Simon MacLeod Dead at Salt Lake

Former Newcastle Business Man Passes Away in the West.—Other Deaths

News came from Salt Lake City Tuesday that Simon MacLeod, who from about 1892 to 1910 was a well-known merchant tailor here, and had come here from Woodstock, had died at the residence of his son, William L. at Salt Lake City, Utah, on Saturday. Deceased was about seventy-two years of age, and was a man highly honored by all who knew him for his sterling business integrity and active interest in all moral and religious questions. Both he and his wife, formerly Miss Diadama Baker who survives him, were members of the Reformed Baptist church of Woodstock, and while in Newcastle worked with the Methodist people in both church and Sunday school. Deceased was an earnest Temperance worker, and was once an unsuccessful candidate for the Newcastle Aldermanic board in the Temperance interests. He leaves five children: Wm. L., Salt Lake City; Clara (Mrs. Philip I. Hon) in the West; Dr. Kate wife of Dr. Scott, Columbus, Ohio; Jessie (Mrs. Mills), Missoula, Montana; and Anna, a Missionary at Kagaazawa, Japan.

The sudden death of James A Schofield, a highly respected resident of Renous, N. B., occurred at his home on Friday, Nov 2nd. The deceased was 66 years of age and has been in ill health for the past eight years. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Annie E Hopkins, and the following children: Miss Jennie, R N on Boston, Mass.; Mrs Clifford E Underhill of Blackville; Miss Violet E at home; and one son, J Weldon, at home. The funeral which was largely attended, was held from his late residence on Sunday at 2 o'clock. The services at the house and grave were conducted by the Rev Mr Fowler, interment in the Presbyterian cemetery at Blackville. The hymns sung were "Rock of Ages," and "A Few More Years shall Roll." The pallbearers were Messrs C R Schofield, D G Schofield, James and Robert Walsh, Michael Fletcher and P J Young.

C. M. Dickison Re-signs as Fire Chief

Popular and Efficient Official will Devote Whole Time to His Growing Business

Mr. Charles M. Dickison, who for the past ten years has been the efficient Chief of the Newcastle Fire Dept. has tendered his resignation to take effect at once.

Mr Dickison while regretting this move has found that his increasing business demands all his time and that it shall not suffer as relinquished his position as Fire Chief.

During his years as head of this department, many fires have been fought, and to the efficient manner in which they were handled Newcastle's fire losses rank amongst the lowest in the province.

At a meeting of the Fire Department held on Monday evening Mr B F Maltby, who has been assistant chief for some time was appointed to succeed Mr Dickison and there is no doubt that under the new leadership of Mr. Maltby the old reputation will be sustained.

Owing to the retirement of Chief Dickison and death of fireman B D Hennessy there are now two vacancies in the department, and two smart young men are needed to fill the posts.

The Victory Loan Explained

Committees Getting to Work and the Loan will go With a Swing Next Week

Mr J M Robinson, of St John, one of the organizers in connection with the Victory Loan paid a visit to Newcastle on Tuesday for the purpose of completing the organization of the Central Committee of West Northumberland. A meeting was held in the Town Hall at 10 a m. those present were Messrs R H Armstrong, J E T. Lindon, John A Creaghan, E Hubert Sinclair, Donald A Jackson, Donald S Creaghan, A A Davidson, A E Cole, Walter Amy, G P Barchill, E A N Jarvis and Mayor Morrissey. Mr Robinson outlined the procedure as they had adopted it in St. John and explained the necessity and advantages of The Victory Loan, and why everyone that has \$50 should invest in Victory Bonds. The meeting was very enthusiastic and will go to work on November 12th with a vim.

One point Mr Robinson impressed upon the meeting was the fact that the name of every investor would be kept an absolute secret and no one save the Minister of Finance would know who invested or how much they have invested.

In the afternoon a meeting of the Executive Committee was held in the office of Mr. J. A. Creaghan. Mr. E. Hubert Sinclair in the chair. It was decided that the Town of Newcastle be divided into three districts. No 1 to be from the Mill Cove to Castle and Prince William Streets. No 2 from Castle and Prince William streets to Jane street and No 3 from Jane street to the North West Bridge.

High Percentage Willing to Serve

Newcastle Men Willing to go Overseas Than the Average in N. B. or in Canada

There were 153 men examined here this week under the Military Service Act, who passed as follows: A, 90; B, 6; C, 15; D, 11; E, 31

At Newcastle post office 144 have registered. Of these 117 have applied for exemption and 27 offer for service. This percentage of 18% willing to serve compares very favorably with the 12% of the whole province and the 8% of Canada as a whole.

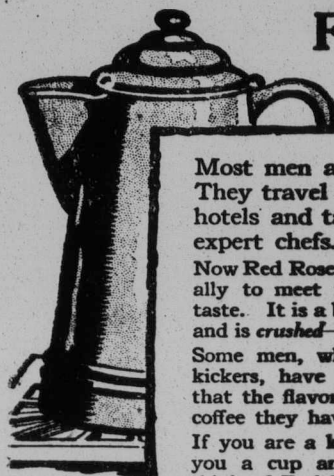
November 10th is the last day for registration. After that one who has not registered will be termed a deserter.

SISTER GODIN GASSED

Mrs. J. D. Paulin of Newcastle has heard from her sister, Nursing Sister Alma Godin, who went overseas two years ago as a nurse in No 6 Laval General Hospital Unit, recently contracted gas sickness from soldiers she was nursing in the ward of which she was matron. Sister Godin was removed to the Sisters' Hospital at Bozsguillarme, near Reuon, and later to the Convalescent Hospital at Etretat, and has completely recovered, expecting to resume her work on the 13th ult. She had been laid up about three weeks. Sister Godin says many nurses run the risk of being indirectly gassed. She has had several narrow escapes, one of them being at Ramsgate Hospital in which she was when it was bombed by German aircraft.

The Penalty Is Heavy For Violations of Military Service Act Regulations

Regulations governing exemption tribunals were issued by the Military Service Council last week. Here are, in brief, the offences cited.

Refusing or neglecting to attend for medical examination when required by local or appeal tribunal.—Fine not more than two hundred and not less than twenty-five dollars and imprisonment for not more than three months. The tribunal may further issue a warrant to apprehend the man and compel him to submit to medical examination.

Bribing or attempting to bribe any member of a tribunal, medical board registrar or any person concerned in the administration of the act.—Imprisonment for not more than five years and not less than one year. No fine. Employer stipulating or offering to stipulate with an employee for reduction of wages in consideration of employer exercising right, or refraining from exercising right to claim exemption for employee, fine not less than one hundred dollars and not more than one thousand dollars and imprisonment not to exceed six months.

Employment of men called out who after expiry of time limit set by proclamation had neither reported nor claimed exemption.—Fine not less than fifty and not more than one hundred dollars and imprisonment for not more than three months.

Employment of deserters or men absent without leave.—Fine not less than one hundred and not more than five hundred dollars or imprisonment for not more than six months.

The regulations also provide that after the expiry of the time limit for reporting for service or claiming exemption (in the present case Nov 10) any man reasonably supposed to be member of class or sub-class called out may be accused by any commissioned or non-commissioned military officer or by any police officer and his name and address taken. If the regulation says, the official questioning him have grounds to believe that the answers are untrue or evasive he may detain the man and take him before a justice of the peace to be dealt with according to the law.

What Will Canada's Answer Be?

OVER in the sodden trenches amid the bursting shells and the roar of artillery where Canada's boys are fighting and dying.

RUSSIA OUT OF THE WAR FOR THE PRESENT

Italians Lost 180,000 Before They Gained Left Bank of Tagliamento.---Allies Steadily Winning in the West

P. ulin, Oct. 30—Canadians this afternoon advanced to within 400 yards of the centre of Passchendaele. One heavy counter attack delivered by the Bavarians from Massemarket against the Canadians was checked by artillery and machine gun fire and smashed. The gain on the Canadian front was between 800 and 1,000 yards along most of it.

Belgium, Oct. 31—Since six o'clock this morning when the Canadian artillery began an hour and a half barrage, until 3 p. m., continuous fighting has been going on, the enemy forces launching one counter attack after another in a vain attempt to regain his treasured positions.

Opposed by troops as formidable as any in the whole of France, the central empire, our infantry is meeting them hand-to-hand and has gained one victory after another, sending them reeling back towards Passchendaele with heavy losses. No fewer than five counter-attacks have been repulsed, one against our right on the Ypres-Roulers railway, where our troops were opposed by the famous guards, another against our positions at Crest Farm, where Prussian infantry fought stubbornly to regain lost positions; two against Meetechele spur, where the Bavarians proved no match for our men on the left flank.

Wounded men give dramatic indications of the nature of the fighting in their detailed stories. Held up for a moment on the right by heavy enemy shell and machine gun fire our troops plunged forward and attacked Crest Farm at the point of the bayonet, killed, wounded or captured the occupants of the concrete strongholds, routed out enemy machine guns, turned their fire on the counter-attacking forces hastily thrown forward from the enemy reserve line behind Passchendaele Ridge.

The German positions on Meetechele spur, which were carried at the point of the bayonet, under a heavy machine gun fire, were the scene of a bitter conflict, but the enemy could not long resist the determined onslaught of our men, who, however, pay a tribute to the clean fighting qualities of the Bavarians.

Belgium, Nov. 1—The British today crossed Paddebeck bog and won and held all their objectives.

London, Nov. 1—The city of Beer-sheba, in Palestine, has been captured by the British, with slight loss.

but the gain of 1,800 prisoners and 9 guns.

London, Nov. 1—During October the British in France captured 9,125 Germans, including 242 officers. They also took 431 machine guns and 42 trench mortars.

Petrograd, Nov. 1—Premier Kerensky yesterday told the associated press that Russia, while she would not make a separate peace was too exhausted to fight. He complained that Russia had had to fight alone, and asked why the British fleet had not entered the Baltic.

Petrograd, Nov. 2—There is unrest in political circles in the Swedish press of the possibility of the taking by Sweden of the Aland Islands, lest they be captured by Germany. Finnish newspapers declare that in no case will Finland give up the Islands, which constitute Finland's chief defence.

Berlin, November 2—The Italians have abandoned the east bank of the Tagliamento River (parallel to the Isonzo) from the Fella valley to the sea. (This leaves over 1,000 square miles of Italy in the enemy's hands.) The Germans claim the capture of 60,000 Italians yesterday.

Berlin, Nov. 2—The Germans report that unnoticed and undisturbed by the enemy they systematically withdrew their lines from the hilly front of the Chemin-Des-Dames last night.

London, Nov. 2—Successful raids were made on German towns by Allied air men yesterday.

Washington, Nov. 2—One million tons of new ships between now and March 1; 6,000,000 tons sure and, perhaps, 7,500,000 during 1918, was the stirring forecast made by Chairman Hurley of the Shipping Board, addressing the assembled shipbuilders of the Atlantic Coast today.

Paris, Nov. 2—Occupation of Courtecon, Cerny, Allies and Cherveaux, in a French advance over a frontage of thirteen miles on the Chemin-des-Dames, was announced today, as the result of the German retreat from the Aisne sector. The Germans are straightening their lines.

Washington, Nov. 3—The United Press can state, as the administration's firm belief, that Russia, after a winter devoted to reorganizing, unifying and stabilizing her Government and military machinery, will resume her place in active military operations with greater effectiveness than at any time since the war began.

The ceremony took place in the drawing room, which was decorated with cut flowers, ferns and palms. Rev. A. S. Hazel, rector of St. Luke's church officiating. The bride, who looked lovely in a gown of taupe broadcloth, with black fox furs, a purple velvet hat, and carrying a shower bouquet of roses, was brought in and given in marriage by her father. Only the immediate relatives of the family and Lt. Col. Tingley, Major Evans, Major B. M. Hay, Lieut. Geo. Lutz, Lieut. Wm. A. Ross and Lieut. McKenzle were present. Lieut. Ritchie and Mrs. Ritchie left on the evening express for a short trip. Lieut. Ritchie is leaving for overseas shortly. The best wishes of a host of friends in both Carleton and Northumberland counties, is extended to the bride and groom. The bride is a sister of Mrs. Fred C. Morrell, whose husband also belongs to Newcastle.

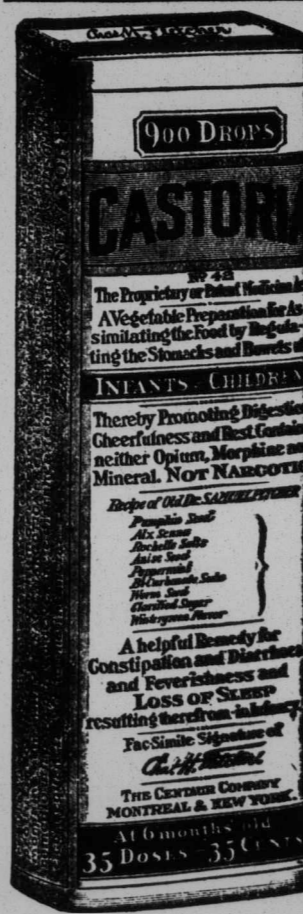
INQUIRING INTO CAUSE OF SHERIFF O'BRIEN'S DEATH

SIR WILFRID'S MANIFESTO

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, leader of the Opposition, has issued his manifesto to the Canadian people.

Sir Wilfrid claims that his "fundamental objection to the government's policy of conscription is that it conscripts human life only and does not attempt to conscript wealth, resources, or the services of any persons other than those who come within the age limit prescribed by the Military Service Act."

The first duty of his Administration, says Sir Wilfrid, would be "to find the men, money and resources necessary to ensure the fullest measure of support to our heroic soldiers in the front; and to enable Canada to continue to the very end to do her splendid part to win the war."

To this he adds: "As to the present Military Service Act my policy will be not to proceed further under its provisions until the people are given an opportunity to pronounce upon it by way of a referendum. I pledge myself forthwith to submit the act to the people and with my followers to carry out the wishes of the majority of the nation as thus expressed."

Sir Wilfrid goes on to say that the economic situation is critical and promises to inaugurate "Tariff reform, control of food supplies and prices, and put a stop to profiteering."

Sir Wilfrid condemns the temporary disfranchisement of citizens born in enemy lands, and the only partial disfranchisement of women. He would take long steps towards free trade, would review the award to McKenzie & Mann for the Canadian Northern Railway and would, if necessary, fix the prices of the necessities of life. He finally calls upon the common people to rally round his banner and give him a majority of the next parliament.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier never was the leader of a Canadian government nor the leader of the Opposition

in the parliament, some planks of his manifesto would have more weight. He now proposes to fix prices where necessary, but we fail to remember any definite concrete motion of his as leader of the Opposition, in parliament during the war, to that effect. While Sir Wilfrid's party in parliament the last three years often severely criticised those who were managing the country and individual supporters proposed all sorts of remedies for the ills of the body politic short of the actual inauguration of the out-and-out collective ownership of the Socialist program, still his party as a party and its leader as leader fought shy of committing themselves to any drastic change of the country's time-honored economic system. Sir Wilfrid took office in 1896, on a free trade issue, but he did not inaugurate free trade. When he gave a referendum on the Prohibition of the liquor traffic in 1898, and the great majority of those voting declared for prohibition, his government did not inaugurate Prohibition. What guarantee have we that Sir Wilfrid's fair promises now will be any more faithfully observed in the future than they have been in the past, especially since so many of the best of Sir Wilfrid's recent lieutenants have, on patriotic grounds, left his following and gone into the Union Government led by Sir Robert Borden?

Conscription of Wealth is a catchword which is bandied about very much lately, and to which very few attach any very precise meaning. Sir Wilfrid must make his manifesto much clearer and much more definite if he expects many thinking people to transfer their allegiance to him from the Union Government.

Sir Wilfrid while professing the greatest concern about winning the war, proposes to proceed no further with the Military Service Act until the people have an opportunity to vote on it in a referendum. Now the election is on December 17th. Parliament will meet on February 28th, and the organization of a new government and the preparation for a referendum on Military Service would, if Sir Wilfrid should win, take at least two months more, making it the end of April next before the Military Service Act, if endorsed by the people, could be again put into operation. And what would the Germans be doing in those four and one-half months in which Canada would be completely out of the war as Russia now is? The Allies need more men at the front—need them now—and any delay in providing reinforcements to their war-worn battalions risks the winning of the gigantic struggle

on which such momentous issues depend

SWEDEN'S NEW DEMOCRATIC GOVERNMENT

The general election in Sweden held during the month of September, increased considerably the strength of the Socialist and Liberal parties in the House of Commons. The standing of the different parties after the election will be as follows:

Socialists	86
Extreme Socialists	12
Liberals	62
New Peasant Party (with Liberal tendency)	9
Conservatives	61

Total 230

As a result of the election, the Conservative Government has resigned, and was succeeded on Oct. 19th by a Government of seven Liberals and four Socialists. The new Prime Minister is Dr. Eden who has, for some time past, been the Liberal leader in the House of Commons, and of the Socialist members Mr. H. Branting is Minister of Finance, and Baron Palmstierna Minister of Marines. Mr. Branting, who has for a number of years been the leader of the Socialist party in the House, is a Statesman of international repute and looked upon as one of the foremost present day Socialists in Europe. He is considered strongly pro-Entente in his sympathies. Baron Palmstierna was formerly a naval officer, he is an active Y M C A worker, and although belonging to the nobility, an ardent Socialist.

The new Government stands on a broad Democratic platform, one plank of which is the granting of political suffrage to women on the same principles as men.

The most important and difficult of the problems which the new Government has to deal with, are those relating to the country's position towards the belligerent powers. After having been sworn into office, the Prime Minister made a declaration regarding the policy of his Government, in which he stated in part:

"Our most important task will be to maintain the strictest non-partisan neutrality towards all the belligerent powers in accordance with the intention repeatedly expressed by the Swedish State, and the direct wish of the Swedish people, and to carry on the commercial politics in conformity thereto."

Dr. Eden further expressed his and his colleagues hopes that the war may be followed by a lasting peace and an International state of Justice which will render it possible to

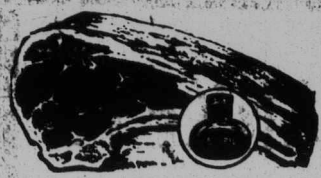

000.00 annually, and its iron ore deposits which are among the best in the world. Its chief articles of export are therefore, lumber and its manufactures, iron ore, steel and iron products, pulp and paper.

Sweden imports grain, coal, cotton, etc., and like all other small nations in Europe, its position during the war has become increasingly difficult. Sweden claims coal is an absolute necessity to keep the wheels of industry turning, and since Great Britain put the embargo on all exports of coal, it has obtained a limited quantity of coal from Germany in exchange for iron ore. For food stuffs, the country has more and more been thrown on its own resources, and the strictest Government control is exercised over all available food stuffs and the distribution of same at fixed prices.

The rumors that have from time to time been heard to the effect that Sweden intended to join in the war on the side of Germany, have, undoubtedly, been without foundation. While Sweden would hesitate to join in the war against Germany, with its 1500 miles of coast line exposed to attacks by the German fleet, the sympathies entertained by a great portion of its people for the Entente Allies and the United States make it unthinkable that the country would join in the war against these nations. The new Democratic Government which is the fruit of a deeply rooted Democratic movement in the nation, is a further safeguard for its continued neutrality.

A HEALTH SURVEY

John Hall, public health officer of East Orange, N. J., has arrived in New Brunswick, at the invitation of the Provincial Government, to undertake a survey of health and sanitary conditions throughout the province. His work will include investigation of conditions affecting public health and present methods of dealing with health problems. In his report he will deal with conditions as they exist, indicate what work should be undertaken, with a view to improving conditions, and give an outline of suitable provincial organization to carry on the work of the proposed provincial health department, according to most modern ideas.

Mr. Hall will be in the province three or four weeks, and will investigate the cities and the larger towns. The mission is an excellent one, and it is hoped that Mr. Hall will find time to visit Newcastle and Chatham and all the other important places on the North Shore.

"NO TIME FOR PARTY POLITICS"

The Chatham Commercial (Liberal) has the following editorial this week re Dominion politics:

"The present is no time for the display of party politics, and in this county as in all others in the province, people of all shades of opinion should unite to support candidates pledged to the Win-the-War policy of the Union Government. There can be no possible opposition to Mr W S Loggie on the score of his attitude on the matter, and if any opposition to him does develop it will come from those who put party before country, and have axes of their own to grind."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may home stead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase ed homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

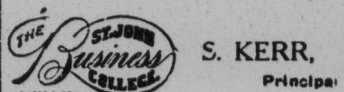
