## GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Rev. Dr. Gordon of Halifax Chosen for Moderator.

Opening of the Presbyterian General Assembly in Toronto—A Large Attendance of Ministers and Laymen—A Goodly Number of Ladies at the Opening—Dr. Robertson as Moderator.

Toronto, June 11. There was a large attendance of ministers and ladies to crowd the first Presbyterian Church when the first Presbyterian General Assembly closed last night. The retiring Moderator, Rev. Dr. Robertson of Winnipeg, conducted the services and delivered a powerful sermon on home missions. It would seem that the first duty of Canada was to plant religious institutions among newcomers settling in the Dominion.

Home Mission work, Dr. Robertson continued, was "two-fold"—first, to help the native population to maintain order, and second, to care for the neglected and the destitute. Canada was a native Manitoba and a forcible speaker.

Dr. A. Reid of Lacombe, N.W.T., gave the annual report of the Home Mission Society. The report was a glowing one, and was followed by Rev. G. A. Wilson, who told of his work in Kamloops. Rev. Mr. Herdman of Regina, and Rev. Principal King of Winnipeg made an earnest appeal.

The resolution was unanimously adopted. The meeting of the Foreign Mission report was presented.

Toronto, June 12. Educational matters were taken up at the morning session of the General Assembly. The report of Manitoba College being the first to come under review. It is likely that Governor Morton of New York will be offered the Republican nomination for Vice-President.

Financially President Kruger was doing a great stroke of business in the Transvaal. The firm which he has received the contract for the reforming of the South African Republic.

TRAMPS AND COMMERCIAL. British imports from Canada increased twelve per cent during May, while the general imports declined four per cent. During the five months of the present year the imports from Canada increased forty-three per cent.

The cause of the accident was the discharge of his gun. Yesterday the No. 2 team of the Dominion League Match at Oshkewick Pond, Mr. Johnson was a member of the team. He was in the afternoon dress suit, and was in the middle of a game of golf, intending to fire his round at sundown. There is not the slightest doubt but that this was purely accidental.

It would seem that the first duty of Canada was to plant religious institutions among new-comers settling in the West.

Home Mission work, Dr. Robertson continued, was to be first, to help the weak, and second, to care for new or neglected churches in the West.

The difficulties attending home mission work were evident. Settlements were being made in the West, and the necessities of the hour were to be met.

Dr. Robertson's sermon was well received, and the assembly adjourned until tomorrow morning.

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### JOHNSON'S AWFUL DEATH

A Terrible Gunning Accident on Saturday on the Six Nations Reserve White

Caledonia, Ont., June 14.—A most distressing accident occurred on the Six Nations Reserve about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, by which Mr. Festus Johnson, one of the most enterprising merchants of the village of Oshawa, was instantly killed while out plover hunting by the accident of a discharge of his gun. Yesterday the No. 2 team of the 37th Battalion were being driven by the Dominion League Match at Oshawa. Mr. Johnson was a member of the team, being Captain-Sergeant of No. 1 Co., and in the afternoon drove out to the target in company with his wife, intending to fire his round at each range, and afterwards his wife, with the intention of putting in the spare time by hunting plover, which are very numerous in this vicinity. On arriving at the range, he decided to go and hunt. The gun was near by. It would appear that after having shot a plover, he was in the act of loading the discharged barrel of his gun, when the other barrel discharged, the whole contents completely tearing off the whole left side of the head, above the ear, and the bullet proceeded to let down the hammer of the loaded barrel previous to reloading and discharged one, which he struck the hammer with his knee. His left hand was thrown over his waist, and about 10 feet from where his body was lying. There is not the slightest doubt that the accident was accidental. Mr. Johnson was one of the most popular of the Six Nations Reserve, and was in politics a staunch Conservative, being for the past few years president of the Conservative Association of the Six Nations Reserve. The same association has since elected over the entire reserve, as well as in the adjoining townships, where he was well and favorably known.

A Waterford Man's Fate.  
Port Huron, Mich., June 13.—William Saunders, an egg shipper of Waterford, Ont., committed suicide here last evening by taking laudanum. Saunders came to this town on the morning train with Arthur Mandeville of Glenora, Ont. He had a cheque for \$125. In a few hours Mandeville and Saunders had spent all the money. Saunders was then driving to his home at Waterford, and was accompanied by a man named Vendome, with whom he was acquainted, and borrowed \$50. The two visited several houses of ill-repute, and by night were again broke. During the evening they visited a saloon, owned by Fred Klench, a saloonkeeper, and bought laudanum at Knill's drug store. The clerk there told Saunders that he had taken some laudanum a few hours before and told him that if he wanted to live to go to a doctor. Saunders went immediately to Dr. Giffen's office, where the doctor worked over him all night, but at 8 o'clock this morning Saunders died, and was pronounced dead by the doctor. The police are investigating the matter and are awaiting the arrival of the coroner. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the proprietors of several saloons and houses of ill-repute, and Mandeville is being held by the police as a witness.

Pointers for Horse Owners.  
Ottawa, June 14.—(Special.)—The Department of Customs has sent out a circular calling the attention of horse owners to the regulations respecting the importation of horses from Great Britain and the Continent of Europe. The circular states that the Department has received information that certain horse owners in Great Britain and the Continent have been designated by the Minister of Agriculture. To the Electors of South Leeds:

GENTLEMEN.—It having been rumored that I intended withdrawing from the present political contest, I wish to state positively that, having placed myself in the hands of my friends, I intend to remain in the field until the last vote is polled.

At my age I would be loth to undertake a fight, did I not, as a Canadian, believe it to be the duty of every patriot to do all that in him lies to wrest the management of affairs from the hands of those who have so abused their trust. Millions of our money have been ruthlessly squandered in such indefensible jobs as the Tay canal, the Curran bridge, the Galopie rapids, and scores of others that might be mentioned, while the people have been taxed beyond what they are able to bear, in order to provide funds for such expenditures. If, as a nation, we are to prosper, we must have rigid economy in the management of affairs.

Having a farmer myself, I will favor a readjustment of the tariff so that while it provides revenue sufficient for running the business of the country on an honest and economical basis, it will bear as lightly as possible on the farming community, who form the great majority of the tax-payers of our country. The readjustment of the tariff should be made so as to stimulate our manufacturing industries by making, as far as possible, their raw material free, thus enabling them to pay their employees better wages, and placing them in a more favorable position to compete with the world.

As the Mother Land admits our products free of duty, I believe the duty on goods purchased from her should be placed at the lowest possible point.

I will, if elected do my utmost to procure extended markets for Canada's produce, and will favor a reciprocity treaty on a fair and equitable basis, with all countries, and particularly with the United States.

The Manitoba school question has been thrust into Federal politics by the Conservative party, where it should never have reached. Believing the minority have a grievance, I believe the settlement of this grievance can never be reached by a coercive policy, but that by approaching the matter in a conciliatory and friendly spirit what ever grievance the minority may have will be remedied by the Provincial Government, which is the only way a settlement permanent and satisfactory to majority and minority alike can be reached.

I appeal for your support on the ground of economical and honest government, reduced expenditure, a readjustment of the tariff, a reduction of the duties on British goods, enlarged markets for Canadian produce, equal rights to all and special favors to none, regardless of creed or race. I will not be able to meet all, but expect to hold meetings throughout the riding and lay my views further before you.
