## Town Council.

At a special meeting of the Council held last week a number of important matters were dealt with. A committee composed of Messrs. Fitch, Duncanson and Wallace was appointed to procure at once a set of public weigh scales, to be located at the corner of Main street and Highland Avenue. The committee on street improvement at Mud Bridge reported the purchase of the West property at \$3.50. The committee was authorized to offer Mr. Thomas Kelley \$150 to relinquish all his claim to land at that place, in order to avoid litigation, to be removed buildings. It was decided that the town proceed at once to install an electric lighting system, to light streets and supply light to private places if wanted. The superintendent was instructed to turn off water from all properties where the rates have not been paid.

## Board of Trade.

A quarterly meeting of the Wolfville Board of Trade was held on Wednesday evening in Temperance Hall. There was a good attendance of representative business men of the town, and the discussion of the various subjects brought up was vigorous and interesting. A communication was read from the Maritime Board, asking that a nomination be made to the Council of that body as a representative of the Wolfville Board. On motion Mr. C. H. Starr was selected to fill this important position. From the Windsor board a letter was read, asking for cooperation in the direction of public ownership of telephones in this province. It was decided that action be deferred until next meeting. The matter of the drop letter box at the railway station was again brought up, and the president was requested to write to the representative of the county at Ottawa urging that this important convenience be at once provided. Considerable discussion took place concerning the matter of the rebuilding of the government wharf here and the necessity for the creek being dredged to improve navigation. A motion was passed that the Board petition the Public Works department Ottawa, asking that the latter work be undertaken. Mr. J. E. Herbin was appointed as a committee to act with representatives of the Annapolis, Amherst and Moncton Boards in bringing before the government the importance of points of historical interest in the provinces being acquired by public ownership. Mayor DeWitt undertook to write to the Hon. Mr. Borden.

"Yes, I know you did, Father James, of St. Mary's, and I have felt it ever since by the town. A resolution was passed approving of the action of the Council, and a committee composed of Messrs. Oakes, Hales and Chambers, was appointed to confer with the Council on the matter.

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**Bob Burdette on the Saloon.**

Now, what another man says somebody told him he heard I said, I stand ready to dispute on general principles. That is not evidence in any court in the world. But let me say it myself, and I'll stand by it to the last comma, and hyphen. Now hear me say it myself.

About the power of prohibitory laws to prohibit—the laws of the state against murder do not entirely prevent murder. But nevertheless, I am opposed to licensing one murderer to every so many thousand persons, even on petition of a majority of the property-owners in the block, that may have all the murder that is desirable in the community under wise regulations, with a little income for the municipality. I believe in the absolute prohibition of murder.

The laws of the country prohibiting stealing do not entirely prevent stealing. Nevertheless, I am opposed to a high license system of stealing, provided that all theft shall be restricted to certain authorized thieves, who shall steal only between the hours of six a. m. and 11:30 p. m., except Sunday, when no stealing shall be done except by stealth, entrance to be made in all cases on that day by the back door and at the thief's risk. I believe in laws that absolutely forbid theft at any hour on any day of the week.

And, on the same ground, and just as positively, do I believe in the prohibition of the liquor traffic. And I never said that I didn't. And I say that I did. And I do.

I do say that the best way to make a man a temperate man is to teach him not to drink. But a saloon is not a kindergarten of sobriety. Your town is under no obligation to any saloon. All that it is, in respectability and permanent prosperity, it has grown to be without the assistance of the liquor traffic. You don't owe a dollar to a merchant or a resident; you don't owe one item of the attractiveness and popularity of your town to the refining and educating influence of the corner ginmill, with a group of sidewalk loafers.

It is deliberately claimed by some people, who appear to be sane on other subjects, that property to instruct a sober people in the ways of sobriety and to teach abstainers the beauty and virtues of temperance, you must license the selling of liquors in the town. The man who originated that idea ought to have it stuffed and exhibit it at the St. Louis Exposition, and it should be leaned up beside it as a part of the exhibit.

There was once a man who owned a parrot. It swore like a pirate. A neighbor owned a parrot that would not swear at all, but habitually used only the most decorous language. "Let me have your parrot for a month," I will keep him in the same room, and mine will teach yours not to swear." The birds were caged side by side. And everybody who knows enough to know anything knows which parrot had its vocabulary enriched with new and startling words.

Keep your town clean from evil. If men will violate a law in order to gratify evil habit and taste, don't try to cure the sin of law-breaking by enacting a law which it would be easy and wicked to obey.

As to prohibition in Pasadena, if any liquor man thinks there is big money and a safe thing in running a "blind pig" in Pasadena, let him come here and try it. If he has any love for his liberty and pocketbook, however, he will do well to consult the fellows who have tried it, if he can find them; we can't. They are in hiding somewhere out in the desert. Running a joint in Pasadena is like running a powder mill in a smelting furnace. It's mighty exciting while it lasts, but it doesn't last long enough to be profitable.

If the saloon men insist on quoting me on this topic, let them commit this to memory, that they may repeat it as they need it: I do not know one good thing about the saloon. It is an evil that has not one redeeming thing in all its history to commend it to good men. It breaks the laws of God and man. It desecrates the Sabbath; it profanes the name of religion; it defies public order; it tramples under foot the tenderest feelings of humanity; it is a moral pestilence that blights the very atmosphere of town and country; it is a stain upon honesty; it blur upon purity; it clogs upon progress; it checks upon the noble impulses; it is an incentive to falsehood, deceit and crime. From such a hateful fountain how can there flow a clear stream? Can you name one good thing the saloon has ever done for humanity?
