Even more to the point is the fact that eitizens to-day are consuming ice from the north branch which, of course, has not been subjected to any purifying process. For years this ice has been freely accepted, and no harmful results experienced."

It is a well-known fact here that the Chatham water is absolutely pure and entirely free from disease germs. The results of various tests made by Provincial analysts, and also by Medical Health Officer Dr. Hall, bear out this fact. When people say that the water from the Thames cannot be purified through filtration, they are merely exhibiting their inability to discuss the matter with intelligence.

Unless Mr. A. B. Aylesworth is called in soon, there will be no such thing as public morality in this country. Everybody will feel that he is entitled to cheat the Government wherever he has the chance. The speech delivered by Mr. Aylesworth in Huron was a straight defence of the "hold-up" and the "rake-off." A man is entitled to overcharge, and the Government is justified in submitting to such roguery! The speech just made at Sarnia is even more immoral. It excuses the North Atlantic trading deal, and declares that the secrecy that has been maintained touching the names of the officers and shareholders of this bonused concern is proper. WILL MAINTAIN STRIKE CATARRH OF STOMACH

Albert's Attempt to Stop Agitation in Southern France Fails.

Hopes of the Government Blasted-Difficult For the Cabinet-Clemen ceau Trying to Weather the Storm -Bill For Abolition of Court Martial In Time of Peace Is Postponed -Discipline Is Lax.

Paris, June 27.—The Government's hope that the return of Marcelin Albert, leader of the wine-growers' movement, to the south, after his interview with Premier Chemenceau would result in a change of attitude on the part of his followers has been blasted. The federated committees have decided to maintain the civic strike and the "redeenter." or "apostle," as he is variously termed, has no alternative but to surrender himself to the authorities in accordance with his promise to M. Clemenceau. Nevertheless the excitement in the disturbed territory continues to subside and the Government believes that, barring some unfortunate incident which may again inflame the people, the latter will gradually come to their senses and realize that a prolongation of the present situation will only increase their misery.

The Government now apparently is quite as much concerned about the insubordinate spirit manifested among troops as the attitude of the wine-growers, for in spite of the efforts to minimize them new incidents showing the lack of discipline in the army are occurring daily. The Government seems to have awakened to the necessity of dealing sternly with the demmoralization engendered by the socialistic anti-military propaganda, and the press commends the decisions of the Government to exile the mutineers of the 17th Infantry and to postpone indefinitely the bill providing for the abolition of courtmartial in time of peace.

The position of the Cabinet grows increasingly difficult, and M. Clemencean's sole object seems to be to weather the storm until the summer vacations of Parliament affords a breathing spell. To-day, when the Premier replies to the interpellation on the general policy of the Government is likely to decide whether he will be able to overcome the difficulties in his path or fail in his attempt to do so.



Davis Swears He Never Led Mob-Was Not a Member of the Union-Heard Orchard Threaten Steunenberg-Remained In Hiding After Mill Was Blown Up and Changed His Name.

Boise, Idaho, June 27.—William F. Davis of Goldfields, Nevada, one of the most important witnesses for the defence of William D. Haywood, accused of the murder of Frank Steunenberg, was called to the stand at noon yesterday, and his cross-examination had not been completed when ourt adjourned.

Harry Orchard testified that Davis ed and commanded the mob that de-

court adjourned.

Harry Orchard testified that Davis led and commanded the mob that destroyed the Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mine in 1899; inspired, as the agent of Haywood and Moyer, the Vindicator explosion and the train wrecking plot at Cripple Creek, and was an accomplice in the Independence Station crime.

On direct examination by Clarence Darrow, Davis went over the story of his working life and made positive denial of every statement of Orchard that involved him or his associates in any form of crime. Davis denied that he was even a member of the union when the Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mine was blown up.

At the conclusion of his general story, Davis swore that a Cripple Creek during the strike Orchard told him of the Hercules Mine affair and threatened to kill Steunenberg.

The cross-examination of Davis by Senator Borah was severe and searching. It was chiefly devoted, as far as it proceeded, to the Bunker Hill and Sullivan affair and the circumstances under which Orchard made the threat against Steunenberg.

Davis said that he remained in hid-

under which Orchard made the threat against Steunenberg.
Davis said that he remained in hiding after the mill was blown up because he did not want to be deported or thrown into the "bull-pen," and that he changed his name when he departed from Butte shortly afterwards, because he feared the mine owners "blacklist," made up from a petition that the employees of the Bunker Hill had sent to Governor Connell protesting against the unsafety of the mine. Borah showed that the petition had been presented six years before and that Butte was a federation camp where the blacklist was ineffective.

On Side of Peace.

On Side of Peace.

The defence is trying to prove that Orchard was not at Warner on the day of the explosion. The defence has been allowed to ask questions bringing out the story of the disturbances at Cripple Creek during the great strike of miners there. The state has objected to opening up this wide field, but the defence persisted that it had the right to go deeply into this matter of labor troubles in order that it may show what was done to the military and the provocation that was given to the striking miners.

While the foundation for proof of conspiracy on the part of the mine owners to exterminate the Federation and thus eliminate an element that interferes with the working of the mines under conditions such as the mine owners would dictate, makes a large part of the fabric the defence have built up so far, Orchard is never lost sight of, and witness after witness is called to show that Orchard, through all the years that intervened between his flight from Idaho in 1899 and his return to this state in 1905, carried with him continually a private grudge against Steunenberg.

What Defence Seek.

If a sufficient weight of evidence can be brought to show that the assassination of the former governor was merely the culmination of one man's grudge and not the part of a conspiracy, counsel for the defence say the state's case must fall. Orchard will stand convicted out of his own mouth of this one murder, and if a conspiracy on the part of the detectives employed by the mine owners to destroy property or cause riot in order to continue a state of martial law can be shown, it is the opinion of counsel that the jury will abandon the conspiracy idea and their clients will go free.

While the defence is trying to break down Orchard by sheer weight of testimony, the state is pushing each witness as far as possible to show that they are subject to impeachment later. The large number of witnesses to be examined by the defence gives promise of a long period of rebuttal testimony. What Defence Seek.

mendment to B. N. A. Act In Imperial House Affects Province.

perial House Affects Province.

Toronto, June 27.—Ontario is interested to the extent of \$500,000 in the passage of the amendment of the British North America Act, in the Imperial House this week.

"If the bill does not go through," said Hon. Col. Matheson yesterday, "it will mean that we will be short \$400,000 this year. The measure must pass within the present week or it cannot be put through this session, and we will be unable to get this money that we have been counting on."

If the amendment carries Ontario will receive two instalments of \$400,000 each, but it is very necessary that the bill should be carried at once, as the Government has been counting on at least one instalment of the money and will be considerably out in its accounts if it is disappointed.
