Delightful Song Recital

The recital given in College Hall on Friday evening last by Miss Ruth Blaisdell MacDonald, soprano, assisted by Miss Beryl Blanch, pianist, and Miss O. Marie McC. Wilson, contralto, was most excellent and greatly enjoyed by the large audience.

Miss MacDonald possesses a voice strikingly clear and of unusual range. She has a diction which enables her to put across her message of melody, and the distinctness with which she characterizes each song proves that there is a fine sympathetic temperament back of the beautiful voice. She has a most attractive stage presence.

Miss MacDonald's first group, consisting of The Star, by Rogers, Sylvain, by Sinding, Recompense, by Hammond and An Open Secret, by Woodman, was sung with artistic taste. Depuis le Jour (from Louise), by Charpentier, was a gem, showing the singer's purity of tone and sustaining power. The second group, Oh, Mother, My Love, by Farley, Oh, Didn't It Rain, by Burleigh, My Menagerie, by Foster and a Norwegian Love Song, by Leighton, showed skilful interpretation of the different songs. Following this she sang the aria Ah, Fors'e Lui (from La Traviata) so successfully that she was forced to respond to an encore and sang the Waltz Song from Romeo and Juliet.

Miss Blanch is a talented pianist. Her playing of the Vienna Carnival Scene, by Schumann, showed excellent interpretation and was played in an artistic and musicianly manner. She is also a brilliant accompanist.

Miss Wilson's singing is always enjoyed by a Wolfville audience but never more so than last Friday evening. Her first two songs, L'Esclave, by Laio, and Si mes versavaient des ailes, by Hahn, displayed the resonant beauties of her voice. A Lullaby, by Hanscom, charmed the audience, and I'm Wearing Awa', by Foote, showed the richness of the lower tones. The aria, My Heart is Weary (from Nadeschda) gave proof of the singer's capabilities and revealed a wide range and exceptional talent.

After the recital the young artists were tendered a reception at the home of Mrs. Gideon Prescott, Summer street.

The Wolfville Fruit Co. has just finished its packing operations, the total number of apples handed during the season exceeding 45,000 barrels.

Town Council

A special meeting of the Council was held on Thursday evening of last week when the Mayor and all the members of the Council were present except Councillor Rand.

The meeting was held for the purpose of disposing of a number of items of business deferred from the regular meeting.

The first matter to be taken up was the petition of the G. W. V. Association for a grant of \$500 towards the furnishing and maintaining of their club-rooms. A written opinion of the Recorder was read in which it was stated that the Council could not legally make their grant from the funds without being empowered by special legislation. After some discussion it was decided that a committee of the Council be appointed to make a canvas of citizens to raise the required amount. Couns. Moore, Graham and Nowlan compose this committee and will soon call upon citizens for subscriptions to this most deserving fund.

The government housing plan was next taken up and a lengthy statement from the chairman was read by the clerk, Mr. C. H. Wright, who was present, was called upon and gave his views as to the advisability of the town adopting the proposition. Mr. Wright pointed out a number of difficulties including the high cost of erecting buildings at the present time. It was finally decided to have a statement of the conditions, etc. published in THE ACADIAN, and those who wished to avail themselves of the provision of the act commune with the town clerk.

The proposition of organizing a branch of the Victorian Order of Nurses here and the securing of a district nurse was again discussed and it was decided that the Mayor call a public meeting on Thursday evening, April 29th, when the matter will be decided by citizens.

Never since it was built has the Opera House been called upon to accommodate so large a crowd as was there on Saturday evening to see Mary Pickford in the famous picture, "Daddy Long Legs". It is estimated that a thousand people witnessed the picture on the two nights that it was shown here. The Opera House was also well filled on Monday and Tuesday evenings when "Auction of Souls" was shown. This is a wonderful picture, depicting the sufferings and hardships of the ravished Armenians.

Council of Board of Trade

An interesting session of the Council of the Board of Trade was held at the Council Chamber on Tuesday evening.

The president was in the chair and the only absentee was Mr. Hsley.

The discussion was interesting and a spirit of progressiveness and a willingness to work for the common weal was apparent.

The Town Improvement Committee made a number of suggestions, including the appointment of a time for a general spring clean-up of the town. This suggestion was endorsed by the Council and the committee was instructed to prepare and present a program at the meeting next Tuesday evening.

The committee also recommended action to improve conditions at the "bridge" and the paving and beautifying of Elm avenue so as to present a better appearance from the railway station.

The matter of the extension of the town limits at the east end again came up and it was decided to send a delegation composed of President Phinney and Mr. C. H. Wright to the next meeting of the Town Council asking for a reconsideration of the last meeting in that regard.

The committee to look into the proposition for a golf course reported that such a course was contemplated at Summerside, and that it would be open to Kentville, Wolfville and other stations. This matter was referred back to the committee for further investigation.

At the meeting next week the question of harbor improvement will be to the fore. This is a matter of vital importance to the town's advancement, and the Council's action will be watched with interest. These meetings are open to members of the Board of Trade.

Sacred Concert

The Sacred Concert given in the Methodist church on Sunday evening, April 11th, was attended by a large and appreciative audience. The program reflected great credit on all who took part, but particularly on Miss Beatrice Rockwell, the popular organist and efficient director of music. The organ prelude with which the program opened, was very fine indeed. The two solos, "Open the Gates" and "In My Father's House", given by Mr. Mason, were sung in his usual captivating manner. Mr. Henshaw was heard to good advantage in the song entitled "O Lord of Light", whilst Miss Evelyn Duncanson excelled herself in her rendering of "Hosanna". The woman's chorus was good. The solo parts were taken by Mrs. Barteaux and Mr. Stackhouse who were supported by the full choir. Indeed the entire program revealed careful training, was well carried through and was greatly appreciated by an audience that will be pleased to attend a similar song service in the near future.

Notes and Comments

The town of Westhoven, in Germany, still enforces an old ordinance which forbids anyone to walk in the street with a lighted cigar.

It has been estimated that the English language possesses fully 75,000 more words than the French, German and Spanish languages combined.

A new French farm tractor is never turned around while at work. It is a double ender and the driver merely changes his seat and the machine proceeds in the other direction.

Arthur Beverley Baxter, the young Canadian journalist, who wrote "The Blower of Bubbles," a book that set all Canada a-talking, has been called to London to assume a prominent editorial position with one of the large London dailies controlled by Lord Beaverbrook.

The Forward Movement among the five Protestant Churches in Canada has now reached a total of over \$13,394,000. The Anglicans have raised \$3,133,000; the Baptists, \$970,000; Congregationalists, \$116,000; Methodist, \$4,575,000, and the Presbyterians \$4,600,000.

An insistent demand has been made at Fredericton that a thorough investigation of the possibilities of harnessing the tides at the head of the Bay of Fundy, as a power development proposition, be made. It is believed that with the help of the railways the project could be carried out successfully, and some investigation work has been undertaken.

The assertion that the consumption of sugar in the United States has increased enormously on account of prohibition is contradicted by the statistics of the American Sugar Bulletin, given in a table, showing the consumption of sugar per capita in the United States for the last 10 years, from which it appears that, omitting the years 1916, 1917 and 1918, when consumption decreased on account of the war, the per capita consumption has averaged 83 pounds for the 10-year period, and the 1919 per capita consumption was only four ounces greater for the year than that for 1913—when they had no prohibition.

The Overseas Settlement Department which was organized to look after ex-service men and women desiring to look further afield than the Old Country for their future living, report an extraordinary rush of applicants. Already the waiting list exceeds fifty thousand, the bulk of whom have registered preference for Canada. The list is being added to by about three hundred daily, the majority of the applicants representing the finest type of manhood and womanhood. These figures do not include ex-members of the Canadian colonial forces who have separate preferential organization. Canada is by far the favorite of the British Dominions. Farming is the chief attraction of what before the war was called the "submerged class". Departures are only governed by shipping.

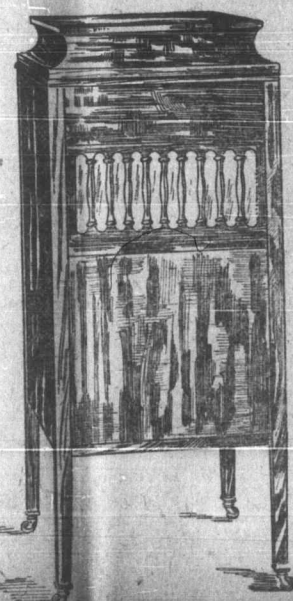

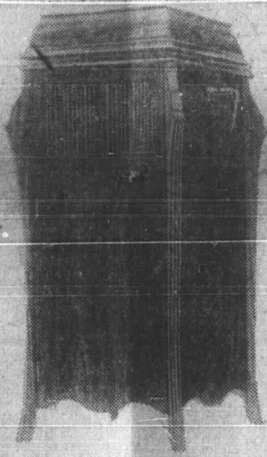
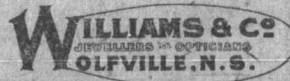

The figures issued the other day at Ottawa of the extent of the strikes and labor disputes in Canada in 1919 ought to be a solemn warning to both parties in the industrial world. Including eight carried over from 1918, there were 298 strikes and lockouts, involving 138,988 employees and 1,913 employers, and resulting in an aggregate loss of 3,942,189 working days. Of the strikes, 157 terminated in favor of the employers and 85 in favor of the employees, 23 being ended by compromise settlements, and 30 were put in the "indefinite" column. The economic loss cannot be definitely computed, but it would amount to a stupendous sum in dollars, apart from the individual suffering and inconvenience caused. Let us hope that the dark record of 1919 will never be equalled again in Canada.

on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-Evs per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

Dusting Apples

DOMINION ENTOMOLOGICAL LABORATORY, ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N. S.

By G. E. Sanders.

In view of the fact that between 200 and 300 dusting machines will be in operation in the Annapolis Valley this season it seems best to outline what seems the best programme for the season.

For those who are going to use 90-10 sulphur-lead arsenate dust we have the following advice. Apply the dust in the early morning when the air is still, and the plants wet with dew. Apply enough dust—75 pounds per acre

per application on 20-25 foot trees. You cannot get results without using enough material. If possible space your dusts a little closer together than liquid sprays, applying five dusts during the same period as you apply four sprays.

Some will use the new copper-arsenic dust on all four applications on account of their preference for Bordeaux, and also for economy. The advice regarding the application of sulphur dusts applies to copper-arsenic dust excepting that 50 pounds of copper-arsenic dust per acre per application is enough for 20-25 foot trees.

If the copper-arsenic dust is used on the third or calyx application about half as much russetting of the fruit will result as results from the use of Thompson Bordeaux. If one wishes to avoid this russetting, and it is worth while avoiding it, one can use 90-10 sulphur-lead arsenate dust for the calyx application, and the copper-arsenic dust for the remaining applications.

Important things to note in ordering dust are:

Copper-arsenic dust costs \$1.00 per hundred less than 90-10 sulphur-lead arsenate dust.

In using copper-arsenic dust 50 pounds per acre per application is enough for average orchard.

In using 90-10 sulphur-lead arsenate dust 75 pounds per acre per application is enough for average orchard.

Order enough dust for four or five heavy applications and use it all.

In former days when dust was expensive we could not reasonably blame people for being saving of it. During the past year we have worked hard in order to lower the cost of dusting material, thereby getting into many rows with spray firms, etc. Now that we have got the material down to a low price do not skimp on it and then blame dusting for the results of stinginess.
