The most disastrous fire which Boston has suffered since 1872 and one which in property loss more than rivals the great conflagration at Lynn, on Tuesday broke connegration at Lynn, on Tuesday broke out on Thursday in the six story granite building owned by Jordan, Marsh & Co., and occupied by Brown, Durrell & Co., dealers in fancy goods on Bedford street, corner of Kingston Street, and raged for six hours and burned over two acres of territory, covered by magnificent struc-tures and entailing a loss now estimated at ten millions.
