about 50 years ago, but, becoming tired of the job, traveled through the States and on to Cuba. But yellow fever at Matanzas stopped his journeying for a while. After some years in Europe he came out to Charleston, S. C., at the opening of the war, and joined the Charleston Light Infantry under Captain T. G. Simmons. He swent four months in Simmons. He spent four months in garrison at Fort Sumter after the surrender of Major Anderson, and af-terwards took part in fourteen en-

gagements.

He passed through all these adventures without injury, but after settling down in Toronto his troubles began. He was attending a semaphore in the Grand Trunk yard at the foot of Simcoe street when he was run over by a train. In this accident he lost his left arm and left eye, had a deep hole knocked in the back of his head, had both legs broken and sustained other injuries, enough to kill a dozen men, but Cousins pulled through, and now at 78 he is still hearty and cheerful. At New Year's he was knocked down by a street car and badly shaken. A month ago his news-stand caught fire and was partly destroyed whi'e he was away delivering papers. But the injuries were quickly repaird, and Cousins is still doing business at the old stand. He passed through all these adven

Once—how long ago?—it stood erect, twenty-five feet high, majestic, splendid, its inscrutable granite face bathed in the red light of the rising sun in the morning and of the sinking sun in the evening. Now there is none to do it reverence except white tourists who come from western lands and gaze with awe and wonder upon the prone limbs, the stone lips, around which the donkey boys climb and play. The donkey boys lawe named the great statue "Rameses asleep." His Egypt has awakened to the touch of modern life and bustle. He hoeds it not. A long beside the tremendous granite effigy passes the common highway. Camel trains, the animals laden with fodder from the fields to be taken to Cairo, stride and jolt past him. The camels are strung together, the nose of one being held by a small rope made fast to the tail of the one ahead.

Men, women, children and donkeys trail by with a ceaseless chattering, clattering, braying noise. Nie watered wheat and fodder fields, brilliant green, stretch away to right and left of the prone image; the long. of Rameses II., which lies in a palm

green, stretch away to right and left of the prone image; the long, gorgeous fronds of date palm groves wave in the winds. All the fields are wave in the winds. All the fields are irrigated. Ditches and dykes interlace them. The rude machines which draw water up from the Nile and its canals are of the pattern of the Bible times. Then they mount again the tiny denkeys and return to Bedreshein, where the Arab horses wait to take them to Cairo.



WHAT TIME IS IT?

Terento, Lendon, St. Petersburg, Tekie— The Clock Face as Seen in Each of Them.


Since the hostilities between Japan and Russia there has been some discussion as to the exact relation between our time and the time in Tokio and the other cities brought into prominence by the present war. Every person realizes that high noon varies with every mile one goes east or west. The confusion that would necessarily ensue is minimized on this centinent by a system called standard time, which was adopted by the railroads in 1883 and since adopted by nearly all of the large cities. This system divides the continent inte four sections, each fiften degrees of longitude in width. The time taken for one district is the solar time at the middle point of the section. Consequently we have eastern, central and mountain and Pacific time, each one an heur later than the one to the east of it. But our system is not universal and, except in those countries where the railway systems make such a method necessary, solar time is in use.

At a conference which met in Washington in 1882 to adopt a cemmon prime meridian to be used in reckoning longitude and delegates representing 26 countries decided in favor of taking the meridian of Greenwich. A resolution was adopted to the effect that the universal day be a mean solar day be

adopted to the effect that the universal day be a mean solar day, beginning at the hour of midnight of the initial meridian.



Japan has its midnight 14 hours and 20 minutes before we do, and when we turn into Sunday, Japan has already reached the hour 2.20 p.m. St. Petersburg has reached 2 minutes after 7 o'clock a.m. and the London time is 5 a.m. Thus when the Torontonian is preparing to go to church on Sunday evening the Cockney, if he be of temperate habits, is preparing to retire, the Russian is already asleep and the Jap is well started on his Monday morning work.

When a despatch dated Tokio, Thursday, 6 a.m., is published in the daily papers, we must remember that the telegram was sent when our clocks registered 3.40 p.m. on Wednesday, Such a despatch is published in a morning paper on Friday, so it must be seen that the event occurred more than two days before instead of the day before, as the date would seem to show.

The above diagrams will show more plainly than words the relation between the time shown by our clocks and those of London, St. Petersburg and Tokio.

HOG CHOLERA

Chatham.

The restrictions forbidding the novement of live hogs into or out of the district composed of the town-ships of Tilbury East, Raleigh, Dover East and West, Chatham and Harwich in the county of Kent; Tilbury West and Tilbury North in the county of Essex, and the island known as Walpole Island in the county of Lambton, in the Province of Ontario, have been modified as follows:-The shipment by rail of fat hogs for im mediate slaughter from certain points mediate slaughter from certain points hereafter specified within the said district is hereby authorized on and after March 15th, under the following conditions: — All shipments of live hogs from the said district must be consigned to a Slaughter house or packing house. Shipments will be permitted only at the following points:—On the Canadian Pacific Railway at Tilbury and Chatham, on the Grand Trunk Railway at Chatham, Prairie Siding and Northwood, on the Michigan Central Railway at Tilbury
