

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:-

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or

3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who falls to make a return or provide informa tion duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be Hable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$180 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty ment or to both fine and imprisonment
